The resolution relative to Standardization was passed as will be seen, on Saturday, May 15, while the second was passed to-day at 12 o'clock. The letters follow:





IN THE COMMONS.

LONDON, May 21. Parliament adjourned to-day for ten days Whitsuntide recess, the final meeting being notable for a vigorous attack on the Government's general Foreign policy, led by Sir Donald MacLean. This attack was the outcome of a belief among opposition parties that there is a disposition to belittle the League of Nations, and elect a Supreme Council into a permanent body as the arbitrator of European affairs. MacLean criticised Great Britain's action in sending war materials to Poland, and pleaded that the League of Nations be brought into existence at once. Lord Robert Cecil made a great impression on the House by a speech, in which he pleaded that the League of Nations be made a real thing, and in effect declaring himself willing to break entire with the coalition, if he found that the Government was not in earnest in behalf of the League. Cecil also demanded why the League of Nations had not been called in to avert new Polish war. Andrew Bonar Law for the Government declared Great Britain had no desire to make war on Soviet Russia. The Government felt strongly that the Soviet Government was more likely to be strengthened, if it were enabled to continue a state than in any other way. Th kind of Government, which the Soviet ature 25 to 35 above. claimed, was contrary to nature and could not last, he declared. The way to get rid of it, and to create a reasonable situation in Russia was to allow the Russian people in the first place to work out their own salvation. Bolshevik forces landed at Ensell, and are believed, in official quarters, not to exceed ten thoucial quarters, not to exceed ten thou-sand, which fact, it was considered, ed to make improbable any imseemed to make improbable any immediate extension of operations of large numbers of recruits from pro-Bolshevist elements in transcaucasian Republics. For this reason War Office experts deemed it to be unlikely that any advance toward Teheran would be attempted, as the Persian capital is more than a hundred and fifty miles distant.

LONDON, May 20. LONDON, May 20.

The Dublin correspondent of the Exchange Telegraph Company says that in consequence of English dockers having telegraphed that they had refused to load war munitions for Ireland, and the Irish transport Union having decided not to unlead munitions should they reach Dublin, the military officer in command at that port to-day interviewed the Harbor Master and later went to Headquarters to consult with his superiors on the situation. Two vessels with war material are expected at Dublin, one from Avonmouth the other from Southampton.



The Maoris.

Recently the cablegrams gave an interesting account of a reception given to the Prince of Wales by many hundreds of the natives of New Zealand, Maoris (pronounced Mow-ries), dressed in loin clothes and exhibiting their native war dances, accompanied with songs. The address to the Prince was most poetical.

These are strange people. When Europeans first visited their island homes they were cannibals of the most pronounced and cruel types, but withal were highly intelligent, conscientions, moral, artistic, eloquent, poetic, and musical. Their warriors were very brave. Considering their numbers, which were small compared with continental races, they offered the strongest and best ordered resistance to British forces which Britons ever met.

Lucas says: "In the native New Zealander you have a man who appreciates nothing, in a supposed enemy, except brute force. If he has to submit to it, when he has done his best, he does so with a good grace, as he has done in this instance, and respects it, because he discovers a power superior to his own.

Their subjugation to civilized power has resulted in a complete cessation of those tribal wars in which thousands were slain, many more thousands than those who fell in resistance to their conquerors. Now they have peace among themselves as well as between them and their victors."

The English law gave them a written language which they did not previously have. But they had schools, open for four months of each year, where the children had to commit to memory histories of their wars, their traditions, sougs and folk lore. When a written language was given them. they gave to the world a wonderful history of the aboriginal conditions of these remarkable people.

Their origin is very doubtful. It was found that they had a general knowledge of many things believed and taught by the Hebrews. They had well-established ideas of the creation of the world, and of the redemption of the world after man had become corrupt through transgression. They held that a god, "Tiki" (te-ke) had made man, and they were extremely orthodox. When a priest once denied the faith they killed him and then ate him. Preachers, a little loose in their theology, had better keep away from New Zealand natives. These natives are not of negro origin, but are supposed to be of the Polynesian branch of the Malay family. The New Zealander's hair is generally coarse and black, though sometimes rusty red. He has good teeth, broad nose, dark brown eyes, large mouth, and an olive brown skin. In tattooing, these natives, both male and female outstripped the natives of all other lands. and their appearance was most grotesque. They are fond of ornaments. esepcially in their head dresses, in which the white tipped feathers of the huia bird held a prominent place.

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
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
