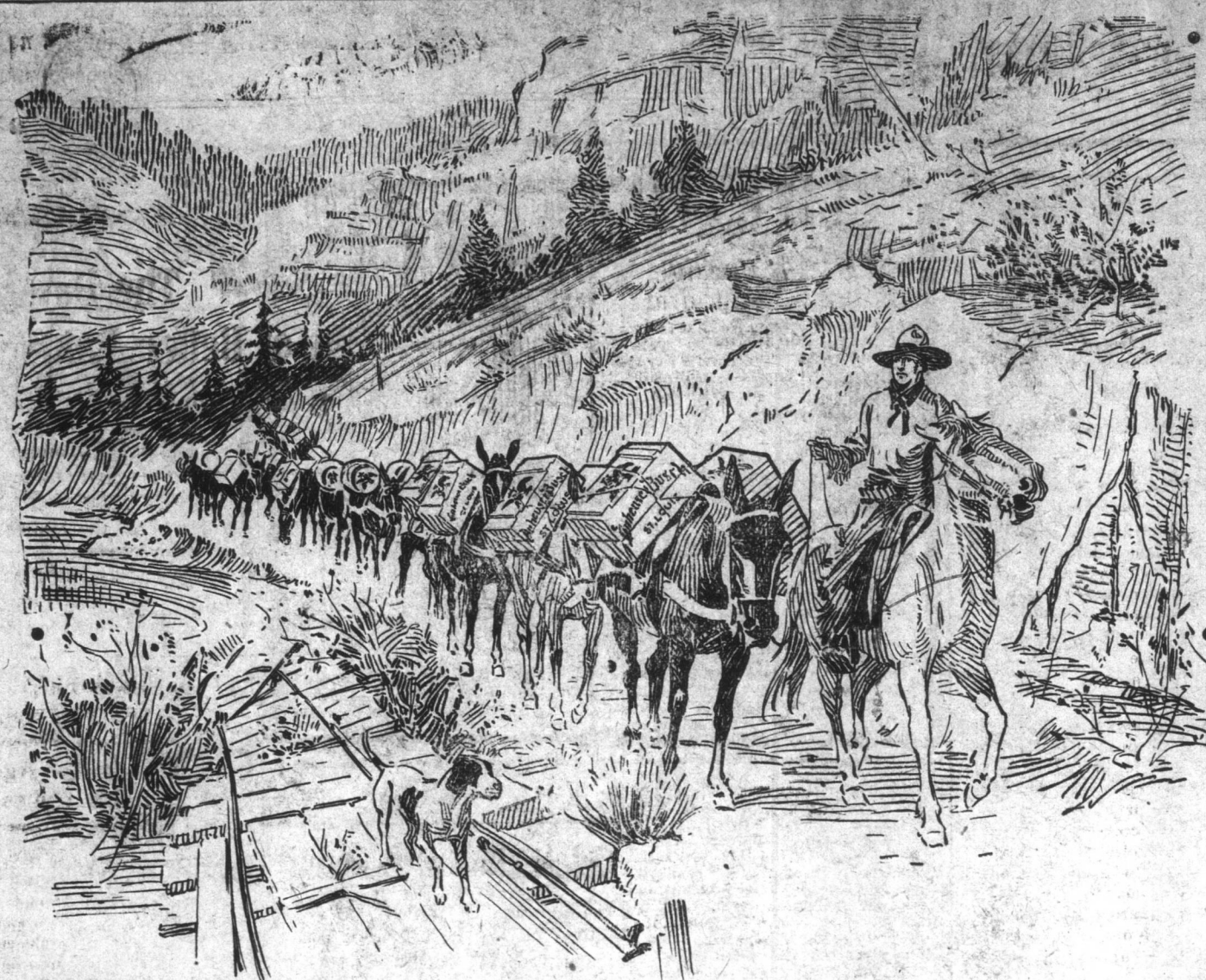

**The Evening Chit-Chat**  
 by RUTH CAMERON

That great advances are being made every year in the science of child training is an undeniable fact, but there is one change in method that I regret. And that is the decrease of things to be learned by heart.

How much poetry does your child learn by heart at school to-day?  
 How much of the Bible is he asked to learn at Sunday School?

Very little, I fancy, if his teacher has the modern point of view. He studies and reads, and listens to explanations and stories and illustrations, but he seldom learns by heart.

And I think it's a big mistake. Of all our childhood's educational advantages that we didn't appreciate and maybe fought against at the time, I think most of us of the older generation—the generation that emphatically learned by heart—will admit that one of the greatest advantages was being forced to incorporate into our mental system so much of the beautiful things in our literature.

Much of what we learned we didn't understand at the time, of course. It was just a string of words and phrases. Or if we did understand it mentally, we didn't spiritually. And then we lived, and every phase of life translated some of that poetry for us.

Very great experience, every sorrow or suffering or joy illumined some line to us. Who hasn't had the experience of recalling some piece of years ago, and for the first time really understanding it?

And I think it's a shame that our children aren't carrying away from their schooling, a similar fund of unrecognized treasure.

Seems to me when the school fails to give them this it's up to us to try to make up the lack.

In our neighbourhood there is one mother who believes as I do about this, and who dedicates a part of every Sunday afternoon to filling in this gap for her four youngsters.

She doesn't try to teach them—not more than ten or twelve lines of poetry or half a dozen verses of the Bible every week. But she spends much time in making the selection from the whole range of literature and the best in the Bible.

She explains the selection and then turns the children loose to learn it. Some dainty or some especial privilege is the reward of the one who is first ready to recite it.

In order to fix the selections more firmly in their minds, she frequently reviews them from Sunday to Sunday, or calls on the children to recite them at the supper table or just before bedtime. And this is a matter of great pride with them to be able to recite correctly.

Of course twelve lines isn't much, but twelve lines a week is 624 a year, and 624 lines from the very refined gold of our literature is a mental treasure not to be despised.

Does this plan appeal to you as worth trying?

I hope so.

### Award Stands --- Both Nations Accept.

To-day's cable despatch declares that the five days have elapsed during which either could demand a revision of the award under Article X. of the submission which runs as follows:—

ARTICLE X.  
"Each party reserves to itself the right to demand a revision of the award. Such demand shall contain a statement of the grounds on which it is made and shall be within five days of the promulgation of the award, and shall be heard by the Tribunal within ten days thereafter. The party making the demand shall serve a copy of the same on the opposite party, and both parties shall be heard in argument by the Tribunal on said demand. The demand can only be made on the discovery of some new fact or circumstances calculated to exercise a decisive influence upon the award and which was unknown to the Tribunal and to the party demanding the revision at the time the discussion was closed, or upon the ground that the said award does not fully and sufficiently within the meaning of this agreement determine any question or questions submitted. If the Tribunal shall allow a demand for a revision, it shall afford such opportunity for further hearings and arguments as it shall deem necessary."  
Representatives of the United States and of Great Britain, however, intimated last Saturday that it had been decided not to question the finding of the Tribunal in the fisheries case, but to accept the award in all its details as binding on both nations.

Mrs. Spracklin, wife of Mr. W. Spracklin, agent of the Reid Nfld. Co., died at North Sydney, Monday, after a protracted illness. The deceased lady was a daughter of Mr. John Trappell, Sheriff of Harbor Grace, and a cousin of Mr. R. H. Trappell, jeweller of St. John's. The remains were brought along on the Bruce express to be interred at Whitbourne.

Scientists from Canada and from England are here to-day to attend the 20th annual meeting of the American Electro-Therapeutic Association, which began this morning and will conclude Thursday. The Association members are studying the value of electric currents and light in the treatment and cure of disease, and the convention sessions will include papers on these subjects by eminent students. An extended exhibit is shown in conjunction with the gathering.

**Special to Evening Telegram.**  
**PORTLAND, Me., Sept. 13.**  
Complete returns to-night for Senators and Representatives in the State Election yesterday gave the Democrats substantial majorities in both branches of the Maine Legislature, which with beginning of the new year will elect a United States Senator to succeed Eugene Hale, a Secretary of State, Treasurer, Attorney General and a Commissioner of Agriculture. The new legislative body also will have to restrict the State which is considered highly important politically, and undoubtedly will be called upon to carry out the declarations of their party platforms of recent years to re-submit to the people the liquor prohibitory law and the repeal of the Sturgis Liquor Law Enforcement Act. Colonel Fred Plaisted who was elected Governor by a 700 plurality over Governor Fernald, will have many important nominations of State officials to make at the Legislature of 1911, according to complete returns to-night.

**Special Evening Telegram.**  
**GENEVA, Switz., Sept. 14.**  
The annual meeting of the permanent committee of the Young Egypt Party, the aim of which is autonomy, opened to-day and afforded an opportunity of which several Egyptians availed themselves to attack former President Roosevelt because of his speeches at Khartoum, and London. Among the epithets applied to Roosevelt were: "vulgar bluster" and "self advertiser." The committee sent a telegram to London demanding the immediate evacuation of Egypt by the British Government. A message was also sent to the Khedive of Egypt asking for the re-establishment of the Egyptian Constitution.

**Special to the Evening Telegram.**  
**BOSTON, Sept. 13.**  
Lucius Tuttle to-day resigned the Presidency of the Boston and Maine Railroad. Chas. S. Mellen, President of the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad, to-night is acting President of the Boston and Maine, with all the powers of President. The retirement from office of the man who for 17 years has been at the head of the railway system of Northern New England became a fact at the regular monthly meeting of the Board of Directors of the Boston and Maine Railroad, held at North Station, in this city to-day. Mr. Tuttle retires because of ill-health, and also because he believes that the New Haven Company should assume the direct responsibility of the administration of the Boston and Maine. He was granted leave of absence for the remainder of the term. Ever since the New Haven Company obtained control of the Boston and Maine system there has been general expectation that President Tuttle would retire at an early date. At the last annual meeting of the Co. Mr. Tuttle announced that he believed that the time had arrived for the New Haven Company to take the active direction of the Boston and Maine, but in compliance with request of the New Haven Board of Directors he consented to remain President for another year. Frequent reports of his resignation since that time have been emphatically denied, and his retirement to-day came as a surprise to the community.

### Latest by Cable.

**Special Evening Telegram.**  
BEVERLY, Mass., Sept. 14.  
Negotiations for a Reciprocity Treaty between the United States and Canada will be opened next month. It is learned in Beverly today that the British Ambassador, Mr. Bryce, has consented to the negotiations being carried on directly with Canada and the United States, without the formality of being conducted through the British Ambassador. The details of the negotiations have not been arranged as yet, but it is the hope of President Taft that before the end of October representatives of both countries will be able to come together. Whether the United States will send delegates to Canada, or Canada its representatives to Washington, is not yet known. Neither is it known whether any agreement that may be reached will be made effective by concurrent legislation or by treaty. The Reciprocity idea will meet with considerable opposition in both countries, but it is believed that the Canadian opposition is more pronounced than that in the United States, chiefly because of the growth of Canadian manufacturing enterprises. The Canadian Premier, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, has declared in favor of proposed agreement, and it is felt here that negotiations will be

carried through to a satisfactory conclusion. The President, it is known, is deeply interested in the matter and considers it of the greatest importance.

**OTTAWA, Sept. 14.**  
Sir Wilfrid Laurier, after over 12 months of practically incessant stress of daily attention to his multifarious duties as leader of the Government, will on Saturday next join Lady Laurier at his old home in Arthursville, for a brief holiday of 3 or 4 days, preparatory to again taking the tiller of the ship of State for another session of Parliament.

**WINNIPEG, Sept. 14.**  
The Countess of Antrim who passed through here two days ago, on her way to the coast, was robbed of jewelry valued at many thousands of dollars, and priceless from the fact that they are partly family heirlooms at the Royal Alexandra on Saturday night. She left for the coast the following evening, where she will visit her son, who is in business in British Columbia.

### Naval Men Encamped.

A number of the men of H. M. S. Brilliant with several officers have been encamped for several days and nights past at Angle's Hill. They have rifle practice daily at the old range there and some good shooting has been recorded. The place has the appearance of a regular military encampment and at night the hill presents a strange spectacle to the people living nearby, with the tents illuminated till a certain hour when all have retired and then darkness reigns supreme. After that is only heard the faint tramp of the men detailed for sentry duty.

### Gloucester Banker From the Grand Banks

The Gloucester banker John and Mand, Capt. M. Smith, arrived here Tuesday night from the Grand Banks after a four weeks' trip, during which time he has been "banded" with squid bait and got 100,000 fish, or equal to 500 qts. She fished 25 miles S. E. of the Virgin and this is all the fish the vessel has, she being only out from the home port since July 17th. All the crew of 18, including the captain, with the exception of four Nova Scotians, are Newfoundlanders, being natives of Placentia and the Southern Shore, who have resided in Gloucester for several years. One of the men, Lieut. Lawrence, a cousin of Capt. E. Lawlor of St. John's. The vessel gets water here and supplies from Job Bros. and will again go to the banks, she carries 800 lbs.

### Fire Last Night.

Last evening about 7.35 a fire began at the residence of Mr. George Hayward Cochrane Street. When the firemen arrived the upper portion of the house was enveloped in flames, and sheets of fire shot up through the roof. On arrival the men quickly had cut three lengths of hose, and took as many streams of water from the hydrants at the head of Cochrane Street and Bond Street, while at the start the chemical engine was used to advantage. The firemen worked with a will and prevented the fire encroaching on the residence of Mr. Thomas Kennedy, adjoining Mr. Hayward's. After a hard fight of fully half an hour the firemen had the blaze under control, but not before the upper portion of the house was completely gutted and the furniture in it destroyed. The loss incurred by the blaze will total several hundreds of dollars. How the fire occurred is not definitely known, though it is thought that children playing with matches in the upper rooms caused the blast. Master Lauce Hayward who went up stairs while the rest of the family were seated in the dining room, discovered a lot of clothing on fire, and gave the alarm to his parents, while a sudden passing and seeing smoke issuing from the house, rang in the alarm.

### Portugal Cove Fishery.

This is the third week of a big "spurt" of fishing at Portugal Cove, and still there are no signs of diminution in the quantity of the cod which—abundant on the fishing grounds there. The men are using trawls, and getting all the squid they require in the Cove, they secure from 4 to 8 qts. daily. John Harding who was the first, after the trap voyage was over, to take advantage of the squid has now 60 qts. in salt, and the others range from 30 to 40 qts. Harding will run up 100 qts. if the fish remains for the next couple of weeks. Cod are also very plentiful around Bell Island, and the only two men catching it there—Messrs. Bennett and Dwyer—get from 2 to 4 qts. daily. The Cove men are in with loaded boats by dinner time each day, and they say they never saw fish so plentiful on the ground at this season of the year, or of so large a run.

### Whiteley's Crew Arrive Home

The schr. Louise, Capt. George Whiteley, arrived here yesterday forenoon from Bonne Esperance in the straits of Belle Isle with his crew of 25 men. Speaking to Mr. Whiteley he informed the Telegram representative that this season could hardly be called an average one in the Straits and that they only secured a little over 2,000 qts. for 13 traps. The vessel left there last Thursday and had fine weather on the run to port. Fish was very scarce all the summer and even while the trap season was on, most of the fish were taken with hook and line. The season opened so early that all thought good work would be done, and they are disappointed over the result. Before they left fish was very plentiful on the grounds but there was no bait to catch it with. If there was, the permanent residents of the place would do well, good deal of the last fish caught by Mr. Whiteley and others was taken on clams which they used as bait. Formerly lance would be plentiful and on this good fishing could be done, but this year there was no sign of this bait and all lost a good spurt of fishing. The schr. My Liver, Patridge master, sailed for Liverpool on the 22nd of August.

Fortunately heavy rain prevailed that night and quenched the flames. But for this both harbours might have been wiped out.

**Special to Evening Telegram.**  
BOSTON, Sept. 13.  
Claude Graham White, of England, flying a Farman Biplane and a Blériot monoplane, proved himself the champion of the first annual Harvard-Boston Aero Meet at the close of 9 days' competitive event-to-night, having won the blue ribbon sweep of the meet. The Boston Globe prize of \$10,000 for a harbor trip to Boston light, taking altogether four first and three second, winning \$22,100 in prize money, one world's record, that of accurately landing on skids, and two American records. Duration and distance were broken, while Mr. White in his Boston Light trip covered 33 miles in 34 mins. 1-5 seconds. The regular competitions for prizes ended to-night, but the management will continue the exhibition two days, offering prizes for new world's records.

**Special Evening Telegram.**  
LONDON, Ind., Sept. 14.  
Scores of miners entombed, with a heavy roll of dead and wounded, is the result of an explosion which occurred at Vandalia Mine, No. 1, 10 miles from here at 9 o'clock this morning. The dead are variously estimated at from 1 to 20, and it has been impossible thus far to penetrate the entry where the explosion occurred or to do anything toward the relief or rescue of the imprisoned men. A miner named Baxter is definitely reported killed, but this is the only name given thus far. Relief parties have gone out from here, and all doctors in town were rushed to the scene of the disaster at once. A few of the men were between the air shaft and the explosion and managed to make their way to freedom, although several of them were fearfully burned.

**Special to the Evening Telegram.**  
BADEN, BADEN, Sept. 14.  
If anything could discourage that intrepid apostle of aerostatics, Count Zeppelin, it would appear to have been furnished to-day when the Zeppelin Sixth, the latest model of his aerial invention, was torn by the explosion of one of the three motors which located in the stern gondola. Three of the airship's crew were seriously injured. The accident occurred without warning, as the dirigible was being slowly worked into her shed here. The defective motor had been

operating as usual, when suddenly the crew were hurled from their seats in the rear gondola as the craft tumbled and lurched. There was a sharp report, a flash of flame, and in a moment the immense fabric of silk canvas was a fire. The crew hardly realizing what had happened, tumbled over the sides of the airship, barely escaping with their lives. The fire spread so rapidly that the shed was soon destroyed. This is the fifth serious accident which has befallen the Zeppelin dirigibles, the histories of which have been brilliant but brief, and usually ending in disaster. The Zeppelin Sixth was under charter of the Passenger Airship Co., having replaced the passenger service the recently wrecked Deutschland.

Many distinctions were also obtained in the Grade, in Art Subjects, English, Arithmetic, Shorthand, second place in Island for Practical Music being obtained by Miss Nellie Jackman, and the prize for School Management by Miss B. O'Connor. A very remarkable feature was the exceptional success achieved in Plain Needlework in this Grade by Littledale, as every one of their pupils (11) obtained distinction. People who arrived recently from Labrador say that Messrs. Rendell and Phillips have a good thing in the coal property which they discovered about 20 miles inland from Forteau, Labrador. Those who were there in a Canadian steamer, believing that the property was on Dominion territory, now concede that it is not, and the people aver that it is the best of anthracite and that there is a big deposit of the fuel on the claim. The owners will proceed there shortly to have a thorough survey made. They have interested wealthy American capitalists in the mine, and hope to have the work of development begin early next season.

### Quidi Vidi Copper.

Work on the copper deposits at Quidi Vidi is progressing quietly but satisfactorily and several men are engaged there the whole time taking out ore. Three shafts have been sunk and a good deal of mineral has been taken out. A large number of bags containing 1 cwt. each of the copper ore are now on the wharf of E. H. & G. Davy awaiting shipment. A boring machine will shortly be put in use to further test the property, the owners of which believe they have in hand a good mining proposition.

### CRICKETANIA.

Yesterday's Interesting Match Draws Thousands of Spectators.

That cricket is again becoming popular with our citizens was well evinced yesterday when a concourse of people assembled on St. George's Field to witness the match between the Shamrock and City teams. It was estimated in the afternoon that fully 2,500 people were present, and the match, which was held for the benefit of the fund for repairs to St. Patrick's Church, was under the patronage of His Excellency the Governor, who was present with his suite, while several clergymen were there, including Rt. Rev. Mons. Roche and Revs. J. McDermott and J. Pippy. Summer weather prevailed and the crease was in good condition. The first ball was delivered at 11 a.m. with the City team at the wicket. They gave their usual excellent exhibition of cricket to the bowling of Larkin, Linegar, Donnelly and Savage, and before retiring had to their credit 155 runs, including 4 extras. Of this J. S. Munn contributed a brilliantly played 31 (not out); H. Rendell, 26, and W. H. Peters, 32; while six of the team made double figures in the innings. The Shamrocks were dismissed for the comparatively small score of 79. The City in their second innings ran up 235 for 9 wickets and with K. Trenchard to bat. Of this R. Goodridge batted a splendid 83; W. H. Peters, 48, and Capt. Woolcombe, 30. Darkness precluded the possibility of further play, and the total of the City team, adding their plurality of 76 from the first innings, was 311. At 1.30 p.m. the players were entertained by the Ladies' Association of St. Patrick's in a tent specially set up for the purpose. Miss M. Geary had charge of the arrangements and an excellent luncheon was served. Miss Geary was assisted by Mesdames Jardine, Nickerson and McGuire, and Misses Raftus, Cowan, Duggan, Colford, Ellis, Flynn and Coady. A cordial vote of thanks was proposed by Mr. P. Myler and seconded by Mr. P. Berrigan to Miss Geary and her aids. Mr. J. S. Munn in a neat speech complimented the people on the efforts they were making to repair their church and wished them full success in the undertaking. Altogether the match was thoroughly enjoyed by all present. The umpires were Messrs. P. Myler and Gregory Flynn.

### The St. Mary's Fishery

Good work is yet being done by the people of St. Mary's Bay. Cod is plentiful at Cape St. Mary's, Cape Pine and Western Head and the boats which make fortnightly trips get from 40 to 80 tubs each, the tubs averaging 1 1/4 qts. Bernard Nowlan of Pat. Power's boat has 600 qts. landed to date, and Michael and Wm. McDonald 700 each. The latter will likely go to the 900 qt. mark before the fishery closes. The other boats run from 300 to 600 qts. each. At Branch squid is plentiful and skiffs get 7 and 8 qts. daily. At Salmonier, Haricot, the Tickle and Mussel Pond they are doing poorly, and very little was done at these places during the summer. One Halifax firm is buying fish all around the bay and is offering \$5 for small and \$6 for large merchantable and \$5.70 for talqual. Several St. John's agents are also offering similar figures. Some 1,400 qts. was made in one shipment sent to Halifax a couple of weeks ago, and this is the first time that fish has been sent direct there from St. Mary's. The agent there for the Halifax firm alluded to has been instructed to buy up 14,000 qts.

### 50,000 Qtls. Fish Landed at Grand Bank.

People who came down on the Glen-coe and arrived by Tuesday night's train say that up to date the bankers have landed at Grand Bank fully 50,000 qts. of codfish. This is greatly in excess of the amount taken to date last year. All of the fleet of bankers except four arrived there last week with good fares. There is plenty of squid at Grand Bank and the men hope to use it to advantage on their next trip.
