INVESTIGATION CONCLUDED

Several Additional Witnesses in Shooting of Joseph Roy Heard—The Verdict.

The adjourned investigation into the mystery surrounding the shooting of Joseph Roy, of Charlottetown, on Sunday, Sept. 24th, 1921 at the headquarters of the Benjamin River, was concluded here on Monday before Coroner Dr. A. Martin. The finding of the jury did not serve to elucidate the mystery nor to establish the identity of the person or persons responsible for the tragedy, but it was as follows: "That the said Joseph Roy was found dead on the 25th day of September, 1921 in the Parish of Colborne, County of Westchester, and that his death was caused by a rifle bullet of large calibre fired by some person unknown at present. The jury which was composed of H. S. Alexander (foreman), Gordon Compton, L. P. Dupuis, Celestine LeBlanc, Fred J. McLean, J. J. Bernier, and Blaise Lest, recommended that further inquiries should be made in an endeavor to establish the identity of the party responsible for Roy's death. Six additional witnesses were examined at Monday's session.

The Tragedy

Although the reopened investigation has so far produced no valuable clues, the evidence submitted at the two sessions has developed facts in connection with the tragedy which were previously known to only a few. Three or four days before the shooting, the victim, accompanied by P. W. Hamilton, of Charlottetown, the latter's son and a tinsmith, went into the woods in the vicinity of where the tragedy later occurred. It is believed that the trip was made for game as the party was season was open. Sometime prior to midnight with Roy and Hamilton, the shooting of the party separated, Roy and Hamilton senior proceeding to the headquarters of the Benjamin River some distance out of the hunting grounds usually traversed by them. It is alleged that Roy intended looking over some timber lands with a view to establishing a sawmill. He was accompanied by Hamilton's ignorant of this cruising. Whether or not these allegations have any significant connections with the mystery has not yet been proved. Just after lunch on Sunday, the 25th of September the two men heard what they believed to be a moose call proceeding from up the west branch of the South arm of the Benjamin River. According to Hamilton, Roy went to the bank of the stream to call the moose while he remained beside the fire. A few moments later Hamilton heard a shot, but owing to a deafness in one ear was unable to hear the direction from which direction it had come. He also heard Roy give a muttered exclamation. Hurrying to the bank he found his companion lying in the stream and upon examining him discovered that he was fatally shot. Pulling the unfortunate man from the water he called repeatedly for help but receiving no answer he left the body and started for home. Arriving at Charlottetown he notified Coroner Dr. Ellis of Jacques River, who with a number of others accompanied him back to the scene of the tragedy. The body was examined and the first inquest held right at the place of the shooting. Nothing was determined except that the deceased had been shot. An examination of the immediate vicinity was then made. This, however, was not carried far owing to the density of the trees, for it was readily agreed by the party that the shot had come from a gun discharged nearby. Opinions as to the result of this examination seem to conflict but it was brought out clearly by a witness at Monday's session who was one of the party, that no visible signs of anyone having been around could be discerned as the ground was covered by thick ferns and moss, the reality of which made it impossible to detect a foot-print thereon even a few moments after it was trampled upon. The bank of the stream opposite the place where Roy received his death wound was also searched but this was likewise productive of no possible clue to the mystery.

Secret Investigation

After the first investigation the matter rested for a time until stories began to circulate and a general feeling spread that the first inquest had been a farce. This feeling was intensified by M. A. Kelly being commissioned to investigate the case. Kelly was in, by a secret outlet, in the case. His body will lie in state prior to interment in the Glasnevin cemetery, where Arthur Griffith was buried a few days ago.

ESTIMATES WHEAT WILL COME CLOSE TO BANNER CROP

Winnipeg, Aug. 22—The Grain Trade News, in its weekly crop report made public here today, estimates the wheat yield of the three prairie provinces this year at 850,000,000 bushels. This compares with a total crop in the year 1915 of 860,000,000 bushels. However, the total acreage in 1915 was only 18,867,715, while this year the prairie provinces have between 20,000,000 and 21,000,000 acres sown to wheat. According to the dominion bureau of statistics based on conditions prevailing at the end of July, the prairie provinces should harvest 297,751,000 bushels. The Canadian Pacific Railway, in its weekly crop report issued yesterday, estimated the yield of the prairie provinces at 870,000,000 bushels.

Peking, Aug. 23—The republican cabinet announced today that President Li Yuan-Hung is willing to resign in favor of Sun Yat Sen, deposed head of the China government, provided parliament approves such action.

Later Evidence

Several other hunters were in the neighborhood on Friday and Saturday preceding the tragedy while others were also in the forest on Sunday, although they claim, not in that particular vicinity. Some clues have also developed as to the probable location of a rifle of the same calibre as that which discharged the fatal bullet.

It was at first claimed by the widow of the deceased that a cheque for \$100.00 which her husband took to the woods with him was missing. But at Monday's session a witness gave evidence to the effect that Mrs. Roy had later found the missing cheque in the house. CAMPBELLTON BONDS SOLD

American Investigators Are Very Favorably Impressed With Our Supply.

A special meeting of the Town Council was held Monday evening, His Worship Mayor McKay presiding. Couns Belle-Isle, Gilkey, St. Onge, Graham, Duncan and Marquis were present. The reading of the minutes of the previous meeting was dispensed with. His Worship explained that the matter had been called to re-consideration, the appointment of the Street Commissioner and the consideration of tenders for bonds. Coun. Belle-Isle contended that the matter should be dealt with by the Public Property and Streets Committee. It would be the proper procedure for this committee to discuss the matter and then come to the council with a recommendation. He was aware that the work of the Street Commissioner did not please all, especially the auto owners, but he should not be too severely criticized. The commissioner had been kept busy on other work. He had to haul pipe and cement, tear up old sidewalks and do grading for this permanent work. His Worship said that since taken over the permanent work he had not obeyed orders. He had been placed under the direction of the Engineer, but it was found that when given a job he did not follow orders. Coun. Gilkey asked if the commissioner had ever made a report. His Worship—Only verbal ones. Coun. Duncan thought there were too many houses and not enough work conflicting orders from the departments until it took two men to drive a team of horses. If the horses were kept busy working on the streets they would not feel like dancing or running away. The streets were full of holes. But the commissioner was not all to blame. He had been put at other work. Chairman of Committee should give him explicit directions. His Worship said we were paying this man \$125.00 per month. The chairman of the committee should not have to follow him around, he should have brains and use them. Coun. Belle-Isle moved that the matter of reconsidering appointment of street commissioner be left in the hands of the Public Property and Streets Committee to report with their recommendation at the next regular meeting. Motion carried.

On motion of Coun. Duncan the tenor of the Armstrong & Bell and the Royal Securities Corporation for \$50,000 at \$98.06 were accepted. Coun. Belle-Isle moved the following resolution: "Resolved that the attention of this Council be called to the great danger to our citizens on account of the large number of level crossings in the town and as it is the opinion of this Council that on account of the rapidly increasing traffic some provisions should be made at once to safeguard the interests of the public. Therefore resolved that the Town Clerk be instructed to write the railway authorities requesting that gates be placed at Andrew, Cedar, Prince Wm., Dalhousie and Ramsay Street crossings at once. And further resolved that as a further precaution special instructions be issued to all trainmen that trains be not allowed to run through the town limits at a faster rate of speed than twelve miles per hour. Carried unanimously. Coun. Graham gave notice of motion as follows:— At the next regular meeting of the Town Council I will move or cause to be moved a resolution to amend the by-law adding to section No. 22 subsection 17th following: "And a fee of \$2.00 per annum for upkeep of said sewers." And that the Town Solicitor be instructed to apply for necessary legislation at the next meeting of the Local Legislature. The meeting then adjourned.

U. S. COAL PROBE

Washington, Aug. 22—The first step toward meeting President Harding's recommendation for a thorough investigation of the coal industry was taken today by the Senate Labor Committee in reporting favorably the "Monckton Bill" to establish federal commission to make an exhaustive inquiry and present recommendations to congress.

Monckton is considering the question of reverting to the correct spelling of the name, and the city council has taken up the issue. Under Joint Auspices of Social Service and Temperance Alliance Here Sept. 3.

A series of Conventions under the joint auspices of the Social Service Council and the Temperance Alliance of New Brunswick, is planned for the first half of September.

These conventions ought to result in much good in forming and awakening public opinion to the vital importance of Temperance and the various social problems vitally concerning the citizens of New Brunswick alike men and women.

The speakers which these conventions bring, insure practical treatment of the themes under discussion, and a strong appreciation on the part of the audience.

The speakers are: Dr. J. G. Shear, General Secretary, Social Service Council of Canada; Rev. W. D. Wilson, Secretary, Temperance Alliance; and the Rev. H. A. Goodwin, Parish Priest of the Social Service Council of New Brunswick.

The subjects to be discussed are: Prohibition versus Government Sale; Mental Defectiveness in the Province;—The extent, the causes, the consequences, the cure.

Child Welfare:—Delinquency and Dependency.

The enforcement of laws bearing on the subject, especially the Temperance Act.

The care of prisoners.

Public Health, and recent progress in social welfare.

The places and dates are:—Sept. 3rd, Campbellton 4th, Bathurst; Sept. 5th, Chatham; Sept. 6th, Newcastle.

At each week day convention there will be two sessions. At 2.30 and 8 p.m.

On Sundays the visiting speakers will occupy two pulpits each and will address a mass meeting at an hour not conflicting with the regular church services.

Each convention will be for the county in which it is held.

NEW YORK WOMAN GETS LEAGUE JOB

Dr. Josephine Baker of New York is the first woman in the world to be recognized by the league of nations in a professional capacity. She has been made a member of the important health committee.

GRAND DUKE CYRIL ANNOUNCES CLAIMS TO RUSSIAN THRONE

Paris, Aug. 17.—Grand Duke Cyril of Russia, son of the late Grand Duke Vladimir, threw down the gauntlet to the non-monarchist republicans today when in an official proclamation he declared himself to be the guardian of the Russian throne as the grandson of Emperor Alexander II, and the cousin of the late Czar Nicholas, and therefore the holder of the primogeniture rights to dynastic succession.

REVENUE PROSPECT

Bouquet Revenue perity Is Ret and

Ottawa, Aug. 17.—Indications of turning prosperity are further increasing Federal revenues and success of the new stamp taxes money makers is being demonstrated. Although the tax has been in operation only a fortnight, revenue from this source has gone as high as \$1,000,000 in a day. This figure indicates and is attributable to companies paying in one day the amount of their checks in full, thus obviating the necessity of stamping.

An ordinary day's receipts from stamp tax, however, is around \$1,000,000. How it works out is illustrated by comparing a single July with one in August.

July 25, before the new levy came into effect, the receipts were \$2,000,000. On the corresponding August they amounted to \$1,000,000 not to be surprising if the increase from this source averages \$500,000, with prospects of an increase of over \$5,000,000.
