

## Paper Controller About to Order Cutting Off of Unpaid Subscriptions

At a public hearing in Ottawa last week in connection with paper conservation, the Paper Controller for Canada intimated that regulations about to be issued would include one to the effect that:

"Publishers of daily newspapers must cease sending their wspapers to subscribers three months in arrears, unless subscriptions be definitely renewed and all arrears fully paid.

The reason for this regulation of the Paper Controller is that it is the practice of some publishers to send their newspapers until ofdered stopped, and this practice frequently results in loss to the publisher, besides a virtual waste of paper. It is to prevent paper waste that the new regulation has been decided on-


The manufacture of paper consumes labor, wood, coal, chem icals and transportation facilities, and every ton of paper saved means just so much more labor, raw materials, chemicals, fuel and transportation available for urgent war needs. 

# BANK PRESIDENT BRITISH MAKE PASSES AWAY

Death of Mr. W. F. Cowan, Head of the Standard Bank

End Came Suddenly at the Age of Eighty-Eight Years

Oshawa, Oct. 28, -W. F. Cowan, president of the Standard Bank of Canada and one of the pioneers in home early this morning, as a result of heart failure. Although Mr. Cowan was 88 years old, he had appeared to be in excellent health, and his death was a shock to his many friends.

Away back in the first half of the

nineteenth century, when Ontario was largely a wilderness, W. F. Cow-an, a young Irish lad, left his home in Trillick, County Tyrone, to come to Canada. He arrived in Toronto over 60 years ago, and with a man 5,620, including 121 officers. named Gow, started a dry goods store at the corner of King and Yonge streets, where now stands the ominion Bank. Later he went into ousiness with his brother, John Cowan, on Yonge street, and after some years moved to Brooklin, near Whitby. He next moved to Oshawa, where, with his brother, he started a general store. In the 70's the brothers established what were at first known as the Cedardale vorks, manufacturing scythes, hayforks and other farm implements. The industry prospered and developd into the Oshawa Malleable Iron Works of to-day

About this time Mr Cowan became interested in financial enterprises, and founded the Ontario Loan and Savings Company and the Western Bank, of which his brother became



### SENDING PRESENTS BY PARCEL POST (Clip This Out for Reference.

For the information of those sending parcels to soldiers in England or at the front, The Courier publishes the rates of postage: To England, the rate is 12 cents a pound or any fraction thereof; limit weight on parcels to England is 11 pounds. To France or Belgium, the rate is 24 cents for parcels any weight up to three pounds; from three pounds to seven pounds (the limit), the rate is 32 cents—not 32 cents per pound, but 32 cents for any weight from three to seven pounds. Any letter or parcel for any soldier in the hospital (even if this hospital is not known to the sender), having the word "hospital" marked across it will be delivered. A customs declaration must be attached to each parcel, for which application should be made at the stamp window of the postoffice.

So far 50,000,000 feet of timber have been taken out, and the operations have been forced to such an extent that in September last over 6,000,000 feet were milled.

Remote Forests Invaded There were many difficulties fac-ing the Board. The scene of the desired wealth was remote. There were no means of communication.

Transportation facilities had to be installed. The Board also operates in six districts on the mainland of British Columbia, its activisouth a distance of 600 miles north as the crow flies. Into all these dis-tricts, roads had to be built. New mills were installed and old ones re-vived. The coast had to be searched for tugs for the hauling of the logs, and for machinery for the mills There was a dearth of labor and supplies of all sorts.

Balkans.

Dual Monarchy a Drain.

Indeed it has been suggested that in her present disorganized and demoralized condition Austria no longer is an asset, but a distinct drain upon Germany from the military point of view, and consequently that even though intending to continue the war on her own account, Germany war on her own account, Germany would be quite willing to allow Austria to drop out, provided she could be ensured against attack from the Entente forces on the south.
