THE STRAITS.—During the week ending March 25, 43 passengers crossed in the ice boats and during the week ending last inst., 69 crossed. On Tuesday of last week the mails were sent via Pictou but owing to the Stanley being unable to cross they were returned to Sackville and sent by the Capes. The delay caused considerable inconvenience to the Island people. On Wednesday the ice boats crossed after the arrival of the train at Cape Tormentine and the mails were forwarded and delivered at Charlottetown at 9 p. m. This is said to be the first time in 30 years that St. John papers have been delivered at Charlottetown the same day they were issued, during the winter service. Some of the Island papers favor the Capes route as the best route for the Steamer Stanley and many practical men say that she could do better at this point than between Pictou and Georgetown.

Such a supposition would be too uncharitable, and I merely mention it to the Minister of the Gospel to give him an opportunity to clear himself from such a slander. 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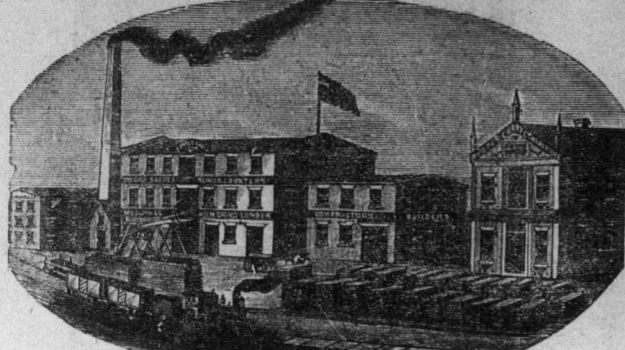
