





Is Confederation on the Carpet? (Harbor Grace Standard.)

The subject of the union of Newfoundland with Canada appears to have come suddenly into prominence the past two or three months, even since the eyes of the people have got fairly open through the logic of events to the financial and fiscal straits in which the over-lavish expenditure of the past four or five years has landed us, or at all events threafens to land us.

Gentlemen lately returned from the City say that the matter is being discussed there as if it were a real live issue, many holding that it is the only chance to retrieve our position, rid us of our present embarrassment, and prevent still further plunging and floundering in the bog of extravagance, and taxation, and governmental insolvency.

Indeed some go so far as to asser that the terms that the Canadian Government would offer the Colony to join the Conferenation are known which if true might imply either that our Government had made formally or informally application for terms, a theory that some will regard as given color to by the presence of three of the leading members of the Government in Canada, and the interview of at least one of them with the Canadian Premier, or it might simply mean that the Canadian Government or some enthusiastic advocate of the 'rounding off" of the Dominion for hem' had put out a "feeler." Though we cannot say positively, we are not nclined to think anything so definite has yet been done. The statement of terms is likely a shrewd guess as to what Canada would offer.

Be that as it may the report is, so far as we have heard and recollect, that the terms offered include besides such inevitable ones as assuming our debt, and provision for the Civil service, the grant of \$1,000,000, and the taking over by the Canadian Pacific of our railway, the building a broad gauge system across the country instead of the present narrow one Whether there is any truth in the report or not, we can readily see that Canada would bid pretty high to include in the Confederation the only part of British North America not
