### Gold From the Floor.

At one time the great fish-canning concerns of the Frozen River simply turned the hose on the floors and washed the offal into the river. Then brain-wave seized one man. There must be quantities of oil in that offal. he argued.

So a refining plant was erected, with the result that 30,000 gallons of oil was obtained from the fish offal in twelve months. Sixty tons of offal is dealt with every day when the canneries are operating, and the oil is shipped to New York.

Even then the offal is not finished with. The residue becomes guano, which is dried out and shipped to California, where it realizes a good price on account of its value as a fer-

Many winds have blown in and out the narrows since those specious promises seduced the electorate of the extern districts, but the Outport Hospitals which were to be erected by the generosity of the persons named have not yet materialised, and the rattling and jolting of the railway cars still bring scarcely suppressed cries of torture from painwracked men and women of the far outports, who have to enter the city hospitals for treatment and healing.

In the face of the dire necessity for small hospitals in the principal outports, plans are being formulated and assistance is being solicited for the erection of another institution in St. John's, additional to and independent of the General Hospital. The conditions, under which this proposed building is to be erected and operated. will not, we think meet with universal approval. It can expect but very little favor or aid from the two hundred and ten thousand people who live outside St. John's Districts who tadly need such establishments nearer and at points more quickly accessible to them than the Capital. There also procurable. are several matters to be considered in connection with the erection of the proposed institution, before the arrangements can be finalised, and these we propose to discuss later.


