CRUSH MEIGHEN AUTOCRACY, IS SINN FEIN RAID BRITISH GARRISON

EDITORIAL-

HON. W. L. MACKENZIE KING has made his appeal to the people of London. They have heard what he has to say-they have heard the policies he considers best for the development of Canada as a nation-they have heard his assurance to legitimate and fair manufacturing interests, and they have heard his severe arraignment of the system of autocracy which has been forced on the people of Canada under the guise of responsible government.

Mackenzie King understands men. There is not his equal in the Dominion as a student and authority on labor problems. Away back in his career, in his capacity as a reporter on a daily newspaper, he laid bare conditions in sweatshops where government contracts were being handled. He presented these facts to Sir William Mulock, then a cabinet minister, who was shocked at the conditions. Right there was planted the seed for Canada's fair wage law. The Lemieux act, an advanced piece of labor legislation, is largely his work. King is recognized by every fair-minded man as a world authority on matters pertaining to labor and the settlement of labor disputes, but more essentially to the prevention of these indus-

H IS challenge to his London audience was straight. He asked who in that gathering had had a voice in the selection of the government that had run the country by orders-incouncil and by committees and irresponsible commissions. In its dying hours the Meighen Government seeks to hand out judgeships and senatorships, as well as every office possible in the gifts of the Government. What happens? The Upper Chamber is controlled by men who have steadfastly turned their backs on reform and progress. Meighen has made certain by his eleventh hour deluge of senatorships that the will of the people, no matter if it is expressed in his overthrow at Ottawa, shall not find expression on the statute books of the country. In that way he has sought to undermine the very essentials of responsible government.

THE women voters, especially those who have to do with the spending of the money from the family purse, found something in Mr. King's address, and it was real vivid, and reflected the experience of thousands of homes where the problem of making ends meet is every day becoming more acute and more pressing. The total obligations of the Dominion are now almost \$560,000,000 per year. This is not a vague amount-something that can be pulled out of thin air. It represents real, hard cash that this country must dig up from its pockets. With the expenditure that was honestly paid out for Canada's participation in the war, Mackenzie King has no quarrel. He regards it as a financial war scar that the country proudly bears. But with the continuation of the million-dollar idea he has no patience. He brings it pretty close home when he makes the point that the Dominion expenditure per year means \$61 per head, \$310 per year for a family of five, or better than \$1 for every working day in the year. We believe the figures he uses are too conservative, and that the amount of indirect and direct taxation that is levied from the family purse of Canada will exceed the figures given by a very large amount.

In face of these staggering totals, is it to be wondered at that the leader of the Liberal party stresses the need for rigid economy in public service, for greater simplicity and directness in the administration of government departments? Facing the inevitable fact that Canada must borrow again to meet her obligations, what other course could be open?

M ACKENZIE KING makes a serious charge, in that he claims that several directors of the National Railways are directors in companies that are receiving millions of dollars worth of business from these roads. No municipal council would permit this sort of business, and yet it is being countenanced and nursed at Ottawa, coupled with the spectacle of the premier of the Dominion standing as a barrier between these companies and the right of Parliament to know where the money expended on these roads is going. If Mr. Meighen can successfully get by with this policy, with the country committed, without its vote, to a tremendously large policy of publicly-owned railways, we might as well say good-by to any attempt to make it possible for the elected and accredited representatives of the people to come into definite and absolute control of our own financial com-

The persistent attempts that have been made to tag Hon. Mackenzie King as a free-trader met with a positive denial. No legitimate undertaking making a decent profit and playing fair with the Canadian consumers of its output has anything to fear from the fiscal policy of the Liberal leader. His plan is safe, sane and workable. He intends to surround himself with the best-informed men he can secure. He will work with the idea of making the tax on eapital needed to promote our industrial development and the opening up of our resources as light as possible. What a manufacturer pays in wages represents what his employees can purchase, and the lessening of the tax on those essential things that a family must have in order to live means that the buying power of the manufacturer's payroll is increased to that extent. Mackenzie King realizes that a tariff for revenue must carry protection with it. From this there is no escape. But he holds to the policy that against this there must be similar protection to the consumer at home who is thus denied free access to the markets of the world. His position throughout is logical, straight and practical.

THE Liberal leader turns to Western Canada for a few days. He has met the people of Ontario, of Quebec and the Maritimes, and his reception has been cordial to a degree that can only be described in the word spontaneous. The people of Canada are looking for something in the way of government administration that carries with it a vision of better things in the future-something that speaks of some lessening in the burden that rests on the mass of the peoplesomething in the way of a fiscal policy that will throttle combines and recognize honest endeavor. Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King stands stronger today than he has ever done before, and he is every day gaining the confidence and support of reformers, no matter under what particular banner they happen to be organized.

The charge has been made in Conservative organs that the Liberal party has one speech for the East and another for the West-one for Ontario and another for Quebec. Mackenzie King's answer to this is: Print them side by side, and show where he is preaching two gospels, according to the tastes and desires of his audience.





Prohibition Commissioner Haynes, in making the announcement today, sald the increase would be sought to enable a more complete and efficient enforcement of the prohibition laws through enlarged forces and facilities.





EXPRESS THE TRUE SPIRIT OF THE DAY

Thanksqiving

A LAY SERMON—By John M. Gunn.

IT IS a good thing," said the Psalmist, "to give thanks unto God." And not only did he SAY it was a good thing, but he made his practice conform to his preaching. Everywhere throughout the Psalms we find him bursting forth into songs of gladness and of praise, and exhorting others so to do. Thanksgiving was not with him an occasional thing. It was the very breath of his nostrils-the atmosphere in which he lived. "From David," said Jeremy Taylor, learn to give thanks for everything. Every furrow in the Book of Psalms is sown with the seeds of thanksgiving."

While the thankful heart finds its fullest expression in the Psalms, it is not by any means confined to that book. It blossoms everywhere in the Old Testament. It was the habitual attitude of mind of all devout Jews. And certain annual festivals had for their object the expression of their national gratitude for the harvest, which they recognized as coming from the bountiful hand of God. The culminating festival of the year was the Feast of Tabernacles, and while it had other meanings, it was pre-eminently and essentially agricultural. It was the feast of ingathering-the harvest home. It was distinctly religious. Every man of Israel was obliged to appear before the Lord at the sanctuary to bring offerings and render thanks for the garnered blessings of vineyard, wheat field and olive grove. The celebration lasted several days, and the people lived in booths erected in the open places of Jerusalem, on the roofs, and in the courts of the houses, in the precincts of the temple, and in the open country outside the city walls.

Though we find nothing exactly similar among the practices of the early Christian church, we find the same beautiful spirit exemplified in a purer and sweeter form. Anyone who thinks the New Testament a gloomy book proves by that very fact that he has never read it. It is the most exultant and joyous book ever written. It was no vain promise of our Lord to his disciples that their joy would be full. It was always full. And it was never dependent on outward conditions and circumstances. When Paul and Silas were thrust into the inner prison at Philippi, and their feet made fast in the stocks, they sang hymns of praise in the night until an earthquake burst asunder the prison doors. The note of thanksgiving is the dominant note of the New Testament. When the aged apostle was lying in a foul Roman dungeon, suffering from disease, chained to Roman soldiers, with whom he could have nothing in common, far away from earthly friends, and expecting hourly to be led out to a martyr's death, he wrote to his beloved Philippian converts, and told them that he had learned one of the greatest lessons taught by the Great Teacher. "I have learned," he said, "in whatsoever state I am, therewith to be content." "Rejoice evermore," he urged them, and to emphasize it by repetition, "Again, I say, Rejoice." "In everything by prayer and supplication WITH THANKS-GIVING, let your requests be made known unto God."

And this ringing note of praise has been heard in all the history of the church just in the measure in which her faith and devotion has approximated to that of the early Christians. Every great revival of religion has been marked by this spirit. The great Wesleyan revival of the eighteenth century in England burst out in songs of praise that have been echoing for nearly two hundred years, not only in the motherland, but throughout the world. So it was with the great Moody and Sankey revival of the last century.

Though the church has always recognized the place of thanksgiving, it has only, within modern times, been made the occasion of an annual national festival. And it is very interesting and noteworthy that we are celebrating this autumn the 300th anniversary of Thanksgiving Day on this continent. For the day, as we know it now, is a distinctively American institution.

The story is one of pathetic and enthralling charm. Late in the year 1620, the Pilgrim Fathers landed at Plymouth Rock. They were men and women of brave hearts, but ignorant of the conditions they had to face, and but ill-prepared to endure the hardships ahead of them. During the first year they underwent the most dreadful suffering from lack of suitable food and clothing, and the more subtle but probably keener pain of loneliness and homesickness in a strange land. Of the little company of one hundred and two who landed in 1620, half had died of exposure and disease before the first year was gone. They sowed grains in the spring of 1621, but the record says: "Barley and Indian corn were the only crops." "The pease were not worth gathering, for, as we feared, they were too late sown." Notwithstanding all this, the good Governor Bradford, at the request of the people, appointed "an especial day on which to give especial thanks for all their mercies." They were short of food. Four men were sent out foraging, and brought in enough game to last the whole company for a week. And that was the genesis of the yearly Thanksgiving Day. "It is our annual time," said Dr. James M. Ludlow, "for saygrace at the table of eternal goodness.

We have reason, first of all, to thank God as individuals. Most of us have prospered in material things. But these are often of least account. Enough is as good as a feast, and there are few in this favored land who have not enough and to spare. Excess of riches do not increase happiness. Indeed, the deceitfulness of riches was emphasized by the Highest Authority of all. There are some things, and the best of things, that we all may have—the things of the spirit for which we should be ever giving thanks; the autumn sunset, the fleecy clouds, never twice the same, the singing of birds, the beauty and fragrance of flowers, the love and the laughter of little children, the comradeship of friends. We are well employed, as someone has said, not in looking for happiness to a remote past or a distant future, but in weaving a song out of our passing days and years.

The grateful heart adds a new grace to personal character. It was a saying of good old Izaak Walton that God has two dwellings-one in heaven and one in the meek and thankful heart. "May God incline us more and more" was the prayer of Dr. William Adams "to that unambitious, unselfish, contented, cheerful, thankful temper which is at once a medicine and a feast, an ornament and a protection." This temper will come to those who can see cause for thanksgiving not only in the things of sense which gratify us, and not only in the so-called successes of life, but also in the hard things which




