## **SCARBOROUGH** BOMBARDED IN EARLY EVENING BY SUBMARINE

Three Persons Killed and Five Injured By Shells, About 15 of Which Fell On Land AGRICULTURISTS EXEMPT -Material Damage Is Slight.

London, Sept. 5 .- Scarborough, on the English east coast, was bombarded last night by a hostile submarine, it was officially announced today. About half the shells in the thirty rounds fired from the undersea boat landed, three persons being killed and five injured, but little material damage being caused.

The official announcement reads:

"A hostile submarine appeared off Scarborough about 6:45 o'clock last night and fired about thirty rounds, about half of which fell on land. Three persons were killed and five injured. The material damage was slight."
