EDUCATIONAL AND MATERIAL PROVISION.

THE HELLMUTH COLLEGE provides a Classical, Scientific and Commercial Education for the sons of gentlemen, commensurate with the wants and progress of this rising country.

THE DISCIPLINE OF THE COLLEGE is based, as nearly as possible, upon the model of the great public schools of England and Germany.

The utmost care and attention are bestowed on the Moral and Religious training of the Pupils, under the direct charge of the REV. THE HEAD MASTER. The fact that the Masters are resident, secures supervision at all times; the PREPARATION of the lessons is also under their superintendence.

To ensure every home comfort for the Boarders, a Lady of high character and experience is intrusted with the Management of the Domestic Department.

COURSE OF INSTRUCTION.

LANGUAGES: ANCIENT—Latin, Greek.
MODERN—French, German.

MATHEMATICS: Pure and Mixed.

NATURAL SCIENCE.

ENGLISH AND COMMERCIAL: Composition, History,
Geography, Elocution, Book-Keeping, Music, Drawing,
Gymnastics, Drill.

The above courses are divided into Three Departments:—

I.—THE CLASSICAL DEPARTMENT.

II.—THE MODERN AND SCIENTIFIC DEPARTMENT.

III.—THE JUNIOR DEPARTMENT.

(1.) In the CLASSICAL DEPARTMENT all those branches of knowledge are taught which are necessary to prepare Pupils for the Universities and the Learned Professions.

(2.) In the MODERN AND SCIENTIFIC DEPARTMENT, the Course of Study embraces less Classics and more Mathematics, Modern Languages, English Literature, History, Geography (including Physical and Political), Composition and Book-Keeping.

Pupils are prepared for the Competitive Examinations for admission at Woolwich and Sandhurst, for direct Commissions in the ARMY AND NAVY; for the CIVIL SERVICE, and for Mercantile Pursuits. Also, for the GILCHRIST SCHOLARSHIP, value 100*l.* sterling per annum, and tenable for three years; open to all candidates who shall either be natives of the Dominion of Canada, or reside there three years immediately preceding the Examination.

(3.) In the JUNIOR DEPARTMENT younger boys go through a Course of Study which will equally prepare them for either of the two other Departments. Special attention is paid to a thorough grounding in the Grammars, and the essentials of an English Education. Boys are admitted to this Department at SEVEN years of age.

The payments for Board and Tuition, which are apportioned between the three Collegiate Terms, must be made strictly in advance. A Term's notice must be given in writing to the Secretary before removing a Pupil.

COLLEGE TERMS.

The College Year is divided into THREE TERMS, which commence and terminate as follows:—

First Term.—First Wednesday in September to the First Tuesday in December.

Second Term.—First Wednesday in January to the Thursday before Easter.

Third Term.—The second Wednesday after Easter to the 30th of June.

Every pupil will be required to return without fail on the day appointed for the re-opening of the School after a vacation, as unpunctuality not only sets a bad example, but deranges the entire work of the classes.

Application for admission should be made as early as possible, stating name, age, and post office address.

To secure admission, a deposit of \$20 must be made on application, which will be returned when the pupil leaves the College.

PRIZES.

A liberal number of Prizes are awarded at the Annual Examination before the Midsummer Vacation, in the disposal of which regard is had to the general conduct, as well as to the work of the various competitors during the preceding year. Special encouragement is held out for the cultivation of truthfulness and high honor; of manly and generous qualities among the boys in their intercourse, whether in or out of School.

THE BUILDINGS, GROUNDS, &c.

The HELLMUTH COLLEGE is situated near the city, on a beautiful site, in the most healthy locality, and stands in *Ten Acres* of ground.

The *Extensive Buildings* contain a *Chapel*; several spacious *Class Rooms*; a large *Dining Hall*; *Library*; *Dormitories*;

and *Baths*, supplied with hot and cold water for the use of the Boarders. The whole *Premises* have been planned with a special view to secure the *Convenience, Comfort and Health* of the occupants, in accordance with the most modern improvements, as respects *warmth and ventilation*.

A Sanatorium has been arranged, isolated from the rest of the Buildings, where pupils, in case of sickness, will receive the best medical attendance.

The Grounds (fenced in) comprise Cricket Field, Gymnasium, Five's Court, Covered Skating Rink, Covered Shed for wet weather, &c.; and every encouragement will be given to the pursuit of manly and healthy games, under careful superintendence.

REMARKS, ETC.

1st.—A Report, by the Head Master, of the Pupils severally, with regard to proficiency in their studies and their general conduct, will be transmitted to their Parents or Guardians at the end of each term.

2nd.—A School Library is provided for the use of the pupils free of charge, and is furnished with such interesting works as are suitable and profitable for a boy's reading.

3rd.—Boys are allowed unrestricted liberty in corresponding with their parents and friends. If letters are sent home badly written or carelessly spelled, the evil might be checked if any glaring examples were forwarded to the Head Master.

4th.—Parents are earnestly requested not to furnish their sons with a large supply of pocket-money, as this practice tends to foster extravagance. Parents would do well to authorise the Treasurer to give a fixed sum for pocket money every week, on a scale graduated to a boy's position in school, with power to increase it in cases of industry and good conduct.

CAREFULLY OBSERVED:

Each article must be marked with the name in full of the Pupil, without which mark the Clothes cannot be identified.

It is desirable that all articles of clothing be brought to the College clean, and in a good state of repair; and in cases where Parents are desirous that their children should be furnished with any article or money, a previous deposit must be made with the Treasurer, and no application from a Pupil will be entertained without this rule being complied with.

It is particularly requested that all Coats and Jackets may be of a dark colour. Collegiate Caps, of a certain prescribed make and material, are required to be worn, and will be supplied at the College for \$2.50.

In lieu of the Bed, Bedding, Towels, and other articles usually brought by Pupils to School, the College supplies all these, *for the whole period of a Pupil's residence*, for an entrance fee of \$12.
