# Criminal Career

Of Thomas N. Cream, M.D., s Former Londoner.

Thirteen Years of His Life Spent in State Prison.

He Pursued His Nefarious Fractice in Kingsion. Hamilton, London and Chicago -- Sentenced to Penitentiary for Lite on a Charge of Murder-Let Out on Account of Ill-Health - Now a Prisoner in London, England.

Many Londoners will remember Dr. Thomas Ne. I Cream, who about fitteen years ago practiced his profession in this city for a short time. His office was no Dundas street, in the Hiscox block. He was then a young man, apparently about 26 or 27 years of age. One morning the dead body of a young woman was found in a shed at the rear of his office. An inquest was held by Coroner Flock, but sufficient evidence against Dr. Cream could not be produced to justify the police in making

Regarding this man a Montreal dispatch says: Absolute proof has been discovered that Thomas Neill, now in London, England, charged with poisoning Matilda Clovey, is Dr. Thomas Neill Cream as native of Quebec, who graduated from McGill College in Montreal. Thomas Neill Cream was born, so the register of McGill College says, in Glasgow, Scotland, on May 27, 1850. While still a young lad his parents emigrated to Canada and settled in the ancient city of Quebec.

Young Cream himself first worked in the ship-building trade as a carpenter. As he showed considerable natural ability his father decided on sending him to Montreal to study at McGill College for the profession] of medicine. Cream went through his chosen course with great credit to himself, nor did he then show any of those traits which alterward made him so criminally famous.

It was in 1872 when Cream entered

he lost his entire practice and was compelled to leave Kingston.

He then took up his home in Hamilton, Ont. Here, again, his flegal practices got him into trouble. The letters were signed Thomas N. Cream, M.D., Blanchard's Hotel, Quebec City. After Neill had made his arrangements for the wedding with Miss Sabittini in London, he lett her instructions to address all his letters "Dr. Cream, care Daniel Cream, Blanchard's Hotel, Quebec."

Dr. Cream was at the Albion Hotel, Montreal, on March 19 last, and from there wrote again to Mr Battersby, stating that he had bought a ticket on the steamship Britannic, that he expected a parcel in Montreal, and asking Mr. Battersby to forward it to Liverpool by the steamship Labrador. When the parcel came Mr. Battersby opeued it. It contained a number of printed circulars, of which the following is a copy:

Mr. Battersby forwarded the parcel of circulars to Cream and received a letter signed Thomas N. Cream, acknowledging the receipt of the parcel and thanking Mr. Battersby. This would seem to connect Neill and Cream in an unmistakable manner. It is another coincidence, however, that Miss Rachael Cream, sister of Dr. Cream, sailed from Quebec for Liverpool on June 15, on the steamship Lake Superior. It is therefore evident that Miss Cream has been in communication with her brother and has crossed the Atlantic to render him what assistance she can.

From another source the fact is gleaned that the accused caused letters to be written by Miss Sabattini in the name of "W. H. Murray" to a Dr. Harper, a physician of some prominence, to the effect that he had evidence in his possession showing that Marsh and Shrivell had been poisoned by Dr. Harper's son, a student or practitioner at St. Thomas' Hoss and that he would turn over the proofs of young Harper's crime on receipt of £1,500. Murray, Neil or Cream was arrested on a charge of blackmail, but the Scotland Yard authorities began to suspect that he was the murderer, began to suspect that he was the murderer. began to suspect that he was the murderer, and he was placed under arrest. Dr. Stevenson, analyst to the Home Office, examined the viscera of the girl Clover, whose body had been exhumed, and found positive evidence that death had been caused by strychnine. She died in tetanic convulsions, which usually result from strychnine poisoning. A London chemist named Kirkley proved that the accused had purchased 100 empty capsules from him, together with a quantity of nux vomica, the drug from which tity of nux vomica, the drug from which strychnine is obtained. This is the police case as far as it had been developed. No case as far as it had been developed. No motive for poisoning the women has been traced to Cream, and no explanation put forward that would account for his visit to Quebec, except that it is suggested that he went there "on business," whatever that may mean. Altogether it is a mysterious affair, but probably by the time the ceroner's inquest is concluded something more may come out.

mandered constituencies. WHEN DOES A MAN BECOME A

CANADIAN? How long residence in Canada does it require before a man becomes a Canadian? Our esteemed contemporary, the Hamilton Spectator, urges that a man who has lived here since his boyhood-some seventeen years-who has voted for twelve of those has all his interests in the Dominion, is not a Canadian.

If the view of the Hamilton newspaper is generally entertained, it surely is time that an earnest effort were made to cultivate a Canadian national spirit. In the United States they welcome new comers to full civil rights as scon as they serve a brief probation. Thus, despite the cosmopolitan character of the population, a strong spirit of united citizenship is fostered. If we wish to encourage a Canadian patriotism we will not be less ready to welcome as Canadians all who choose to east their lot among us, and

to make no discrimination against them. At the same time we hold that whether a man is a Canadian by birth or by legitimate settlement, he should not boolebarred from aspiring to any office sustained by the money of the Canadian people. At present there are several offices of this kind. Men who have never lived in Canada are sent for to take these offices; they stay here while they hold them; when they get their last check from the Government they pack their trunks and clear off to the regions from which they came. The Spectator apparently believes that the iving out of the best Canadian offices in this way does not place a brand of inferiority on Canadians who are passed over. though well fitted to perform the duties.

The logic in both instances is decidedly against our contemporary. There is a very wide difference between the man who comes to Canada and, in the rough and tumble fight for a living, forges to the front, and the man who has the best office kept for him-to which no Canadian can aspire-and who will not stay an hour in Canada after the termination of his engagement.

The Carling Brewing and Malting Company sre assessed for \$124,000 real and \$35,000 personal property. They appealed against this amount, and gave reasons at the Court of Revision last evening.

Ottawa, June 28.—The Redistribution Bill was read a third time this morning in the House of Commons. No other amendments were made to it, except the addition of a clause by Sir John Thompson that the bill shall not come into effect until the dissolution of the present House. The amendments proposed by Messrs. Bennett and Hughes were thrown out. On the motion for the third reading. Sir Richard Cartwright moved an amendment that the additional member for Toronto and for Nipissing be provided by the union of South Grenville to Leeds and Genville, and Frontense and Lennox, and that no other changes be made in Ontario. It was defeated by a vote of 51 to 90 on a straight party division, except that Mr. Boyle (Monck) voted with the minority.

An amendment was then moved by Mr. Yeo (Prince Edward Island) that the present three electoral divisions on Prince Edward Island be undisturbed, and that one member be taken from Kings county. This was defeated on a vote of 54 to 87.

NEW YORK, June 27 .- The greatest ex-

New York, June 27.—The greatest excitement known in many years was occasioned to-day in Part Une of the Court of General Sessions, when Max Clerget was deliberately murdered by Edward Davins, a brother of 15-year-old Sarah Davins, whom Clerget had assaulted.

Judge Martine was on the bench when Clerget, who is 18 years old and a Frenchman by birth, was arraigned to plead to the charge of the crime committed June 18 on Sarah Davins. The charge had been made by an officer of Gerry's Society.

Clerget pleaded guilty and was on his way back to the prisoner's pen when Edward Davins, the 15-year-old brother of the girl, stood upon his seat in the rear of the court-room and fired a shot from a 38-calibre revolver, which struck Clerget in the body. Clerget fell and died instantly, the shot having passed through his heart.

On the way to the coroner's office the police say Davins had stated the dead man had rained his sister and he shot him.

Toronto, Ont., June 27-11 p.m.— An important depression which developed over Michigan last night has caused strong over Michigan last night has caused strong winds and heavy rain throughout Ontario. It is now centered near Parry Sound and is moving northeastward. The weather is fine in the Maritime district, with high pressure and showery in Quebec, with increasing pressure. Low pressure and fine warm weather prevails in the Northwest.
