NOTICES.

THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE will meet on the second Tuesday of February, May, August and November, at 4 o'clock, in the Synod office, University street.

ANNUAL SERMONS are appointed to be preached and collections taken up as follows:

In January, on the first Sunday after the Epiphany, *for Foreign Missions.*

In February, *for the Mission Fund of this Diocese*, by Envelopes which are distributed in the churches on the first Sunday in the month and handed in with the Offertory collection on the second Sunday in the month.

In March, *for the Widows and Orphans Fund.*

In May, *for Theological Training*, in aid of the Theological College at Montreal, or Bishop's College at Lennoxville.

In September, *for the Mission Fund.*

In November, *for the Superannuation Fund.*

An assessment is made *towards the Bishopric of Algoma.*

An Assessment is made *towards Expenses of Synod.* (See page 787, Journal XVII.)

All Parochial Missionary collections should be made in each Parish or Mission, and forwarded to the Secretary or Treasurer with lists, *by the 31st December, on which day the Synod Accounts for the year are closed. Sums received after this date cannot be printed in the Treasurer's yearly report.*

It is not safe to send money through the post offices, except in the form of post office order, or by cheque or bank draft made payable to order.

The Secretary of the Executive Committee desires to call special attention to the fact that he acknowledges the receipt of all sums sent to him *on the days on which they come to hand.* If at any time such acknowledgment be not received in due course, the person who made the remittance is requested to notify him without delay, in order that inquiry may be made.

THIRTY-FIFTH ANNUAL SESSION
OF THE
SYNOD OF THE DIOCESE OF MONTREAL.

FIRST DAY.

The Thirty-fifth Annual Meeting of the Synod of the Diocese of Montreal was held on Tuesday, the 16th day of January, 1894.

There was a celebration of the Holy Communion in the Cathedral, at half past ten o'clock, by the Lord Bi-hop, assisted by Archdeacons Lindsay and Evans, Canon Norton, Rural Deans Naylor and Brown, Rev. H. Plaisted.

The Bishop read his charge to the Synod as follows:—

CHARGE.

DEAR BRETHREN IN CHRIST,—I have not the usual routine of duties performed to bring before you to-day. As you are already well aware, it has pleased Almighty God to give me the hitherto unknown experience of severe sickness. He sent to me the message which Isaiah the prophet took to Hezekiah: "Set thine house in order," and as in the case of the Jewish king, God has granted me, in answer to the earnest affectionate prayers of the Church, of which I am chief pastor, prolonged life. First, to Him therefore, the Author of all being, I offer up my humble thanks for the great blessing of life, with powers of mind and body, enabling me to take an intelligent interest and part in the progress of the Church over which I preside. I pray that in His abundant love and mercy He will give me of His Holy Spirit to guide my thoughts and prayers into channels useful to you as you go on your way, busy in your several duties for the suppression of evil and the promotion of good in a wicked world. I desire also to express here to you my grateful thanks for the sympathy and love shown me during my illness by all my brethren and friends, lay and clerical. I am now pursuing the course laid down for me by my medical advisers, and am taking the rest from public speaking which they consider necessary; but I trust that soon I shall be able to visit you again in your parishes, and resume that intercourse which I valued so highly, and so sorely miss. There cannot remain to me now many years of life, but such as in the providence of God I am permitted to enjoy, I hope to pass in active service for you and with you. True happiness consists in a sense of duty performed and of duties still awaiting us. To be wanted by our own generation, to be necessary to those with whom our lives are passed, may not seem a high ambition; but it will bring more content and cheerfulness than the uxorious indulgence of selfish desires, or of personal ease, or personal aggran-

dizement. Let every corner of your lives be full of duties, carefully performed, unto the Lord. The nearer we draw to the boundary line which separates this present life from the life beyond, the clearer ought to be our view of our relation to the great God and Father of us all. It is not permitted us here below to see the Eternal face to face, but we may measure the close of our own lives by the beginning, and enquire of our own souls how far they have progressed on that road toward perfection which the Son of God himself told us must be our aim. "Be ye therefore perfect, as your Father in Heaven is perfect" was His instruction to His disciples, before yet Christianity was a systematized course of doctrines, or the world had attained to any appreciable social civilization. This striving after perfection binds us on the one hand to God and His laws, and on the other to our fellowmen and their needs. Bear with me, then, beloved brethren, while I dwell for a few minutes upon the first part of the experience of life which brings forth fruit towards God, that life which develops in us, by virtue of our union with Christ, the graces of the Spirit, by growth in which alone we may presume that we are new created in His likeness, and have striven after His perfection. "He first loved us." This is the sheet anchor of our confidence. Without a sense of His love the best of men would faint at the magnitude of the task before them, and weak men would despair. Depending then upon His infinite love, let us ask ourselves, are we growing in love to Him? How shall we know? First, by knowing in ourselves an increasing and loving submission to His will. If we could choose our own lives, how different and how much more delightful would be our experience. So we think when young. Nothing wrong desired; nothing contrary to God's law; but we would find grand and wide opportunities for good. We would be benevolent, helpful, strong, wise with the wisdom of the world, that we might spend and be spent in God's service. Many a clergyman starts in life with such an ambition. I do not say that he is wrong. How shall we attain to the perfection of the Father in heaven if we do not aim high? But as the years pass by, a consciousness takes possession of us that we are not realizing our ideal. What is amiss? Are circumstances to blame? Have we no scope for our energies? No listening crowds to hang upon our eloquence? Does poverty trouble us with sordid care and with anxiety for the morrow? Are we weakened with sickness and sorrow? Do we seem to be without relief? Who can be good or great with such surroundings? If we do not fall away and faint at the beginning of this journey, it is because we are upheld by infinite and sympathizing love, and because we are impelled onward, our very difficulties His messengers to carry us past the dangerous and slippery places, and to plant our feet upon the rock of Christ's sympathy and strength, so that looking back, instead of finding our souls filled with fears and weariness and misery, we are ready to sing a song of praise for mercies vouchsafed, for good accomplished, if not by us, yet in us, and we are ready to say "not my will, not my will,

but Thine be done." We shall see in the will of God our happiness and safety, our success in life, and our growth in holiness. We grow humble, and with humility comes a pure love to God, the first step towards that perfection which must be consummated hereafter. But I said that divine perfection does not content itself with personal perfection. God does not satisfy Himself with the contemplation of His own attributes, albeit those attributes are true, all sufficient and perfect. He cannot—I speak with reverence—He cannot forget the creatures of His hand, nor cease to love them and do them good. We must then look out upon the world, look out upon our fellow-men, look out in love and helpfulness, as well as look in upon our own souls, if we would be perfect, as our Father in heaven is perfect. The constant habit of active love in thought and deed is as necessary to the attainment of God-like perfection as high thoughts of God Himself; indeed, there will be no high thoughts of God without the habit of active love. Men have often made mistakes about this double responsibility.

Fascinated by the beauty of truth, justice, love, and the other virtues with which we try to realize our ideas of the image of God, men have forsaken the duties of life altogether, and retired into lonely places, holes and caves of the earth, to spend their whole lives in vain and barren efforts to bring heaven to earth. On the other hand, some men have been so impressed with the active side of religion as to give all their time and thought to mere schemes for the relief of the distressed, until their thoughtless and ignorant restlessness has done more harm than good. Of such stuff, fanatics, agitators and visionaries are made. But the divine perfection teaches us differently. He who "maketh His sun to rise on the evil, and on the good, and sendeth rain on the just and on the unjust," requires us to walk with a love which is not too exclusive, but altogether beneficent. We have not to destroy evil so much as to produce good. We must favor industry and general improvement by making men feel that freedom and happiness lie along that road. Elevation of thought and enlargement of mind are seldom the fruit of selfish retirement, whether that retirement be the hermit's cave or the pastor's study. Dark and melancholy natures grow more distorted in over much solitude, until, instead of increasing in love either to God or man, dislike grows into hate, and the judgment is weakened if not unbalanced. So far, therefore, as you can, beloved brethren, be "active in business, fervent in spirit, serving the Lord." A clergyman, before all men, should be earnest, for he is a teacher of his fellow-men in all that pertains to good, both for this world and the world to come. He is an agent for moral strength and progress, as well as for religious zeal and enlightenment. Let each, then, look to himself that, through the power of the Holy Spirit, his mind is right toward God and his active service devoted to the welfare of the flock committed to his charge.

and a pastoral signed by the bishops has been issued to the faithful in communion with the Church of England in Canada, with the request that it be read in all the churches. It was right and fitting that a General Synod, to include all the dioceses, should follow upon the consolidation of all the provinces under one Governor-General. The Bishop of Rupert's Land has been chosen Primate, while the Metropolitan bishops have been given the title of Archbishop, in order that in external organization they may conform as nearly as possible to the style and customs of the mother Church. The declaration of the pastoral is that the General Synod, through the good hand of our God upon us, has been constituted, with the hearty good will of all. "In it and through it all our dioceses are so bound together that they can take sweet counsel together and speak with one voice." The churches in this province and the churches in Rupert's Land have each for some time enjoyed the great privilege of intercommunion; but the outlying dioceses have found themselves excluded from this source of strength and refreshment by distance and fewness of numbers, and it is right that they should derive what strength and encouragement they can from those whose geographical position is so much more favourable for progress and enlightenment. The pastoral further declares the Church to be the instructor of the young, with power to form the character for good, besides being the teacher of all, of love to God and union with God in Christ Jesus. It is, indeed, the peculiar duty of the Church to take of the things of Christ and show them unto all men; and for the due exercise of this duty the Great Head of the Church has promised the continual gift of His Holy Spirit. See to it, then, beloved brethren of the clergy, that ye be not lax in the matter of the instruction of the young. In these days of secular education a great responsibility rests upon you. It is an age of enquiry and research, and the younger as much as the older members of your congregations are eager to be taught the reason of the hope that is in them. It is open to the young men studying for orders in this diocese to gain the highest and best knowledge which the universities have to offer in what is generally called secular education; while in our Theological college they may devote themselves to religious learning in the widest and fullest sense of the term. I am thankful to say that the college now furnishes me with sufficient men to fill the vacancies occurring periodically in the parishes. The bishops, in their pastoral, complain that so few of the sons of our wealthier families offer themselves for the sacred ministry. I can echo the same complaint. Yet I do not know that I should lay too much stress upon it. What I want is bright, energetic, earnest, godly young men, apt to teach, willing to go where they are sent, whether it be to the remote missions of the country or the poorer districts of the city. Moreover, the bishops' pastoral hopes for greater missionary zeal as a result of the union of the churches, and the bishops would not confine the word "union" to the churches of our own com-

munion, always hoping that some means may be found for common sympathy and common work between ourselves and those who are working in the same great cause, though in formal separation from us. There is scarcely anything more to be desired in Christendom than organic union between the separated members of Christ's body; but we must ever bear in mind that to effect this each and every denomination must be prepared to yield something of its individuality and prominence.

In connection with missionary work, I wish to mention the Montrea. Diocesan Women's Auxiliary Society. Both in the diocese and beyond the diocese, as far as its means permit, but far short of the desire of the members, this well organized Society sends Christian greetings and substantial help in such form as seems to be most needed in any particular case. We in this diocese every year benefit by their wide charity. I may mention that they aid largely the Indian homes and needy missions in the Northwest, and contribute \$200 per annum towards the teacher's salary in the Washakada home, and \$150 per annum towards the support of the lady medical missionary in Japan.

I am sorry to say that the Mission Fund is not in so good a condition as we could wish. No funds are yet available from the Shelton estate, and every year finds us falling behindhand, notwithstanding the generous efforts made by some of our congregations. It is plain to me that many of our missions are insensible to the call of duty and of privilege. This cannot go on without serious consequences. You would not like that we should close any of our missions, and I hope greater zeal, especially in the more wealthy districts of the country parts, will be shown in the coming year. If God permit, it is my intention to send you a pastoral on the subject after Synod.

The Girls' Friendly Society is doing by no means an unimportant work amongst the young women of our communion. We cannot take too much care of our young people, or give them too much encouragement to persist in the ways of righteousness. The Boys' Brigade, a kindred association in its intentions and work, has also found a place in one or two parishes of the diocese, and has proved itself useful. I hope its numbers and strength may increase.

Dunham Ladies' College, with its furniture, is now quite free of debt. The friends of female education have lost none of their confidence in the value of the institution as a means of Church education. They have strong convictions concerning the ultimate success of the college, and they have reason to believe that it will be opened under satisfactory arrangements in September next.

In the course of last year the diocese has lost three aged clergymen. The name of Rev. Canon Robinson is closely associated with the Church of England in the Eastern Townships, as the family were loyal, liberal and devout, serving the country as clergymen and laymen, the women also showing a good example of hospitality and piety. the late Rev. Geo. Robinson, were, by their stable and simple characters, powers for good, not easy to over-estimate in these days of ambition and unrest. As clergymen and Christian gentlemen they were universally respected, both on account of their office and their personal worth. The Rev. I. Constantine, after a residence of forty-two years at Stanbridge East, retired, only a few months ago, at the age of 74, desiring to spend his last days in England, his native country. His death occurred shortly after his arrival. But he was a ripe Christian, and the summons would not have found him unprepared. Though quiet and unassuming, there were few men better known in the Synod, especially in his younger days, when he frequently spoke on the side of order and church ritual. We, who are left of these workers in the mission field of those far-away days when the Church in this diocese had hardly attained the age of independence, look around, and, missing the familiar faces, feel ourselves bereft. They shared with us the day of small things. They remembered the trials of ship fever and cholera, the difficulties and dangers of travel, unhelped by steam or electricity. Their places know them no more, and ours will soon be vacant. Younger men will be building on our foundation. What will they build? Wood, hay, stubble? God forbid! God, in His mercy, grant to these, our younger brethren, grace to build with the silver, gold, precious stones of Christ's own providing, so that in the day when every man's work shall be made manifest, ours may prove to be the true foundation Jesus Christ Himself, and theirs the good work which shall abide the trial and remain for ever. Since the Synod of January, 1893, there have been confirmed 392 persons—180 males and 212 females—and ordained 7 deacons and 6 priests.

Rev. Canon ANDERSON moved the adoption of the report of the Committee on Better Observance of the Lord's Day, seconded by Dr. L. H. DAVIDSON.

Moved in amendment by Rev. J. A. ELLIOTT, seconded by Mr. WM. OWENS: That the reference to the Sunday service of the Montreal Street railway be omitted from the report.

This amendment was withdrawn by consent of the seconder, Mr. OWENS, and by permission of the House.

The motion was then put to the House, and—*Carried.*

Moved by Dr. DAVIDSON seconded by Mr. CHARLES GARTH: That this Synod respectfully memorialize the City Council of Montreal, praying that this the representative body of the citizens of Montreal may be pleased not to grant further privileges to, or allow of the opening of Sohmer Park on the Lord's Day (Sunday), under the proviso contained in the Act lately passed by the Legislature of the Province of Quebec, in regard to this place; and further, to respectfully urge upon the Council the necessity of more rigorous enforcement of all laws relating to the observance of Sunday.—*Carried.*

It was decided that the collection at Missionary meeting last evening be given to the Mission Fund, \$34.48.

Major Bond was placed on the committee to act with Immigration Chaplain.

The committee appointed to suggest names from which to select one for trustee and one for member of Council for Bishop's College reported the following names:

For Trustee, Mr. James Ross, Mr. J. W. Marling, Mr. R. Wilson Smith.

For Council, Rev. Dr. Ker, Rev. G. Abbott Smith, Mr. G. H. Balfour.

The Bishop selected Mr. James Ross for Trustee, and Rev. Dr. Ker as member of Council.

At one o'clock the Synod adjourned.

Dr. DAVIDSON moved, seconded by Rev. G. OSBORNE TROOP: That the Synod extend its thanks to the Woman's Auxiliary, Branch of the Diocese of Montreal, for its continued efforts and most valuable aid towards the support of the Mission work of the Church in this Diocese and beyond it; and expresses the hope that in continuing it they may receive the richness of the divine blessing contained in the declaration of the Master Himself, that "It is more blessed to give than to receive;" and that a copy of this resolution duly authenticated be communicated to the President of the Woman's Auxiliary.—*Carried.*

Dr. DAVIDSON moved, seconded by the DEAN of Montreal: That the report of the Committee on Books and Tracts be adopted, and that the Committee be authorized to carry out as far as practicable the recommendations contained in the report.—*Carried.*

Dr. DAVIDSON moved, seconded by Rev. J. F. RENAUD: That the report of the Committee to act with Immigration Chaplain on Immigration Home be adopted.—*Carried.*

Dr. DAVIDSON moved, seconded by Rev. J. F. RENAUD: That the Committee on Immigration Home (committee to act with Immigration Chaplain) be continued, and that it be authorized to carry out the recommendations contained in its report, as far as may be practicable.—*Carried.*

The Executive Committee, whilst recommending the scale of grants contained in their report, in order to comply as far as may be with the Canon on Stipends, and equalize the grants for the Mission Fund accordingly, nevertheless feel that in a number of cases the parishes or missions are well able to do with a less amount than that mentioned, having regard to the capabilities of the localities as compared with other places in the diocese.

It was also resolved, that in the opinion of this Committee it is desirable to appoint from time to time a special agent, who shall, under the direction of the Bishop and the Executive Committee, visit such places in the Diocese as may be determined, and where increased contributions might be expected.

DEEDS OF RELEASE AND DISCHARGE.

The following resolution was adopted:—

That the Lord Bishop of Montreal as the President of the Synod, and the Treasurer of the Synod, be and they are hereby specially authorized and empowered to sign and execute in the name and for and on behalf of the

Synod of the Diocese of Montreal, any and all deeds of release and discharge, whether of hypothec, or mortgage, or otherwise, which the said Synod may require at any time so to sign and execute; and also to sign and execute, in the name and on behalf of said Synod, any and all deeds of transfer that said Synod may require at any time so to sign and execute.

ACTING TREASURER.

Mr. Walter Drake was appointed acting Treasurer during the illness of Mr. Charles Garth, with power to sign all cheques, discharges, deeds of obligation and mortgage, deeds of transfer, and all other necessary documents connected with the discharge of the duties of the Treasurer of the Synod.

After Mr. Garth's restoration to health, a hearty vote of thanks was tendered to Mr. Drake for his faithful performance of the duties devolving on him as acting Treasurer.

RECOVERY OF THE LORD BISHOP.

At the September meeting a resolution was adopted by the members of this committee, expressing their deep joy and gratitude at the Bishop's presence among them after the very serious illness through which he had passed, and at the same time their thankfulness to Almighty God for His gracious answer to the prayers of his Lordship's people throughout this Diocese.

SUPERANNUATION.

Rev. E. G. Sutton, S. P. G. Missionary at Edwardstown, has resigned the charge of that parish, owing to ill health.

OBITUARY.

The Committee have to record the deaths of the following clergymen:— Rev. Canon F. Robinson, M.A., formerly rector of Abbotsford and Rouge-mont; Rev. Hugh Montgomery, formerly rector of St. Armand West; and Rev. I. Constantine, M.A., for many years rector of Stanbridge East, from which charge he retired on 30th September last.

LAPRAIRIE.

The Church building and lots at Laprairie have been sold for \$900, of which \$250 were paid at the passing of the deed, the balance payable with interest at 6 per cent. in three equal annual instalments. The purchaser undertook to pull down the building within two months after the passing of the deed. A resolution was adopted authorizing the sale as above.

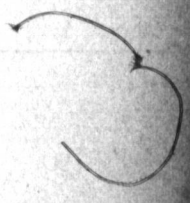

REPORT OF THE SUB-COMMITTEE ON GRANTS TO THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF THE DIOCESE OF MONTREAL.

(Ordered to be printed for the information of members of the Synod.)

The Sub-Committee on Grants beg to report as follows :

(1) That your Committee find that the total amount of anticipated revenue which is at the disposal of the Synod in connection with the Mission Fund for the current year will be in round numbers \$13,460.

(2) That the present state of the Mission Fund is an existing indebtedness of \$9,324 through overdrafts for several years past, necessitating the utmost care not to increase the expenditures beyond the anticipated revenue.

(3) That your Committee find that the terms of the Canon as to stipends of the Clergy can be fully complied with—save as to the Missions mentioned in the schedule herewith and marked with a cross, and to which the highest grant given per annum, viz., \$400, has been allowed, and whatever balance is necessary to comply with the Canon should, the Committee feel, be made up by the parishioners in the several localities named. Your Committee submit the schedule of such grants according to Canon, showing an apparent surplus of \$1,286.68.

(4) Against the apparent surplus there are the contingencies which arise each year, and the following instances, in which grants were made from the Mission Fund in previous years, but which are not included in the distribution above made, viz. :—

Montreal, Coteau St. Louis.....	\$400.00
“ Junction.....	400.00
“ City Missionary.....	400.00
“ Immigration Chaplain.....	400.00

In all, \$1600, not including any allowance for students, which may amount to \$400 more. In regard to these cases your Committee submit the fact for your consideration and action.

(5) As to the special cases intended to be covered by the resolution appointing this sub-committee, they are met in the schedule herewith submitted. Your Committee have adopted this course in dealing with them under the advice and with the consent of the Bishop of the diocese.

(6) Your Committee are unanimously of opinion that in view of the present position of the Mission Fund, and the heavy indebtedness against it, and having regard to the capabilities of many of the parishes and missions in the diocese, the demand upon the Mission Fund might and should be immediately reduced through more liberal contributions locally to the support of the Clergy and the work of the Church ; and they feel that some steps should be taken by Synod to secure this result.

(7) They also feel that increased contributions towards the Mission Fund of the diocese might reasonably be expected from several of the City Churches. In fact, there is need of much larger individual contributions,

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE BETTER OBSERVANCE
OF THE LORD'S DAY.

As the last decade of the 19th Century hastens to its close, it is noteworthy that the contests of our time seem to be gathering with ever increasing intensity and force around both the Person and the Day of the Lord.

Whilst the so-called "Higher Criticism" boldly challenges—as never perhaps before—the authenticity and the inspiration of the Sacred Scriptures with the Divinity and Atonement of the Lord Jesus Christ, the mammon-worshippers, the pleasure-seekers, the large crowd of this world's followers, have at the same time been untiring in their efforts to break down the inviolable sanctity of God's Holy Day.

The Lord's Person and the Lord's Day, in very deed and truth, are links in the same golden chain which connect earth with heaven, coming down to us from the beginning of human history, in their conjunction, and reaching forward to the Lord's second coming and to the millennial Sabbath for their ultimate completion and design.

In Holland, the Lord's Day has been sometimes called "Dyke Sunday," an appropriate title enough in that low-lying country with its artificial barriers against the encroachments of the sea; at the same time a highly suggestive title to all Christendom, in the recognized fact that God's Holy Sabbaths are always and are everywhere a "dyke" or protection against the floods of ungodliness and of abounding worldliness which everywhere surround us.

Your Committee, in their last report, emphasized the fact, then one in anticipation, as of favorable augury, that in the great Chicago Exhibition of 1893, the Congress of the United States had affixed the seal of a mighty nation to the perpetuity of the Fourth Commandment, by prohibiting, under national penalty, the opening of the Exhibition on the Lord's Day.

But now, in-retrospect, the hope then cherished has not been fully realized, since, after much conflict between the opposing forces of gain and godliness, the design of Congress and of its able and upright president was defeated, and the Exhibition was opened for the whole seven days of the week.

It is matter for thankfulness, however, that not only did many States of the Union, from first to last, invariably close their doors against any display of their wares and fabrics on the Lord's Day, but that tens of thousands of Christians from every part of the Union, of the continent and of the world religiously abstained from visiting the Exhibition on God's Holy Day, thereby proclaiming that in the mighty contest between God and the world they at least desired to be ranked on the Lord's side.

And to us, in Canada, as British subjects, it is to-day a matter of exultant joy that the "Union Jack," the meteor flag of ever dear old England, that has waved triumphant for centuries in the battle and the breeze, has now also waved from start to finish in Chicago's colossal exhibition, alike in

greater as in lesser Britain, alike with England and her colonial dependencies, over departments closed, over machinery silent, over varied products of earth, meriting and carrying in final competitive examination (Canada, in particular) to an unusual extent, the palm of superior merit, whilst, thank God, that merit has not been tarnished by the public and national breach of God's great universal law of the sanctity of God's own Holy Day.

In humiliating contrast with this gratifying national fact, your Committee are compelled to remark on the continued and notorious violation of the Fourth Commandment, which, in Montreal, perhaps above any other city in the land, still characterizes the Metropolis of the Dominion.

Here, above her younger sister of Toronto, Montreal still maintains her bad pre-eminence in her Sunday car service, thereby depriving the employees of the Electric Car Company of their God-given seventh day rest, whilst luring multitudes of men, women and children to a complicity in their guilt.

In Montreal, some of the wealthiest and most influential river and railroad corporations in the Dominion still start their boats in summer, or their cars through the year, on God's Holy Day, thus tempting their fellowmen to evil, whilst grinding the faces of the poor by exacting from their servants compulsory labor throughout the whole seven days of the week.

In Montreal, the notorious and openly avowed spectacular exhibitions of Sohmer Park are luring thousands every week to support one of the worst features of a continental Sunday.

Nowhere, perhaps, in all Canada is a "Nehemiah" more needed than in the Province of Quebec and in the city of Montreal, to contend, as did that grand old Jewish governor, with the nobles of the land on the self-same vital question, the perpetuity and universality of God's holy Sabbath day.

Alike from pulpit, press and platform, the Fatherhood of God and the brotherhood of man are constantly proclaimed as great foundation truths,—as doubtless they are. Scotland's favorite poet has emphasized this truth in lines which the American quaker poet Whittier says is one of the finest stanzas in all Burns' poetry:—

"For a' that and a' that,
The time is coming for a' that,
When man to man, the world o'er,
Shall brithers be for a' that and a' that."

It is coming, and with ever increasingly rapid strides, on the unerring testimony of God's own prophetic word, in this Saturday evening of the century.

And in no surer way can we speed the advent of that most blessed day than by honoring and exalting, according to our opportunity and ability, the Lord's Person and the Lord's Day in our ministry, in our labours and in our lives.

Your Committee would again recommend that the Clergy, as the standard-bearers of the Church, should preach, specially and strongly, at least once every year on the question of Sabbath Observance, and on the indefeasible right of the toiling masses, the poor of the land, to their everywhere needed and God-given right of one rest day in seven.

Your Committee would further suggest that the Lord Bishop of the Diocese, in the name of this Synod, be requested again to memorialize the Dominion Parliament to introduce or to promote the enactment of a "Sunday Observance Bill," securing by-law to all classes and creeds of Her Majesty's subjects in Canada the Sabbath day rest, which nature itself demands, and which God Almighty, in His revealed word, has given to every member of His large human family.

In conclusion, your Committee are conscious that whilst, in these humble efforts to secure a "better observance of the Lord's Day," they do but feebly embody the wants and echo the desires of many thousands of their brethren of every creed and of both sexes from Vancouver to Halifax, they are at the same time well assured that no prayer will ascend from earth to heaven more heartily, in this toilsome work-a-day world, than the suffrage to the fourth as to the other Commandments of the Decalogue, which the Church of England has put into the mouths of all her children: "Lord, have mercy upon us, and incline our hearts to keep this law."

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON BOOKS AND TRACTS.

The Committee on Books and Tracts beg to report that several meetings have been held during the year, to consider the question of opening a Depository in a more favourable situation than in the Synod building; but so far, owing to the expense involved, your Committee have not felt able to undertake the work, although they have received a very favorable application for superintending the depository from a lady well qualified for the work. The matter is still under consideration, and your Committee hope to be able, during the coming year, to accomplish this very desirable object.

During the year, the supply of Prayer Books of various qualities and prices has been kept up, and has been freely drawn upon, and a large number have been circulated.

Application having been made to the Committee for "Hymns, Ancient and Modern," a supply of these was procured last Fall, which has been to a considerable extent taken up.

Your Committee also procured from the S. P. C. K. a large number of Books, Pictorial, Illustrated, for Sunday Schools, suitable for prizes and libraries, and these have been to a considerable extent used for this pur-

pose, though there still remains a number upon the shelves of the Depository.

The Committee also procured a small supply of beautiful churchly Christmas cards, for Sunday Schools, which, to some extent, have been used by the Clergy and others. Enquiry was made of the Chairman, by the Sunday School Association, as to whether a grant of books in connection with the Church of England Sunday School Institute Scheme could be obtained, and the Chairman wrote to the Secretary of the Institute in May last, asking for as complete a set as possible of the books used in connection with the Church of England Sunday School Institute System, and in June last received a letter in reply, expressing the readiness of the Committee to make such grant. Since then the books have arrived, and are now in the Depository, and may be seen by any of the members of Synod.

They evidence an ample provision made by the Sunday School Institute for the needs of Sunday School teachers and Sunday School instruction.

At a late meeting of the Committee, the question of employing a travelling agent for the purpose of disseminating Church literature, the S. P. C. K. publications, and giving lectures on Church history, etc., was brought before your Committee. The suggestion met with the entire approval of the Committee, but it was felt that to undertake the work alone was perhaps beyond the power of our Diocese, and accordingly it was suggested that communication should be had, under the authorization of the Bishop, with the Dioceses of Quebec and Ontario, to ascertain whether it would be possible for the three Dioceses to jointly undertake the employment of such an agent and such work. It was also determined that before entering upon it, application should be made to the S. P. C. K. for assistance in the way:

1st. Of a grant towards the salary of a travelling agent for a period of three years and of \$600 per annum;

2nd. For a grant of books and other material necessary for such travelling agent; and

3rd. For a lantern and slides for use by such agent.

Your Committee have communicated, through the Chairman, with the Lord Bishop of Quebec, who has replied favourably, and is personally disposed to enter into a joint arrangement subject to the approval of the Synod. No direct communication has yet been had with His Grace the Archbishop of Ontario; but from private communications received from divers parties, it is thought that the scheme would be favourably received in that Diocese. Your Committee are impressed with the importance and desirability of entering upon this work, and hope that the Synod may authorize them to continue negotiations with the other Dioceses and carry out the proposed plan, always provided that the cost to the Diocese of Montreal does not exceed a sum of \$400 per annum.

REPORT OF THE COUNCIL OF THE DIOCESAN BRANCH,
CHURCH OF ENGLAND TEMPERANCE SOCIETY.

The Church of England Temperance Society in this Diocese has pursued its work quietly and effectively during the year that is past; there are no startling features to report, no change from the ordinary routine of the Society's operations.

The Council would once again urge the clergy to carry on their various parochial temperance undertakings in co-operation with and on the lines of the Diocesan Society. It would greatly assist in helping to determine the progress or otherwise of the movement in the Diocese, if the Rural Deans in their annual reports would give statistics as to the condition of the work in the various parishes within their jurisdictions. The want of such definite information is much felt from year to year when matters pertaining to Diocesan Temperance are discussed in Synod.

Since the Synod last met, the Royal Commission on the Liquor Traffic has again held sessions in the city of Montreal. The Lord Bishop of the Diocese, President of this Society; Very Rev. Dean Carmichael, 1st Vice-President; and the Honorary Secretary were summoned to give and did give evidence before the Commission.

The Council notes with satisfaction that the Quebec law of 1892, permitting the sale of 4 per cent. beer as no infringement of the License law, has been repealed.

The Council takes this, the first opportunity to congratulate the temperance workers and the temperance organizations of the Province of Ontario on the magnificent majority in favor of Prohibition polled in that province on New Year's day, and trusts that suitable legislation on the lines of the popular will may soon follow. In this regard the forward movement in Ontario cannot fail to have a beneficial effect on the temperance cause in this province.

The Council has observed with regret that some few of the clergy, both in the United States and in England, have advocated and do advocate the establishing of places for the sale of liquor under the control and direction of the Church. This Council hopes that the Church of God will never lower Herself to enter the saloon business in any form or under any name whatever.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CHURCH PROVISION FOR THE LUMBER DISTRICTS.

Work amongst the lumbermen has been carried on with vigour during the past year.

The Rev. J. M. Coffin visited last February on the Coulonge River ten camps, in which were 320 men, one-half of whom were of the Roman faith. He reports a kind reception everywhere, the foremen taking pains to get the men together for services.

The method of procedure which is followed in a general way in all the work is first to get the foreman's permission to hold a service, then when the men come in from work, a service of about forty minutes is held, followed by conversation and distribution of literature, for supplies of which Mr. Coffin wishes to thank kind friends.

The Rev. R. C. Brewer, of River Desert, has a large district of lumber country under his care, which seems to divide into two districts, one of them lying to the north of the Baskatong Lake which he visited first last winter, going from camp to camp and holding services with the men. The other district lies up the River Desert to the west of the village of that name,—two days journey. In this district he visited five camps containing from 20 to 60 men each.

In visiting these districts last winter Mr. Brewer travelled a distance of 735 miles, and ministered to 500 men, about equally divided between Roman Catholics and Protestants.

The importance of the mission of River Desert is growing year by year, and the Church needs to make her influence felt here with a strong hand. It is a work which requires special tact. The results depend very much upon the personal influence of the missionary with the lumbermen. In this connection Mr. Brewer wishes to testify to the good done by the eight years' ministry of the Rev. H. Plaisted.

REPORT OF THE DELEGATION UPON THE CONSOLIDATION OF THE CHURCH.

That all of the members of said delegation duly attended at the meeting in question, most of them remaining throughout its session. They endeavoured to carry out to the full extent the instructions given to them by the Synod, and believe that they have obtained all the points involved in the resolutions adopted by this Synod from time to time, as the basis upon which it would be willing to enter into and become party to a scheme for the consolidation of the Church in Canada. Such consolidation has been accomplished, and there was formed in Toronto in September last, with the concurrence of this Synod through its delegates, a *General Synod of the Church of England in Canada*, the constitution of which will doubtless be duly submitted through the officers of Synod. Your Committee take pleasure in communicating to the Synod the fact that the Very Rev. the Dean of Montreal was unanimously chosen as the presiding officer of the Lower House of such General Synod.

Your Committee cannot but express the regret which they felt at the time, that, owing to the illness of the Lord Bishop of the Diocese, he was unable to be present, and they lost, as the Synod itself lost, the benefit of his counsel and advice during this important period of the Church's history. The Synod itself expressed by resolution its sense of its loss in this respect.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION.

The Committee on Education beg to report :

That during the past year there have been no great changes in the work since the last report :—

The distinctively Church Institutions are : The Theological College, St. John's School, and Sabrevois College. These continue in successful operation.

Dunham College, your Committee is glad to learn, has surmounted all its

financial difficulties, and now bids fair to open in September next under most favourable circumstances. This Institution should have the warmest support of our people. Berthier Grammar School, of which the Reverend R. D. Mills has been appointed Rector, is, under his management, in all probability to become of great importance.

Your Committee would again call attention to the properties which have apparently passed out of our control, especially Missisquoi High School. Though not distinctly Church education, yet your Committee think the Synod should regard with deep interest the growth and improvement in the schools of the country.

It is important that the present provisions for Scripture teaching and instruction in morals in the Public Schools of the Province, and the relations of the clergy thereto, should be clearly understood.

The School Law and Regulations of the Province require: (1) that each Protestant school shall be opened with reading of the Holy Scriptures and with prayer; (2) that the first half hour of each day shall be devoted to instruction in Scripture and morals.

The Bible is a text-book for all classes. The course of study prescribes the chief events of Old Testament History for Elementary classes; for Model Schools, Old Testament History as in MacLear; and for Academy Grades, New Testament History as in MacLear. The Government Inspector examines the work in Elementary classes, and in Model Schools and Academies the pupils are required to pass a regular written examination each year.

A text-book of notes on moral lessons is recommended for the use of teachers in this department of their work.

The law provides that members of the clergy have the right of entrance to each public school of their own religious faith, in their district, at any time during school hours. They have access to all documents and records connected with the school, and they have the right to observe and to enquire about all the arrangements and management of the school. These are important privileges, and if the clergy took full advantage of them, it would tend to increase the efficiency of this department of Public School Education, and by laying a solid foundation of Scripture knowledge in the public schools, enable us to devote more time to definite Church teaching in our Sunday Schools.

It has occurred to your Committee that the interests of Church teaching would be promoted by a more careful supervision of the large number of young people who are attracted to Montreal by the superior educational advantages which the city offers. Your Committee are aware that something has been done in this direction in the past; but as the Normal School and the University draw from the country parishes and missions not a few of their choicest spirits, your Committee feel that some well organized system should be adopted to secure the interest and co-operation of these young peo-

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

MY LORD,—

This Committee, and none more important in the Diocese, was duly convened, but out of 18 members only 5 were present. It was seriously considered whether we should not ask the Synod at this Session not to appoint the Committee, but it was unanimously agreed to continue to act, even though it should be as a protest. Any parish that desires a special blessing in spiritual or temporal things must be actively interested in Foreign missions. For, indeed, as the wise man saith: "There is that scattereth and yet increaseth. And there is that withholdeth more than is meet—but it tendeth to poverty." In this work of Foreign Missions, honourable mention must be made of the increasing interest manifested by the Woman's Auxiliary.

At our meeting, held on the 14th November, among other things discussed, it was suggested:—

1. That stated Quarterly Meetings of the Committee be held in future.
2. That agents appealing for Foreign Missions under sanction of the Bishop be accorded a special welcome through co-operation of this Foreign Committee of the Diocese.
3. That three general Foreign missionary meetings be held in each year in different sections of the Diocese, in addition to the chief meeting to be promoted in the city of Montreal.

We are grieved to report a decrease of \$500.81 in the total amount although in some instances there has been an increase.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON IMMIGRATION AND COLONIZATION.

MY LORD,—

The negotiations conducted between the representatives of the Governments of Canada and United States during the past year will probably result in giving us a true idea of the value of the figures representing the immigration to our shores. Heretofore it has been impossible to correctly state the proportion which intended to remain in Canada, as it was well known that, for various reasons, many people landed in and merely travelled across our country on their way to the neighbouring republic. Of those who came to settle within the limits of this Diocese, last year, it has been found difficult to give exact account, as by far the greater majority entered by way of Quebec or Halifax, and statistics are not yet available from these important ports. But an increased number of young agricultural labourers have been provided with situations in the Eastern Townships, and Rev. Mr. Fyles, the efficient immigration chaplain at South Quebec, the headquarter-

ters, as it may be styled, for immigration work in the province and Dominion, reports that he can provide situations for many more such men than came to us in the Eastern Townships alone, and at a good rate of wages.

Some attention has been given to the philanthropic work of bringing rescued pauper and orphaned children from Great Britain. It may not be widely known that reformatory children and young first offenders against the laws of honesty and purity are sometimes sent to Canada by enthusiastic, hopeful individuals and local societies. If the clergy would in all kindness and quietness establish communication with those who in the old land have interested themselves in the children and young immigrants they meet with in their parishes, much good might be accomplished. Your Committee is not prepared as yet to recommend that any representations respecting this report should be made to those in authority. But some system respecting the rescue immigration and distributing work of children's homes might well be insisted upon, whereof the little ones should be furnished with their certificates of baptism for purposes of identification, etc. And the kind friends in England who do so much to give the destitute ones a good start in the new world ought, as they probably do not, understand how exceedingly lax is as a rule the method of placing their protégés, and how difficult it is to secure regular and definite reports of their progress afterwards.

They also feel that such a home could be made useful in many other ways in connection with Church work in the city of Montreal, and though unsuccessful in carrying out the resolution of the Synod adopted at its last session, they would express the hope that the Committee may be continued, and that the Synod may authorize it to proceed with the undertaking referred to in the resolution adopted at its 34th session, to be found on page 36 of the Journal of 1893.

CONDENSATION OF REPORT OF IMMIGRATION CHAPLAIN.

MY LORD :—

This report includes my visit as delegate from the Synod of Montreal to England last year. The details and statistics have necessarily been elaborate, and at my request the original report has been submitted to our Committee on Immigration for condensation. Still, I would request, my Lord, for the sake of those who may follow in my work, that inasmuch as the names, dates, figures, particulars and much carefully gathered information are essential, my original report in full, as read at Synod, be placed on file with the Secretary of the Diocese for reference.

The condensed report as approved by the Immigration Committee is as under.

MY LORD :—

I render to your Lordship and the Synod a synopsis of my work as delegate from your last Synod to visit England on Emigration work. It had become necessary to place affairs on a business footing as the large majority of immigrants landing here are English and of our Church, and the lack of

means to assist them as to even a lodging is lamentable, and the Immigration societies at home gave little assistance, in interest or in funds, as to watching over those they send to our shores. The need of an Immigrants' Home of our own is so urgent that it became one of my chief efforts to make known our great want, hence its prominence in my full report.

On landing at Liverpool my first visit was to Rev. J. Bridger, organizing chaplain of the S. P. C. K., who offered in every way possible to assist and promote our interests, although his work in Liverpool was not confined to Church lines.

Visited Mrs. Drysdale, a member of the United British Women's Association of Emigration, who gave me all information and offered her co-operation in all ways possible. Under this lady's supervision is the Emigrants' Rest, for girls and women only, but though undenominational, so thoroughly Christian, that such an institution was refreshing to inspect. Entire satisfaction was not expressed with the internal arrangements of Osborne Street House upon Protestant and Christian grounds purely.

His Lordship the Bishop of Liverpool kindly gave me an interview, strengthening my hands with his sympathy in our work, and with a letter approving of the effort to be made in the establishment of an Immigration Home in Montreal.

In London, with letters to Sir Charles Tupper, I found himself and Mr. Colmer both able and ready to help in advertising my mission, and I trust their promises have been fulfilled. I received afterwards a letter from His Grace the Archbishop of Canterbury, expressing entire approval of your wish and the desire of the Synod to establish a Church of England Home at Montreal for newly arrived emigrants. A copy of the original and my reply will be found in full report. As advised by the Bishop of London, I called at the office of the Self Help Emigration Society, and formally requested that the Secretary, Mr. Gates, should forward me a list of all Church emigrants. This he consented to do, and stated that a similar list should be sent to the clergy of the different denominations of the Emigrants up to date. I have received no such list from him, and my offer to care for and aid any of our own communion has not been accepted by this Society, doubtless from the dread of interfering with the province of their appointed agent, Mr. Marquette. I also called upon the Rev. John Kitto, chairman of the East End Emigration Fund, and subsequently wrote at his request. (Copy of my letter to him will be found in original report.) The chief points referred to are the scheme of work as already laid before you, an explanation of the workings of my office and its difficulties, our readiness to care for all coming to us, our willingness to procure shelter and work for those assigned specially to us, to act as guardian for those under age, and to accept the responsibility of expending moneys remitted for these. I also pointed out that inasmuch as the Rev. Mr. Fyles at Quebec, and myself in Montreal,

I requested that the names of the very Rev. the Dean of Montreal and my own fill the vacancy on their committee caused by the deaths of the late Revs. Rural Dean Lindsay and R. Acton, late Immigration Chaplain.

Reply received acknowledges all kindly intentions on our part, thanking us for our interest in their people, but states that Mr. Marquette, the Provincial Agent, is also their recognized agent, therefore they cannot specially consign their people or forward remittances to us. The result that such societies as the East End Emigration Fund and the Self Help sending out emigrants belonging to our Church, without introduction or reference to us, will be found in my full report.

Met by appointment Committee of the Church Emigration Society and Ladies Auxiliary with sub-Dean Sheppard presiding. After reading report of our work and explaining the need of our Immigration Home, I met with the most cordial reception, and was cheered by the promise of at least twenty pounds towards starting the Home. On another occasion, I urged this Committee continuing their work on their present Church lines; not amalgamating with undenominational societies, as pressed so to do. My thanks are due the Honorary Secretary of the Church Emigration Societies, also to Miss Tomlinson, the Hon. Miss Denison and Miss Gregory, for their interest in the emigrant English girls. I called upon the Rev. Osborne B. Allen, secretary of the S.P.C.K. Society, who, with Mr. Scott, gave me every assistance, and their kindness was marked. By advice I wrote to their Committee, fully stating our need of a home in Montreal, and our difficulty in raising funds without assistance from the English societies. I asked that the S.P.C.K. should make a grant of \$800 for this purpose; also stated that an additional \$400 should be expended in keeping open my office during the full business day, etc. I received in reply the Society's forms of application for a grant, stating that it was necessary to formulate a complete scheme, procuring a site, having plans prepared, before the necessary form could be filled up; that any necessary delay would not interfere with our project; that whenever the detailed plan and necessary forms were sent to them they would judge the matter on its merits.

I am indebted to Mr. Allen and Mr. Scott for much kindness and courtesy.

I had the pleasure of meeting His Grace the Archbishop of York at this office, who was greatly interested in our work; was astonished to hear of our difficulties, undenominational and otherwise, and thought immigration was controlled entirely by the Church; desired to hear more of our undertakings. We have His Grace's full sympathy and approval.

The majority of emigrants sent out by the several emigration committees are largely Church of England. Funds raised by these and other societies are chiefly subscribed by Church people. A large number on the committees

are Church-men. Last year the vice-presidents of the East End Emigration Fund were the Bishops of Wakefield and Bedford. The appointment in England of Mr. Marquette as agent of some of these societies to place, to arrange pecuniary matters, to rent houses or lodgings, etc., prevents our taking charge of our own people. We object to Protestants and Church of England people being handed over upon being landed at Quebec or Montreal to a Roman Catholic gentleman, even though he be the paid agent of several of these societies. Such action ties our hands, and leaves us almost helpless in our efforts to care for our own people.

My interview with the Hon. and Right Rev. the Bishop of London was, owing to his courtesy and patience, most gratifying. He coincided with your Synod's desire of procuring a Church of England Immigration Home. While in London, had several interviews with the Hon. Mrs. Joyce, concerning Osborne Street House, and the English girls sent out under the auspices of the United Women's Emigration Association and in connection with the S.P.C.K. Society. I desire to acknowledge the assistance rendered by the Hon. Mrs. Joyce in convening a meeting of the council of the U.B.W.E.A. It was held in the Board room of the S.P.C.K. building on the 23rd February, presided over by Lady Jane Levett. I was requested to open the meeting with prayer. Read Synod report of Immigration work, gave verbal account of my work and existing state of the internal management of the Osborne Street House. Surprise was expressed that Protestants might be sent to Roman Catholic families. Roman Catholic ladies being on the committee, they could not be refused if they desired to engage a Protestant girl. The Montreal committee now meet and depart without prayer as formerly. I objected to a Roman Catholic matron and frequently a Roman Catholic assistant, who was lately an inmate of the Home and the Church of England, being placed over our Protestant girls. I spoke in the kindest manner of the matron as housekeeper, but objected to her placing or having any authority over our Protestant immigrants. I requested that a Protestant resident secretary should be appointed by this council, and that she, with the Montreal committee, should have the placing of the girls and look after their spiritual interests, specially so on Sunday evenings. Finally, it was proposed by the Rev. J. Bridger, seconded by Lady Jane Levett, and carried: That the council of the United British Women's Emigration Association unanimously agree to recommend to the kind consideration of the committee of the Montreal Home the appointment of a Church of England permanent secretary to the House in Osborne Street, as a very large majority of the girls sent there are members of the Church of England. I thanked the council for this resolution in the name of the Bishop, and said I would earnestly endeavour to aid in all possible ways the Osborne Street House committee, if our requests were carried out. Subsequently I received a letter from the Hon. Mrs. Joyce, stating that she had selected, as requested by

the Montreal committee, a lady as resident and permanent secretary, who will have the placing of the young women with the committee, who will be the person to receive the girls, and keep track of them, and has been specially requested to supervise them on Sundays. The matron to be the housekeeper.

On her arrival, we tendered Miss Sadler a warm and hearty welcome, offering to assist her in every way possible.

I am sorry to state that I have not been altogether satisfied with the management.

Interviewed the Rev. W. Carlile, honorary chief secretary of the Church Army, also the Rev. W. H. Hunt. Interested these gentlemen in our Canadian work. The Archbishops of Canterbury, Dublin and Armagh, with most of the English bishops, are patrons of this society. During the season this Association has sent to my care eighteen recommended men, most of whom are doing well. The Church Army has promised to assist in maintaining our Immigrants Home. Mr. Hunt writes:—"I am glad the Bishop and Synod of Montreal are strongly disposed to set up a receiving home for Church of England Immigrants, so that they may at least secure the sympathy and co-operation of earnest minded churchmen after their arrival in the new country.

Tower Hamlets Mission Emigration and Colonization Fund, whose late president was the great and good Earl of Shaftesbury, K.G., does grand work. We have promised Captain Andrew Hamilton, honorary secretary, to assist him in placing and caring for any families or individuals his society may send to our care. The Church of England Central Society for providing homes for waifs and strays was visited. The Archbishops of Canterbury and York are its presidents. Forty Bishops and many Dukes, Earls and Lords are vice-Presidents. The efficient secretary being Mr. E. De M. Rudolph.

Visited Dr. Barnardo's Home, a wonderfully organized institution. Frequently Church of England children are sent to this home to be emigrated. Offered Dr. Barnardo to care for any young people he might send out to Montreal.

Visited Canon Cooper, Church House, who still carries on his emigration work.

Endeavoured to procure some reliable information of a Mr. Pady, who for several years past has gathered up boys and girls from workhouses and other places, and brought them out to Montreal, leaving them there in several cases without any protector to care for their wants and needs. Could find nothing reliable concerning him or his work. I have cared for some of these little people, saved some from prison and penitentiary. Such work as this could be put down by a strong hand.

Visited Mr. J. T. Middlemore at Birmingham; few more interested than

he in emigration. His work in Canada is so well known that it requires no words from us.

Mr. A. Hill of Birmingham is also greatly interested in the Children's Emigration Home, St. Luke's Road.

Called upon Mrs. Foster, Emigration agent, Bristol. Was not aware of an Immigration Chaplain in Montreal. Stated she received a letter from a provincial agent offering to transact all business in connection with immigration work, consequently this undenominational society, with the Bishop as its president, utilizes the provincial agent, appointing him to place and look after all sent to him from Bristol, girls as well as boys, allowing him a grant for this work as their agent.

Called upon Bishop Marsden, solicited his interest and co-operation in our desire to care for our Protestant people. 'Although' Mrs. Foster promised to write and inform me of those she would send out, up to the present I have received no notification. She still corresponds with, and sends our people to Mr. Marquette. At Bishop Marsden's suggestion I wrote a letter to be seen on file addressed to the Immigration Committee, but up to the present no practical results have followed.

When in Glasgow, I visited Mr. Quarrier's City Homes for Working Boys, etc. Fewer nobler works are carried on by the man whom Glasgow loves to honour.

There are 19 societies in London engaged in general Emigration work; 8 societies for women only, 10 for children. Societies also in Birmingham, Bristol, Liverpool and Glasgow.

Praying to the great Father of us all to bless and prosper this my work of love for Jesus' sake, and earnestly trusting that my efforts will meet with the approval of your Lordship and this Synod, the whole of which is respectfully submitted.

REPORTS ON RECTORIES QUESTION.

(Printed for the information of the Members of the Synod.)

On the question, "regarding the powers which belong to the Rectors of Parishes which originally formed parts of Crown Rectories," referred to a special Committee of Synod at its 33rd session, the undersigned members of such Committee beg to submit the following report:—

FACTS.

By the Provincial Statute 35th Vict., ch. 19, the Synod was authorized by Canon to divide any Parish in this Diocese, constituted for ecclesiastical purposes by Royal Letters Patent issued under the provisions of the Imperial Act, 31st George III., ch. 31, into two or more Parishes; to establish, from time to time, the limits of each new parish so constituted; and afterwards to subdivide the same, if deemed necessary, and to vest in such division or subdivision all the powers conveyed in the Letters Patent, and such additional powers as might be deemed necessary. It being provided that such division and distribution of powers and additional powers should not take effect without the consent of the Rector in office at the time the Act came into force (23rd February, 1872), or until after his death.

In June, 1872, the Synod passed a Canon for the division of any parish then constituted under Royal Letters Patent into two or more parishes, by

Decree of the Bishop, with the consent of the Rector during his lifetime, or after his demise, to take effect only after confirmation by the Synod.

This Canon did not profess to vest the Rector or Incumbent of any new parish constituted thereunder with any of the powers conveyed by the Letters Patent, but, on the contrary, declared that he should not be vested with such powers, and should "be subjected to the provisions of the Church Temporalities Act."

Under the provisions of this Canon, the parishes of Dunham and St. Johns (which are Crown Rectories) were divided as per Decrees printed on pages 26, 27, 28, 29, 30 and 31 of the new edition of the Constitution and Canons of Synod.

And, by the several Canons printed on pages 20, 21, 22, 23, 24, 25 and 26 of said edition, which were all passed with the consent of the Rector of the parish of Montreal (also a Crown Rectory), thirteen parishes were created out of said parish, leaving the parish of Montreal to consist of all such portions thereof as were not assigned to these new Parishes.

These Canons and the said Decrees are entirely silent on the subject of the powers conveyed in the Letters Patent.

Then, under a Canon of Synod, passed in 1860, for the "Organization of Parishes," provision is made for the erection by the Bishop of new parishes out of any existing parish or parishes, with or without the consent of the Incumbent or Incumbents of such existing parish or parishes.

Lastly, the Rector of Montreal, who was alive when the said Act came into force, died on the 22nd day of August, 1872, and the clergymen who were rectors of Dunham and St. Johns when the Act came into force ceased to be such rectors many years ago.

The questions sought to be answered by the Committee, as arising from the foregoing statement of facts, are understood to be the following:—

Can the Bishop, under the provisions of the said Canon for the organization of parishes, erect new parishes out of the parishes created by the said Decrees and by the said Canons dividing the Parish of Montreal? If not, can such parishes so created by said Decrees and Canons be sub-divided under the provisions of the said Canon for the division of parishes under Royal Letters Patent? And if not, can the Synod itself divide any of such parishes, and if so, would the consent of the Rectors of such parishes be necessary to give legal effect to such division?

OPINION.

After mature consideration, we are of opinion that neither under the Canon for the Organization of Parishes nor under the Canon for the Division of Parishes under Royal Letters Patent, can any of the said parishes created under the said Decrees and the said Canons dividing the Parish of

MEMORANDUM

PRESENTED BY DR. L. H. DAVIDSON, Q.C.

On the question referred to a Special Committee of the Synod of the Diocese of Montreal at its thirty-third Session, "regarding the powers which belong to the Rectors of Parishes which originally formed parts of Crown Rectories," the undersigned, a member of such Committee, submits the following statement of facts and opinion:—

FACTS.

1. At the time of the formation of the Diocese of Montreal, there existed and still exist Parishes known as Crown Rectories, that is, Rectories created by Royal Letters Patent of the Crown issued under the provisions of the Imperial Act 31st George III., cap. 31, under which the Rector or Incumbent is constituted a corporation sole, and in regard to which it has always been held that interference with the bounds of such parishes could not be made even by Synod subsequently created.

2. After the formation of the Synod system, a Canon or Regulation was passed under the title "Status of Parishes," by which what shall be considered a "mission," "parish," or "rectory" is defined; but in referring to a "rectory" which is defined to be a "parish raising within its limits the whole of the stipend of the Incumbent," it is expressly provided "that it be understood that nothing herein shall be regarded as affecting Parishes erected by Letters Patent from the Crown."

3. At the Twelfth Synod, a report on the "Division of Parishes" was made and adopted by the Synod, in which it was provided as follows:—

"That it would be advisable to apply to the Legislature of the Province of Quebec for an Act to vest in the Synod the power of dividing existing parishes under Letters Patent into two or more parishes, and for that purpose authorize the Synod to confer upon each parish thus separated all the powers conveyed by the said Letters Patent;

"Secondly. To confer upon the said Synod all the necessary power and authority to establish, from time to time, the limits of each Parish so con-

to the Legislature of the Province of Quebec, in December, 1871, for power,
as stated in the Preamble : " from time to time, to subdivide Parishes con-
stituted for Ecclesiastical purposes by Royal Letters Patent issued under
the provisions of the Imperial Act, 31st George III., cap. 31, into two or more
Parishes, and to vest in each subdivision all the powers originally conveyed
by such Letters Patent, and for other purposes mentioned in the said
Petition ; " and by the enacting clause of the said Act : " The Synod of the
Diocese of Montreal in Synod assembled is hereby authorized, by any
rule, regulation or canon to be adopted by such Synod, to divide any Parish
within the limits of such Diocese constituted for Ecclesiastical purposes
under Royal Letters Patent issued as aforesaid, into two or more parishes ;
to establish, from time to time, the limits of each new Parish so con-
stituted, and afterwards to subdivide the same if deemed necessary ; to
vest in such division or subdivision all the powers conveyed in the
Letters Patent, and such additional powers as may be necessary for the
welfare and good government of the Church not inconsistent with the
laws in force in this Province, and from time to time to alter, amend or
rescind such Rules, Regulations or Canons, and others to constitute in their
stead ; provided always that such division and distribution of such
powers and additional powers shall not take effect without the consent
of the Rector in office at the time this Act shall come into force, or until
after his death."

5. At the Thirteenth Session, the Committee on Division of Parishes
reported, setting forth the action of the Legislature of the Province of Que-
bec, and suggesting that a Special Committee should be named to report
at the same session, a Canon for the division of Parishes in accordance with
said Act. That Committee did report a Canon as follows:—

(1).—Any Parish now constituted under Royal Letters Patent may, with
the consent of the Rector during his lifetime, or after his demise, be divided
into two or more Parishes by the Bishop of this Diocese, by decree signed
by him and registered by the Secretary of the Synod in a register to be kept
for that purpose, and in such decree the limits of each Parish so newly
constituted shall be designated.

(2).—With the consent of such Rector or after his demise, the Bishop of
the said Diocese may in like manner subdivide the new parishes so con-
stituted in any other manner, create any new parishes within the limits of

the same, as circumstances shall render necessary for the welfare and good government of the Church.

(3).—The Incumbent of any new Parish thus constituted shall not be vested with the power conveyed in said Letters Patent, but shall be subjected to the provisions of the Church Temporalities Act.

(4).—In any portion of the Diocese not constituted under Royal Letters Patent, the Bishop may, by decree to be signed and registered as aforesaid, create new Parishes, the Incumbents of which shall also be subjected to the provisions of the Church Temporalities Act.

(5).—The decree to be made by the Bishop of the Diocese of Montreal in the subdivision of any Parish constituted under Letters Patent, shall take effect only from the time of its sanction by the Synod by any rule, regulation or Canon to be adopted for that purpose. (p. 282 of Thirteenth Synod.)

This Report being considered clause by clause, clauses 1, 2, 3 and 5 were carried, but clause 4 was expunged; and then on a motion to adopt the whole Canon so amended, clause 2 of the Canon was also struck out, so that finally only clauses 1, 3 and 5 were adopted. Two things are noticeable in this connection: (1) That contrary to the only power given by the Legislature, viz., to divide and confer on each subdivision like powers or additional powers as were conveyed by the original Letters Patent, the Synod refused to vest like powers in the Incumbents of the new Parishes so created, and subjected them to provisions of an entirely different character, viz., those of The Church Temporalities Act, which hitherto had no application, or only limited application, to Crown Rectories. This provision the undersigned has always held to be illegal, *ultra vires* of the Synod, and null; (2) that the clause permitting subdivision of the new Parishes was, so far as the Synod is concerned, expressly expunged, and, therefore, the Synod declined to give the power, although authorized to do so.

(6).—At the Fourteenth Session of the Synod of the Diocese of Montreal, in conformity with the Canon so adopted at the Thirteenth Session, the original Parish of Montreal constituted by Letters Patent was divided into ten parishes, it being declared in the Preamble to the Canon that: "It is passed under the authority vested in the Synod by the Provincial Statute, 35 Vic., Cap. 19, and in such Canon the bounds of each and every of the said Parishes are fixed and determined." In the case of one or two of such Parishes, subdivisions or changes in the bounds have been made since said Canon, but by consent of the Rectors of each of such Parishes and of their Vestries, as a rule.

or changed by action of the Bishop, or of the Synod, or of both combined, against the will and consent of the rector of the parish or parishes concerned?"

OPINION.

In this connection the points indicated in the statement of facts above mentioned in connection with the adoption of the Canon at the thirteenth Synod are important. Assuming the legal position to be, that a Crown Rectory, as originally constituted, could not be divided or interfered with without the consent of the Rector thereof (as is apparent from the application itself to the Legislature, whose power in the circumstances may itself be doubtful), it follows in the opinion of the undersigned that, acting under the enabling Act, the Synod could not legally deprive the rector of any parish created by the subdivision of the original rectory or parish of Montreal, of like power and protection relatively to the parish so created, as the rector of the original parish held as to it. The Synod might give additional power, not less. That alone, it is to be remarked, was the application authorized by Synod to be made to the Provincial Legislature; that with authority to give "additional powers to the rectors of such divided parishes" (whatever such additional powers may have referred to) was conferred upon the Synod; and when the Synod undertook by its own act to deprive the rectors of such parishes of these powers and rights, it exceeded its authority; and notwithstanding the provisions of its Canon objected to at the time, its enactment remains inoperative, null and void.

Further, the Canon itself seems to apply solely to the divisions first and originally made of the old parish of Montreal; since, clause two, providing for further subdivision of such parishes, was expressly struck out.

The undersigned, therefore, is of opinion that the only answer that can be given to the question which, as above stated, he considers to be involved in this reference to Committee, is in the negative; and in this respect he differs, though with diffidence, from the opinion of the learned Chancellor of the Diocese.

The undersigned holds that the parishes so created by subdivision of the original parish of Montreal are fixed and unchangeable, except by consent of the rector of any parish or parishes concerned; and that a new application to the Legislature would be necessary in order to enable the Synod or the Bishop of the Diocese to make such change in any of such parishes against the will of the parties concerned, or to deprive the rector or rectors of said subdivided parishes of any powers that were originally conveyed by the Letters Patent from the Crown to the rector as rector of the whole parish.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SUPERANNUATION.

Your Committee beg to report as follows: There are 26 clergymen qualified to rank upon the Fund, through having complied with all the requirements of the Canon, and 4 through having availed themselves of the opportunity afforded by the Canon as amended in 1884—making only 30 in all of the Diocesan Clergy who are in a position to avail themselves of the benefits of this Fund, should occasion arise for doing so. 35 are disqualified through being in arrears of annual subscriptions, and 26 through being in arrears both as regards subscriptions and the taking up of the annual collection for the Fund—the whole as shown by the subjoined lists.

Your Committee cannot feel that the above figures are satisfactory, and would respectfully urge the matter upon the consideration of the Clergy. Especially would they urge them not to fail in making the annual collection for the Fund, as it is now the rule to exact a penalty for every such failure, when a clergyman in arrears desires to qualify.

A lay member of the Committee having kindly volunteered to correspond with those clergymen who have not qualified, with a view to urging them to do so, the Committee have thankfully accepted his offer, and earnestly hope that his efforts may be abundantly successful.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON WORKS OF MERCY.

The Committee on Works of Mercy beg to report a most satisfactory shewing from all those Church Institutions and agencies it is their place to take cognizance of, as the following will shew.

ITY MISSIONARY'S REPORT.

I have visited the House of Refuge on Dorchester st. thirty-six times. The work at this institution consists in making enquiry as to the needs of those families which apply for relief to the Irish Protestant Benevolent Society and the Out-Door Board of Relief. I have made fifty visits to the House of Industry and Refuge at Long Point, for Divine Service, visitation of the sick and burial of the dead. I have administered the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper on five occasions to thirty-six communicants. At the service on Christmas Day there were over one hundred present, and twenty-five received the Sacrament.

I have made twenty-four visits to the rooms of the Women's Protective Immigration Society on Osborne st., and thirty-six visits to the Working Girls' Home. I have visited the Protestant Infants' Home for Divine Service, baptisms and burials twenty times, and the Montreal Foundling and Infant Nursery eighty-two times. I am glad to be able to report a very marked improvement in the building and the management of the latter institution, which has had the effect of greatly decreasing the high rate of mortality. The Committee were fortunate in securing the services of Miss Hall, the present Lady Superintendent, to whose able management the present improved state of affairs is largely due.

I have visited for Divine Service the Church Home nine times, and the Ladies Benevolent Institution seven times. As the agent of the Prisoners Aid Association, I have visited the Jail fifty-two times, and attended eight

meetings of the Association. Of the work of this Association I need not speak, as the annual report just issued gives a full and clear statement of the work done. I have made ten visits to the Hervey Institute, which is doing a good work in providing a home and education for some forty children. I have visited for Divine Service the Sheltering Home twenty-nine times. A service once a week is held in this institution; when I cannot go the service is taken by the Rev. J. F. Renaud. I have attended seven committee meetings of the Society for the Protection of Women and Children and thirty-eight meetings of the Fresh Air Committee. I have visited the Home at Chambly ten times, and accompanied three of the picnic excursions to Sherringham Park. I have visited the Protestant Hospital for the Insane at Verdun three times, and the Montreal General Hospital also three times.

I know that many Protestants are received into the Notre Dame Hospital and the Hotel Dieu Hospital, but the authorities in these institutions will not admit a Protestant clergyman to the public wards unless he can name some Protestant patient there and ask to see him. I think it would be well to call the attention of the Boards of Management of these institutions to the very different method adopted in the General Hospital, by which any clergyman, Roman Catholic as well as Protestant, can get access to the patients of his own faith. I believe if this question were brought to the notice of the Boards of Management of the two Hospitals named, a change might be effected by which the Protestant Clergy would have the same privilege as that now accorded to the Roman Catholic Clergy in the General Hospital. I would gladly visit the Protestant patients in these Hospitals if permitted to do so. I have made one thousand and fifty-eight visits to families and individuals in the city, and ninety pastoral visits at the Back River. I have thankfully to acknowledge my indebtedness to the Rev. L. N. Tucker for three visits to the jail, to the Rev. T. Everett for three visits to the Montreal Foundling and Infant Nursery, and to the Revs. T. E. Cunningham and W. A. Mervyn for three visits to the Home at Long Point, during my absence on a short holiday.

S. if there happens to be a Branch near them, and we would specially record our appreciation of the kind reception our girls meet with in Boston, where from the time they arrive at the Railway Station they are carefully watched over.

We regret that our President, Mrs. G. D. Redpath, has been obliged to resign her office, owing to her intended absence from Montreal for at least a year, but we hope on her return that she will re-enter on the work in which she takes such a heart-felt interest with fresh zeal. Her place has been kindly filled by Mrs. Botterell, who has long been a warm friend and active worker for the G. F. S. The Annual Service was held on 5th Feb. in the Cathedral, when there was a good attendance of Associates and Members. The Rev. E. Capel read the prayers; and the sermon, a most earnest and appropriate one, was preached by the Rev. Canon Norton, D.D. The Bishop was present and pronounced the Benediction. The Annual Festival was held on the following Thursday. The Annual Meeting was held in the Synod Hall, on 3rd May, the Bishop in the Chair. The reports of the various Branches were read and addresses given by Revs. J. F. Renaud, G. Osborne Troop and L. Norman Tucker, all of whom spoke in favor of the good work done by the G. F. S. The Rev. W. J. Dart of St. Lambert intends to reorganize the Branch of the G. F. S. which formerly existed in that place.

The officers and workers of the Girls' Friendly Society were much pleased at the kindly word of encouragement given to them in the last Report of the Synod by Rev. J. F. Renaud, who said: "I desire to acknowledge the great assistance rendered by the G. F. S. in looking after the interest and well-being of those girls who, as members, come to Canada."

We are still dependent on the liberality of the churches, and are hopeful that the interest already manifested on all sides in our good work in caring for the aged and infirm may continue and increase yearly.

PRISONERS' AID ASSOCIATION.

The Prisoners' Aid Association is a most valuable addition to our Church's agencies, and has been greatly blessed in its efforts. It meets the discharged prisoners, and by "advice, help and sympathy" seeks to give them a chance of making a fresh start in life, and becoming respectable citizens.

The following is a summary of help given.

During 1893, 146 prisoners have been personally dealt with. Of these 117 have been definitely helped in some way, 21 men have been referred to clergymen, 9 have been given letters to the Sailors' Institute, with the result that 4 of them secured ships, 16 were sent to the charitable institutions, 102 days' board and lodging have been given to men who were absolutely destitute and friendless, generally one or two days to each man, thus giving them a chance to look for work, situations have been found for 10 men, and 14 others found work for themselves while under the care of the Association, and in many other ways, material, moral and spiritual help has been given. The Association is composed of representatives from the city churches, the officers being as follows:—

He desires also gratefully to acknowledge the kindness of those clergymen and laymen who carried on his work while absent. The following figures shew his hospital visitation, etc., during 9 months of 1893: Visits to the General Hospital on week days, 101; visits to the wards 302; visits to patients when there were devotional exercises, 409; friendly visits, 622; total visits to patients 1,031. The Holy Communion has been administered, funeral services have been held, and the Sunday afternoon services have been carried on with unfailing regularity, and their success is due in a great measure to the faithfulness of the members of the St. George's Y. M. C. A., a detachment of whom are present every Sunday to visit the convalescent patients and encourage them to attend the service. The Chaplain is thankful to the Students of the Diocesan Theological College, who have conducted the services on several occasions when he has been unavoidably absent.

The Rev. Dr. Borthwick continues to hold services in two jails, assisted by members of the Lay Helpers Association; and Rev. T. Everett still carries on his gratuitous work at the Montreal Foundling and Infants Nursery.

Some thirty years ago, the Civil Provinces of our country, so feeble in their isolation, were consolidated under the one Government of the Dominion of Canada. The results of that union are familiar to us all. They foreshadow the advantages which we may look for from the union of all our Dioceses under the General Synod.

The life and rights and powers of our Dioceses will be just what they have been hitherto, except that a deeper meaning and fresh energy will be infused into them. For it is distinctly laid down as a fundamental principle that :

“The General Synod shall not take away from, or interfere with, any rights, powers or jurisdiction of any Diocesan Synod within its own territorial limits, as now held or exercised by such Synod.”

Another fundamental principle is that the General Synod brings with it no change in the existing system of Provincial Synods. The retention or the abolition of the Provincial Synods is left to each Province and the Dioceses therein.

The first act of the General Synod was to set forth the position of the Church of England in Canada, in the one Holy Catholic and Apostolic Church ; the foundations of her faith, her worship and her discipline, and her determination to maintain and transmit the same unimpaired. We repeat this solemn declaration to you to-day and desire you to store it up in your hearts and minds.

In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost, Amen. We, the bishops, together with the delegates of the clergy and laity of the Church of England in the Dominion of Canada, now assembled in the first General Synod, hereby make the following solemn declaration :

We declare this Church to be and desire that it shall continue in full communion with the Church of England throughout the world as an integral portion of the one body of Christ, composed of Churches which united under the one Divine Head, and in the fellowship of the one Holy Catholic and Apostolic Church, hold the one faith, revealed in Holy Writ, and defined in the Creeds as maintained by the undivided primitive Church in the undisputed Ecumenical Councils ; receive the same Canonical Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments, as containing all things necessary to salvation ; teach the same word of God, partake of the same divinely ordained Sacraments, through the ministry of the same apostolic orders, and worship one God and Father, through the same Lord Jesus Christ, by the same Holy and Divine Spirit, who is given to them that believe, to guide them into all truth. And we are determined by the help of God to hold and maintain the doctrine and sacraments and discipline of Christ as the Lord hath commanded in His Holy Word, and as the Church of England hath received and set forth in “the Book of Common Prayer, and administration of the sacraments and other rites and ceremonies of the Church, according to the use

“of the Church of England; together with the Psalter or Psalms of David, “pointed as they are to be said or sung in churches; and the form or “manner of making or ordaining and consecrating Bishops, Priests and “Deacons;” and in the 39 articles of religion; and to transmit the same unimpaired to our posterity.

The way to maintain and hand on the Gospel of the Kingdom of God is to teach its truths fully, definitely, clearly. All classes, educated and uneducated alike, have suffered in the past, and are suffering still, because there is a lack of definiteness, accuracy and depth in the teaching afforded to them.

The lessons of the Catechism and the Prayer Book are not vague and misty. They are clear and positive, like the facts with which they are concerned. Let all, both clergy and laity, see to it that these lessons are no mere sound of words.

The History of the Church of God in all its dispensations, and especially in the Christian era, ought to be familiar. The first planting, the growth, and the continuity through the centuries, of England's branch of the Holy Catholic Church, should be presented in frequent lectures everywhere.

It is a great encouragement to be assured that there are indications of growing dissatisfaction in the community with the absence of religious instruction from our public schools.

The General Synod has put on record its judgment that “Religious teaching in our public schools is absolutely necessary in order to fulfill the true purpose of education and to conserve the highest interests of the nation at large.” We urge all who are willing to be guided by us to use their influence to bring the education and training of the young into a true and close connection with the religion of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ.

Until this is effected, parents, sponsors and pastors should be unceasing and persistent in their efforts to teach the young all that a Christian ought to know and believe to his soul's health.

Sunday Schools, Bible Classes, Lectures and Public Catechizing in our churches may be made effective means of imparting religious instruction. Nothing, however, can be accomplished in any of these ways, either by the clergy or their lay-helpers, without intelligent, painstaking, systematic and persistent efforts.

The period of preparation for Confirmation is of inestimable value. The serious thoughts to which our young people are open, in anticipation of their Confirmation and admission to Holy Communion, and their desire to learn what their position and privileges and duties as Christians are, afford to their parents and clergy an opportunity which is singular in its advantages.

Instruction, however, is not everything. The training of mind, heart and soul, the formation of sound religious habits, the establishment of spiritual character in every one of our young people, these demand the combined un-

ceasing influence of home life and school life, of parents, pastors and teachers, of kindly lessons and worthy examples.

It is not right that any part of the child's life should be separate from religion, its influence and its lessons.

We repeat it, so long as there continues in the schools of our country the grievous severance of education from religion, parents, pastors and sponsors must put forth special efforts in every way open to them, so that their children may be virtuously brought up to lead a godly and a Christian life.

Next to the religious training and instruction of the young, is the selection and the education of suitable men for the work of the ministry.

Our Universities and Theological schools are doing excellent work, notwithstanding the hindrances which beset them, through inadequate endowments and insufficient support.

One fact, however, which will call forth at once your sympathy and your co-operation, weighs heavily on our hearts: Very few of the sons of our wealthier families offer themselves for the sacred ministry. They are drawn away by the bright prospects of wealth and advancement afforded by the secular enterprises which abound in our young and growing country.

But this is not all. They are repelled from the highest and noblest vocation in life by the unworthy views of the Christian ministry which are frequently expressed in their hearing, even in Christian homes. Some shrink from the indignities to which not a few of our clergy are subjected by reason of their poverty. You are certainly able to help us in this matter.

We call upon you, then, most earnestly and affectionately to see to it, that your children never hear in your homes anything which can lead them to think lightly or unworthily of the calling of a minister of Jesus Christ.

Take care, too, that you are doing all in your power to provide a maintenance, not for your own clergyman only, but for all the ministers of the Church in your Diocese and in the mission field.

It were well for you and your children to understand that "An unworldly church, an unworldly clergy, means not a poor church, a poverty-stricken clergy. A poor, unprovided, dependent clergy is scarcely able to be an unworldly one, and accordingly cannot betoken an unworldly laity. A laity which breaks the bread of its ministers into smaller and smaller fragments, and has none of the divine power to multiply, works no miracle and has no honor."

"Unworldliness is not emptiness of garners, but the right and noble use of garners filled by God. An unworldly clergy is not a clergy without a world, but one which knows the world and uses and teaches man how to use the world for God until it brings at last the whole world home to God."

The Church exists for the purpose of bringing all men into union with God, through Jesus Christ, and teaching them to know and love and serve

Him with their whole being. The more closely and completely she is one in every land, the greater will be her power and efficiency to accomplish this far-reaching object of her existence.

Accordingly we look for extended and more effective missionary effort as one of the brightest and best results of the Consolidation of the Church of England in Canada. The field, which the General Synod opens up for direct and promising labor, is bright and hopeful beyond the reach of man's imaginings. It stretches across this great continent from shore to shore. Millions in the near future will plant their homes over its plains. The Lord, who died for all, hath laid it on us in His Church that these homes should, from their first establishment, be Christian.

Beyond the Pacific Ocean there are millions of heathen who have been brought by rapid steamships within our reach. They are accessible to us, and our Church can now act upon them and among them with combined force and energy. Besides these, there is a multitude of heathen Indians in the Northwest of this Dominion, who have yet to be brought into the congregation of Christ's flock. There is also a large company of Christian Indians, whose spiritual training has already been undertaken by our Church.

We do affectionately ask you all to realize your opportunities and to rise up to meet them—not by one effort—but by persistent loving efforts from day to day, offering freely your sons and your daughters and your gifts of wealth for your Church's work.

It rests upon us all together, and upon each one individually, to do all that in us lies, so that "Christ may see of the travail of His soul, and be satisfied."

Many Christian bodies, separated from us, are working by our side, some in advance of us, both in the foreign field and in the Dominion. We yearn for union with them.

The General Synod has set forth the position which the Church of England occupies in her desire to recover and restore, among all Christian bodies, that organic unity which Christ prayed might ever distinguish His Church. The language adopted by the General Synod is as follows:—

We desire hereby to make it known that we adopt and set forth, as forming a basis for negotiation with any bodies of our separated Christian brethren, with a view to union, the following articles agreed upon by the Lambeth Conference, held in London in the year of Our Lord 1888, viz. :

- (1) The Holy Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments as containing all things necessary to salvation, and as being the rule and ultimate standard of faith ;
- (2) The Apostles' Creed as the baptismal symbol, and the Nicene Creed as the sufficient statement of the Christian faith ;
- (3) The two sacraments ordained by Christ Himself, Baptism and the

St. Simon's Church, St. Henri, has been formally handed over by the Rector of St. George's Church, as representing St. George Young Men's Christian Association, to the Rev. Samuel Massey, who has received your Lordship's license as Rector of the same. The church fabric well furnished has been transferred to the Rev. Mr. Massey, practically free from debt, Mr. Massey undertaking to assume the responsibility of meeting the yearly payments on the land. The Deanery commends strongly this method of Church extension to the wealthier churches of the city, building and transferring rather than building and holding.

IMMIGRATION.

In the last report it was stated that, as a Church, we could never do our duty to our emigrants apart from a central Church of England Emigration Bureau, supported by the whole Church in the Dominion. The experience of another year has strengthened the views of the Deanery in this respect. We hope for nothing whatever from the Boys' Home in this city, nor do we think that our Church of England servant girls should meet as their female guide in landing in this city a Roman Catholic matron in the Osborne St. Home. We need, and I trust ere long will have, a "Church of England Institute," which will provide for our boys and girls, furnish a proper office for our Emigration Chaplain and City Missionary, provide for the temporary needs of emigrant families previous to settlement,—in short, become a centre of Church of England charitable activity. The work

of Rev. J. F. Renaud as Emigration Chaplain is a ceaseless and ever anxious work, and he fulfills it with a zeal and energy in every way commendable. The following is a summary of his work:—

SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

The Deanery expressed its great satisfaction with the very successful S.S. Convention held last September at Bedford, and strongly endorsed the resolution of that body recommending the appointment of a Diocesan Sunday School Visitor.

RECTORY OF NELSONVILLE.

Information of the resignation of the Rector of Nelsonville was received with regret, and the opinion was unanimous that, owing to the peculiar circumstances of that parish, it is impossible for one clergyman to discharge the duties appertaining to the two churches of Cowansville and Sweetsburg with satisfaction to himself or his parishioners.

PROVINCIAL SYNOD ELECTIONS.

A communication on the subject of the election of delegates to the Provincial Synod was received from the Rural Deanery of Iberville; but inasmuch as a motion on the same subject is to be brought before the forthcoming Synod, it was deemed that any immediate action on the part of this Deanery would be premature and unwise.

CHURCH DAY SCHOOLS.

We regret that the re-opening of the Dunham Ladies' College is still in abeyance, the project for placing it in the hands of the Synod having fallen through, owing to legal difficulties. We still hope, however, that some way will be discovered for the utilizing of this valuable property for the honour of God and the good of His Church.

The Missisquoi High School property is still in the possession of an unauthorized intruder, but we confidently expect that, in accordance with the resolution of the last Synod, the necessary measures will be taken for its restoration to the rightful owners—the Bishop of Montreal and his successors.

DEATHS.

We have to mourn the removal by death of three clerical members of this Deanery, the Reverends Canon Frederick Robinson, Hugh Montgomery, and Isaac Constantine—all brethren beloved and honoured. We thank God for their good examples, and pray for grace to emulate their zeal in His service.

OTHER CHANGES.

The Rev. N. A. F. Bourne, B.A., has been appointed to the Rectory of Dunham, *vice* the Rev. George Johnson, transferred to Montreal Junction; and the Rev. C. G. Rollit to the parish of Stanbridge East, *vice* the late Rev. I. Constantine. The Rev. B. D. Mills, M.A., has resigned the Rectory of Nelsonville, and accepted that of Berthier, together with the head-mastership of the Berthier Grammar School.

In conclusion, My Lord, I am able gratefully to report that the Church in this Rural Deanery is more than holding her own against all opposing forces, and that her members are harmoniously striving together for the conservation and propagation of the "Faith once for all delivered."

RURAL DEANERY OF BROME.

MY LORD,

In the good providence of God manifested to your Lordship and this Diocese by your restoration to health, it is my great privilege to lay before you the annual report and tabulated statistics as received from the Parishes and Missions of this Deanery.

I make no attempt to analyze or classify these statistics, for the same reason as given last year, viz., that the Reports vary as to the time they include or cover. Two at least are from Easter, 1892, to Easter, 1893, and the others, in part, if not altogether, from January, 1893, to January, 1894.

The annual Chapter of this Deanery was held on the 9th of January just passed, and by the kind permission of the Rector, in the parish of Knowlton. Gore Rollit from Bolton for another portion of this diocese, where, however, if his future is to be judged by the record he leaves behind him in Bolton, the parish of Stanbridge East, whither he is going, will be the gainer. It is hoped that the mission thus made vacant will not be left long so. The Temporalities in the mission of Bolton have been greatly improved during the past year, and chiefly by the exchange of the old Parsonage and grounds for a much larger and more comfortable house, situated more conveniently to the village and overlooking the same. The exchange was made at the cost of \$200, and the building has been put into good repair. The churches of St. Patrick, Bolton Centre, and Holy Trinity of South Bolton have seen some improvements. In the former, a re-arrangement of the choir seats and the introduction of an ample pulpit made of brass, with crimson hangings; this cost \$70. The roof of the church was repaired at the cost of \$35. Another building was re-shingled at the cost of \$38. In the South Church a fine chancel lamp has been put in place; a new pulpit, a *fac-simile* in wood of the one at the Centre, and costing \$35. The horse-shed has been shingled, costing \$40.

Mr. Rollit speaks very warmly concerning the hamlet near the western bounds of Bolton and not far from the main road that leads to Knowlton from the East, and locally known as "China." The work there has been to him a source of great satisfaction. Service has been rendered in the S.H. three consecutive Sundays in each month. A large congregation is always present, and the services are heartily congregational. The drift of feeling is decidedly in favour of the Church. Ten persons (6 of whom are adults) have been baptized, and four buried. There was a class of candidates for confirmation, but the lamentable illness of your Lordship has necessarily postponed here as elsewhere in the Deanery its administration. An organ (\$60) has been purchased and placed therein, and given over for the Church's sole use, and this, with a lectern (presented by the Incumbent), lends to the services somewhat of the atmosphere of a proper church. A properly constructed and consecrated building for Church worship is here a something that can soon be realized, if the work is judiciously carried on. That the people here have been thoughtful of the welfare of their pastor, Mr. Rollit can testify fully.

The Rector of Knowlton reports, in addition to the usual returns made, that the Young Ladies' Industrial Society has procured a fine piano. In Bondville Mission the congregation have secured a new and enlarged organ, and through its societies has \$100 on hand for other purposes.

In Potton the Ladies' Society has kept up its good record of always coming to the aid of the Clergyman, where his comfort and that of his family are concerned. The Parsonage required repairs, and such have been made, the L. S. defraying the expense. Something more remains to be done to the

barn and the fence before the Parsonage to make everything complete. The church building is more and more giving evidence that its day of usefulness is well nigh gone, and that a new one should take its place. Delicate women and children, finding the place too hazardous to their health, have simply abstained from attendance during the cold weather. The time is not propitious just now for projecting a new church, as we are feeling very keenly in every way as a community the financial depression. "Money," is the general expression, "is not to be had." But the matter of a new church must be soon attended to.

In Sutton, the Rev. E. T. Capel has done a great deal of parochial visiting, and finding a larger number of Church families than he could well attend to, contemplated having an assistant; but if, according to a motion mentioned below, a portion is detached from his parish and made part of Brome, he will be able to work without.

The following is the motion referred to:—

"Resolved, that it is the opinion of this Rural Deanery in regard to the boundaries between Sutton and Brome Corners, the Mission and the people of the eleventh and tenth ranges in the Rectory of Sutton be advised by the Bishop to accede to the terms of the letter of the 23rd of December last, from the Rector of Sutton to the Incumbent and Church Wardens of Brome Corners, suggesting a temporary connection; or if that be inadvisable in their opinion, that the people living along the road between tenth and eleventh ranges in Sutton proceed in the regular canonical manner by petition to the Bishop, requesting a division and re-adjustment of the boundaries, and which the Rector of Sutton is willing to consider, if regularly proceeded with."

This motion which received the endorsement of the chapter, I was authorized to especially draw your Lordship's attention to; as also the following:

"In view of the fact that there is a large tract of country towards East Bolton on the South, Eastman on the North, Lake Magog and Magog Parish 8th range on the West, more or less populated with a number of families who are practically unreached by the Church, this Deanery would view with much satisfaction any scheme that would bring them within reach of its ministrations; and whereas we have been informed that the Church people of Eastman have offered to raise \$200 per annum towards supporting a resident missionary; we would therefore respectfully say to his Lordship, that, in our opinion, East Bolton, Dillonton (the Mines) and Eastman should be formed into a new mission, to the great advantage and profit to the Church, Eastman being the headquarters of the Missionary."

I. First, I wish to assure you, my Lord, of the sincere thankfulness of this whole Deanery for your recovery from your late serious illness—a thankfulness which has been expressed by resolution of the Rural Deanery in meeting assembled, and by public religious acts of Thanksgiving to Almighty God.

II. I have to report that the work of the Church in this Rural Deanery is prospering.

There are no vacancies.

We have lost the Rev. H. L. A. Almon from amongst us; but we have gained in his place the Rev. E. P. Judge, who, we hope, will long continue one of our number.

We also welcome as one of our fellow-workers the Rev. Alex. Elliott, who has been appointed to Eardley, where he is doing good work in gathering in the scattered members of the Church.

I am glad to report the following evidences of Church life:—

A very pretty little stone church is being built at Thorne Centre.

Material is being prepared for a church at South Onslow, and also for one near Clarke's Station in the Parish of Portage du Fort. St. Augustine's Church in Eardley has been painted, and preparations are in hand to complete a tower and vestry room in the spring.

A room has been fitted up for Divine Service at Kazzuabazzua in the Mission of Aylwin.

Missionary meetings have been held in every parish and mission in the Rural Deanery.

The Parish of Clarendon kept its jubilee and commemoration of the first confirmation on the 21st of June.

One Parish reports arrears of stipend amounting to \$800.00.

Some of these totals are less than the corresponding ones of last year, but a comparison extending over a period of years will show that the Church of England is more than holding her own in this part of the Diocese, and doing so in the face of many obstacles.

III. Meetings of the Rural Deanery. Two have been held during the year. The first at Shawville, June 22nd, attended by seven laymen and eight clergy.

1. A digest of the interesting reports of the Rev. J. M. Coffin and R. C. Brewer will be found in the Report of the Committee on Church Provision for the Lumber Districts.

2. Arrangements were made for a quarterly meeting of the clergy for the purpose of Theological reading and study.

3. The Rev. W. E. Kaneen reported that steps were being taken for the purchase of a house at Wright in the Mission of Aylwin for a parsonage. The plan was approved by the meeting, upon the condition that the Aylwin part of the Mission show their support by placing their names upon the subscription list for the purpose.

4. The Rev. H. Plaisted reported the acquisition of one acre of land at Clarke's Station for a churchyard. The ground is deeded and fenced.

5. The Rev. J. M. Coffin reported \$70.00 collected in Montreal toward the erection of the church at Thorne Centre.

6. The Rev. A. A. Allen reported \$100.00 collected for work on the Chelsea Parsonage.

7. The Rev. W. C. Dilworth reported the gift by Mr. Wm. Rattray of one acre of land at Bristol Mines for a church and burial-ground.

8. The Rev. W. A. Fyles reported the gift by the Boom Company through Mr. J. A. McAdam of heavy timber for the woodshed at Quyon Parsonage.

9. The Rev. J. L. Flanagan reported an opening for a church day school on the Pickannock Road in the Township of Thorne, but that efforts to obtain assistance for that purpose from the Colonial and Continental Church and School Society had failed.

The second meeting of the Rural Deanery was held at Aylwin, Oct. 25th, attended by eleven clergymen and six laymen.

1. Arrangements were made for the publication of a Rural Deanery magazine. The Revs. J. L. Flanagan and W. A. Fyles were appointed joint editors. It is believed that Church work throughout the Deanery will be materially advanced by this undertaking.

2. The Rev. W. A. Fyles read an exhaustive paper upon the subject of Representation in Provincial Synod, and the Deanery by unanimous vote expressed its conviction that the Canon on election of Delegates to Provincial Synod needs amendment in such a way as to secure a proper representation of all parts of the Diocese.

3. The following resolution was also adopted:—That on grounds of religious principle it is inexpedient that women should vote in our vestry meetings.

4. An arrangement was approved by the Rural Deanery between the Rev. W. A. Fyles and the Rev. W. C. Dilworth, whereby the latter undertakes to ascertain the possibility of reopening St. Mark's Church.

5. The Deanery also by resolution urges upon the consideration of the Lord Bishop of the Diocese the pressing need of assistance in the Parish of Clarendon, and also in the Northern and Western parts of the Parish of Portage du Fort.

6. It was unanimously agreed to place on record the joy and thankfulness of the Deanery that the Rev. F. R. Smith has in the good Providence of God been spared to come among us again.

IV. Sunday School Work.

I have to report a slight falling off in numbers both of teachers and scholars, as compared with last year's report. But, on the other hand, I believe it right to say that the quality of the work done is certainly improving. Many schools are using the Institute Catechisms by Palmer on the Bible and the Prayer Book, and the results are most satisfactory.

The Sunday Schools of the Rural Deanery are affiliated as a Branch of the Church of England Sunday Institute. The annual meeting was held at Shawville Sept. 21st. There was a large attendance of the clergy, S. S. teachers and others. An effort had been made to obtain the assistance of Mr. Buchanan, the convener of the Diocesan S. S. Committee; he was, however, unable to be present. Material assistance was rendered by the Rev. Thos. Garrett of Ottawa. An interesting feature of the meeting was a training lesson given to a class of children by the Rev. H. Plaisted.

The question of a Diocesan Sunday School agent was considered at much length, and a resolution recognizing the importance of urging upon the Synod the appointment of such an agent, with proper definition of his duty and office, was supported unanimously by all present.

V. Nine Parishes have made their annual contribution to the funds of the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge. This old Bible and Prayer Book Society and Church Building Society of the Church ought never to fail of the warm regard of the many parishes it has generously assisted in this part of the Diocese.

VI. I wish to call your Lordship's attention to the condition of the Parsonage at Aylwin. Should the plan of buying the house at Wright not be carried out, it will be necessary to make thorough repairs or to wholly rebuild the present house.

Allow me also to emphasize what has already been said regarding the need of addition to our clerical staff; two more clergymen could be profitably employed in the Deanery.

VII. Finally, my Lord, as a Rural Deanery, we pray that the Divine Head of the Church may spare you long to be our Chief Pastor, and that He may bless all our efforts for the furtherance of His kingdom.

RURAL DEANERY OF IBERVILLE.

MY LORD,

The annual meeting of the Deanery was held at Lacolle on Wednesday, the 5th day of July, 1893.

The members of the Deanery present with others partook of Holy Communion in St. Saviour's Church, after which the members of the Deanery, lay and clerical, assembled for business; and besides discussing other questions brought forward, the following resolutions were adopted:

1. That this meeting would recommend to his Lordship the Bishop the sending of a Student to Edwardstown for the summer months, and the continued work of such Student on Sundays until the adjourned meeting of this Deanery, when further action may be taken;

2. The matter of holding Missionary meetings in each Parish was disposed of by leaving it to each clergyman to make arrangements for his own parish;

3. That in the opinion of this meeting it is desirable that the Secretary of the Executive Committee should, within two months from the taking up of the annual collection for Mission Fund of the Diocese, make and publish a return giving the result in each parish;

4. We, the members of the Rural Deanery of Iberville, assembled in our annual meeting at Lacolle, this fifth day of July, 1893, beg to give expression

to our sorrow for our beloved Bishop's recent severe illness, and trust God will grant him perfect recovery and strength for the continuance of his important work as chief pastor of this Diocese.

The adjourned meeting of the Deanery was held in the Synod Hall, January 16, 1894, at which meeting the following report was submitted by the Rural Dean for the consideration and approval of the members.

CHANGES.

Your Lordship saw fit to annex the parish of Clarenceville and Noyan to the Deanery, and on the resignation of the Rev. J. F. Renaud, appointed the Rector thereof Rural Dean. The Rev. E. G. Sutton, owing to failing health after long and loving service to the Church, resigned the Incumbency of the Mission of Edwardstown. The falling out of the ranks of one and another of the pioneers of the Missionary work of this Diocese reminds us young men of our privileges and great opportunities, and also of the importance of being up and doing, "For the night cometh when no man can work."

The services have been acceptably conducted by Students of our College ever since.

CLERICAL STIPENDS.

We are pleased to note that no arrears on salaries have been reported, but regret to point out that the Incumbent of Sabrevois, although having given many years' service to the Church, receives still less than \$600 per year.

MISSION FUND.

Your Lordship finding the Mission Fund overdrawn to the alarming amount of \$5,000 made an earnest appeal to the members of the Church in the Diocese. That appeal was loyally backed up by your clergy throughout the whole of this Deanery, and the satisfactory result was to more than double the amount given the preceding year, \$301.17 being the amount paid in to the Mission Fund for the year 1892, compared with \$702.96 for the year 1893. For this we thank God and take courage.

NEW BUILDING AND IMPROVEMENTS.

There has been erected during the past year in the Mission of Hemmingford a Parsonage which does lasting credit to the Incumbent and his faithful people. We believe that it is impossible to find in the whole Diocese a better and more comfortable and convenient Parsonage. The Rev. T. B. Jeakins and his people are to be warmly congratulated on the successful completion of an undertaking which has cost in money and labor voluntarily given nearly \$2,000, and of this large amount (for a comparatively small mission) there remains a debt of only \$260.86. And we feel confident that those who worked so nobly during the past year will not

allow this debt to hang over them for any length of time to trammel their future efforts in Church work.

The Lacolle Congregation, ever thoughtful of their Rector's comfort, moved the outbuildings attached to the Rectory, at some loss and no little trouble, to a much better and far more convenient location, thus securing to the Rector and his successors for all time to come much greater comfort and convenience.

We are but rendering honour to whom honour is due when we say, judging from reports of other years and from what has been spoken and written, the Church people of the Mission of Hemmingford and Hallerton and of Lacolle have awakened as out of sleep to a sense of their great privileges as members of Christ's body, and also to a sense of their solemn sacred duty as such. May faithful discharge of duty ever characterize them, and may they never become weary in well doing.

As in every Mission and Parish there are to be found workers faithful and zealous for the good and well-being of the Church, so in Grace Church, Lacadie, Miss Simpson and Miss Charlotte Brownrigg, seeing the Vestry cold and bare, collected \$14.80 as a labour of love, for curtain material and for matting floor, etc. The Rector is also indebted to Mrs. Higgins and Miss Katie Brownrigg, for assistance in the work of the Sunday School as teachers.

Most of the families of St. Johns, Savanne, contributed seven dollars each for re-shingling the church roof and for a new fence around the church grounds, and a member of this church has bequeathed \$300 towards an endowment for the Mission. May others follow the noble example set them by this person, of making provision for the future welfare of Christ's militant Church on earth before entering into their eternal rest.

The church steeple at Sabrevois has been repaired during the past year at a cost of \$16.60.

DEANERY STATISTICS.

The following figures will give a fair idea of the general position and work of the Deanery:

There are 10 clergymen, 1 vacancy, 4 other stations where service is held, 646 families, 757 communicants, 74 baptisms, 15 marriages, 32 confirmed, 520 Sunday School scholars, 2671 books in library, \$42,800 insurance, \$260.68 debt, \$2,122.00 given through the offertory, \$6,575.00 Clerical Stipends, \$702.96 Mission Fund, \$153.74 Domestic Missions, \$64.90 Foreign Missions, \$2,846.01 for other purposes not named above, \$11,511.39 total raised during the year.

All the Church property in the Deanery is reported insured. No report from Ormstown.

RURAL DEANERY OF SHEFFORD.

MY LORD,

In presenting to your Lordship the annual report of the Deanery of Shefford, I feel that I am but voicing the sentiments of the Church people in this section of the Diocese, if I should first in their name express the deep gratitude to Almighty God by which we are moved, for His mercy in restoring your Lordship to preside over the affairs of another session of Diocesan Synod.

The annual meeting of the Deanery was held on the 11th of January in Waterloo, at which were present seven clergy and ten laymen. The annual returns of statistical and other information were read and thoughtfully considered by the Chapter. The number of Incumbencies remains the same as last year, viz.: two rectories, one parish and five missions—two of these still temporarily united, North Shefford and Roxton, with Warden for lack of another missionary, while Milton, Canaan and Shefford Mountain have been since last June under the pastoral care of Rev. T. A. Ball, B.A., and the work of Rev. Seth A. Mills, of West Shefford, has been extended to Glen Farnham.

The past year's work has been of an ordinary kind, and marked by less activity in the direction of church building, as the total results in the financial returns under the column of general purposes will show.

There has been an increase in the number of Sunday School scholars and of library books, in the amount of church insurance, and of endowments raised and expended on stipends. Church offertories have been more generous, and the stipends have been more promptly paid, no arrearages for the year being reported; and while we have drawn a little more heavily on the Mission Fund, having more clerical supervision, yet it is encouraging to know that the parochial contributions to that fund have increased nearly 25 per cent. over any previous year, and this increase has taken place in the majority of the parishes. We have also raised for Foreign Missions more than ever before.

The property of the Church has been carefully looked after, and is all judiciously and well insured.

In the Mission of Boscobel the church has been re-roofed. In Milton the old parsonage in part has been roofed, and a new organ placed in St. Mark's church.

In North Shefford the parsonage has been painted and renovated generally at a cost of \$140.00, also a wire fence round the grounds. In South Roxton, extensive repairs to the church. At Warden the ladies have done good work, \$160.00 have been raised towards the erection of an enclosed horse-shed, with lecture room. In South Stukely and Eastman the glebe has been fenced in the latter place, and the parsonage repaired in the former.

An exceedingly handsome brass lectern enriches the chancel of St. Luke's Church, Waterloo, it being another "Robinson Memorial," and \$300 have been raised for Dunham Ladies' College in this leading parish.

In West Shefford the parsonage has been repaired, and the sum of \$90.00 raised towards the payment of a debt of \$300.00 assumed by the Building Committee when St. John's Church was consecrated. The Incumbent of this place hopes to see the tower of the church completed before long—one generous contributor volunteering half the cost. At Fulford a horse-shed has been completed and paid for; also an organ for St. Stephen's Church.

As a Deanery we hail with satisfaction the efforts of the Diocesan Executive Committee to carry out the details of a scheme for a graded scale of payments for the Mission Clergy, and only hope that in time the salaries of all will be raised to a more satisfactory level, in accordance with the Canon of Synod. We shall try in our several parishes to do all we possibly can for the Mission Fund in return.

Owing to fluctuations in the Protestant population in some of our most promising parishes, the prospect of being able to report an increase in the near future of Rectories is not a bright one.

The Chapter has resolved to meet at an early date, and devote its time to the consideration of the arrangement of our Missions as at present existing, with a view to the better limitation of their boundaries, and to see if it be for the good of the Church to extend or subdivide some of them.

MY LORD,

I have the honour once more to present my Annual Report.

The Deanery Meeting was held at Lachute on Monday, January 15, when 6 clergymen and 11 laymen were present. The usual order was observed, the Holy Communion being celebrated and a sermon preached by the Rev. A. B. Given. The attendance may be considered as fair, but we missed many whose presence and counsel would have aided our plans.

Since last we met many changes have taken place. The Rev. R. F. Hutchings succeeds Rev. Chas. Wright in Arundel; Rev. B. S. T. Marriott takes Rev. H. A. Meek's place at Buckingham; Rev. J. W. Dennis is Incumbent of St. Andrews, succeeding the Rev. N. A. F. Bourne; Rev. E. P. Judge has resigned the Mission of Papineauville, which is at present vacant; Rev. Jas. Carmichael, jun., enters upon his duties as Incumbent of Vaudreuil, February 1, succeeding the Rev. L. G. A. Roberts, who has left

the Diocese; Rev. H. A. Meek takes Rev. Jas. Elliott's place at Mille Isles; Rev. Chas. Wright is taking temporary duty at Vaudreuil. Thus only the Mission of Papineauville is vacant, and that your Lordship expects to supply in the course of a couple of months.

When the Chapter assembled for business, the following resolution was first of all brought forward and adopted by a standing vote:

"That the Deanery of St. Andrews, assembled January 15, 1894, records its deep thankfulness to Almighty God, for the restored health of our greatly beloved Bishop, and earnestly prays that his precious life may be spared to this Diocese and to the Church at large for many years."

From the reports presented it will be seen that progress has been made and general interest manifested in Church work. The Church property is fully insured. The arrears due to the clergyman for stipend may appear large, and would not exist if weekly offerings were the general practice; but the amount is magnified by the report being made up at this time of year. The contributions to the Mission Fund show advance, and the clergy are not slack in advocating its cause very strongly to their congregations. The W. & O. and Superannuation Funds receive attention, and the former specially deserves our care in view of its condition at the present time, and of the possible demands which may be made upon it. It is pleasing to note the effect on the part of the majority of our clergy to put themselves right with these Funds, and I trust that our younger brethren will be careful to pay their subscriptions from the outset when they can best afford to meet the demand, and thus avoid having to pay up arrears later on when they can ill stand the tax. The offerings for other Missionary purposes have varied considerably according to local needs, but we should not be afraid to appeal to our people, who if they adopt some system in giving will be thankful for the opportunities afforded to identify themselves with the work of the Church as a whole.

The Woman's Auxiliary of Montreal have shown continued interest in our Mission work in the Deanery, and this year we are much indebted to them for giving to Laurel Church in the Arundel Mission a very handsome Communion Cloth, and to St. Aidan's Church, Louisa, in Lachute parish a beautiful Communion set. They also assisted the Incumbents of Lachute and Lakefield in their S.S. work by providing numerous presents for Christmas trees in Dunany, Shrewsbury and Louisa. At the Deanery Meeting the following was unanimously adopted:—"That the Deanery of St. Andrews records its thankfulness to the Woman's Auxiliary of Montreal for their gifts to the different Missions in this Deanery in years past as well as during this year."

Following my usual practice I would take the Missions in order, and mention the points to be noticed as of interest.

ARUNDEL.

Rev. R. F. Hutchings occupies one of the hardest and most trying Missions in the Diocese. There are many scattered settlements to be cared for; the distances are great, and the roads, though much improved, are often very rough for the traveller; the families are few in number; the circumstances of the people generally are humble; and, while there are many encouragements in the demands for services, Sunday Schools and pastoral care, many encouragements in the hearty co-operation, warm sympathy and simple piety of the members, yet the needs to be met, the limited means, the burdens resting upon the missionary of the nature of the pastoral office, of finances and of organization make the Incumbency of Arundel no sinecure. There are 3 churches (17 miles apart), but only one of them is really complete. Laurel and Ponsonby both require money expended to put them into proper order. A church is wanted at the Glen of Harrington, and a parsonage at Arundel is an urgent necessity. Mr. Hutchings has thrown himself heartily into the work, and deserves a generous response to the appeals for assistance which he expects during the year to make, and active sympathy with his work at the hands of the Church.

BUCKINGHAM.

Last summer a student was sent to assist Rev. Mr. Meek in giving special attention to the work up the River Lièvre. He resided among those he was to minister to, and the efforts of Incumbent and Student were well received, unusual interest being manifested in the services and other work of the Church. The Buckingham Vestry agreed to pay \$70 (if necessary), and the Executive the balance, to cover the expenses, but the settlers themselves raised all but \$45, which the Executive paid. If the new Incumbent is at liberty to continue and extend this new work, I hope the Executive may see its way to lend assistance towards this end. In the town the agitation for a new church continues, and will no doubt result before many years in the erection of an edifice in a suitable locality. The parish has many members, and it is to be hoped they will year by year assist increasingly in every way their hard-working Incumbent.

GRENVILLE.

This rectory continues to develop. At Easter the vestry decided to advance the stipend to \$650; and during the year over \$400 has been spent in improving both Trinity and St. Matthew's churches. The Rector and parish deserve much praise for the position they hold and for their activity in all Church interests.

LACHUTE

Holds its own in the town in spite of the commercial depression and of reduction in membership through death and removal. Louisa has taken the proper step and built a church for itself at a cost of \$1,050. The Incumbent raised \$400 outside of the parish, the S.P.C.K. has given \$125, and the settlement has raised or is pledged to raise \$520, most of which has been paid. Kind friends provided the Holy Table and Cloth, and the W. A. of Montreal the Communion set. The settlement may be congratulated upon its efforts, and the Incumbent well satisfied at the result towards which he has contributed very materially.

MILLE ISLES.

The state of this Mission is satisfactory. The parsonage is considerably out of repair, and no doubt in the spring the members will take the necessary steps to make their clergyman's home as warm and comfortable as possible.

PAPINEAUVILLE.

During the year a good parsonage has been built on the lot of land at Montebello given by Messrs. Owens. The Rev. E. P. Judge, late Incumbent, worked hard to secure this end, and was ably seconded by his parishioners. I understand the building cost \$1,200, about \$400 of which was contributed by good friends in Montreal and elsewhere, upon Mr. Judge's solicitation.

PORTLAND.

This is one of the border line Missions of the Diocese. It is certainly a hard post. There are two churches, 6 miles apart, at Poltimore and at Blanche Lake. Twenty miles north lies the White Fish Lake settlement, which looks to the Portland Missionary for pastoral care, and receives it. The road to it is only partly opened, and most of that is by no means perfect. Then towards Ottawa, 24 miles from the parsonage lies Cantley, a new station which has recently asked for services. The road to this station, as your Lordship knows by experience, is very bad, almost impassable at certain times of the year. The Incumbent proposes to give fortnightly services at Poltimore and Cantley, each settlement agreeing to this plan, and each engaging to contribute \$150 towards the stipend. The expectations of a few years ago, that the phosphate mining enterprises would be successful and attract men and money to Portland, have not been realized, and the result is that the settlers feel the effects very keenly. Hence they find it hard to raise the amount they promise for Church work. The parsonage is all one could desire. There is a debt resting upon it of \$500. Mr. King made some efforts to collect funds, but the many calls upon his

time have prevented him so far from accomplishing more than he has done. His people have laboured well in the undertaking, but still \$500 remains a debt upon the property. It is Mr. King's intention shortly to appeal to the Church people for aid, and I trust that a generous response will be accorded both in acknowledgment of his four years' labour and also to encourage the truly missionary work being carried on and maintained by the Church, by clergymen and people.

ST. ANDREWS.

I am very thankful to be able to report that by a change in their financial system, this Rectory has entirely wiped out all arrears of stipend, and by the envelope system is able to meet its liabilities to the clergyman every week, and this I think without any trouble after the first effort. If the weekly offertory by the envelope system is generally adopted and faithfully worked, it will produce results desired by the congregation for the spiritual and temporal welfare of clergyman and members, and to the benefit of the Church at large.

In conclusion, My Lord, I will say the reports and information obtained show that the Church is maintaining her position and extending her work in the Deanery. Nine of the ten parishes are filled, the number of churches is increasing, and every parish but Arundel is practically supplied with a parsonage. While the many constant changes to be looked for perhaps in a Missionary Deanery take place to one's regret, yet there is recognized a bond of union, an *esprit de corps* is admitted, whereby the clergy have regard for the interests of each other, and encourage one another with helping hand and true sympathy in the great work in which we are all engaged. May the bond be strengthened, the union intensified.

OBITUARY.

Rev. Hugh Montgomery, successively Missionary at Sutton, and Rector of St. Armand West, died in retirement from the ministry, at his residence in the latter parish, 2nd August, 1893.

Rev. Canon Frederick Robinson, M.A., was formerly Incumbent of Coteau du Lac, and subsequently for over forty years of the Parish of Abbotsford. The last few years of his life were passed in well earned retirement at his residence at Abbotsford. Still, to the very last he maintained a deep interest as Trustee in Bishop's College, Lennoxville, and as an honorary member of the Corporation of Dunham Ladies' College, attending the meetings of these bodies with exemplary regularity. That in recent times Dunham Ladies' College was relieved of a heavy indebtedness was largely owing to his indefatigable efforts and his personal liberality. He died 8th September, 1893, aged 71, and was buried, surrounded by a large body of the neighboring clergy and a crowded gathering of former parishioners, in the graveyard attached to the church at Abbotsford.

Rev. Isaac Constantine, M.A., for forty-two years Incumbent of Stanbridge East, died at Heavitree, England, 16th December, 1893, aged 73 years, shortly after retirement from active duty in his Canadian mission. Mr. Constantine was a man of unflinching loyalty and devotion to the Church, and it was to his untiring efforts that his parish was provided with a most beautiful church, a comfortable parsonage and a church hall.
