Paris, Jan. 10.-Foreign Minister Delcasse today informed the Council Ministers that the Moroccan crisis had been entirely relieved. The Sultan restores his French military advisers and expresses satisfaction with the French policy. # STOESSEL MISLED BY OWN PEOPLE

Was Amazed to Hear of Kuropatkin's Defeat.

BALTIC FLEET IS NOW USELESS

Vanquished Commander Anxious to Spend His Declining Years

Headquarters Third Japanese Army at Port Arthur, Jan. 7, via Tien Tsin, Jan. 9.—Captain Tsunoda, the Japanese staff officer, who was sent to Port Arthur to inform General Stoessel of the contents of the message of the Emperor of Japan, saying that the garrison should be treated with the greatest consideration, says:

"General Stoessel's first inquiry was about the whereabouts of General Kuropatkin. I said I did not know exactly, but understood he was some where about Mukden. General Stoessel remarked that he had last head from General Kuropatkin Oct. 6, saying he would come to relieve Port Arthur soon. General Stoessel was plainly incredulous at my statement that General Kuropatkin had been defeated and driven back towards Mukden, so I produced maps, showed him the position of the two armies near the Shakhe River, and gave Stoessel details of Kuropatkin's defeat with the loss of 50,000 to 60,000 men, at which the Russian general expressed amazement and quickly remarked he had been

"General Stoessel then asked about the Baltic fleet, and I told him some of the ships had passed Cape of Good Hope. With a hopeless expressed look General Stoessel said: 'Now that Port Arthur has fallen there is no use for the fleet coming any further.' "I then asked General Stoessel what






