Sting of the Honeybee

About the Most Effective Internal Machine in Existence.

In proportion to its size, the sting of the honeybee is probably the most effective internal machine in existence.

The stinging apparatus is smaller than that of a rattlesnake, yet a single sting has been known to kill a man. When we realize that it is the most invisible and consider what it can do we cannot fail to be astounded. It seems the very quintessence of devilishness.

The honeybee's sting is complicated—so complicated that many words and much ink have been used in discussing its construction and use.

It is generally conceded that the sting consists of a shaft of three parts, the principal one being a sheath within which move two barbed lancets. Like the barbs of a fishhook, the lancets are not easily extracted from the flesh into which they have been driven. The sheath and the lancets combined form a hollow tube through which the poison flows from the poison sac.

Two hairy, soft projections, exceedingly sensitive, in form the bee when she is in contact with a stinging object. Popular Science Monthly.

'Proud to Die', Wrote Tupper's Gallant Son.

New York, October 10.—As an illustration of the lofty sentiments possessed of men who die on the European battlefield in the war for democracy and a remainder for Americans who may be backward in contributing to the second Liberty loan for the same cause, the Liberty loan committee made public this week the last letter written by Captain V. G. Tupper, of the Canadian Scottish 16th Battalion, to his father, Sir Charles Herbert Tupper, before his death at the battle of Vimy Ridge last April. The soldier wrote:

"My dear Father—I am writing one of these 'in case' letters for the third time, and, of course, I hope you will never have to read it. If you are reading it now, you will know that your youngest son 'went under' as proud as Punch on the most glorious day of his life. I am taking my company over the top for a mile in the biggest push that has ever been launched in the world, and I trust that it is going to be the greatest factor towards peace."

Worth While to Die.

"Dad, you can't imagine the wonderful feeling; a man thinks something like this: 'Well, if I'm going to die, this is worth it a thousand times.'"

"I have been over two or three times before, but never with a company of my own. Think of it—a hundred and fifty officers and men who will follow you to hell, if need be."

"I don't want any of you dear people to be sorry for me, although, of course, you will, in a way. You will miss me, but you will be proud of me. Mind you, I know what I am up against, and that the odds are against me. I'm not going in the way I did the first time, just for sheer devilment and curiosity. I have seen this game for two years, and I still like it and feel that my place is here."

"So much for that. I want to thank you from the bottom of my heart for all your loving kindness to me. This war has done wonders to me, and makes me realize lots of things I would not have done otherwise. I could write a book about it, but you know what I mean."

"Good-bye, dear father and mother, and all of you. Again I say that I am proud to be where I am now."

Speed of a Motor Car.

Fast Running, Besides the Danger, Piles up the Cost.

"The driver who persists in operating his motor car at high speed may elude constables and police," says a writer in the Farm and Fireside, "but he cannot escape from the penalties which natural mechanical laws levy upon his car. Here are ten reasons why it is expensive, dangerous and inconsiderate of others to speed:

"Tires last about twice as long on a car that is driven at fifteen miles an hour as upon cars driven at thirty miles an hour. Speeding generates heat, which is an enemy to rubber.

"Driving a car around a sharp corner at twenty-five miles an hour does more damage to the tires than 200 miles of straight road work. Excessive side pressure on tires may pinch the tubes, and it always strains the side walls of the casings.

"High speeds are likely to cause skidding and breakage of springs and steering gear, any of which are dangerous when speeding.

"In proportion to the mileage obtained, high speeds require more gasoline and oil than a moderate rate of traveling.

"Driving a car at excessive speed, especially over rough roads, subjects the bearings to enormous strains.

"High speed may cause crystallization of rapidly moving metal parts that are subject to strain, and these may break at any time without warning.

"High speed interferes with the accuracy of steering, as is shown by the number of reckless drivers who have gone over banks and into ditches, especially on curves.

"It is a strain on the eyes and the nerves of the driver and also of the other passengers in the car."

"Finally it is a menace to the pleasure and safety of others who use the road."

"The majority of modern motor cars develop their maximum efficiency with lowest expense at speeds ranging from fifteen to twenty-five miles an hour, depending on the make of car and condition of the road."

How Charles M. Schwab Spurred Them on to Greater Efforts.

In telling how he increased the efficiency of one of his departments Charles M. Schwab, the famous steel man, says in the American Magazine:

"It was near the end of the day; in a few minutes the night force would come on duty. I turned to a workman who was standing beside one of the red mouthed furnaces and asked him for a piece of chalk."

"How many heats has your shift made to-day?" I queried.

"Six," he replied.

"I chalked a big '6' on the floor and passed along without another word. When the night shift came in they saw the '6' and asked about it."

"The big boss was in here to-day," said the day men. "He asked us how many heats we had made, and we told him six. He chalked it down."

"The next morning I passed through the same mill. I saw that the '6' had been rubbed out and a big '7' written instead. The night shift had announced itself. That night I went back. The '7' had been erased, and a '10' swaggered in its place. The day force recognized no superiors. Thus a fine competition was started, and it went on until this mill, formerly the poorest producer, was turning out more than any other mill in the plant."

A Fuel Experiment.

Utica Press: Several weeks ago an announcement was made in the papers that waste paper could be soaked and then compressed into chunks or bricks and be used as fuel. A Rochester engineer read the directions and determined to beat the coal trust. He prepared a coal hod full of chunks and put them into the kitchen range to dry. Some one closed the door, perhaps not understanding the principles of the generation of steam sufficient to blow the range to pieces and call out the fire department. The cost of the experiment was \$200, which would have purchased several tons of coal. However, in this loss there was gain, for the chunks were thoroughly dried and when placed in another range burned for a full day, giving great heat and leaving only a few charred bits of paper.

New Naval Types.

The flush-deck destroyers now building for the United States Government constitute a new type of war vessel, the advent of which has often been predicted by naval experts. Besides having a speed hitherto thought unattainable in warships, they present a minimum of lifting surface to the enemy. It is unofficially reported that the British Navy now possesses two vessels of the size of battle cruisers, 890 feet long, with a speed of forty land miles an hour, which carry only two seventeen-inch guns, but have many torpedo tubes. In his testimony as to the needs of modern navies before a Congressional committee some time ago, Admiral, then Captain, Sims described a vessel planned by "a young officer named Schofield," and some of his remarks upon this then non-existent marine type are recalled in The Army and Navy Journal.

A 20,000-ton boat with a protective deck and so flat that nothing could get under it, with only two towers, one forward and one aft, carrying no guns but having eight or ten torpedo tubes on each side, this new engine of destruction was to have a speed of at least 35 knots. No waste of side armor, because the vessel would have practically nothing to protect above the water line. Captain Sims declared that if he were in command of a fleet and "one of those things" suddenly came down on him, he would feel impelled to turn the feet over to the second in command and go below. Of course, Admiral Sims would do nothing of the kind, he would stick to the command of his big dreadnoughts and do his best. But if such cruisers can be built, it seems obvious that they will revolutionize all naval warfare. There are reports that two of that type, or a similar one, have been built, though, of course, there is no accurate information as to the extent of the development of the British Navy. The tale that the Germans have undersea boats 800 feet long, however, has been generally believed.—N. Y. Times.

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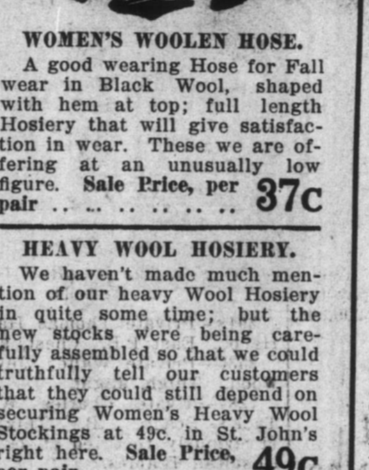

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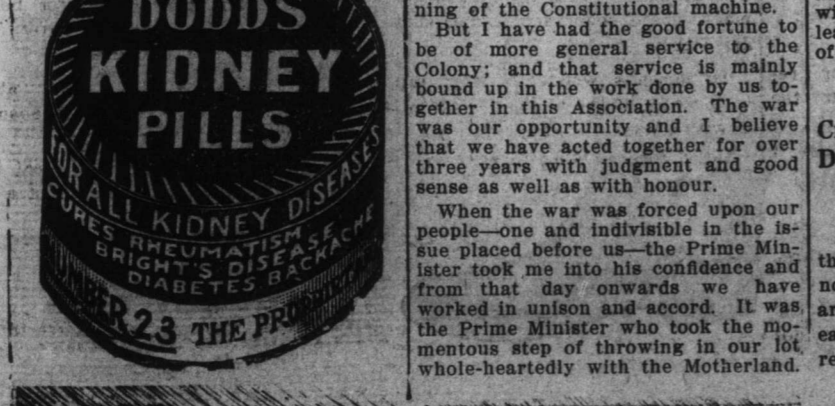
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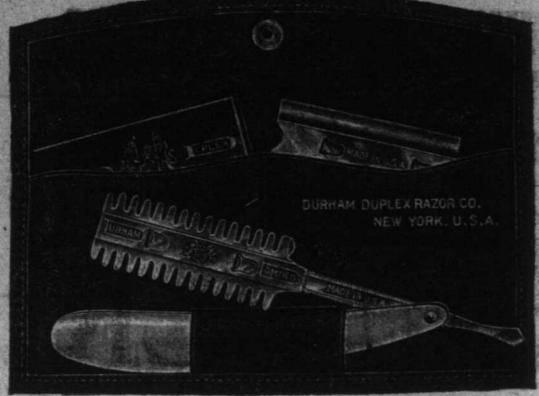

People are often most unreasonable & billy impatient with physical deafness. But even the most unreasonable person if he stopped to think could not maintain that the deaf person was to blame for his deafness.

Now there is also a deafness of the mind. Some people especially old folks, are to use an old term, "a little hard of hearing" in their brains. And there are many people who really blame their housemates for this sort of deafness.

For instance I know a man whose wife, while one of the sweetest women in the world and very far from stupid, is not "quick in the uptake." She cannot get things quickly. He has lived with her thirty years and should be used to that fact by now and if he loves her (and he would certainly be ready to hit anyone who said he didn't) should have accommodated himself to it.

I Don't See How She Stands It. Instead, when she doesn't understand anything, sometimes he gets indignant and flies out irritably at her. Again he laughs at her that derisive laugh that makes the blood come to my face just to hear it. How she can stand it I don't see. I'm sure I should have told him long ago that if he laughed at me that way again, I'd leave him.

Old people are very often treated this way by sons and daughters who think they love their parents. Of course there are cases of geniuses whose minds remain clear and quick to their deaths, but with the average person the understanding slows up just as the body does. The old folks can't help not getting things quickly any more than they can help not moving as swiftly as you do. And it is just as brutal to blame them for one as the other.

Nobody Wants To Misunderstand. Nobody wants not to understand. Anyone would understand if he could. Especially when he knew the danger of being pounced upon if he didn't.

As a matter of fact I think that very fear makes people slower and more liable to mistakes. They are so nervous and apprehensive that they are more likely to make mistakes.

The old person's habit of forgetting is another thing about which many young people are cruelly unreasonable. "Why mother don't you know I told you, etc., etc., or 'Father hey, can you be so queer, you know it's so and so' they say with quick irritability.

The Meeker They Are The More They Get Scolded. It's not fun to be old and it's not fun to be slow of comprehension.

And the meeker and more patient the old folks are under reproof the more the young folks use them for an irritability vent.

Meekness certainly is a beautiful virtue but sometimes I think the worm that turned did more good in the world than if he had let himself be trampled on to the end.

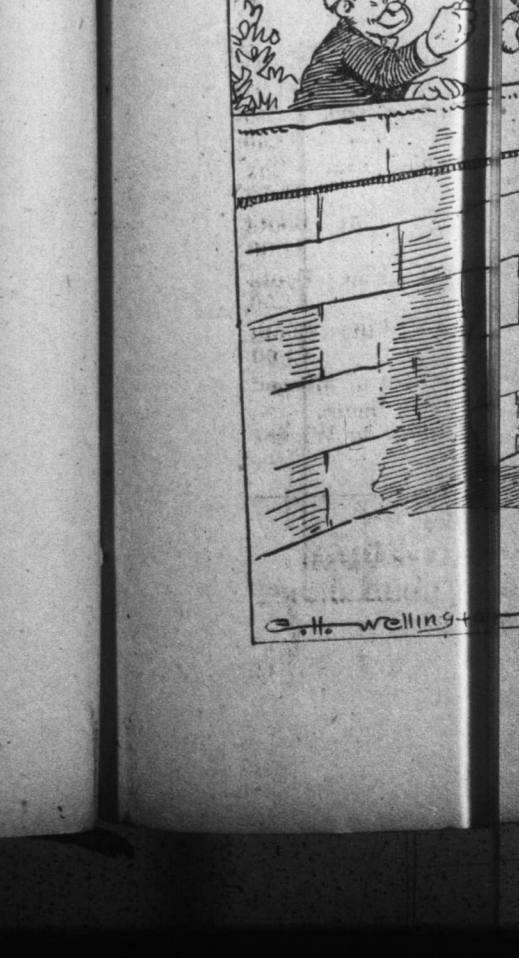

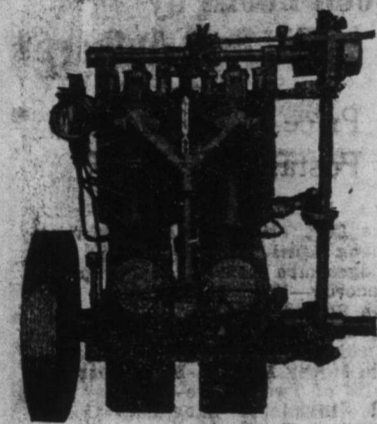

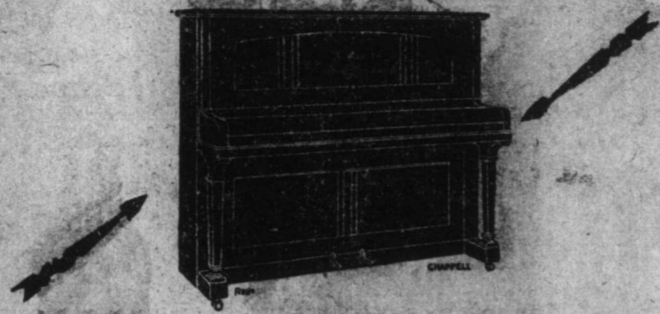

Ship Building Bounty!

I am instructed by the Government that it is their intention to submit to the Legislature at its next session a Bill to limit the class of vessels entitled to Bounty from the Government under the present Shipbuilding Bounty Law. Hereafter Bounty will be payable on vessels not exceeding 120 tons gross measurement. Vessels exceeding 120 tons gross will not qualify for any Bounty whatever. It is intended that the Regulations shall apply to all vessels of which the keel has been laid at the date of this notice; but all vessels, the keels of which are not now laid, shall come within the scope of the proposed new Regulations, and shall not be entitled to Bounty when the vessels exceed 120 tons gross measurement.

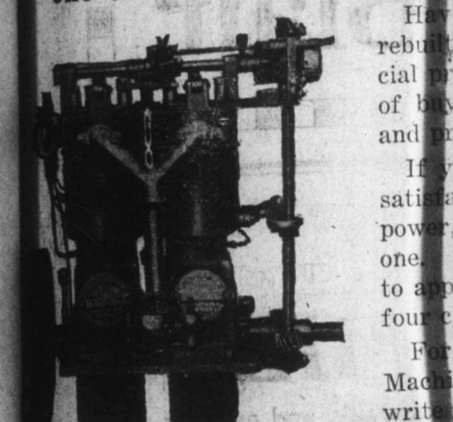
