Report of F. W. Holt, C. E., A MASS MEETING Presented to Bridge Commiltee - Provides Accomof Traffic—The Cost

ed Navy Island bridge was submitted to the Bridge Committee yesterday by F. W. Helt, C. E., who was authorized Is. W. Helt, C. E., who was authorized last January to draw up plans and specifications for the structure.

Many of the objections to the bridge project which have been mentioned in street talk about the scheme are disposed of in the report in a most satisfactory manner.

In order to make the structure as convenient as possible for street and rallway uses, I have kept it as low as it is advisable. The elevation of the rail is not arbitrary, but is the elevation advised from an operating point of view.

You will note that the river channel in a deep gorge in which the currents are heavy reversing ones, and that the bottom is very irregular and full of holes. At the site selected the ledges on the north and south sides nearest approach each other, and for this reason this point has to a certain extent fixed the main channel crossing. A careful detail location survey may possibly enable some advantageous change to be made in exact location of piers.

Having made a careful survey of the site in the tall of 1889 I had my original notes, but to check the work and make sure of the positions I employed assistants and checked the soundings outside of the previous lotation, so as to meet the changed conditions, and get the termini of the work as close as possible to the centres of business of both sides of the harbor without encroaching upon the navigable waters for large steamers and to interfere with other rover traffice.







## PLANS AND ESTIMATES FOR THE NAVY ISLAND BRIDGE

Report of F. W. Holt, C. E., Presented to Bridge Committee— Provides Conveniently Ample Accommodation for all Classes of Traffic—Objections Answered—The Cost.

(Continued from Fage One.)

of way of the bridge and railway's property for a short distance, the northerly line of the proposed railway and southerly line of the Bridge Railway Company's right of way being in common. It then swings to the left by an easy curve, to which the bridge alignment is tangent; crosses the channel and northerly shore of Navy Isiand just below the "Rapid Weir," then over the highest part of the island and the reef connecting the island to the Old Fort beach. From this point it may connect with Union street by a second easy curve, as shown, or it may swing to the left before it reaches that point and connect with Middle street and the railway connect with the present system across the wharves and slips as may be desired. The location shown is recommended as making the best connection for the railway from a structural point of view.

As designed the bridge is intended to have a 32ft, highway and 3ft, sidewalk, 25 feet above the lower floor, carrying one steam railway tracks on the same level. The three tracks are side by side inside of the trusses, to simplify the counter balancing of draw. Since a grade of 1 in 30 is admissible on the best class


