HOUSE of ASSEMBLY

Yesterday's Sitting.

Several petitions were presented. The Bills introduced by Mr. Kent to amend the Acts to incorporate the R. C. Bishops of St. John's, Harbour Grace and Vicar Apostolic of St. George's were read a first time.

Ways and Means were deferred until to-day.

The House having gone into Committee on the Bill to Encourage Shipbuilding, Mr. Moulton criticized some of its provisions relative to the bounties.

Mr. Kent held that Mr. Moulton had pointed out with clearness the defects in it and he thought with him that the difference of a ton, more or less, was not much. Such a small margin should not be an impediment to securing the bounty when a man had made a bona fide effort and complied with the regulations for building.

Another difficulty was that small vessels built in outports in a manner which would qualify for the bounty do not get it owing to the cost of bringing them to St. John's which would be more in most cases than the bounty itself would be worth.

Mr. Picolet in answer to Mr. Kent's question on the matter explained the procedure of the builder to secure a survey.

The Bill then went through Committee. The House went into Committee on the Bill to amend the law relating to Merchant Shipping. The Bill deals with collisions between vessels and salvage and liability would be fixed in proportion to the degree in which each vessel was at fault.

The Bill went through Committee when the Bill to amend the Game and Inland Fisheries Board Act was read a second time. It had reference principally to the protection of foxes. It imposes a maximum penalty of \$1,000 for exporting them. The Bill goes into Committee to-day.

The Bill entitling the following to pensions was read a third time and goes to the Committee to-day.

Mrs. John Carnell, late Keeper of Oil Store, one hundred dollars.
The Bell Island Tramway and Plantation Water Co. Bills were read a second time, when the House went into Committee re the improved Sydney

Port aux Basques and Labrador Steamship Services.

The Premier explained that his had relation to the steamers Bruce and Lintrose plying between Sydney-Port-aux-Basques in connection with the daily train service and the two steamers for the Labrador route. Instead of calling for tenders for these contracts he asserted that the Government were satisfied that they could not do better as regarded price and class of ship. He gave statistics as to the growth of the coastal trade since the days of the Plover and Curlew and the great improvement in the class of ships now running as compared with those plying formerly on our bays and coasts. They were seeking for power to make a contract. On the Bruce and the building of the new Bruce, Lintrose and the new Labrador boat the Reid Co. had expended \$1,000,000.

Mr. Kent was sorry that the Premier could not furnish the House with the terms of the proposed contract, and he thought that the matter had been under discussion and that there was ample opportunity and time to have arranged every contract that might be made between the Company and the Government. The Government should, before now, have been in a position to place before the House the contract upon which it was proposed to operate the service on Labrador and they should see to it in connection with the Port aux Basques service that the railway system would be operated to the satisfaction of the public. He had already referred during the session to the absence of any information regarding the whole system of the contractor. Last year, for a period, traffic was tied up through congestion. There were two reasons, one on the route and the other on the steamers on the route and the congestion must have arisen from some other source than want of steamship accommodation. His own impression was that the line between St. John's and Port aux Basques had not sufficient accommodation to handle the traffic of a daily service, and the contractor when this service was inaugurated, should have been compelled to provide sufficient accommodation to meet the requirements of the public. He otherwise the same dissatisfaction with the daily service which we had last year, would again be in evidence. He hoped the inauguration of the Labrador new service would be an overhauling to which he had alluded recently.

Mr. OHT was pleased to note that an additional steamer was being built at Notre Dame Bay, and that contemplated ports of call would be submitted to the sitting members for the District. He thanked the Premier for this courtesy. He was also pleased to know that the additional service extended to Labrador, which heretofore was anything but satisfactory. He praised the Bruce and Lintrose, and declared the accommodation and equipment to be found in them were excellent and believed the public should assist to make these services all they ought to be. He trusted that the advent of the new service would be fraught with much improvement to the freight and passenger traffic of the Colony.

Mr. Kent here alluded to the difficulty encountered in settling disputes between the public and contractor. Some other method should be found besides arbitration. It was very difficult to handle complaints made regarding the service under the existing procedure. Some permanent Board of authority should have charge of these matters instead of a tribunal of arbitration. That was altogether too cumbersome. In matters of small complaints which frequently occur and which in the aggregate were large, some other tribunal should be provided either that or let them go to the Courts. Regarding complaints re freights, people had the law as a remedy, but he was referring to present procedure by arbitration which was unsatisfactory. Complaints about freight had arisen from time to time as regards the handling of the contract in the provisions of the contract in the handling of these freights was very incomplete. Some amendments must be made as regarded liability as to carriage, particularly in the case of boats subsidized by the Government. Some law covering the duties of liability of common carriers should be introduced which would give a greater satisfaction to those sending freight from place to place in the Colony. He thought the Government in entering into the present contract should bear in mind the matter of the applicability of the present system regarding questions of dispute or any other matter that might arise between the Government or contractor, as to the manner in which the service was carried on. In making the contract the Government should devise some other means besides the present way of dealing with complaints regarding the service.

The Premier contended that in all cases of arbitration the Colony had two arbitrators, against the contract of one, and if he were a party to a dispute he would certainly prefer such an arrangement. The Colony had never yet lost an arbitration except when our own arbitrator signed the award against her. He traced the history of the more famous local arbitrations. The Reids had special rights and in disputes they had the common law and statute rights of the Colony.

Mr. OHT—The point he referred to was the procedure itself, which was provided for by the contract was cumbersome, unwieldy and unsatisfactory in the settlement of disputes. He would not discuss the merits of former arbitrations but he would affirm that a tribunal to which any disputes were referred arising in connection with the operation of the contract was troublesome and slow, and there should be an impartial tribunal like our Supreme Court, in which all have confidence, and there would be no satisfaction until some such tribunal was instituted.

A Bill giving effect to the Resolutions, was read a first time. The Premier introduced the Resolutions dealing with the Newfoundland Co., for the manufacture of glue, etc., from fish offal and dog fish. They got the monopoly for five years on this, had already built one and must build four other factories, they

will get in certain machinery, etc. duty free, and the Government has to give them the dog fish nuisance to the satisfaction of the fishermen.

Mr. OHT thought this would be a good way, if successful, to dispose of the dog fish nuisance and thought it would be a good thing for the fisheries. Mr. Moulton also praised the idea, after which the House adjourned.

OBITUARY.

MRS. J. E. P. PETERS.

After a protracted illness the death occurred yesterday of Mrs. Peters, wife of J. E. P. Peters, Commission Merchant of this city. Only on New Year's Day past did Mr. and Mrs. Peters celebrate their golden wedding with their numerous family about them. Several of the came and reached her 74th year. During her long life she ardently identified herself with philanthropic works and was an earnest promulgator of temperance, being associated with the late Lady Thurburn in the W. C. T. U. and the Poor Asylum Mission, of which she was President. She was kindly and charitable and by exhortation as well as example led many stragglers into virtuous paths. Mrs. Peters was a good woman in every sense of the word, and many a family in St. John's whom she encouraged in their hours of trouble and affliction will regret her passing and cherish her memory. She has gone but her good works will live after her. A husband, her father for over fifty years, seven sons—Rev. J. E. Peters, M.A., Dr. Charles, Alfred, Joseph, Arthur, William and George, and one daughter, Mrs. Byth of Brooklyn, N.Y., survive. General and sincere sympathy will be extended to the bereaved family, in which the *Telegram* joins.

JOHN MATHIESON.

The death occurred on March 23, of John Douglas Mathieson, aged 54 years, of 1445 Ellicott Street, east. The widow and three children are left to mourn a loss. The funeral will be held at the residence of the deceased, 1206-10 First Street East, on Wednesday afternoon at 2.30. Funeral services conducted by Rev. Mr. Esau. Interment takes place in Union cemetery. — Calgary paper.

There passed away on Easter Sunday at Calgary, Mr. John Mathieson, aged 60 years. Thirty-five years ago he came to St. John's to the firm of Ayre and Marshall, where he remained until five years ago, when he started business for himself as a commission merchant. 



Notes and Comments.

Yesterday we protested strongly against the conduct of Ministers of the Crown who were flouting the representatives of the people in either delaying answers to many questions asked in the House of Assembly or ignoring them altogether.

The Morris Ministers seem to think they have been appointed to their office to do just what they like and that they are answerable to nobody. They betray the objectionable features of bureaucratic rule. They seem to forget that they are answerable to parliament for all their doings and that a representative of the people has a right to get information of their doings and the doings of their departments.

If any further proof of the Premier's liking for autocratic rule and the spirit of bureaucracy which is moving his Ministers were needed, it is to be found in the Resolutions which were submitted to the Assembly in regard to provisions for an additional mail service for the Labrador and one also for the Cabot Straits.

Instead of submitting a contract which had met with the assent of the Government and contractors for these services, the Government ask for an authority to complete a contract without submitting its terms.

We submit the proof of our statement. Here are the resolutions:—"BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council to enter into an Agreement with the Reid Newfoundland Company that the said Company shall, instead of one steamer on each of the

Cable News.

LINCOLN, To-day.
Zeppelin IV, which is the latest and largest model, carried ten passengers, of whom four were officers. The captain explained to General Lesco, that the Zeppelin was undergoing a test, prior to being taken over by the War Department. He and other officers had been assigned that task. They left Friederichshafen in the early morning bound for the Grand Duchy of Baden, with the intention of making a trial. They had mounted to a height of 3,000 metres (about 9,750 feet), and had lost their course in the clouds. As they were short of gasoline they decided to land. They did not know they had crossed the French frontier. The chief officers and engineers of the corps removed the engine, so that the airship could not get underway, and the car-biners searched for photographic apparatus or similar articles. Nothing of that nature, however, was found. The German officers were permitted to telephone Friederichshafen for a supply of hydrogen and for mechanics. Some spectators who witnessed the landing of the Zeppelin say she had a German flag flying, but when near the ground it was hastily hauled down, torn to pieces and thrown away apparently with the idea of avoiding an unpleasant incident. After the German officers had answered the questions of General Lesco and been searched, they were taken in the Mayor's auto to an hotel. Military engineers made an examination of the airship. They found she had been

slightly damaged, partially deflated. It will therefore be impossible to move the airship until hydrogen is brought from Friederichshafen, and repairs made. No instructions have yet been received from the Minister of War regarding the disposition of the airship. Meanwhile it is solidly moored to iron stands and watched by soldiers.

The Singers at Rossley's Theatre

The Song Bird of the West, as she was named while in California, Miss Juliette Talbot was born in Italy and educated in France. She sings equally well in Italian or French. Evans Honey Boy Minstrels, Haviland's Minstrels, and many others. His black face acts as a source of delight, as that is where he shines. He intends putting on short sketches, and playlets when Mr. Rossley returns. Miss Talbot changes her costumes with every act and she is noted for her superb wardrobe. Jack Rossley, the genial proprietor of the Star, was fortunate in securing these fine artists.

Enthusiastic Demonstration

According to messages before us, the F.P.U. at Comfort Cove and Scissors Cove had enthusiastic demonstrations, at Comfort on Wednesday, and at Scissors Cove last night. At both places great meetings were held, and Mr. Cooker, the President, delivered eloquent speeches, which elicited the approval of his audience. Arches were erected, mottoes displayed and hunting shown at the places he visited.

37,882 Seals.

The S. S. Stephano finished unloading her seals to-day. Her turn out was—35,812 young harps; 1,874 young hoods; 175 old harps and 21 old hoods. Total 37,882; gross value 62,757.09. Her crew of 270 shared \$85.56. Capt. A. Keen's share comes to \$2,500.00 roughly; not a bad fortnight's work.

Tor's Cove Wants Cashin to Keep Promises.

Editor Evening Telegram.
Dear Sir,—As petitions for money to carry out marine works, seem to be the order of the day, could I trouble you for space for a few remarks.
The late Government, through Mr. Ellis and Cashin, started a breakwater between the main land and an island some four hundred feet distant. A small sum was expended and three blocks of wharves were built. We were assured that this work would be completed. Many were of the opinion that no structure not built of concrete could stop this passage as it is open to the ocean, and the sea there is terrific, especially with heavy northeast gales. We have been long hoping to get this place stopped, as our hardships are great in the fall of the year, loss of fish, as it makes anchorage unsafe, but if it was stopped it would make a cozy harbor for small craft in the rough season.

When the present Government was elected and Mr. Cashin returned for the Southern Shore, many of us thought he would complete that breakwater. He was asked if he would do anything, as we saw that it would be a difficult matter as the wharves though unfinished and unsupported, had stood the severest tests. He advised that a petition be got up and that he would do all he could. The petition was signed by every man from here to LaManche, and presented to the House by Mr. Cashin. Ten men were appointed to look after the matter and some correspondence followed. The result, however, was nothing. Not was anything else done beyond some small grants for roads given to a special fund.

We want the breakwater badly, and think we have been greatly neglected that it is not done. The Government is being reminded of heavy overdrains on marine account as well as others, but none of that money came this way. We are paying revenue as well as the rest of the people, and as we have to get it out of the water, like most of them, we want our share of the public money.
Some are for getting up another petition, and some against, as they say a petition was sent and Mr. Cashin promised to do all in his power. It is up to him to keep that promise. He knows how badly we need this breakwater, and should in justice attend to the matter. We are a small number, only about five or six hundred, but we have votes, and fairly good memories.
We hope Mr. Cashin and his partner will keep this in mind, and before the spring advances send us along some money for that breakwater. People about get a lot of sticks on speculation, and these could be secured. There will be no excuse if the matter is let drop. Come, Mr. Cashin, let us see you have some interest in us. You know, promises don't count for much, but they tell against a man's honor when they are not kept.

To Celebrate Empire Day (May 24).

Delegates from the following societies met last night in the British Hall on the invitation of the British Society to celebrate Empire Day this year: B. I. S., C. E. T. S., S. O. E., S. U. F., Onward Lodge Good Templars, Knights of Columbus, Leeming and Royal Oak Lodges, L.O.A., Star of the Sea, I. O. O. F., Mechanics, George Boyd Lodge, I.O.G.T., and British Society. Communications were received from the P. A. & B. and Masonic bodies. Mr. W. H. Goodland, President of the British Society, took the chair as convener, and Mr. W. J. Higgins, Secretary of the B. I. S., was appointed secretary of the meeting. The Chairman explained that the British Society at a recent meeting had determined to try and secure the co-operation of sister societies in making the day a general holiday. At present the day was only observed as a Government and Bank holiday, but was not kept as a general holiday by the mercantile people until the following month. It was felt that the day set apart by statute as Empire Day in honor of the late Victoria the Good should be fittingly celebrated. Mr. E. M. Jackman, President of the Star of the Sea, endorsed the remarks of the previous speaker and expressed his approval of the British Society's attitude. Mr. J. L. Slattery, of the B. I. S., and Mr. J. P. Scott, of the Mechanics Society, spoke in a similar strain. It was moved by Mr. Slattery and seconded by Mr. Scott that a communication be prepared by Messrs. The Golden Key.

The older I grow, the more deeply I realize that no experience of life is without its value. Even sickness, pain, needless mistakes and cruel disappointments, torturing anxiety and the bitterest losses, leave us richer in some ways than they found us.

For every human experience through which we pass gives us thousands upon thousands of brothers and sisters of the soul.

The woman who loses a child, by that loss finds a million sisters in the other Rachels who are weeping for their children and will not be comforted.

Of course the realization of our new brotherhood does not come at once. When we are experiencing suffering of any kind most of us are passionate individualists who cannot think of any heart but our own.

It is only after the pain has passed and only in retrospect instead of being engulfed by it, that we are able to realize that our experience has brought us closer to some of our fellow men.

Of course there are some people who do not realize this even then, but I hope they are not very many. For I think they are the saddest failures in all the world. They prick their hearts on the thorns of and will not pluck its roses. And the wisest and most blessed of folks in all the world are those who

can find in every experience a golden key to sympathy and understanding.

A young girl, who undoubtedly belongs to this latter class was telling me the other day of the suffering she endured while waiting for a most important letter which was unaccountably tardy.

Did you ever wait for a letter? If you have you know that there are few more miserable experiences than the sickening suspense of such waiting. Well has the proverb maker said, "I hope deferred maketh the heart sick." I do not mean to be irrelevant, but it certainly seems as if he must have been waiting for a letter that did not come. It is like fighting ghosts. You are wild for action, but there is nothing that can be done, and so you must only stand and wait. At first you look forward eagerly to the postman's visits, but by and by you almost dread them, because you fear the miserable disappointment that you will probably receive.

This is the crucible through which my friend passed. And this is what she said about it. "I wouldn't live through that week again for a thousand dollars; but I've learned one thing, and that is to sympathize with people who have anything like that to bear. Do you know, last summer I actually used to laugh at one of my girl friends when she was anxious because her fiancé did not write? It makes me shudder to think I could have been so cruel. I'll know better the rest of my life."

Thus out of the cruel crucible this girl brought with her a golden key. Have you done likewise?

Caplin Cove, yesterday morning after a long illness. He had reached nearly the allotted span of man's life, and was a fisherman all his days, doing a little farming as well. He leaves no immediate relatives. The deceased was never married and lived by himself for years. Last fall he took rooms at the house of a friend at Bear's Cove, his new house not being completed. On Monday, realizing that the end was near, he requested to be brought home, where he died shortly after arrival.

On Monday night, at about 10 o'clock, an engine passed through here, and many people hurried to the station thinking it was the "regular" coming in "on time." They were disappointed, one being heard to say it was only the 1st of April in advance.

There is a large amount of sickness at present in this town, and as a consequence our doctors are kept pretty constantly on the road. The sickness is mostly among children, and is chiefly whooping cough, mumps, &c.

Again we are compelled to ask what about the hospital? The Government has promised us by the Government. There is at present a nice little sum in the bank since the Guy Celebration waiting to be used for the purpose of an hospital in this town, which would benefit the whole bay, besides relieving the strain on the General Hospital at St. John's. The Government has promised such an institution, and as there is a great need of it, they will certainly fulfil that promise when the matter is placed before them in a substantial manner. They gave us public buildings, guarantee docks, and they surely will give a helping hand for an hospital to relieve suffering and save life. We have heard of cases right here in Harbor Grace that would be operated on were a suitable place provided, but a trip to St. John's was out of the question, consequently death ended the suffering, while an operation would possibly have saved life.

For a long time we heard that the hospital would be built as soon as a suitable site could be secured. This remark is now a thing of the past, as there is no more doubt as to the fact that it is possible to think of us refer to "Bracehead," the property of the late R. S. Munn, Esq. The house is built on an elevation on the north side of Harvey Street, and no doubt has all modern conveniences, while the grounds in front are surrounded by beautiful trees, where the patient convalescing can walk of it in their shade.

Why stand on a few hundred dollars when such a place is offered for sale. It is a chance of a lifetime, and the supporters of the present Government should bestir themselves at once and urge the People's Party to use no time in securing this hour for Harbor Grace; not Harbor Grace alone, but the whole bay. Call it what you will, a Guy Hospital or a St. John's Hospital, but secure the place at once. We have no axe to grind nor have we been asked to refer to the matter. It is the need of the hour, and the offering of "Bracehead" is a sale that prompts us to say so much on this subject at present.

The Mission at Conception

His Lordship Bishop March arrived here on the 27th inst., and the next day assisted by Rt. Rev. Missioner Veitch and Fr. McAndlish, he administered the Sacrament of Confirmation to 270 children, 4 men and 1 woman.

His Lordship preached a very touching sermon to the parents and children, after which he paid a glowing tribute to the good work of the Mission Fathers and hoped that their labors will be productive of the choicest blessings for the people.

Yesterday afternoon the closing exercises of the mission for the men took place at 3 o'clock. Fr. Holland recited the Rosary and then in his usual impressive language preached a sermon on the sins of impurity and drunkenness. He dwelt at considerable length on the sin of impurity, which was the worst of all sins in the sight of God. In referring to its heinousness the preacher pointed out its effects upon the soul hereafter, namely, remorse and hell for all eternity. In dealing with drunkenness, Father Holland cited instances of the dangerous habit, and how a drunkard is known. Take the child in the street half clothed and not at school, and you will find out, said the preacher, that his father was a drunkard. Some will boast that they can take a glass of liquor and then leave it off, but the hundreds in the Lunatic Asylums, the hundreds in the penitentiaries and worst than all the millions burning in hell to-day, at one time said the same. Speaking of drink from every standpoint it ruins the health, makes homes miserable and drives a person to a premature eternity.

In conclusion the preacher impressed it upon the moderate as well as upon the habitual drinker to cease taking liquor and become total abstainers. So eloquent and forcible was the rev. preacher's exhortation,

and so clearly did he portray the wretchedness and misery attributable to that vile demon, drink, that over four hundred solemnly promised at the altar rail to abstain for at least one year from intoxicating drink.

Fr. Holland then cordially thanked our Rt. Rev. Pastor for his kindness and help to the Fathers. He, in his turn, spoke of the splendid work done during the past week by the Fathers and on behalf of the men present offered his heartfelt thanks.

The triple blessing of the Mission was then imparted; the blessing of the Fathers, that of His Holiness the Pope and the Blessed Sacrament. The scene was a very solemn one, and few of those who were present will hurriedly forget it.

"I may also mention that the church presented a beautiful spectacle on this occasion. The Altar of the Blessed Virgin was beautifully decorated and lit with candles, while flowers were in great profusion. A collection, a feeble tribute of appreciation, was then taken up, and the amount was \$276.—Com.

Our Educational System.

Special Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir:—I have just finished reading a vigorous letter in this morning's Daily News, signed "Catholicus," on our present Educational System. It is a caustic reply to that "Sapient purveyer, or cheap jokes," the Editor of the Trade Review, who whenever he ventures the arena to discuss any matter of serious import usually puts himself on record as "uttering the veriest buncombe."

A certain Memorial was recently presented to the Morris Government asking for an increase of twelve cents per capita, in the Educational Grant. The amount to be expended for the following purposes: viz., Teachers' salaries, training of Teachers, industrial training, School Buildings, investigation of attendance, medical inspection, and travelling expenses of Inspectors. We are in entire accord with "Catholicus," until he starts to deal with the question of compulsory education, and while perhaps the enforcement of a general law such as he has in mind, would be impossible under existing circumstances, "draconic procedure" in certain well-defined cases would appear to be absolutely necessary, if the child is to be given fair play in the matter of education. "Catholicus" is as well informed by reason of his office as any educated gentleman in this Colony, that there are some hundreds of children to-day in extern places the cruel victims of our slipshod educational methods. Are we to understand that no workable plan can be devised whereby the indigent parent, at the prime of life, who hustles a ten-year-old boy out of bed before daylight on a winter's morning to go in the woods, for "a load of starrigans" cannot be compelled to send that child to school? As I

understand compulsory education (locally applied), it is primarily intended to reach the Pater Familias, who bugs the bogey of the bunk and allows, aye compels in many cases, the child that God has lent him to grow up in ignorance and in crime. So much then for the principle of compulsory education. Surely this question of attendance can be approached by our most ardent advocates from both sides of the question, and dealt with on its merits. Again, Free Education as applied to this country under our present system, simply means—No School Fees. Here again, "Catholicus," who knows the scant limits of a fisherman's purse, must, I think, agree with me. On the ground of political expediency past Governments and especially the present combination have glossed over or the questions germane to a practical solution of our educational difficulties, only to use them as a bug-a-boo about the time of a general election. Every sensible man who regards the rights of the child to some education as a sacred duty, be his religion what it may, should get right after every hoaxer who attempts to bamboozle him on this Free and Compulsory Education business. We know already of certain well-known political parasites, who, to save their political necks and hang on to the spoils of office, are trying to stir up a feeling on this question of education. Such characters ought to be shut out from the pale of human society. On the basic principle of Denominational Education, there is and will be absolutely no issue for the electorate to decide at the coming election. But all are agreed that a thorough revision of the undigested mass of legislative enactments re education, which appear on our statute books at present, should be undertaken without delay—the whole subject matter of our educational methods requires probing to the bottom by a competent tribunal by men of such mental

equipment as "Catholicus," and we hope to see the Liberal Party father such an educational law as will secure to every child in the Colony the benefits of such free and practical tuition as will meet the requirements of his or her particular case.

Cable News.

Special to Evening Telegram.
LONDON, April 3.
All second class accommodation on the White Star Canadian service has been booked till May 3rd, and the third class to May 7th, when 12,000 will have gone by this line in 7 months.

TOULON, April 3.
Two French naval officers and three petty officers were swept overboard from the deck of the submarine Turquoise and drowned, while engaged in manoeuvres in the Mediterranean last night. The bodies have been recovered.

LONDON, April 3.
Although there is no direct evidence, suffragettes are credited with an attempt to burn St. James' Free Church, in Hampstead Heath, last night. The organist found the cupboard ablaze, but was quickly extinguished.

NEW YORK, April 3.
The German ship Columbus, carrying a crew of 25 and a cargo of 8,500 barrels of petroleum, is bullet-riddled and missing. The Columbus left Bayonne, New Jersey, on December 20th for Bristol. No news has since been received. She is thought to have foundered during the storm.

LONDON, April 3.
Delegates from France, Germany, United States, China, Russia, Britain and her dominions, met here to-day for a week's session of the International Congress for Historical Study. The Congress is under the patronage of King George, and was presided over by Adolphus W. Ward, Master of Peterhouse, Cambridge, in the unavoidable absence of Ambassador Bryce.

PLYMOUTH, April 3.
Suffragettes made active preparations to welcome Winston Churchill on his arrival here aboard the Admiralty yacht. They painted their greetings in big letters on the Sunston Lighthouse and other points of vantage. One ran, "No security until you give women the vote, no matter how big the navy"; another "To save the State from shipwreck, give the women a vote."

LONDON, April 3.
Justice Lush sentenced Mrs. Pankhurst to 3 years penal servitude to-day, amid cries of "shame" from suffragettes who crowded the court. The jury added a recommendation to their verdict of guilty. Pankhurst declared that she would start a hunger strike at once, and come out of her prison dead or a live, at the earliest possible moment. Justice Lush instructed the jury that her speeches were an advisory mission of her guilt. Amongst other statements Mrs. Pankhurst said, "I deliberately broke the law, not hysterically, and not emotionally, but for a set and serious purpose, because I believe it the only way. This movement will go on, whether I live or die."

Billiard Match.

RYAN vs. POWER—CHAMPION DEFEATED.

One of the best billiard exhibitions ever witnessed in the city, took place last night between Messrs. T. F. Ryan, of the T.A. Society, and R. C. Power, of the B.I.S., and resulted in Ryan, who was looked upon as the best billiardist in the city, accepting a defeat from his opponent by 121 points. The game came off at the B.I.S. Club Rooms in the presence of hundreds of onlookers, including representatives of sister societies, and great interest was manifested throughout. The number of points agreed upon was 500. Referee Comerford called the players together. Ryan won the string off and Power broke the balls leaving his opponent a fairly good position. Ryan then went in and made a double figure. Ryan took the lead at the opening but Power gradually crept upon him and reached the hundred mark first. Continuing Power kept his pace and at 200 when the score was announced, Power was still ahead by 7, having made a five break. Ryan then gave a brilliant exhibition and notched up 54, amid applause from his supporters. Power appeared to have greater confidence in himself and made a few successive breaks, which evidently rattled his opponent. The latter also made several double figures but they were not equal to Power's. Towards the finish Power showed up well and won in fine style by 121. The breaks made were:

RYAN'S—17, 17, 10, 10, 54, 18, 16, 15, 20, 21, 28, 23, 12.

POWER'S—13, 13, 12, 13, 34, 55, 27, 13, 29, 16, 16, 20, 32, 12, 35, 26.




