GRAND MASTER'S ADDRESS

The M. W. Grand Master delivered the following address:

BRETHREN OF THE GRAND LODGE OF PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND:

"Remorseless Time!" that "Fierce spirit of the glass and scythe," has added another year to the many thousands that have gone before, bringing us nearer the end of our life's labour here below.

It is with feelings of the deepest gratitude to our Supreme Grand Master for his manifold blessings, that I now extend to you all a fraternal welcome to this our Nineteenth Annual Communication within the precincts of our own new Temple.

Allow me to congratulate you on the occasion of such a noble structure. May we all live long to enjoy the fraternal shelter of this our Masonic Home; and here, as well as throughout the length and breadth of this jurisdiction, may we, while life lasts, continue to show to the world our belief in the fatherhood of God and the brotherhood of man.

"Through knowledge we behold the world's creation,
How in his cradle first he fostered was;
And judge of nature's cunning operation,
How things she formed of a formless mass:
By knowledge do we learn ourselves to know,
And what to man and what to God we owe."

Brethren, we are assembled here for the purpose of reviewing our Masonic labours for the year that is gone.

In giving this first annual report of my official acts, I trust that they will redound to the interest of the Craft.

On the 3rd of August, 1893, I called an Emergent Meeting of Grand Lodge in Summerside for the purpose of laying the cornerstone of the new Methodist Church, which was done in ample form, the Grand Master on the occasion being presented with a silver trowel suitably inscribed.

I issued two dispensations: One—to confer the third degree at a shorter interval than that required by the constitution:—my reason being that the Brother was about to leave the Island. The other—to attend the funeral of our late Brother J. S. Carvell, Lieutenant Governor of our province.

A number of questions have been asked, many of which are plainly answered in the constitution.

The following I deem of sufficient importance to bring to your notice:

- Question: Define the territorial jurisdiction of a Lodge?
 Answer: Compute the distance by the nearest public road travelled between Indiges.
- 2. Question: Can a Brother guarantee the amount of fees that should accompany a Petition?

Answer: No! The constitution is plain on this point.

DISTINGUISHED DEAD

The angel of death has reaped a plentiful harvest of noble lives in sister jurisdictions.

"Death is the crown of life;
Were death deny'd, poor men would live in vain;
Were death deny'd, to live would not be life:
Were death deny'd, ev'n fools would wish to die."

Most Worshipful Francis Henry Hill, Past Grand Master and Lecturer of District No. 3, Grand Lodge of Virginia, died Jan. 28th, 1894, aged 76.

On the 29th July, 1893, Most Worshipful Richard Briggs, Grand Master of Massachusetts, died, in the midst of the duties

of a busy life.

M. W. Past Grand Master of Grand Lodge of Michigan, William Power Innes, died at his home, Grand Rapids, August 2nd, 1893, aged 67.

M. W. Past Grand Master Zelotas H. Mason, Grand Lodge of Florida, has fallen by the icy hand of death. Glorified in a

ripe old age he passed away.

The Craft of Georgia was for a time in confusion on account of the death of M. W. Grand Master John S. Davidson, which occurred March 20th, 1894.

And coming nearer home to our sister Province of New Brunswick, we have to regret the death of Very Worshipful Bro. T. Nisbet Robertson, Grand Secretary, which took place April 25, ultimo.

Among the most painful announcements of deceased nobility among the Craft of other jurisdictions comes that of the death of our own Representative, near the Grand Lodge of Utah, M. W. Brother James Lowe, Past Grand Master, which took place at his home, Salt Lake City, October 21st, 1893.

Very Worshipful Brother Diehl, Grand Secretary of Utah, says of him:—"In Freemasonry Brother Lowe footed every path. In Lodge and Grand Lodge he was always ready to call a halt when brethren with less experience and knowledge attempted to walk into the temple on a new road; his motto ever being—Hold fast to the laws of the Fathers."

Masons of Brother Lowe's stamp are much required in most jurisdictions to repress the innovations of radical Brethren who are often more distinguished for zeal in the introduction of their own views than in following the land-marks their fathers have set.

I trust that the usual Memorial pages will be inscribed to the memory of our deceased Brethren.

Our own jurisdiction has lost some good men and true, although not members of the Grand Lodge; among them being

Bro. Jedediah Slason Carvell was called from labor here below on Wednesday, 14th February, at Government House. He died after a protracted illness.

Brother Carvell was, in whatever capacity one met him, whether in Lodge-room or at his business, as Senator of our Dominion, or Lieutenant Governor of our Province, a friend, a brother, a genial companion whose heart was large and whose sympathies went out to the poor and distressed on all occasions.

"Stars will watch over him; silence lament for him; Soft murmuring breezes re-echo his knell; Bird-note and leaf-murmur tenderly blend for him, Comrade and brother and friend, fare thee well."

OFFICIAL VISITATIONS

March 14. In company with several of the Brethren from the city, among whom was Past Grand Lecturer Brother Duncan McLean, I visited Orient Lodge, No. 11, Souris, and found it in good working order with energetic Master and Wardens. They conferred the Third Degree on two Brethren, in a manner deserving commendation. The attendance was large and I enjoyed my first visit to Orient Lodge very much.

April 12. Zetland Lodge, No. 7, Alberton, was visited in company with M. W. P. G. M. MacKelvie, who kindly assisted me in the inspection of this Lodge, which, I find, has taken a start in the right direction, and promises well for the future.

April 13. I had the pleasure of visiting Alexandra Lodge, No. 5, Port Hill. Owing to shortness of notice the attendance was not so large as on other occasions. The books were kept in good order and the Lodge generally is in a flourishing condition. Several questions on Ritual and Jurisprudence were discussed to the mutual advantage of all.

On Monday, 4th June, accompanied by Grand Secretary Higgs, I visited Victoria Lodge, No. 2, this City, and found it in a healthy condition, the books well kept, and the members hopeful. On the First Degree I witnessed work which did credit to the Lodge.

I issued a commission to G. Secretary Brother Higgs, to visit St. John's Lodge, No. 1, from whom I expect a report.

June 8. Mount Lebanon Lodge, No 6, Summerside, came in for a visit from me, accompanied by R. W. Grand Secretary Higgs, R. W. Deputy Grand Master Stewart, R. W. Grand Lecturer Morris, and P. R. W. Grand Lecturer McLean. We found the Lodge in a healthy state, books well kept. W. M. Baker exemplified work on the Third Degree in a very satisfactory manner, proving himself to be a workman who need not be ashamed.

On this same evening we visited King Hiram Lodge, No. 3. But, owing to the absence of the Secretary and his book for the year 1893, we were unable to examine the working of the Lodge from June until December.

I ordered the missing book to be sent to the Grand Secretary's office, which order was complied with. On examination of the book I found that they had received a petition from Mr. Goff, whom they entered without charging the usual fee. Immediately I telegraphed the Secretary to forward me his book for this year, also the Treasurer's cash book, in order to see if they would clear the matter up. Up to the present the order has not been complied with. With this exception I found the Lodge working closely along the lines of the constitution, and with such first-class material it should not be found behind any Lodge in the jurisdiction.

June 15. Accompanied by P. G. L. Duncan McLean I visited Prince Edward Lodge, No. 14, and met there R. W. D. G. M. Stewart, R. W. G. L. Morris, and S. G. W. Ross, I found that

The evening was passed in discussing the best means of making Lodges interesting when no masonic work is on hand. This is a problem well worthy the consideration of every Lodge.

After the discussion, we were invited to partake of refreshments to which we did ample justice. Thus passed one of our most pleasant visits, and after having sung "Auld Lang Syne" we parted with the Brethren.

June 22. In company with J. G. W. Bell and P. G. L. McLean, I met with St. Andrew's Lodge, No. 13, Montague Bridge. On examination I found that the Lodge is in a flourishing condition and ranks among the first in our jurisdiction.

I issued a commission to J. G. W. Bell to visit St. George's Lodge, No. 4, Georgetown. Also one to D. G. M. Stewart to visit Mount Zion Lodge, No. 12, Kensington, from whom I expect reports at this communication.

On May — I visited True Brothers' Lodge, No. 8, Tryon. But having met only three of the Brethren, (on account of shortness of notice), including P. S. G. W. Muirhead and P. M. Lang, I am unable to report.

I trust that my successor will take this Lodge under his care and endeavour to stir up an interest among them with reference to their duty to the Craft.

And now, Brethren, as this Grand Lodge will probably deal with the question of Ritual at this session, I would urge you to bear in mind that, before perfect harmony can exist throughout the jurisdiction, a similarity of work must prevail.

I am strongly in favor of one work, and that strictly adhered to.

The work in the country Lodges, as I have observed it, seems to be more uniform than in the City, where innovations are often made.

In conclusion, Brethren:—Before to-morrow's sun shall have risen in the East I shall be called upon to surrender this Gavel, the emblem of authority, to my successor in office. But before that time arrives I wish to tender the Officers and Past Officers of this Grand Lodge, as well as the members of all subordinate Lodges, my heartfelt thanks for the kindness and courtesy with which they have treated me during my term of office.

I have always endeavoured, during my Masonic life, which has existed since 1866, to promote peace and harmony among the Craft, and I trust that failure in this respect will not mark my term of office as your Grand Master.

I further sincerely hope and trust that all Masons in our jurisdiction will stand by the teachings of our noble institution, and show forth in their lives and actions that they love one another.

"Grant we may ever, at the morning ray,
Open with prayer the consecrated day;
Tune our great praise, and bid our souls arise,
And with the mounting sun ascend the skies;
As that advances, let our zeal improve,
And glow with ardour of consummate love;
Nor cease at eve, but with the setting sun
Our endless worship shall be still begun."

I examined their books and found them neatly kept by their very efficient Secretary, Brother N. Fairchild; their finances good. During the past year they have initiated 4, passed 3, and raised 3. There are twenty-six members in good standing, working together in peace and harmony, and to show further the progress made by them, in 1892, their dues to the Grand Lodge were \$8.00; 1893, \$11.86; 1894, \$18.40; this large increase in three years is owing to the fact that several of the new members are young men in good positions, and the Lodge is more active than it has been for some time.

GRAND LECTURER'S REPORT

To the M. W. Grand Master and Brethren of the Grand Lodge, A. F. & A. M., Masons of Prince Edward Island:

My Report for the year now closed is as follows:

Along with Deputy Grand Master Stewart, I visited Alexandra Lodge, No. 5, at Port Hill, and witnessed a Funeral Service conducted by Past Master Ellis, assisted by their Chaplain, Bro. Harper. This Lodge does excellent work and is a credit to the fraternity.

We were very kindly received by the Lodge, and partook of the hospitalities of Past Grand Master Yeo, whose kindness extends to every Mason.

There seems to be, I think, a necessity for a Uniform Burial Service to be prepared by Grand Lodge for use throughout the jurisdiction.

DECISIONS RENDERED BY GRAND MASTER

Physical Qualification.—There is nothing in the constitution or landmarks for disqualifying a hunchback from being initiated into Masonry, provided he could comply with all the ceremonies of the initiation in the several degrees.—(Proceedings, May, 1877).

LODGE BUSINESS.—It is not competent for a Subordinate Lodge at an emergent meeting to enter upon any other business than that specified on the summons.—(Proceedings, 1887).

RESTORATION.—A brother who has been indefinitely suspended can be restored to membership by a majority vote of the Lodge at any regular communication, notice having been given at a previous regular communication that a motion to that effect would be made.—Proceedings, 1880).

MASONIC BURIAL.—The friends of a brother who died while under suspension for non-payment of dues cannot, by paying his dues, entitle him to Masonic Burial.—(Proceedings, 1880).

MOTIONS.—A brother who gives notice of motion to amend the Constitution cannot delegate another brother to move in the matter in his absence.—(Proceedings, 1880).

Demits cannot be granted to Entered Apprentices and Fellow Crafts.—(1885).

Lodge working U. D. cannot affiliate brethren. - (1885).

DEMIT.—A vote of the Lodge is the demit, the paper the evidence thereof.

ALTERATION OF THE CONSTITUTION.—Section 14 of the By-Laws as amended to read: The officers of a Subordinate Lodge shall be installed on the 27th day of December, or as soon thereafter as practicable, but not later than the Regular Communication in January.

Section 1 of By-Laws pertaining to Grand Lodge as amended to read: That the Annual Communication shall be held at such place as the Grand Lodge may determine at each annual meeting.




