Under the Parliament Act any Bill passed three times in succession by the House of Commons automatically becomes law after it receives the consent of the Sovereign, whether passed by House of Lords or not. If the Irish Home Rule Bill passes through all its stages in the House of Commons this time it will therefore become law whether the Peers assent or dissent.

Speakers differed and opposed one another according to the opinions they held. Amendments were submitted. As many as three were be fore the Chair at one time.

"The Executive met and adjourned again and again, debating carefully the best action to take, but it was most encouraging to observe that all were actuated by a great desire to arrive at a plan that would be best for the good of the city. Differences gave way always before this desire. Finally the Committee reached as unanimous decision in the resolution placed before you to-night, and which I have the honor to support. This resolution has not been hastily arrived at but has had the best thought and wisdom of the Executive. It now devolves upon us as citizens to give it the ungalified support that it

"I speak to-night as a St. John's man attached to his city. For ove 40 years I have trodden its streets and climbed its hills. Looking back, I recall it as it was in my boyhood days. I see the advances our city has made since then and how much it has been improved. All credit to the men who have done their part in bringing about these improvements,

Unattractive Conditions

"But to-day I still see a city with dirty streets, with many comfortless houses hardly fit for my brother man to live in, with filthy drains in front around which tender little children play inhaling foul vapours and making their fight for life against heavy

"Then I look ahead and see a better city, with well kept streets and lanes. modernly equipped houses for the working man to which he points with pride as "home"; robust rosy-cheeked children happily playing in clean and elevating surroundings.

"This is the city we have in view, and towards which this motion is intended to make as tride. How soon we reach it depends upon ourselves We must arouse from our lethargy and indifference and show a determined purpose in this direction. REPORTS LIKELY TO STARTLE THE COUNTRY.

Promised Revelations of Transac tions Under Laurier Government.

WORKED IN CONCERT.

Say That Facts Revealed Show Much Crookedness or Questionable Work.

Ottawa, Feb. 7.—Some interesting evelations are promised when ther s tabled in the House a series of reports by Mr. G. T. Fergusonfi K.C. who some months ago was appointed Royal Commissioner to inquire into he disposition of the public domain inder the late government. The commissioner has been at work for some nonths, and his undertaking is far rom finished. One report has already een presented, but investigation into lengthy series of transactions inder progress, and it is not quite ertain when they will be completed. Much unsavory matter, it is learned, as been uprooted. On the strength of the initial report one Deputy Minister resigned, and other officials are quite likely to experience the same fate.

Wide Field

The investigation covers a very wide field, and extends over the whole Liberal regime from 1896 down o the time the present government aid hold of the helm in October, 1911. Leases or sales of lands, water powers, mineral rights, grazing riveleges, timber limits and various oncessions are being probed.

It is understood that numerous ransactions, exceedingly peculiar in haracter, but correspondingly profitble to those who engaged in them, ave been established. Some years igo there was an inquiry into the ale of timber concessions in the west and the manner in which proposals vere advertised and tenders were pened were, to say the least, deciddly suspicious. 

APPROVE THE IDEAL.

Just as soon as thoughtful mer carefully examine the F.P.U. legislative proposals, they are forced by reason and logic to admit their practical value. This was proven last night when at the M.C.L.I. debate the Homestead idea received more votes than the Model Farm and Distribution of Seeds policies together, as the members evidently looked on the model farm as useless under present conditions and the distribution of stock and seeds as a farce as the receivers are not well enough informed on farming to get full returns of equal value to the amount invested.

The Homestead idea really plans to do for the farmer what Mr. Coaker would do for the fisherman, that is give the farmer a chance, by loaning him money, to purchase the farm utensils, stock and seeds to start proceedings properly; this money would be payable within say 10 years and if 20 farms per year were started in ; years we would have at least 100 model farms instead of having bu one farm for the whole Island.

An instructor or two could visit these farms and give necessary advice as to the soil, stock, etc., and as the money invested would be payable within a certain time, more farm could be started at no expense whatever to the Country.

The farmer in the first place would invest sa y\$500 and the Government about \$1500, and as the farmer would receive proper instruction from the Department in St. John's, he would in a short time be in a position to get good value out of the land.

The Department of Agriculture would be in a position to handle his stock as they would require this to stock other farms, and in this way an endless chain of benefit to farm er and country would be formed, that would forever do away with the idea of giving away public moneys as in

M.C.L.I. debaters, and this is the agricultural policy proposed by Mr.

The F.P.U. plan will mean practical benefits to the whole country; the Morris party simply results in an extravagant outlay of public moneys to absolutely no practical purpose.




