

The Canada Brush Company, The White Candy Company, Scovil Bros. & Co., and the Automobile Foctory at Coldbrook, are mentioned as having contributed greatly to industrial progress, in or near the city of St. John, where, it is estimated, that the cost of new buildings, erected for manufacturing purposes, and the work upon enlargement, was \$550,000.

During the past twelve months, there have been fitty-four accidents, two of whick were fatal. Machinery, however, is being more carefully guarded, and particular attention is paid to this by industrial managers, but regret is expressed that the employes themselves, in far too many cases, are indifferent to the efforts put forth to protect them. In this connection, the inspector states that, in several cases, he has found the danger guards removed by the employes, because they stated they were in their way.

Sanitation also is referred to and great difficulty is met with in dealing with health conditions. Strange to say, the report says, the chief difficulty is that many employes are not doing their part in this matter, by the exercise of proper care and reasonable cleanliness.

The inspector says he finds it almost impossible to properly enforce the law in regard to child labor, because of great difficulty in obtaining correct statements of age. In spite of the fact that all manufacturers were notified regarding the recent amendment to the law, some of them are still evading its provision and are content to go on in the same old way and violate any law, in order to obtain cheap labor. He says he proposes, however, to see that the act is strictly enforced.



London, Feb. 22—It is well within the probabilities that, a few years hence, the books that are read by the Queen of England and the royal children may be chosen for them by an "ex-navvy" (as the day laborers who build railways, docks and roads in this country are called).
