I. SEDERUNT.

Hamilton, Tuesday, June 6, 1854, 7 o'clock, P.M.

The Synod of the United Presbyterian Church in Canada, met, and, after sermon by the Rev. William Barrie, the Moderator, from Eph. 1. 22, 23, and Col. 1. 18, first clause, was constituted.

The Presbytery of London reported that they had ordained Mr. Report Presby-William Deas to the office of the Ministry, and to the pastoral charge of the United Presbyterian Congregations of Adelaide and Warwick, on the 7th of September, 1853; that they had ordained Mr. Matthew Barr over the Congregation of McKillop, on the 14th February, 1854; that they had ordained Mr. James A. Devine over the Congregation in Goderich, on the 10th of May, 1854; and that they had accepted the Rev. Mr. McLellan's demission of the charge of the Congregation in Detroit, on the 10th of May, 1854.

The Presbytery of Flamboro' reported that on the 6th of June, ReportFlamboro 1854, they had dissolved the pastoral connexion between the Rev. J. F. A. S. Fayette, and the Congregation of Ancaster West; that they also, on the same day, had dissolved the pastoral connexion between the Rev. John McClure, and the Congregation of St. Catherines; and that, on the same day, they had united the Congregations of Ancaster East and Ancaster West into one pastoral charge.

Report of To-

The Presbytery of Toronto reported that they had organized the Second United Presbyterian Congregation in Toronto on the 23rd of June last; that they had inducted the Rev. John Taylor to the pastoral charge of the said Second United Presbyterian Congregation on the 23rd of November; that they had received the Rev. William Dickson's demission of the pastoral charge of the United Presbyterian Congregations of Albion and Vaughan, on the 7th of February, 1851; that they had also received the Rev. Thomas Dickson's demission of the pastoral charge of the United Presbyterian Congregation of Caledon, on the 9th of May, 1854; and that the names of the Rev. William Dickson and of the Rev. Thomas Dickson had been taken from the Roll of Presbytery; and lastly, that on the 9th of May last they had organized the Congregations of Dunbarton and Canton.

Canada EastPresby tery Report.

The Presbytery of Canada East reported that since last meeting of Synod they had inducted the Rev. Alexander Stuart into the pastoral charge of the Congregation of Hemmingford; and that they had accepted the Rev. Peter D. Muir's demission of the pastoral charge of the Congregation of Huntingdon.

Darham Preshy-

The Presbytery of Durham reported that on the 29th of June last they had ordained Mr. John Scott to the pastoral charge of the Congregation of Ernesttown and Fredrickburgh; that on the 14th of July they had ordained Mr. Gilbert Tweedie to the pastoral charge of the Congregations of Lindsay, Verulam, and Mariposa; and that on the 4th of April they had accepted the Rev. Alexander Kennedy's demission of the pastoral charge of the Congregation of Darlington; and that the name of Mr. Kennedy had been taken from the Roll of Presbytery.

The Roll of Synod was now compiled from the Rolls furnished by the Clerks of the several Presbyteries, and being completed, was called and marked.

Rev. Mi. Dick, On the vote being taken, Professor Taylor was elected by a majority, but he respectfully declined the appointment, and thereupon another vote was taken, when the Rev. James Dick was chosen Moderator, and took the chair and addressed the Synod

The Presbytery of Wellington reported that none of its Minis-Wellington Presters comes under this injunction of Synod, as none of them re-byery. ceives aid from the Mission Fund.

The Presbytery of Flamboro' reported that none of the Minis-Flamboro'. ters within their bounds have received any supplement of stipend during the past year, and consequently, no missionary labour has been performed on this condition.

The Presbyteries of London and of Durham, reported verbally London and to the same effect with that of Flamboro'.

The Presbytery of Brant reported that, under their direction, Brant. the Rev. REPORT OF THE MISSION COMMITTEE, READ AT THE MEETING OF THE U. P. SYNOD, 8th JUNE, 1854.

↑

The proceedings of your Committee for the year which has just closed, do not present any feature of special interest or importance. All that has been done may be condensed into a brief Report, and your Committee judge it improdent to occupy the time of this meeting by presenting anything more than a summary statement of the business they have transacted since the last meeting of Synod. During this period they have granted applications for supplement made by preachers to the amount of £127 7s. 7d -by congregations to the amount of £223 0s. 9d.—making a total of £650 8s. 4d In this sum there are included two items due to a Minister w ose engagements with the board of Missions in Scotland entitled him to the full stepend of £100 sterling; with a sum of £15 due to one who, in consequence of family affliction, has been under the necessity of resigning his charge, and removing from the Province, and a further sum of £14.17s 2d, paid to Mr. James Frazer, who has now been employed for some years by the London Presbytery as a Catechist, and whose efforts for the spiratual instruction and impression of those among whem he is labouring seem to be acknowledged by God.

To make these payments, your Treasurer, the Rev. Mr. Christie, has drawn upon the Synod Grant for missionary panposes to the amount of 2489 0s. 10st. carrency, and there have been collected among the congregations of the Church in the Province, and sont in to the Treasurer of the Henne Fand, Robert Christie Esq., the sum of £215 14s. 3d. At their meeting on Tuesday, your Committee have passed applications by preachers amounting to £11 12s., and by congregations to £28 10s., which have not yet been paid, and there are other demands which have not yet been formally presented. The books of your Treasurer, then, show the following state:—

A balance remains in the hands of the Rev. Mr. Chsistie of £35 6s. 2d., and in the hands of Robert Christie, Esq., of £240 10s. 3d., while the former is liable for £40 2s.; at present there is no demand against the Mission Fund of the latter.

Your Committee, in obedience to the injunctions of Synod, prepared and forwarded to the Board of Missions in Scotland, a request for ten additional preachers. Before doing so, a circular was addressed to each of the Presbyteries of the Church, containing a number of questions designed to clicit as full information as possible as to the number of vacan-

cies—their local situation—their present state, with their prospects, and this was embodied in a communication which was sent off as soon as in could be got ready, to the Rev. Mr. Somerville. All the members of Synod have, we presume, seen the document as published in the Misstonary Record for the month of October, 1853. An answer was received stating that the request had been laid before the Board at their meeting in that month, and that they had resolved to comply with it so far as in their power. When this answer was read in your Committee, they cordially and unanimously resolved to record their satisfaction with it, and instructed their Convener to convey their thanks to the Board in Scotland for the kind and Christian spirit in which the application had been received and considered. Efforts have been made, and are continuing to be made at home, to procure for the Church here the number of missionaries named, but they have been only partially successful. Five have been engaged, some of whom have already arrived. Let it be hoped, however, that those who are on the list of Probationers or compicting their studies in the Hall, may be induced seriously to ponder the invitation that has been addressed to them, and to choose Canada as a field for the forth-putting of those energies which they have professedly dedicated to God, to serve Him in the Gospel of his Son.

We are happy in being able to inform the Synod of there being evidence that the care which they exercise over the weaker congregations has not been in vain, and that their kindness has not been unappreciated. A letter was addressed to the Committee, through their Convener, in the early part of the year, from the congregation of Cha, ham, which was one of those under the necessity of applying for sapplement when they first obtained a pastor, conveying their thanks for the assistance that had been afforded them in their weakness, and stating that, in the present year they were in hopes of being able to raise £125 as stipend for their pastor, and £50 for building purposes. They remark, "As the day on which we were wont to receive pecuniary assistance from you is approaching, and as we are met to-day to transact the business of the congregation, we cannot allow so favorable an opportunity to pass without conveying to you this assurance of our heartfelt gratitude for the favors already mentioned -favours the more valuable because by means of them, under God, we have been enabled to go to the fold of Christ, and find pasture, and can say not only that we have a minister of our own, but also that we support him by our voluntary offerings."

Your Committee think it would serve a useful purpose were means taken to publish the reports, or a digest of them, which are presented by preachers to the respective Presbyteries within whose bounds they have been laboring. This would supply information as to the number and state of the vacancies which exist, and of the extent of mission field which the operations of the Church embrace: it would afford a better understanding of the position which the Church occupies in the Province awaken a greater interest throughout all the congregations, and might lead to greater prayerfulness and liberality for the welfare of those who are without a shepherd. Were these reports forwarded by Presbyteries to the Mission Committee, they could embody as many of the facts narrated as they deemed advisable in a statement like the present—which would give it greater variety and interest to such a meeting as this—and we are certain that the Editors of both magazines would be willing to insert it in their periodicals, so that it would be diffused throughout our congregations for their instruction.

The Rev. Andrew Kennedy has written to the Committee informing them that, having succeeded in obtaining a situation which affords him the opportunity of laboring for the advancement of that cause to which his life has been hitherto devoted, he will not, in the meantime, draw upon the fund for any money in the way of salary.

Annual Statistical Reports have been received from six Presbyteriesthose of Brant and Durham have not come to hand. From those which have been sent in, it appears that there are sixty "congregations," but fourteen of these, from some cause or other, have not furnished their With the fifty-two that have reported, there are connected thirty-six "stations"; the "average attendance" is 8260—the "numbers added" 567, and "removed" 368, giving an increase of 199, while there are on the roll of communicants in the Church 4291. In "religious classes" there are 1774, and 644 attend prayer meetings. The total number of baptisms is 541; the number of volumes in libraries 10,041; and the number of Churches 43. Congregational Debt amounts to £2132 0s. 6d., and the total income to £4684 4s. 4d., being an average to each member of almost £1 1s. 10d., and to each hearer of about 11s. 4d. £2585 16s. have been expended upon "stipend," and £1153 4s. 6d., on " Church Property;" £77 19s. 11d. have been collected for the Theological Fund - £31 2s 1d. for Synod and Presbytery Funds -£127 14s. 94d. for the Synod's Missions-£91 13s. 11d. for General Missions-£25 9s. 6d. as contributions to the poor, while £426 17s. 8d. fall under the heading of incidental expenses.

Your Committee refrain from instituting any comparison between these returns and those of last year, but they would call attention to the number of instances in which congregations have failed to make collections for the schemes of the Church, In one Presbytery not a single farthing has been raised for the Synod and Presbytery Funds-only two congregations of the same Presbytery have contributed to the Theological Fund : one to the Synod's Missions, and one to General Missions. In another Presbytery the column under the heading "Theological Fund," presents a uniform blank, while those of the other schemes have but very few entries. Most of the other Presbyteries have been more faithful; but we believe that all the circumstances should remind the Synod of the propriety of enjoining that greater attention be paid in all the congregations and vacancies of the Church to the annual collections for the different objects specified in the statistical schedules, and of stating anew that those in need of supplement forfeit their right to have it granted, unless they comply. Your Committee cannot help expressing their conviction that the fault here lies at the door of ministers, and that the people would be willing to give of their wealth for these purposes were they asked, or furnished with the opportunity to do so. All our funds require the hearty and universal liberality of our membership. Much of our Zion is, in this respect, as an uncultivated field. Were we to work the resources which are within our own power to the full extent of which they admit, we would not require to be as dependent as we are upon external aid. And the circumstances of the Church are now such, that she can afford to east more than she has been doing into the treasury of the Lord's house, and she needs to cast more.

We would embody in this report the suggestion that Presbytery Clerk be instructed to send to the vacancies, intimation of the periods at which collections for the schemes should be made; and farther, that vacancies as well as congregations having a pastor, be required to make returns of

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THEOLOGICAL EDUCATION.

The Committee on Theological Education beg respectfully to present the following Report:—

They met on Tue-day, 2nd August last, when the Divinity Hall was opened by the Moderator with devotional exercises and an address. The Rev. Dr. Taylor then read an Introductory Lecture; and the Rev. Dr. Ferrier delivered an address. The students who entered were,—of the fourth year, Messrs. John Lees and John Fotheringsham; of the third year, none; of the second year, Messrs. Robert C. Moffatt, William C. Bruce and Francis Tisdell, (Mr. Alex. McFaul, who entered in 1852, was prevented from attending last year by severe and protracted bodily affliction); and of the first year, Messrs. David Waters, William Ballantyne, John McNeillie, and William Fletcher, the last of whom had not been examined by a Presbytery, but was afterwards admitted by the Presbytery of Toronto. Mr. John McNaughton also joired the Hall, but only as a hearer. The Committee likewise made arrangements for the meetings of the Hall dering the session, and for the accommodation of the library.

The Committee met again on Thursday, 6th October, when the two Senior Students delivered their discourses, which met with the approbation of the Committee; and the Rev. Messrs. Thornton and Dick delivered addresses. Dr. Taylor stated that the students had attended regularly during the session, had conducted themselves with propriety. and had performed to his sansfaction the exercises prescribed; that they had been examined on Dick's Lectures, from XLVIII. to LXXI, both inclusive, and on Mosheim's Church History, from the Fifth to the Temb Century, both inclusive; that they had read critically in the Greek of the New Testament, the narratives of the chief facts and incidents contained in the Gospels; and, in the Hebrew of the Old Testament, selected passages in Genesis, beginning with the murder of Abel, and ending with the interview between Abram and Melchizedek, along with the corresponding passages in the Septuagint. Also, that the students, besides donvering a discourse, had all during the session read several critical exercises on passages prescribed to them. The Committee then proceeded to the consideration of the remit from the Synod, and agreed to the following Recommendations to Presbyteries respecting the examination of

"The Committee are of opinion that the standard of requirement ought to be considerably elevated; but that this ought to be done gradually and cautiously; and they beg respectfully to recommend that the following be now the minimum which Presbyteries should faithfully and rigidly demand, viz.:

I.—Before Admittance to the Divinity Hall.

- English.—A good Education, i.e., a correct knowledge of the principles of the Language; Geography; Arithmetic; and History.
- 2. Latin—The Grammar; Casar's Commentaries; and Virgil's

 Eneid, Books I—II.
- 3. Greek.—The Grammar; Gospel by John; and Xenophon's
 Anabasis, Book I, Chaps. 1-6.

- 5. Mathematics.—Euclid's Elements, Books V.—VI.
- 6. Divinity and Church History.—The portion of each studied at the Hall during the preceding Session.
- 7. Composition.—An Essay; and a Lecture,—the latter to be delivered.

IV - Before Entrance to the Hall the Fourth Year.

- Latin.—Calvin's Institutes, Book III, Chaps. 11—16; and Horace's Odes, Book I.
- 2. Greek.—Hebrews; I. Peter; and Septuagint, Isaiah, Chaps. XL.—LXVI.
- 3. Hebrew .- Psalms XLI .- LV.
- 4. Natural Philosophy.—Mechanics; and Optics, (Chambers', Educational Course.)
- Divinity and Church History.—The portion of each studied at the Hall during the preceding Session.
- Composition.—A Critical Exercise; and a Popular Sermon, the latter to be delivered.

The Committee also recommend that Presbyteries give Students every encouragement to avail themselves of the opportunities they may have for becoming acquainted with such Branches as the following, viz.:—Natural Philosophy generally, including Astronomy; Chemistry; Natural History, (Mineralogy, Botany, and Zoology); Geology; Anatomy; Physiology, &c. And it is respectfully submitted that in the case of Students who may be attending University College, Toronto, or any other approved Academical Institution, or who may be preparing for such Institution, Presbyteries should dispense with the Literary and Philosophical portions of the above Curriculum, and should accommodate their examinations in these departments to the course of study pursued in the Public Institution."

The Committee resolved that these be printed, and that a copy be forwarded to every Minister in the Synod; and they are now respectfully submitted for the consideration of the Reverend Court. The Committee have to state also, that at their first meeting they directed their Convener to correspond with the Convener of the Scottish Synod's Committee on Theological Education, respecting a donation of Books which, it was understood, that Synod had, in 1852, generously resolved to transmit to the Theological Library here. From that correspondence the Committee have learned that the books are not very numerous and chiefly in the Latin language, but that they will be sent on directions being given as

to the best mode of conveyance. The Committee have instructed their Convener to furnish such directions, and to intimate that the Committee will be glad to receive whatever books the Synod at home may have the kindness to bestow. The Committee feel it a duty and a pleasure to record, that they voted in August last their cordial thanks to John Logan, Esq., Corn Merchant, Glasgow,—the son of a late excellent minister in Scotland,—for handsome donations of books he had made to the library both last and preceding year; and their pleasure is increased by hearing that their Convener has just received a letter from Mr. Logan, intimating that he has, this year also, sent out a number of additional volumes. The Committee trust the Synod will concur with them in opinion that Mr. Logan is justly entitled to the thanks of the Synod itself for his considerate, continued and exemplary generosity. The Committee will not further detain the Synod, than by expressing their conviction that it is a matter of vast importance for the prosperity of this Church, and for the religious well-being of the Province, that all legitimate and prudent means should be assiduously used for inducing young men to come forward as students of Theology; and that it deserves most serious consideration, whether the Synod should not endeavour to devise some method of providing for such young men, in cases where it may be needed, some pecuniary assistance by scholarships, exhibitions, or

The Committee cannot conclude without commending the Divinity Hall to the warmest sympathies and most fervent prayers of the members of the Synod and the Church.
