MR. THOMAS MURPHY. It is with regret we record the

death of Mr. Thomas Murphy, son of Ellen and the late Nicholas J. Murphy, which occurred yesterday morning, after a long and tedious illness, borne with truly Christian fortitude and resignation to the Will of God. and after having received all the rites of Holy Church. "Tom," as his friends were pleased to call him, who has been cut down in the very prime of life, and in the midst of an exceptionally useful career, was a young man of fine presence and charming personality which won the respect of all who knew him and had the privilege of an intimate acquaintance. He seemed to possess all those qualities of mind and heart in a man, so that his memory will not soon be forgotten. The deceased received his education at the Christian Brothers' School, St. Patrick's Hall, and upon leaving that institution, he was appointed to the position of page in the House of Assembly. After occupying the above four years, he was appointed Clerk in the office of the Registrar General of Births, Marriages and Deaths, where he remained until compelled to retire, owing to delicate health, about six years ago. Never of a robust constitution, he remained at his post as long as possible, and about twelve months ago, it was seen that his health was gradually declining, and six months ago he was compelled to take to his bed. During his term in the public service, he was exceptionally courteous and obliging, and the call of duty never found him unwilling or reluctant. He leaves to mourn a mother, four brothers and one sister, to whom the Telegram extends sincere sympathy in their bereavement.---Requiescat in pace.

The third reading of Bill en "An Act further to amend Chapter 22 of the Consolidated Statutes entitled 'Of the Customs,' " was defer-

A Bill entitled "An 'Act to ame Chapter 35 of the Consolidated Stat utes entitled 'Of the Postal and Telegraph Services' " passed third reading with amendment.

The Bills "An Act to amend the Act 5 Geo. V, Cap. 10, entitled 'An Act respecting Stamp Duties," and "An Act to facilitate the Reciprocal Enforcement of Judgements, Orders, and Awards in Newfoundland and other parts of His Majesty's Dominions" passed third reading without amendmen

Hon. Tasker Cook sat as Chairman of Committee on the Bill entitled "An Act to amend Chapter 108 of the Consolidated Statutes entitled 'Of the Protection of Animals." During the second reading of this Bill there was much discussion and amendments were suggested.

Hon. Geo. Shea urged the passage of the Bill contending that the law was designed more to apply to outside shippers of cattle than to local people. He said that the Bill had passed a special committee of the Lower House and imposed no hardship. He thought that no harm could be done by erring on the right side. Sir Patrick McGrath said that the carrying of cattle was better attended to than years ago, when the animals were of so much less value. He had made enquiries as to the method of carrying cattle by the Kyle and he was told that the practice was to make the run across from the Canadian shore when the weather was favorable. The animals were carried in the well deck, tied head to the rail and pounded off. He was informed that the period allowed by the Bill (May 30 to Oct. 1) for carrying cattle on deck was too short and should be extended. He suggested amending the dates to read from May 1st to Oct. 31st.

Hon. Eli Dawe thought that the Bill would impose unnecessary hardship. He said that probably not 20% of local vessels had a hatch as large as required by the Bill. He would like to hear of sufficient and good reasons of cruelty to animals under present carrying conditions before he would vote for the drastic measure now proposed. Where cattle were landed by steam winch there might he thought, be a necessity for a 7 x 9 hatch but where cattle were hoisted by block and tackle there was no need for a 7 ft. wide hatch, as that width would allow two animals side by side to come through.

Hon. Tasker Cook, who left the chair to take part in the debate, said he agreed with what both the previous speakers had said. The Bill was so worded that it appeared to him. it was desired to prevent cruelty t







support to the bill. He thaught that war pensions was one of our most justifiable outlays. It was thought by many to be a heavy burden. but in comparison it was perhaps one of the lightest. The cost to this colony is about three dollars per head whilst in Canada the pensions and reestablishment cost the people of the Dominion \$6 per capita and in the British Isles the assessment totals 45 shillings or \$10.20. In reference to the war pensions burden in the old country Sir Patrick said that efforts to relieve the strain were being made by the raising of a loan which would be passed on to the next generation. In a similar manner relief from our burden could be accomplished. The speaker made reference to the pensioners from the U.S. Civil War. The number of pensions being paid was surprising and although the war ended sixty years ago the payment of the last pension showed an increase over that of the previous year. The attention of the Government leader was drawn to the fact that there was practically no fire protection for the documents in relation to the war records of the 8.500 men who went overseas. The records were stored in the Militia Building but were not kept in fireproof safes, and should a conflagration take place all this valuable data would be lost.

The Bill entitled "An Act for the more effectual transfer of certain properties to the Roman Catholic Episcopal Corporation of St. John's," was given second reading, after which the House adjourned until Friday at 4 p.m.
