





LABOR FAIRLY

Repudiates Charges That Men All III-Housed On Chippewa Work.

McCREA MEASURE

Says Too Many Lobbyists Trying To Get Increased Fares Authorized.

TORONTO, May 20 .- Declaring that he had always treated labor fairly, that he had stood by labor and that ne did not believe in boards of arbitration or conciliation, Sir Adam Beck, hairman of the Provincial Hydro-Electric Power Commission, addressed a meeting of the Ontario Municipal Hydro-Electric Association in the city hall this afternoon on the present disturbed situation at the Chippewa Canal nevelopment at Niagara Falls. Sir Adam stated that the advance in

the men's wages which the hydro commission had granted had increased the cost of the enterprise to the hydro municipalities by \$1,500,000, and the demands which the employees on the development work were asking would development work were asking would still further increase it by \$3,000,000. The commission, he said, could not see its way clear to conceding this, having in view the interests of the municipalities. If the hydro commission was not capable of looking after this enterprise, Sir Adam said, the Government chald appoint another commission was a supported another commission. should appoint another commis

Sir Adam repudiated the allegations that had been made in some quarters that labor was not fairly treated on the Chippewa work. The men there were comfortably housed in good houses, he said, with separate rooms and iron beds containing proper bed-clothes. The laborer at Chippewa, he said, had worked ten hours a day at 50 cents an hour, and thus made \$5 a day. As to the practical closing down of two sections of the canal work at present, through laborers quitting, the chairman declared that the men were willing to go back to work at the tenhour rate, but were not allowed to work more than eight hours.

The importance of the Chippewa development was emphasized by Sir Adam Beck, who foresaw a further coal shortage. The demand for power had become enormous, he said. He did not particularly object to the appointment of a commission by the Government to look into the trouble between the men and the hydro commission. At the same time, it was planned to increase the total supply of hydro power to 500,000 horse-power. The Government was not hostile to the hydro radial scheme, as some persons had suggested, Sir Adam said. sons had suggested, Sir Adam said. He had had a conference with a Government sub-committee and had been assured that the Government would ac-

cept hydro-radial bonds to the extent of \$700,000. He also stated that he had been told that they would turn over all government radial roads now held, or any secured by the acquisition of the Grand Trunk Railway to the hydro-Too Many Emissaries. 

MINIMUM WAGE **MEASURE GETS SECOND READING**

Rollo Aims To Help Unorganized Labor Rather Than Organized.

WHAT ABOUT TEACHERS?

Labor Minister Says They Can Organize To Better Wages.

[Special to The Advertiser.] TORONTO, May 20 .- The minimum vage bill was given the second reading in the Legislature today, with very little criticism beyond that by H. Dewart, Liberal leader. Other Liberals were much in favor of the bill. Mr. Dewart did not quarrel with the principle, even admitting that it was a good thing to introduce into the province. He was inclined to think that the bill was a little too wide in its scope, as it included domestic servants and farm workers. He thought the bill would have been better framed, along the lines of the Manitoba act, for industrial workers only. ng in the Legislature today, with very workers only.
Rollo Explains Act.

Hon. Walter Rollo, minister of labor. explained the act, stating that it had received the indorsation of labor. It would be operated by a commission of five, of which two would be women. The commission would investigate each The commission would hivestrate and case and draw up the minimum wage scale. Pressed as to scale Mr. Rollo pointed out those in effect in Manitoba and British Columbia. There they ranged from \$11 to \$15 a week. There could not be a fixed scale for all parts of the province he said.

Include Stenographers?

J. W. Curry wanted to know if it would include stenographers. Hon. Mr. Rollo said the board would have the power to deal with what class is desired, but that it would start with those who were in the greatest need of help. He said that it was not as much required to help the organized labor, who could look after themselves, as it was to look after the unorganized labor. The only charge upon the province would be paying the commission an allowance per day to draw up the wage schedules. If there was an industry essential to the province which could not pay the schedule, there would be a subsidy from the Government.

Thos. Marshall (Lincoln), brought up the matter of school feachers. He quoted figures to show that the average wage of the rural woman teacher \$16. School trustees, he said, were pursuing a short-sighted policy. While sympathetic towards school teachers, Hon. Mr. Rollo thought they could organize. 




