Wireless Station at Cape Race Consumed by Fire

St. John's Nfld., May 6. - The fire which destroyed the wireless station at Cape Race last night, started through a spark from the sending apparatus igniting the side of the wooden building in which the apparatus was installed. The station is one of the best known on the north Atlantic coast and the company will install a temporary equipment as soon as possible. The loss is placed at \$10,000.

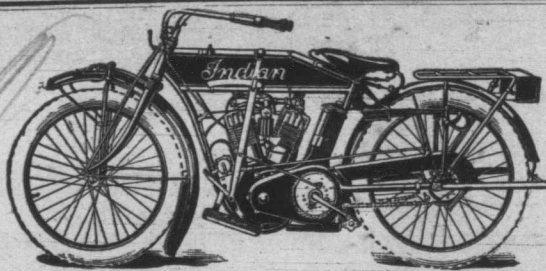

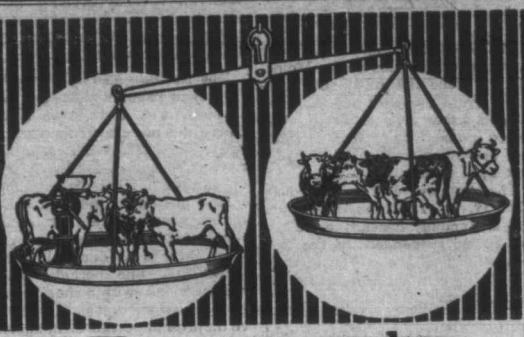

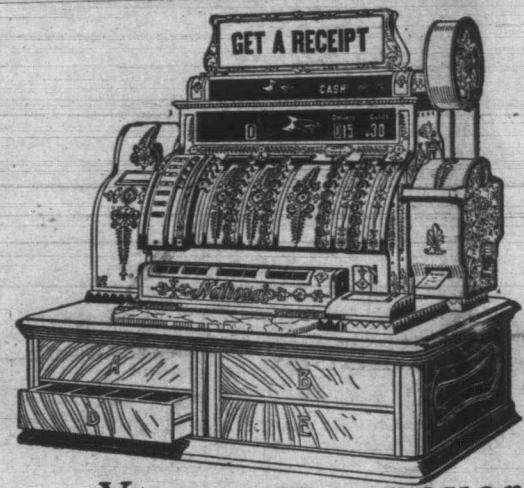
