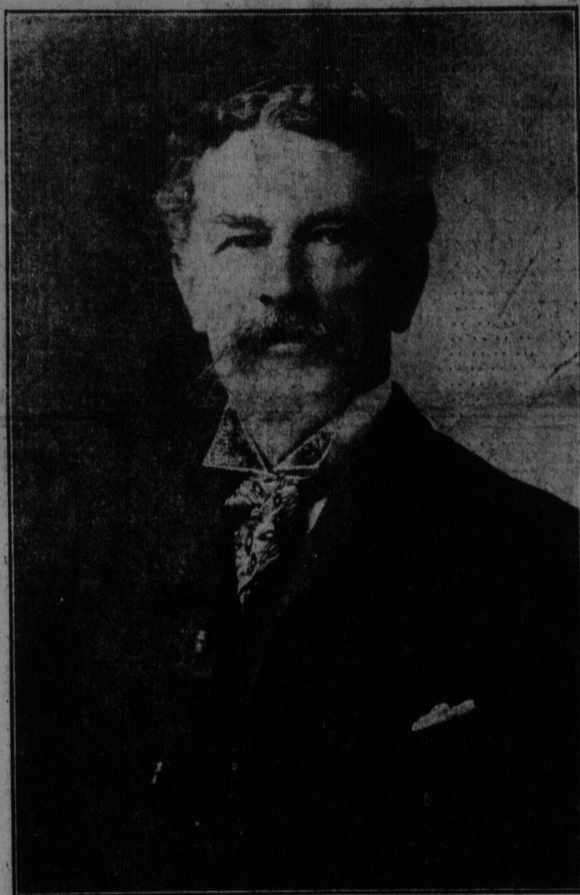


LAURIER GOVERNMENT SWEEPED FROM POWER; CONSERVATIVES HAVE ABOUT 50 MAJORITY

GREATEST TURNOVER CANADA HAS KNOWN

Seats Which Liberals Regarded as Sure Were Captured by Conservatives-- Nationalists Cut Little or No Figure in the Fight.

Special to The Standard Ottawa, Sept. 21.—The Laurier government has been swept from power on a resolute wave of anti-reciprocity sentiment and righteous indignation at the regime of graft and scandal with which Canada has been cursed for the last fifteen years.

The Liberals were beaten by the farmers who refused to believe that prices would be higher, while they nations would ravage their home market, and felt that the movement was designed to subject Canada to the United States.

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The government now consists of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Mr. Lemieux, Dr. Borden, Mr. Pugsley, Mr. Murphy, Mr. Oliver and Sir Richard Cartwright. The defeated ministers include most of the younger and more promising members of the cabinet.

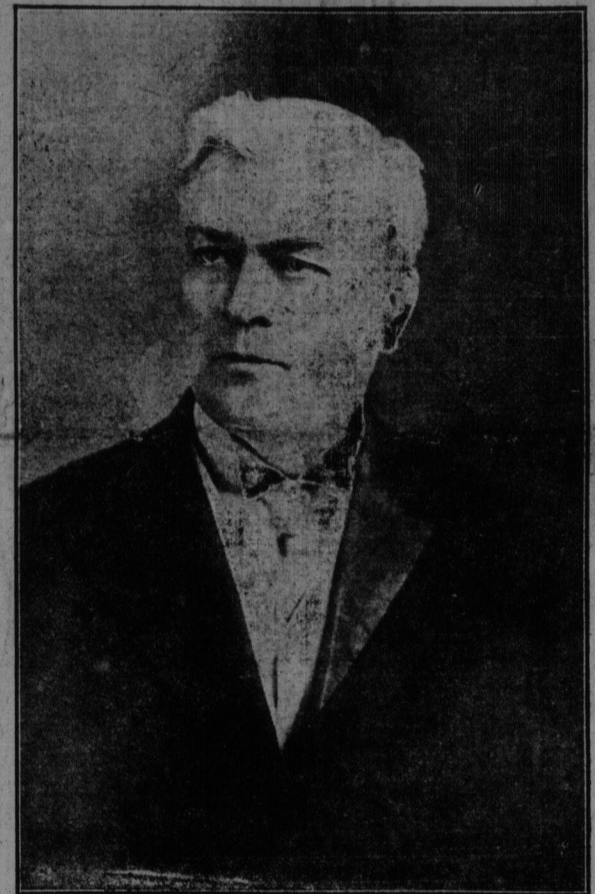
Table showing election results in St. John, including columns for City and County, Powell, Pugsley, Daniel, and Lowell, with a final tally for Majorities.

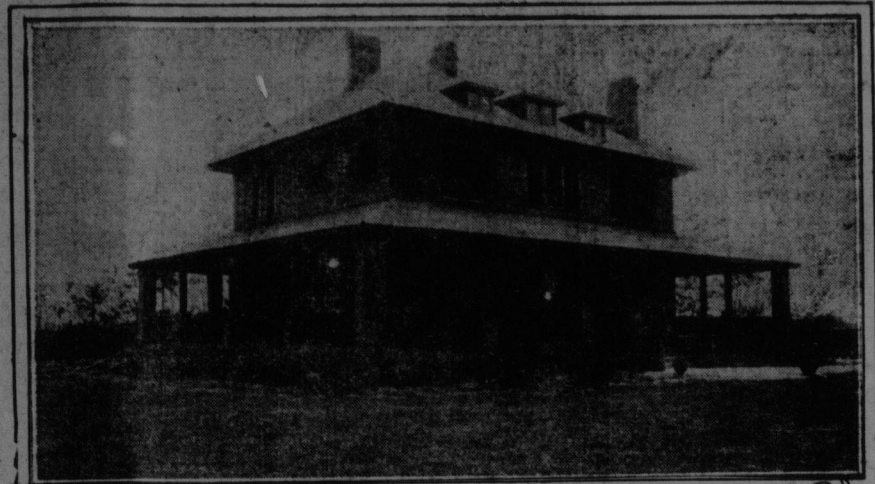

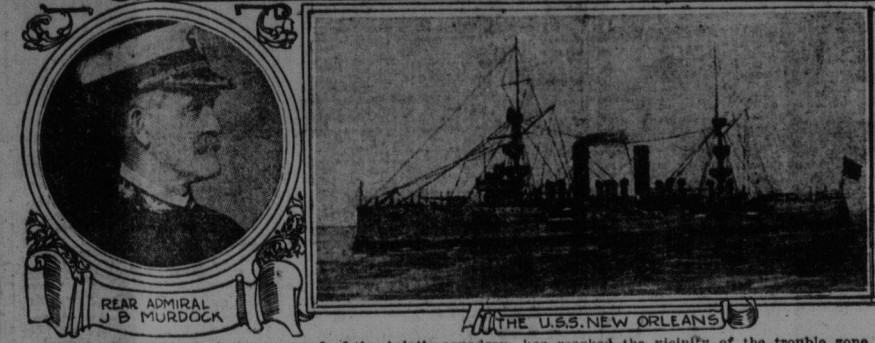
Word reached the local dealers yesterday morning that Ontario flour had advanced 15 cents.

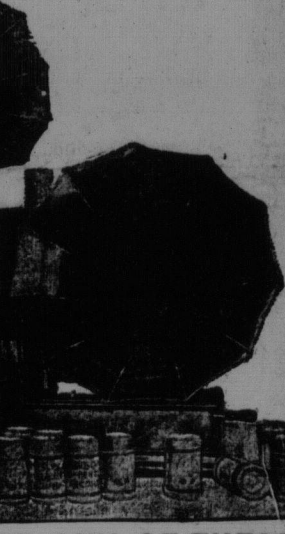

CANADA IS SAVED.

In 1812 the American army which invaded Canada was driven out of the country at the point of the bayonet by a few British regulars and the Canadian Militia. The invaders numbered six to one of the Canadian forces but the spirit of loyalty and devotion to their country was so strong that Canada was saved to the Empire.

Again without mandate from the people Sir Wilfrid Laurier entered into an agreement with President Taft to hand over all the control of our trade relations with other countries to the Government at Washington.

Mr. Borden, who adheres to the old trade policy of the Conservative party which had led to the up-building of new industries, the creation of a home market, the construction of railways for opening up the country, for providing ways and means for the development of agriculture, for the promotion of better roads, the nationalization of our chief ports and other important measures that will insure the continued prosperity of Canada, has been returned to power by a majority of 48 according to the latest returns.

THE RESULT IN ST. JOHN.

The result of the elections in the two constituencies of St. John will hardly come as a surprise to the people who have been following the trend of opinion during the past six weeks. When Parliament was dissolved it was expected in many quarters that the Minister of Public Works would be re-elected, but that he would find it impossible to carry his colleague with him.

Mr. Pugsley was selected as the representative of St. John at Ottawa in 1907 because the people believed he would be the strongest advocate they could send in their interests. Through the energy and self sacrifice of her own citizens St. John has undertaken in 1895 a work, truly National in its character.

In twelve years the city of St. John had expended nearly a million and a half of money in the erection of wharves and warehouses and providing terminal facilities for the Canadian Pacific Railway.

This was not all. The facilities were insufficient for the trade. More wharves and warehouses had to be erected or the city stood to lose much that it had gained.

The course of the Minister of Public Works since 1908 down to the present time has been such as to deprive him of all Conservative sympathy, instead of using the

great power that he possessed for the sole benefit of his constituents it was soon discovered that the constituency was only the means to an end and that end was the encroachment of a few political friends.

A vast amount of treasure was expended in his interest, tons of literature were distributed to show what he had done for St. John, but the people were not convinced.

No man in this country ever had a better opportunity to make good than Wm. Pugsley, but he failed to keep his pledges to protect Canadian interests and gave his support to the vicious and disloyal policy of Sir Wilfrid Laurier.

A DISGRACEFUL CAMPAIGN.

The campaign conducted by the Liberals in this constituency in the interests of Mr. Lowell and Mr. Pugsley was the most disgraceful in its history. It was evident at the outset that they meant to win by fair means or by foul.

Hundreds of voters were approached during the latter days of the campaign and invited to motor boat excursions and automobile rides on election day in order that they might be unable to cast their votes for the Conservative candidates.

Reports of irregularities on the part of deputy returning officers have reached the Conservative headquarters and a recount of the votes in the city constituency will certainly be demanded, and if Mr. Pugsley still has a majority a protest against his return will be entered.

Had the people been allowed to exercise their franchise honestly and fairly, the majorities against the Liberal candidates would have been overwhelming. With all the machinery of the election at his command, and unlimited money in the hands of his supporters, Mr. Pugsley comes out of the election with a nominal majority and his colleague is defeated.

The history of 1891 has been repeated in 1911 and the dream of Sir Wilfrid Laurier of a Continental union that would replace the British flag in the northern half of the North American continent has been interrupted by a second rude awakening.

Where is that 1500 majority that Mr. Pugsley said he was going to have in this election? There is quite a difference between 1500 and 64, and even this is doubtful.

In 1878 when the Conservative party won their great victory which gave the Canadian people a National Policy and a home market, their leader, Sir John A. Macdonald was defeated in Kingston, Ontario, but soon after obtained a seat in British Columbia.

Mr. Pugsley owes his election to his distinguished friend, Mr. J. G. Spedakes.

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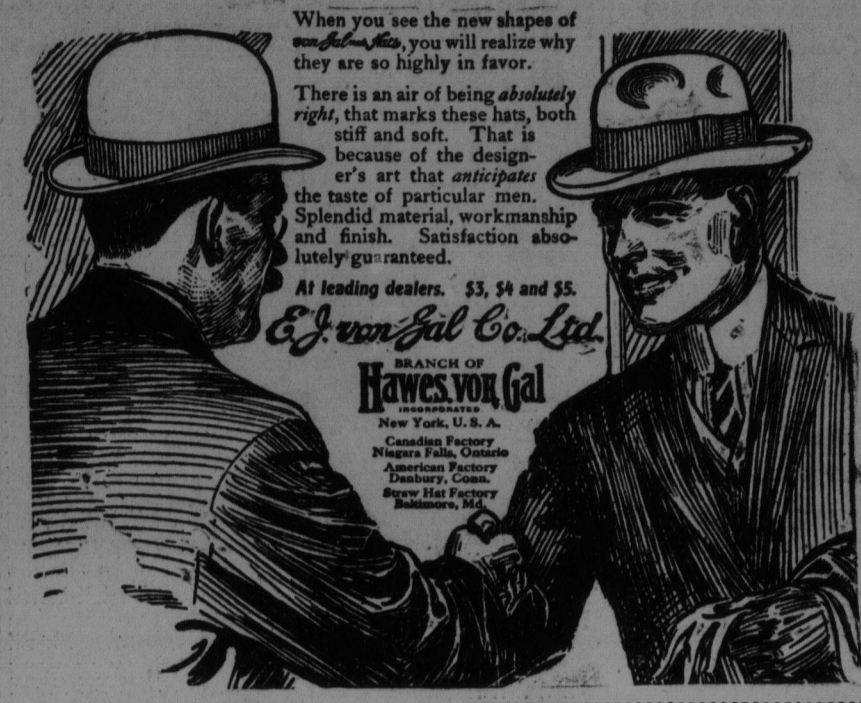

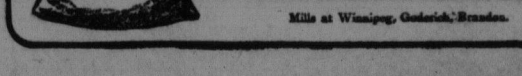

STOCK MARKET SEES A BIG SLUMP

New York Sept. 21.—Wall street spent another uneasy day in watching the speculative slump in the securities of the United States Steel Corporation. Trading in the stocks dominated the market. Wide-spread reports that dissolution of the Corporation was impending coupled with yesterday's severe decline seemed to have aroused the fears of investors. Selling orders flooded the market at the opening. They came from all parts of the country and from abroad and their force was irresistible. The low price of the day for the common was 58, a decline of 5 1/2 points since the lowest figure since 1909. The pfd. fell 1 1/2 to 104 1/4 a lower price than had been reached before since 1908. Trading in these stocks reached enormous proportions. The common was sold in lots of 1,000 to 6,000 shares. Largely by reason of this selling the day's transactions amounted to 1,250,000 shares, the largest total of the year, and of this the sales of the U. S. Steel were nearly one-half, or 572,000 shares. Conjecture ran wild as to what was in store for the steel corporation. The report most widely credited was that either a suit for dissolution would be instituted by the department of justice or that the steps toward that end in order to meet the views of the Federal government in regard to the requirement of the Sherman Law. Responsible officials of the corporation refused to discuss the reports. The report most widely credited of knowing facts. There seemed to be good grounds for the belief, however, that the steel corporation and the U. S. Steel were united in an effort to avoid a suit, and that if the formidable obstacles in the way of dissolution could be overcome according to a plan to which both sides could agree, such action would be undertaken. There was no hysteria elsewhere in the market. The movement in the steel securities resulted in severe losses among other industrial stocks. The market was at no time demoralized. General electric lost 5 5/8. A long list of others, including Amalgamated Copper, American Beet Sugar, Bethlehem Steel, National Biscuit, Sears Roebuck, Pressed Steel, Car. Pfd., Railway Steel Springs pfd., and American Brake Shoe fell from 7 to 7 points. The railroad list was relatively firm. Missouri Pacific rose a point, despite the unexpectedly large deficit revealed yesterday in the annual report. Some of the railroad shares sold at a point or more and at times there was a heavy pressure against the Union Pacific, but these were rallied later and throughout the session offered effective resistance to the day's unsettling influences. The market virtually ignored all outside influences. Increases in the rates of discount by the Bank of England and the expectations in view of recent events abroad. The position of the Bank of England for some time has been a matter of precaution rather than of necessity. Policies combined with the higher rates in which might have been deferred had conditions been less uncertain. The bond market was weak with marked declines in the active speculative issues. U. S. Steel rises however, conservative quarters because of \$2,904,000 U. S. bonds were unchanged on call.

MARTIAL LAW IN VALENCIA STRIKE

Troops Occupy Streets of Spanish Seaport Where Workmen Have Revolutionary Support. Madrid, Sept. 21.—A general strike which has behind it revolutionary support has started at Valencia. Martial law has been proclaimed and the streets are occupied by troops. The telegraph wires out of Valencia have been cut. Just before communication with the city was broken off, it was reported that serious disturbances had occurred. The population of Valencia is about 220,000. The city lies on the Mediterranean, about 150 miles southeast of Madrid. The government is considering a suspension of constitutional guarantees throughout Spain, which course will probably be adopted if the situation with the city is not quickly brought under control. The many working-men's strikes becomes more serious. Strikes are general at Bilbao and Saragossa and partially successful at Cadix, Huelva, Valencia, Seville and Gijon. It is expected that the workmen will go out at Barcelona, Coruna and Ferrol and the strike movement will become general in these cities. The ministry of the interior says that the city police have discovered a revolutionary plot directed by Spanish and foreign anarchists and a certain political group. The group is to be suppressed by the army. Violence against property.

Conservatives Make Merry Over Victory

Wonderful Demonstration in St. Andrew's Rink was in Remarkable Contrast to the Gathering of "The Grooms" in the Queen's Rink, where the Liberals Received Word of Utter Defeat.

Never in this city has there been a parallel to the scene in St. Andrew's rink last night. From five o'clock when the last vote had been polled, a continual stream of expectant people thronged the vast building. In their enthusiasm and desire to hear the glad news which they confidently expected they crowded in. Not a thought for honor, support nor of the fatigue. All thought of these was swept away. Cheer after cheer rent the air as the glad message of victory was flashed across the wires and communicated to the anxious throng. The enthusiasm of the people knew no bounds. The ring of victory pervaded the atmosphere and not even the announcement of a grit gain could stay the joy of the crowd. Scarcely ten minutes had elapsed after the closing of the polls when the procession to St. Andrew's rink began. When the first returns were given out fully twenty-five hundred expectant people were on hand. As the hour advanced the crowd increased proportionately, until between four and five thousand crammed the rink. On the platform were seated Premier Hazen, L. P. D. Tilley and other prominent conservatives. Upon Premier Hazen developed the pleasing task of announcing the first notes of victory. As the Premier announced the news of Pugsley's victory it was greeted with cries of "Shame! It's not all over, Mr. Powell! We'll send you to Ottawa yet." The word "Dr. Daniel's" victory was the signal of greater jubilation, and the applause and enthusiasm of the crowd were boundless. As each successive message of victory came, the cheering was renewed. About seven o'clock Mr. Powell arrived on the scene and had the tide of victory flow his way, no greater tribute could have been his. Not only as the standard bearer of the party was he proclaimed, but to Powell the man did the immense throng pay their tribute of esteem. Prolonged and deafening cheers shook the rink.

As the news of the defeat of one after another of the cabinet ministers was announced, the enthusiasm was limitless. Not the most fertile imagination could form a mental picture of the vast assemblage waving arms and throwing up hats as the word arrived, telling the joyful news of the downfall of the fathers of the reciprocity pact, Hon. W. S. Fielding and Hon. Mr. Patterson, the prime movers in the design to rob Canada of her rightful heritage and hand over the Dominion to the authorities at Washington. Dr. J. W. Daniel, the successful candidate arrived at the rink shortly after 8 o'clock. No sooner had he entered the door that he was literally lifted off his feet and carried to the platform where he received a magnificent ovation. The crowd called upon him for a speech, and though fatigued with the strenuous campaign, he readily acceded to the wishes of the crowd and addressed them briefly. The Candidate Cheered. "I thank you, my friends for this tribute and for this mark of confidence in me. But one thing overshadows my joy, that is the regret I feel in the defeat of my esteemed colleague, Mr. Powell. We have had many things to fight against in this election but we have defeated the efforts of our opponents. The defeat of Mr. Powell has all the glory of a victory, when we consider that he has been pitted against a minister of the crown."

In answer to the call of the crowd, Mr. Powell addressed them. After thanking them for their goodwill, he said that at the outset he had placed himself in the hands of the party, resolved to fight a winning fight to uphold the standard of the party. Though fate had not smiled on him, yet he could bear his defeat as philosophically as another. "I feel one duty especially incumbent on me above all others; that is my duty in view of my knowledge of the flooding of the country with outside funds, and I shall probe the matter to the very root." He then exhorted himself for not making a more lengthy address as the fatigue of the campaign had been great. The wildest enthusiasm prevailed as he closed his remarks. For over five hours the crowd waited and cheered themselves hoarse. Each successive message announced

the glad tidings, and told the story of a glorious triumph for the Conservatives. During the jubilation over the victory news arrived from the Queen's Rink to the effect that Dr. Pugsley had again turned his coat to be on the winning side. This announcement was greeted with hisses and cries of "We don't want him." When the Conservative victory was a certainty and Col. Best announced that the party had already captured 113 seats, the whole of the vast audience rose to their feet and waving their hats, gave cheer after cheer, making the building ring with their enthusiasm. After that the returns came in so rapid succession, each piling up the great majority. When a majority of 45 had been assured, Dr. Daniel was called upon for another speech. He made a few brief remarks and said: "We will look after the part of St. John, not with stereotyped views, but with something more substantial." Mr. Powell responded to the shouts for him and spoke briefly of the great victory of the day—just such an occasion as that of 1873.

A Gloomy Contrast. What a contrast was the death scene in the Queen's Rink where the Liberal supporters had gathered early in the evening so full of hope. Not a shadow of doubt entered their thought; with them it was just a matter of how great and crushing would be the blow delivered by their hopefuls. How sad was the awakening. The pleasant dreams of Courtenay Bay, with which they had buoyed themselves for weeks past evaporated with lightning effect as the message from over the wires shattered the hopes of the little groups huddled together. When the word of a victory came to them, but a faint cheer was all they could muster. Mr. Pugsley, on whom they had centered their great hopes could not revive them. Inevitable defeat they realized as their lot, and as the tide of victory for the Conservatives swelled as the hour advanced, the crowd gave up in despair and quickly dispersed. Dr. Pugsley's feeble effort to rally the disheartened gathering failed to strike a responsive chord in the Liberal supporters, and with gloom and dismay written on every countenance, what remained of the once boastful party slunk away to forget in sleep the most crushing defeat it has ever been the lot of the Liberals to experience. The death knell of the Laurier administration had sounded, and with the defeat reciprocity met its doom.

PUGSLEY GRATEFUL FOR HIS ELECTION

Appears to Think People Have Expressed Confidence in Him—Registers Kick at his Opponents.

"I thank the people of St. John from the bottom of my heart," said Mr. Pugsley, "because they have returned a vote of confidence in my ability to further their interests. But, we have not been beaten by the Conservative party alone, but by the combined forces of the Conservatives and Nationalists. Not only have we had to cope with this alliance, but we have had to contend with the Great Trusts of the United States. But," continued Mr. Pugsley, "it will not be long before the Conservatives and Nationalists will be flying at one another's throats." "The Conservative party will hold office by the will of the Nationalist party. During the campaign I called the attention of the electorate to the important work commenced in the city of St. John and I hope that my successor whoever he may be, will do all in his power to complete these works."

CAMPAIGN OF SLANDER WAS OF LITTLE AVAIL

Attempts to Deceive Voters into Libelous Assertions Deceived None—Grafters Organs Discredited.

It was a wild and a jubilant night in St. John that witnessed the rout of the most corrupt government with which Canada was ever cursed and the triumphant return of the Conservative party under R. L. Borden with a substantial majority over the Liberals and Nationalists. By the result of yesterday's contest St. John is freed from the thrall of the dredging grafters and the Pugsley ring. The election of Mr. Pugsley himself is in doubt and there is certain to be a protest over the seat followed by a recount and a complete probing of the wholesale importation of Yankee money by the Grafters, in an effort to corrupt the constituency. Keeping up their campaign of lying and deception to the last possible minute the special edition of the Evening Times the evening organ of the grafters issued last night did not even admit the return of the Conservative party although at the time the issue was put on the street the Times had in its office a Canadian press despatch in which the Toronto Globe, admitted as the leading Liberal organ in Canada, conceded the defeat of the government by a good majority. If there was one indecent feature of the campaign in this province it was the slanderous torrent of abuse and misrepresentation carried on by The Telegraph and The Times, the papers which support the graft ring of the Liberal party. Not a day during the campaign but these papers teemed with falsehoods in an effort to deceive the electorate. Constituencies which were certain to return Conservative candidates and which yesterday's result showed did return Conservatives were held up as sure for the Liberals, and every effort made to picture a complete victory, even if they were forced to stir up race and creed differences to do it. It is, however, all over now, and the grafter journals stand totally discredited in the realm of decent journalism. The news of the great Conservative victory was well received last night and there was a very general feeling of satisfaction that the regime of the Laurier government and the reciprocity agreement had been killed at the one blow.
