TWELFTH ANNUAL REPORT.

Your Directors in presenting the twelfth annual report of the Home, take pleasure in recording continued prosperity, while having no special feature of management to speak of.

Briefly mentioning the transactions of the year, and expressing the hope that our successors in office may, in continuing the good work, improve upon past methods, and increase the usefulness of the Institution, will constitute the chief feature of remarks.

As will be seen by the following statement the number of inmates admitted during the year was 62, being one less than the previous year.

Several of the inmates have been out on leave, during summer, but with the approach of cold weather they are expected to return. The number will then doubtless be quite equal to the accommodation in the building, and for the present this cannot be increased.

In regard to general management it again becomes a pleasure to acknowledge the great assistance the Ladies' Auxiliary has given the board of directors. The report of the ladies published herewith will show what has been accomplished financially; and for regular visitation and watchful care over the interests of the Home, in addition to help in sustentiation, your directors express warmest appreciation.

The Steward and Matron must also be complimented, their management being careful and thorough.

As to the finances in general the statement of the Honorary Treasurer, Mr. J. H. Dewar, will be found clear and explicit. The Home has been well sustained by subscriptions and otherwise, and it will doubtless be gratifying to all contributors and to the public alike to learn that no debt exists to embarrass the working of the Institution.

While thus speaking cheerfully of the progress of the Home it is with regret that mention must be made of the passing from among us of fellow-workers. Those thus mourned are Mr. John A. Cameron, one of the organizers of the Institution, and a regular attendant at the meetings and Mrs. E. L. Perkins, the honorary president of the Ladies' Auxiliary, a most devoted worker for the Home.

Doctors R. P. Robinson and A. T. Shillington continue, as for three years past, to visit the Home when called upon, their services have b Gordon of the y e for

services being entirely gratuituous. Their prescriptions have been filled, also gratuituously, by Messrs. McCormick, Gordon, Kennedy and Watters, druggists, each for three months of the year ; and to all these professional gentlemen thanks are e for their liberality and prompt attention to orders.

The spiritual welfare of the inmates has not been forgotten. The Rev. Messrs. Timberlake and Lawson of the Methodist Church, Rev'd Mr. Milne of the Presbyterian Church and, until his removal from the locality, the Rev. Mr. Bousfield, of the Anglican Church, have been weekly visitors. The choirs of nox, McLeod and Bell street churches, and representatives

of the Y. M. C. A., and the Christian Endeavor Union of the Methodist Church have also visited the Home, conducting song-service and prayer once a week, making the evenings very pleasant for the old men, who are always pleased at the interest shown in their comfort and spiritual welfare.

Lastly, our legal friend must not be overlooked. Mr. Wentworth Greene, barrister, continues to devote much valuable time to the interests of the Home.
