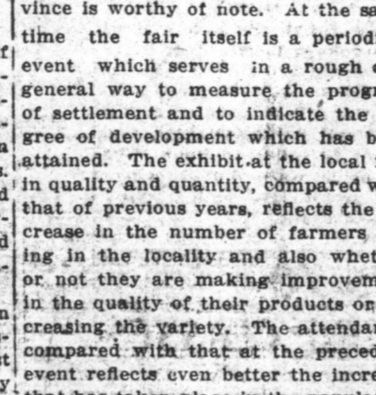

Chicago, Sept. 27.—An alliance of all English-speaking people against Teutonic conquests is offered as the result of Germany's warlike attitude.
