MR. CHAMBERLAIN'S PROPOSALS.

He proposed to put a low duty, not exceeding 2 shillings (43 cents) quarter on foreign corn, but none on corn from the British poss sions. He proposed no tax on maize, partly because it formed the food of some of the very poorest among the population, and lastly, because it was raw material as feeding stuff. He proposed a corresponding tax on flour, and he would give special preference to the miller, with the object of re-establishing one of our ancient industries and of preventing a rush from the country to the town, and also of placing corn, offal and feeding stuffs more cheaply within the possession of the farmer. A small tax of about 5 per cent on foreign meat and dairy products would be imposed, excluding bacon, which was the feed of so many of the poorest population. Lastly, he proposed to give a substantial preference to the colonies on wines and fruits. Against these increases he proposed some great remissions. He proposed to take off three-quarters of the duty on tea, half the duty on sugar, with corresponding reductions upon cocoa and coffee.

The net result of these impositions and remissions would be that the town artisan's food would, according to the most elaborate calculation, cost him twopence halfpenny (five cents) less per week than it did at present, while that of the agricultural laborer would cost him twopence (four cents) less, but if, as he believed, a great part of the tax on food would be paid by the foreigner, there would be a reduction in the cost of food both for the artisan and the agricultural laborer. A moderate duty of 10 per cent on manufactured goods would give to the exchequer £9,000,000 a year, and he would make use of that for remission of

MONSTER LIKE MANIAC'S DREAM

Endeavors to Secure Control The Town Terrorized by Aw ful Winged Form.

IT SHEDS A DAZZLING LIGHT

Des Moines, Iowa, Oct. 7. - The town of Van Meter, containing 1,000 persons, is terribly wrought up by what is described as a horrible monster. Every man, woman and child in the town is n a state of terror, and fully half of them fail to close their eyes in slumber

At 2 o'clock he was blinded by the presence of a light of great intensity

Eventually he recovered his senses sufficiently to distinguish the monster and fired through the window. The plate glass and sash were torn out and the monster disappeared. Next morning imprints of great three-toed feet were disernible in the soft earth. Plaster casts of them were taken.

SUICIDE AT THE ASYLUM

Inmate's Strange Method of Taking His Life.

With a Chain and Team of Horses He Breaks His Neck.

James E. Haldane, an inmate of the London asylum, and the son of a farmer residing near Strathroy, committed suicide yesterday in a manner that was peculiar. He went early to the reservoir, which was empty at the time, and there in the bottom he attached a chain to an iron pipe. The chain he had secreted from the stable in the early morning, showing that he contemplated self-destruction. He attached the other end of it to the double trees of the wagon which he was driving, and put a smaller chain around his neck, the object being that when he started the horses into a jump the jerking of the chain would break his neck. This is what happened, death being instantan-eous. Coroner Ferguson decided that an inquest was unnecessary. Haldane was a young man, and had been at the asylum about nine months. His malady was not a severe one, and he was employed about the farm. His duties were to drive a team of horses where excavations were going on at the reservoir, and he had all summer proved very industrious.
