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# BRITISH AND AMERICAN ATHLETES ARE LEADING

Capture Most of the Laurels Quite Handily at Olympia Yesterday

John J. Flanagan of the Irish-American Team Breaks Record With Hammer Throw Games Bewildering to Watch.

LONDON, July 14.—America and Great Britain acquired most of the laurels today in the first real business day of the Olympic sports. Twice the Stars and Stripes fluttered to the top of the lists in the centre of the arena...

The final will be contested tomorrow by the first men of each team. The other interesting number on the programme today was the 600 yards cycle race, of which there were sixteen heats of this number the United Kingdom won six, France three and America, her only entry, being Cameron, and Holland, Canada, Africa, Germany, and Belgium, each with one heat which will be void because the time limit was exceeded.

The British pedestrians had their own way in the 3,000 metres walk, there were no American contenders in this event. The 20 kilometre cycle race was the most important event of the day. L. J. Whentz of the New York Athletic Club made a desperate effort, but he was unable to secure a place in the final sprint.

## JORDAN DROPS DEAD IN WALL ST. SUBWAY

Death of Financier Attended by Tragic Circumstances

NEW YORK, July 14.—Thomas B. Jordan, formerly controller of the Equitable Life Assurance Society, dropped dead of heart disease late this afternoon in the Wall street station of the subway. His death was attended by tragic circumstances. Scores of persons saw him fall. Mr. Jordan had parted from his son, Frank B. Jordan, only a moment before and a messenger overtook him on the subway street and informed him of his father's death. The son was overcome with grief.

While a young lad of about twelve years of age was on some float stages at the pond near the mill, he suddenly lost his balance and fell into the water. Hearing his cry for help, Mr. Hilyard, who happened to be near, leaped to his feet and swam strongly to the boy's side. He rescued him just as he was on the edge of the water going down the third time.

# FEDERAL SUBSIDIES FOR ST. JOHN VALLEY RAILWAY

Grant Given For Complete Line, Grand Falls to St. John

And For Interprovincial Bridge at Restigouche and Tobique Railway

Amended Clause One of Election Bill Passed After 8-Hour Fight

OTTAWA, July 14.—After a debate lasting most of the day, the Commons at ten o'clock tonight finally passed clause 1 of the election bill. The opposition kept up for eight hours sort of half-hearted fight against the clause as the amended bone of contention being the government's determination to secure fair lists in unorganized districts of Northern Ontario by having a revision of lists by the board of judges before any federal election. Mr. Boyce of Saint Ste. Marie, who foresaw defeat at the next election if the present unfair lists are discarded, led the fight, but facts as to the unfairness of the lists and the weight of argument produced by the government speakers were so conclusive that the rest of the opposition members declined to enter into the argument with any display. The remaining clauses were then taken up and passed rapidly and unopposed.

ST. JOHN VALLEY RAILWAY NOW UP TO MR. HAZEN. The railway subsidies laid before the House of Commons yesterday are particularly interesting to New Brunswick in view of the fact that, as far as is possible to the federal authorities, the government has provided for the construction of the greatly needed railway down the valley of the St. John River.

THE NEW SUBSIDIES. The new subsidies for the maritime provinces are as follows: For a line of railway from Tuskett West to the line of the Halifax South Western Railway on or near Riverdale Station, not exceeding 15 miles.

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# PEOPLE OF ST. GEORGE ARE BREATHING SMOKE

Forest Fire Raging That No Man Dare Predict Result of

Prompt Action of Wardens Might Have Saved The Situation — I. C. R. Loss is \$75,000.

Forest fires continue to rage in different parts of the province. On the Back Lands road in this county the fire which has been raging for some days assumed alarming proportions yesterday afternoon. Scores of men turned out and fought it, but failed to prevent it from spreading across the road. One home was abandoned. The wind died down considerably last night and with it the fire.

FIRE ON BACK LANDS ROAD BREAKS OUT WITH RENEWED VIGOR AND RESIDENTS FLEE

Fire Assumed Alarming Proportions Yesterday and Men Were Called Out to Fight It—Inmates of George Crane's House Abandon It—Serious Fire at Loch Lomond—Timber Destroyed

Yesterday the forest fire on the Back Land road to the southwest of South Bay were at their worst, having burst out with renewed vigor at about noon. As a result of this the dwelling occupied by George Crane was threatened with destruction and its occupants, Mr. Crane's sister, Mrs. Rayson, and her four children, together with the contents of the building, had to be removed to a place of safety.

Abandoned houses to his own dwelling on the other side of the road. Yesterday although the fire was burning fiercely, very few were fighting it. James Lowell, M.P.P., of South Bay, was on the scene in the morning and also during the afternoon, and with the aid of some of the residents of the locality did what he could to stay the onward march of the fire.

SHOWING GREAT ENERGY. Since the beginning of the fire on the Tuesday of last week Mr. Lowell has shown great energy in attempting to check the fire. He has used his own horses in the attempt and will continue the work today. Speaking to a representative of The Sun yesterday, Mr. Lowell said that it was the duty of the government to take steps to have the fire checked by having the firewarden and men on the scene. Last evening Mr. Lowell went to Grand Bay for the purpose of obtaining fire-fighters for today's struggle with the flames.

ONLY ONE LEFT. The reporter found Mr. Crane, senior, the only one about the house, which had every appearance of having been hurriedly vacated. A few articles of furniture still lay scattered about the yard. About a hundred yards away the smoke was rising in a dense cloud and the flames were roaring and crackling in the brush. The presence of a clump of green woods retarded the advance of the fire, which, nevertheless, was making progress.

BOSTON GETS RELIEF FROM HEAT AT LAST.
