A noted author in one of his recent books says, "Have you a grandmothership? If not, you miss one of the most beautiful influences in your home that could possibly be there. One might almost say that no home is complete without one. Her silver hair, her quiet voice and manner, her old-fashioned courtesy call for our deepest respect and admiration."
One agrees with the statement. There is a dignity that goes with old age and it is good to have that dignity a part of our everyday life. The very presence of a wonderful old lady in a room glorifies the room itself and makes the home complete indeed. Young people learn to express a natural courtesy and an amount of consideration in her presence, and the painful observance of these finer instincts stand them in good stead in after years.
