BOARD OF TRADE.

Newcastle Board of Trade met on the 30th ult., Pres. Hennessy in the chair. 35 men were present. Committee reported that Local Government intended to grant \$200 increase to the yearly subsidy for the Dorothy N., and nothing extra for the ferry. W. S. Loggie, being present, was urged to again try to secure a subsidy from Dominion. He promised to do everything possible.

Hon. Mr. Morrison said that the committee had not seen Capt. Amos since subsidy was fixed at \$1000. They did not know if Capt. Amos could form a company under such conditions. The Chief Commissioner was willing, if Dominion would increase down river subsidy by \$500, to decrease local subsidy to that rate by same sum and add it to the up-river route.

Mr. McCurdy thought that \$1300 for Dorothy N. and \$700 for ferry would be sufficient. Matter of I. R. C. charging \$1.50 extra for shunting cars to deep water wharf was discussed and the President and Secretary were instructed to memorialize the government concerning the charges.

The following were proposed for membership, and accepted:—Wm. M. Sinclair, W. K. Payne, Thos. Foley, Thos. J. Durick, H. S. Miller, Dr. R. Nicholson, David J. Buckley, Rogersville and E. H. Sinclair Newcastle.

Mr. Morrison gave notice that at next meeting he would move for appointment of committee to revise the by-laws.

A communication was read from the E. Sinclair Lumber Co., calling the attention of the Board to obstacles in the river, requiring about ten days dredging, and asking them to ask Dominion Government to have same dredged.

Mr. Loggie reported that this matter was likely to be seen also, so that dredging was probable in the "cut" and the "horseshoe" below Newcastle.

Sinclair's communication was received and the president and secretary were authorized to forward a memorial in the matter to the Dominion government.

A communication was received from D. J. Buckley that he had furnished D. J. & J. D. Buckley's gig and which must be moved to front road. He would also operate saw mill. He wanted a my assessment fixed at \$1000, and wanted Board of Trade to use their influence to that end.

Mr. Nelson protested against such action as asked of Board of Trade. It was worth \$3000.

T. W. Butler and E. A. McCurdy moved that a committee of three be appointed to promote application of Mr. Buckley before County Council at its next meeting on April 5th.

Committee—T. W. Butler, S. A. Russell and James Falconer. Carried. Adjourned.

The Board of Trade held its regular annual meeting last night, Pres. Hennessy in chair.

Secretary read his proposed report to the London, (Eng.) emigrant office, filing in statistics re wages, prices, etc., here. He had marked wages of farm laborers at \$18 to \$22 per month, with board; wages of laborers, \$1.50 to \$1.75 per day, without board, female domestics, \$6 to \$15 with board, with good demand for all three.

classes, prices of butter 20 to 29c per lb.; beef 10 to 15c, etc.

T. W. Butler barrister, who runs a large farm said that he was paying one hired man \$28 per month also providing him a house, wood, and several other advantages. His second man received \$20 and board. Farm help came high and good workmen were scarce.

Rev. P. W. Dixon said he had obtained from Immigration Agent Wilnot of St. John a man from Scotland who called himself a farmer. Had paid him \$20 a month and board. During 6 or 7 months he had him, he had to face someone else to do the more particular work as the Scotsman knew nothing of horses and did not know and could not learn how to drill turnips etc. Men from the British Islands should be employed here on farms only on trial.

Secretary reported that letters had been sent to Ottawa asking for dredging of river between here and Sinclair's mill, and for abolition of charge of \$1.50 extra for shunting cars from station to Deep Water wharf down in the town to be loaded or unloaded.

It was arranged to have a committee meet on Thursday with directors of Miramichi steam Navigation Co. at Chatham to talk over rearrangement of subsidies for boats on the river.

On motion of T. W. Butler and John Clark, a committee of three was appointed to interview business men of town re floating a company to put a ferry boat on route between here and Nelson.

Rev. Father Dixon guaranteed \$100.

The committees were appointed and Court adjourned.

ADJOURNED MEETING TOWN COUNCIL

Police Committee Reported on Police Magistrate's Accounts for 1909 and 1909

Town Council, pursuant to second adjournment, met Wednesday night, Mayor Miller in the chair. Aids present:—Doyle, Morrison, McMurdo, Ritchie, Sargeant, T. Russell and S. A. Russell.

A communication was received from Wm. Casey, asking for exemption from taxation, because no public road connected his property with the rest of the town. Referred to committee on petitions.

Finance committee reported that the deed of the Copeland property had not yet been secured. On recommendation of Light and Water committee, the following bills were passed:—I. C. Coal Mining Co. \$75.99 Colonial Lubricating Co. 104.40 Can. Gen. Electric Co. 3.16 T. McAvity & Son 4.80 Cataract Refining Co. 35.40 Jerome Laundry 10.85 S. Matheson 3.00 \$237.51

Police Committee reported that they, with T. W. Butler, as counsel, had gone over the Police Magistrate's reports for 1908 and 1909 about which there had been considerable dispute and had carefully audited the same. They found that, according to previous custom, the Police Magistrate had been charging for certain cases, more than the law strictly allowed, but he had merely followed precedent.

There were two items incorrect in 1909 report, but these were mere errors in carrying out the amounts and had been corrected in accounts for first quarter of 1910.

The committee recommended:—(1) That the case of Miller vs. Miller be left with Mr. Miller and the Magistrate to settle, as Mr. Miller has expressed his willingness to pay the costs as far as he is concerned in the matter.

(2) That in the case of Jones vs. Vye the Magistrate should look to these parties for his costs or refund them to the town.

(3) That in the case of the six boys who came before the Magistrate on Nov. 29, 1909, he be asked to refund to the town the sum of \$9.00.

(4) That it is the opinion of the committee that the fees laid down by law are too small for a town Magistrate to be governed by generally.

(5) We would also recommend that the magistrate be requested to collect costs, at least, from all offenders, when it is possible to do so.

We may add here that Mr. Malby was before your committee and he agreed to all the suggestions and recommendations of this report. We found him quite willing to meet the town in all fairness. We would, therefore, recommend that his reports for 1908 and 1909 be received and adopted.

Your com. are of the opinion that it would be more satisfactory to all concerned to pay the magistrate a salary and have all costs and fines go to the town.

Report was received and laid on the table for consideration of next meeting.

The matter of lighting North-west bridge was brought to Mr. Loggie's attention, with request that he again bring it before Dominion government. Adjourned.

COUNTY COURT IN SESSION

County Court was in session today, Hon. Judge McLatchey presiding. There was no civil cases before the court. The following criminal cases were presented.

The King vs. Haley—breaking and entering.

The King vs. Glidden—breaking and entering.

The King vs. Mayes—breaking and entering.

The King vs. Manuel—receiving stolen goods.

R. A. Lawlor K. C. appeared for Haley, Mayes and Manuel. Robt. Murray appeared for Glidden. A. A. Davidson K. C. presented the indictments on behalf of the King. His Honor the Judge spoke at some length to the grand jury, commending their full attendance and going very fully into the cases. His Honor also impressed very strongly upon the Grand Jury the sanctity of the oath they had taken; their duty to the King and Society—Regardless of sympathy. They should forget everything but their duty, and do it without fear or favour.

SPECIAL MEETING COUNTY COUNCIL

County Council was held today to appoint an Inspector under C. T. A. and deal with Board of Health accounts. Only one Councillor was absent. 55 applicants were in and the Council decided to cut out those getting no votes and take a vote on the highest 4 after a secret ballot was taken on all who received votes.

The last ballot resulted in the selection of Daniel Baldwin of Nelson and was made unanimous.

The Board of Health occupied the Council in quite a lengthy discussion. Expressions of confidence in the Council's members were general and the matter of accounts eventually left in their hands.

T. W. Butler, Jas. Falconer and Samuel Russell were heard as a Committee from the board of trade in application of J. D. Buckley for local taxation on an industry at Mill Cove Bridge including grist mill, corn mill and lumber. Mr. Butler spoke at some length to the Council on the benefits to be derived from the industry. The men employed would be so many more tax payers and the industry not only a stimulus to farming, but the introduction of a new business which necessarily followed the importation and grinding of corn "home produced feed." Mr. Falconer and Mr. Russell also addressed the Council. All seemed to want the industry, but thought it should be left to Newcastle Parish Councillors, in view of another session of the Council before Legislation could be obtained. It was decided to allow the matter to stand over till next Council meeting and the Councillors could look into the proposition more fully. E. J. Parker, Warden, presided and directed the method of selecting an Inspector.

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NARROW ESCAPE

As Geo. Stewart, of Douglastown was crossing the ice to Chatham Sunday evening on his way home he went through the ice and narrowly escaped drowning. Fortunately his predicament was noticed by Jack Skidd and W. G. McKay, who hurried to his rescue and succeeded in dragging him to firm ice. Stewart continued on his way, no worse for the ducking.

FIRE IN THE ADVOCATE

Does Several Hundred Dollars Damage to Plant and Hinders Business.

The Advocate office was the scene of a serious fire on the evening of the 31st ult. There being a brisk fire of wood in the furnace one of the hot air pipes became so heated that the ceiling through which it passed took fire and the rollers and ink on the press also caught. Had the firemen not been soon on the scene the conflagration would have proved most disastrous. As it was, our loss was several hundred dollars and our newspaper press was temporarily put out of commission, which explains the unusual appearance of this issue. We trust however, that before another issue is due we shall be better than ever prepared to print an up-to-date paper.

REV. T. H. CUTHBERT

Northumberland County mourns the loss of an earnest Christian gentleman, who passed away on Tuesday last in the person of Rev. T. H. Cuthbert, rector of the English Church of Derby and Blackville. Returning Tuesday night from a meeting in Blackville, he walked across the river from Chelmsford, and reached his house in apparently good health. But while hanging up his coat he suddenly expired. Mrs. Cuthbert, who was Miss Estella S. Hill of Guelph, Ont., and a descendant of the English Church of Derby and Blackville, where he remained till 1900 when he came to Newcastle. Here he was rector seven years. Then after a few months visit in England, he took charge of the Derby Blackville field, where, as in Newcastle, he was very successful and popular, and much esteemed by all denominations. In politics he was an ardent radical and much interested in Temperance and Moral reform. The funeral took place in St. Peter's Church, Derby, on Friday.
