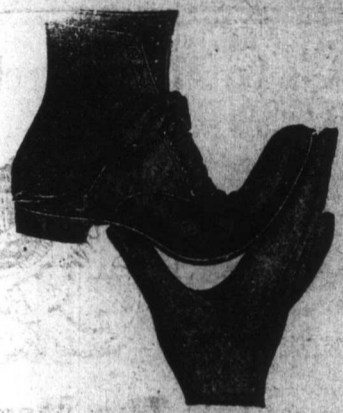

British Premier Takes Unusual Course.

Storm of Protest Aroused--Canadian Finance Minister Delivers Budget Speech--Round the World by Air--Thirty Thousand Mile Flight Started.

LLOYD GEORGE RAISES STORM.

LONDON, May 24. Lloyd George's decision to put up Sir Laming Worthington Evans, Minister of War, to relate the results of the Geneva Conference, reserving his own speech until he has heard all his critics have to say, has raised a political storm. The Prime Minister's opponents contend the country has a right to hear an account of his stewardship from himself, and even the papers supporting him are urging him to reconsider his decision. Labor and Independent Liberal Members decided to-day not to speak in the debate until the Premier was heard.

CANADIAN TARIFF PROPOSALS.

OTTAWA, May 24. Making his Budget Speech to-day, Hon. W. S. Fielding stressed the inadequacy of the present tax system and indicated that additional tax burdens were being imposed. A tariff reduction of 2 1/2 to 5 per cent, on agricultural implements and fishing supplies will be made. The British preference will be increased in some respects and an offer of preferential rates to Australia is made. Regarding reciprocity with the United States, Mr. Fielding said the Government would await developments in Washington. A tax of ten cents per gallon on mineral waters and soft drinks was announced. The cigar excise rates are raised from \$5 to \$9 per thousand and that on transfers of stock is raised from 2 to 5 cents per share. The sales tax is to be increased 50 per cent. The duty on cotton, woolen, rubber, and knitted clothing and on boots and shoes is reduced 2 1/2 per cent. The confectionery tax is 5 per cent, and ale and beer 15 cents per gallon. Mr. Fielding said further loans would be necessary at no distant date, and it was planned to make the next loan a purely domestic issue. Mr. Fielding said it was not proposed to reduce the tariff on American goods except on agricultural implements and one or two similar items. Most of the reductions proposed were made under British preference provisions, and not on a reduction of the tariff applying to the United States. The Government has decided that the provisions of the last taxation proposals requiring foods to be marked with the country of origin was undesirable, it had never been enforced and would now be repealed. The Government had also decided that the provision of the last tariff dealing with valuations of imports from countries where the currency was depreciated below fifty per cent, was an unwarranted interference with trade. It meant Canada had been charging duty as high as some cases as 1000 per cent on German goods or that Canadian importers bought from Holland or England instead of direct from Germany. The Finance Minister declared Canada was willing to enter into negotiations with the United States for better trade relations, but pending the outcome of the Fordey Tariff Bill Canada would hold her hand.

CABINET CRISIS IN GERMANY.

BERLIN, May 24. There are persistent rumours of a Cabinet crisis here owing to Chancellor Joseph Wirth having declined to endorse the proposals made to the Reparations Commission at Paris by Andreas Hermes, Minister of Finance, especially the proposal to impose new taxation to cover the increase of Germany's floating debt.

LONG FLIGHT BEGAN.

CROYDEN, May 24. Major W. T. Blake and his companions started from the Airports here at 3.05 this afternoon on their attempted thirty thousand mile aero-plane flight around the world.

THE FIRST STAGE.

PARIS, May 24. Major Blake reached here at 6.12 this evening after a successful flight. To-morrow he leaves for Lyon and then on to Turin.

FREIGHT RATES CUT.

WASHINGTON, May 24. Reductions of freight rates on American railways averaging about ten per cent, were ordered to-day by the Interstate Commerce Commission. In the Eastern territory the cut is 15 per cent, in the Western 13 1/2, and Southern and Mountain Pacific territories 12 1/2.

WILL COOPER WITH BRITISH GOVERNMENT.

LONDON, May 24. Representatives of the Irish Provisional Government will reach London Thursday night for a conference with the British Cabinet concerning the agreement reached here Saturday between the two Irish political factions.

ULSTER WILL CONCEDE NO TERRITORY.

BELFAST, May 24. Ulster will make no concessions to South Ireland on the boundary question, Premier Craig declared in Parliament to-day. "What we have we will hold," Sir James said.

IRISH LABOUR WILL NOMINATE 17 CANDIDATES.

DUBLIN, May 24. The Labor Party will nominate seventeen candidates for the coming Irish elections. James Larkin, now in New York State Prison, will be a candidate.

KILLED BY GAS.

MILWAUKEE, Wis., May 24. Three city firemen and two tunnel workers were killed by gas at the bottom of a fifty-foot sewer shaft to-day and nearly a score of firemen were overcome. The firemen were trying to rescue two tunnel workers.

BRITISH OFFICER SHOT IN CAIRO.

CAIRO, May 24. Wilfred Cave, a British Officer and Assistant Commandant of Police here, was shot and killed while returning from a bicycling trip.

GOVERNMENT WILL BE QUESTIONED.

PARIS, May 24. The Government will be interpellated on the circumstances surrounding the disastrous collision of the Egypt and Seine. While the white officers of the Egypt showed heroism the Lascars lost their heads, passengers say.

300 SINN FEINERS ARRESTED.

BELFAST, May 24. It was officially stated at 4 o'clock this afternoon that three hundred Sinn Feiners had been taken prisoners by the Ulster authorities and would be interned.

TO-DAY'S MESSAGES.

INDIGNITY OFFERED PRELATE.

DUBLIN, May 24. The Catholic Bishop of Derry, while motoring from his residence to Movilla was held up by Ulster special constables to-day, ordered to leave the car, and was searched by the roadside. The incident, it is asserted, has aroused great indignation.

ONE DAY'S RECORD.

BELFAST, May 24. Brigadier-General Higginson, who recently commanded the British Infantry at Cork, was shot and wounded in two places while riding near Tip-

perary to-day. While large groups of shipyard workers were returning home to-night, bombs were hurled at the tram cars on which they were riding and sharp fire ensued, resulting in several casualties. Police returning from operations in Ballymena-District, were ambushed and a fierce fight followed, two of the attacking party being killed. Carnegie Library in Falls Road District was set on fire and mobs attacked firemen and also police. A tram car was stopped, saturated with oil, and set afire.

STREET WARFARE.

ROME, May 24. Scores of Fascist and Royal Guards were wounded to-night in a

street battle in the crowded San Lorenzo section of the city.

CABINET RESIGNS.

VIENNA, May 24. The Austrian Cabinet, headed by Johann Schober, resigned to-day, owing to Parliament having reduced credits asked by the Government.

KILLER IN COLLISION.

BERLIN, May 24. The German battleship Hanover and torpedo boat 8-13 collided during manoeuvres last night near Sassnitz, east of Soreby of the torpedo boat being killed.

PELTED WITH EGGS.

VIENNA, May 24. Polish Foreign Minister Constantine was pelted with rotten eggs here to-night as he was going to a dinner. He had arranged for representatives of the foreign press. Three of the assailants, who proved to be former Ukrainian officials, were arrested. They gave as their reason that they wished to avenge the Ukraine for Polish oppression. Chancellor Schober called on the Minister and expressed his regret at the incident.

PREMIER CLIMBS DOWN.

LONDON, May 25. Premier Lloyd George is prepared to-day to open the debate in the House of Commons on the achievements of the Genoa Conference. His political opponents were also ready, and the Premier's replies to his critics, after his set address, is expected to form the most interesting part of the debate. The public is taking an intense interest in the event, while a big attendance of members is expected, since Mr. Lloyd George announced his willingness to forego the intention of forcing his critics to speak first. His surrender to pressure from both supporters and opponents on this matter has given general satisfaction and is preventing what threatened to become an unpleasant incident. Herbert H. Asquith, Liberal leader, is to follow Mr. Lloyd George, and other speakers will be John Robert Clynes, chairman of the Labor Group and Lord Robert Cecil.

RUSSO-ITALIAN TREATY.

GENOVA, May 25. A commercial treaty between Soviet Russia and Italy was signed yesterday afternoon.

RAISING REPUBLICANS.

DUBLIN, May 25. Mrs. Edmond De Valera, wife of the Republican Party leader, has given birth to twin boys, and Mrs. Christa Bergin, wife of the former Minister of Defence in Mr. De Valera's Cabinet, and a prominent opponent of the Anglo-Irish Treaty, has given birth to a daughter.

EMPIRE DAY CASUALTIES.

BELFAST, May 25. The total casualties in the series of disorders which swept Belfast last night and this morning are placed at four dead and twenty-seven wounded at ten o'clock this morning. The wounded included only the cases treated in hospitals.

Addresses Brigade.

ROTARIAN SPEAKS ON THRIFT TO C.L.B.

Mr. B. C. Gardner addressed the C.L.B. Cadets at their parade on Tuesday night on behalf of the Rotary Club. His subject was Thrift. Mr. Gardner spoke of the value of thrift from various aspects, and reminded the boys of the assets which they possess in body and mind and the care that should be taken of them. At the conclusion of the address a vote of thanks was proposed by the Battalion Chaplain, Rev. J. Brinton, and was heartily accorded. Mr. Gardner, who was an ex-army officer, stayed to watch some special marching and expressed his appreciation of the excellent manner in which the various evolutions were performed. Following the parade, the Officers' Mess held their regular monthly meeting under the chairmanship of the Mess President, Capt. H. A. Quinbridge. 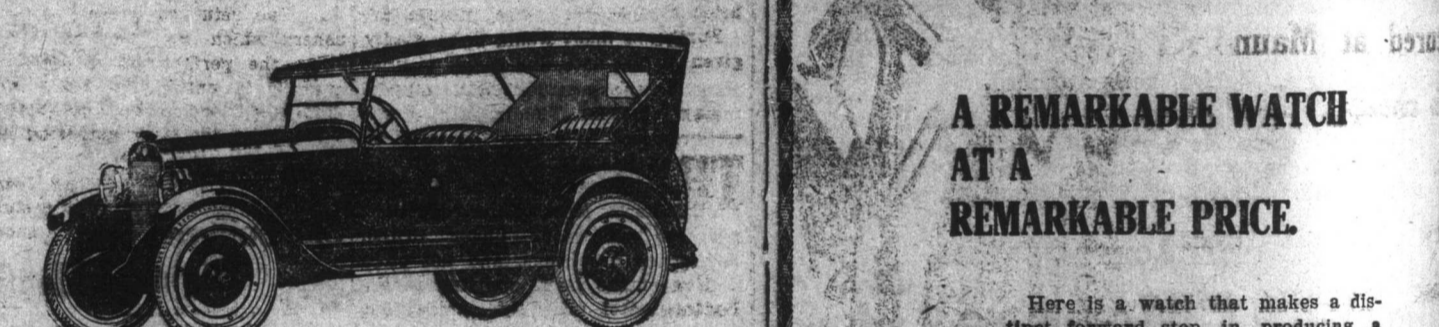

Census Evaders Were Shot.

A census is a thing that is about as old as human government, though we get the word "census" from the Romans among whom the word "census" means to estimate or make a count, and hence came "census," meaning a measure of inhabitants. The people had to be measured or "enumerated" or numbered for purposes of taxation and military service and the old Romans had their "census," which was made at varying intervals.

It is most likely that the ancient Egyptians had their census, perhaps an annual census, though, of course they called it something else, for each inhabitant had to pay a tax and give an account of the way he made his living. In Herodotus's history it is set down:

"Under the reign of Amasis, Egypt is said to have enjoyed great prosperity, both in respect to the benefits derived from the river to the land, and from the land to the people, and it is said to have contained at that time 20,000 inhabited cities. Amasis it was who established the law among the Egyptians that every Egyptian should annually declare to the governor of his district by what means he maintained himself, and if he failed to do this or did not show that he lived by honest means he should be punished with death. Solon, the Athenian, having brought this law from Egypt, established it at Athens, and that people still continued to observe it as being an unobjectionable regulation."

The first census of the United States was made in 1790, though there were censuses taken in the colonies at an earlier time. It has been set down that the first census in England, covering the whole kingdom, was made in 1801, but it is a matter of record that a census of all England was taken in the year 859, at very close to that year. This census may be seen in an old document called the Tribal Hidage, printed in Birch's "Cartularium Saxonicum" (a card of chart of the Saxons). It gives a list of 23 old English districts, the number of families in each and a sum total, which, slightly corrected, gives the number of families in all England at that date. There were then 156,000 families, or about 1 1/2 million souls, in England.—Kansas City Star.

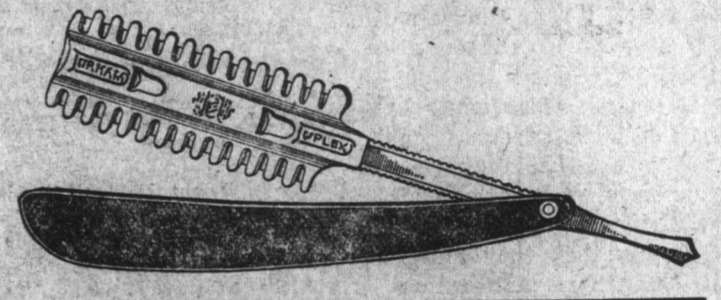

What of the Future?

No matter what the result of the conferences between the Government and the Railway Company, the public have at least some small satisfaction in that trains were started on Tuesday evening, and the running continued. Thus the deadlock has been somewhat relieved and freight and passengers will receive transport for so long as the present agreement, which apparently is but temporary, lasts. It is rumored in Water Street circles that the Government has agreed to pay the Company the balance due on guaranteed loss up to June 30. Other reports state that the present is but by way of interim arrangement to facilitate traffic long held up. So far as can be learned, however, and the Government press is responsible for the statement, the decision of Tuesday has nothing whatever to do with the policy being pursued, either of Government or Company. At the same time something must have been accomplished to induce the Company to resume operations. In the face of their announcement a few days ago that they were determined to wash their hands of the whole service, it is somewhat strange that they should release their trains on a temporary operation. The question, therefore, naturally arises, have the claims for arrears of guarantee against losses 1921-22 been met by the Government and paid over.

There is an air of mystery about the whole proceedings. No explanation has been made by the Government: no statement has emanated from the Company. All that the people are aware of is that trains are moving. Under easier circumstances this might be sufficient to allay anxiety as to the future of the service, but at the moment it is not compatible with good business that the people—who in the fiscal settlement have to pay—should be kept in the dark. Some have gone so far as to say that the Government has bought out the Company. That may or may not be the fact that Mr. R. C. Morgan is again on his way to Newfoundland gives color to this latest rumor. Even though a limited service will be maintained is not sufficient to allay suspicion that a new deal has been put through. The Premier declared in the House of Assembly on Monday last when replying to a question of Sir Michael Cashin that he hoped to be able to do some operating of the railway before Mr. Morgan arrived. Tuesday's movements of express and shore trains give color to this, but what has the Colony been let in for? What liabilities may have been incurred from this sudden change of mind on the part of the Company? It is not well that this mysterious conjunction of Government and Contractor

should be kept secret. The people have to pay, no matter what the temporary agreement consists of, and it is up to the Prime Minister to outline his plans to-day.

It is significant, and to be carefully noted with regard to the intentions of the Railway Company that they did not apply for a renewal of the Canadian subsidy paid them for Cabot Strait Steamship Service—North Sydney to Port aux Basques. This subsidy which is so much per trip per annum expired in March last. This matter was discussed by the North Sydney Board of Trade at a meeting of that body held when the news of the suspension of railway and steambot traffic between Newfoundland and Cape Breton reached that town. North Sydney is exceedingly jealous of its connection and trade with Newfoundland, and great anxiety existed there lest because of the tie-up a loss in traffic might be a consequence. The subsidy paid by the Canadian Government to the Railway Company is several thousand dollars, collectable per trip of the steamer or steamers operating across Cabot Strait. That the Company did not make application for a renewal at the termination of the subsidy period points to facts, that if urged, are incontrovertible. What is the inner meaning of this neglect to seek such a substantial sum? Was the whole course of procedure as adopted from May 15, figured out and premeditated? On the face of the North Sydney Board of Trade allegation, it looks very much that way. Again let the people consider the decision of the Shipping Dept. to dispatch the s.s. Eagle to South West Coast ports. All in all there must be something brewing. What that something is may be made public in the House of Assembly this afternoon, when the Prime Minister makes his promised statement. Meanwhile let the country practice a policy of watchful waiting.

Concert Broadcasted.

TELEGRAM EDITOR DELIVERS SPEECH.

Mr. C. T. James, editor of the Telegram, has the unique distinction of being the first newspaperman to have a speech broadcasted to owners of wireless telegraphy outfits. The speech was on current topics and was delivered during the concert arranged by Messrs. J. J. Collins and Brown of the Marconi Company on Tuesday night. When the concert had concluded several people telephoned that the speech had been heard clearly and distinctly. In the course of a few days, through the energy of Mr. Collins, those who may be "listening in" will receive a surprise as he has a special treat in course of preparation. Active movements are being taken to procure apparatus sufficiently powerful to receive the New York concerts and when this is accomplished there is no doubt that radio telephony will become as great a hobby in Newfoundland as it is now in the United States. For an interesting, profitable and entertaining hobby there is nothing that can compare with radio telephony.

A Letter and a Withdrawal.

23 May, 1922.
Messrs. W. J. Herder and C. T. James, Evening Telegram.

Dear Sirs.—On Saturday, May 20th, you published a leading article in large type, entitled "Highly Dangerous," in which occurs the following sentence: "One thing only is certain in this connection, and that is the unhappy fact that the Government of the day is composed of lightweights in law and statesmanship, and may be confidently counted on to do the wrong thing."

While I have no objection to any fair criticism of me as a politician or a statesman, I very much object to your attacking me professionally as a lawyer, and interfering with my means of livelihood. As a prominent member of the Government, and, especially, as I am the one solely responsible in the public eye for any advice on law to be given the Government, your assertion that I am a lightweight in law, and may be confidently counted on to do the wrong thing, is a direct slur upon my professional reputation and my means of living, and one which with any respect for myself, or my professional firm, I cannot let pass unnoticed.

Unless you publish as a leading article a retraction of your libellous statement before Friday next, I shall take it that you are prepared to prove it, and shall give you a chance to do so in the Supreme Court.

We gladly publish the above letter. Everybody in this Colony knows the name of Mr. Warren's excellent standing at our local bar, and, therefore, it would be absurd to suppose that the world complained of ("lightweight") could do him a harm. Besides, as a word of comparison, it is really defamatory, even in Mr. Warren's own opinion. He is not a "lightweight" as a Newfoundland lawyer, but compared with Birkenhead, Haldane, Simon, etc. he would himself, perhaps, plead guilty. And why should he take our words so specially to himself. He is not the only "prominent" member of the Government or the only one responsible for advice on law points. The Premier and the Hon. Mr. Footit are also lawyers, and prominent, and they are as responsible as he. However, we apologise for using the word "lightweight" and substitute "heavyweight" with the additions that Mr. Warren is a competent and reliable practitioner, in whom persons having legal affairs demanding attention can implicitly rely.—(Editor Telegram.)

Personal.

R. C. Morgan, former Chairman of the Railway Management Committee, is due at North Sydney to-night and will leave by the Sagona for Port aux Basques. The express is due here on Saturday night and Mr. Morgan will probably assume complete control of railway operations on Monday.

The Railway Situation.

BOOK DEBTS AS SECURITY FOR GOVERNMENT GUARANTEE.

The agreement for the temporary operation of the railway while negotiations for a settlement are pending will be signed to-day or to-morrow. In the meantime all trains are again in motion. The Bank of Montreal had advanced the Reids sufficient funds to meet the April payroll on Government guarantee, said Sir Richard Squires to the Telegram this morning, and he further stated that the Company had hypothecated a proportion of their book debts as security. All wage cheques have been paid for the month of April as a result of this agreement. What the ultimate settlement of the railway problem will be is a matter for conjecture. The Government are still faced with only two alternatives, litigation or purchase, and which is likely to prove more advantageous to the country has yet to be discovered. Mr. R. C. Morgan's return appears to be proof positive that the Government either intend to buy out the Reids or to run the railway temporarily until a decision is reached. Purchase and operation by the Government of the railway would necessitate a big initial expense as the rolling stock needs replacement.

Unveiling of Memorial Window at the Kirk.

Next Sunday morning St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church will be the scene of a very interesting service. His Excellency the Governor will unveil the memorial window to the men of the congregation who gave their lives in the war. The window is a very beautiful and original piece of art and was specially designed for St. Andrew's and made by one of the oldest and best known firms in Scotland. Arrangements are being made to make this a fitting memorial service. Rev. E. S. Coffin, R.A. of Harbor Grace will take charge of the dedicatory portion of the service. Rev. Robert J. Power will take the address which will be an interpretation of the window. Prof. Moncrieff Mawer and his choir have been at work on the music for some time and can be trusted to give a good account of themselves.

LOCAL WRITER MADE MEMBER OF DIALECT SOCIETY.

Mr. H. F. Shortis, whose writings given to the public through the medium of the Telegram have won him unstinted praise, has been elected to membership in the American Dialect Society. The President of the Society is Professor J. W. Bright of Harvard University, and Mr. Percy W. Long, also of Harvard, the Secretary. Mr. Shortis's proposer was Mr. George A. England, the American novelist and journalist who made a trip to the ice fields in S. Terra Nova, and his second the Secretary. A letter to Mr. Shortis from Mr. Long speaks of the "considerable assistance you afforded Mr. England during his recent visit," and refers to "your very valuable collection of material relating to the history of Newfoundland" which he regards as a "priceless store of work, and which will probably never be duplicated." Mr. Shortis has already completed four volumes of a popular history of Newfoundland and has another in preparation. It is to be hoped that this will shortly be given to the public in book form.

New Road Ordinance.

STREET BARRED TO MOTORISTS.
From now on LeMarchant Road is barred to motorists from 6 p.m. until 11 p.m. Sundays. This pronouncement was made by Judge Morris in the Magistrate's Court this morning when fixing a motorist five dollars for exceeding the speed limit. This will appear a hardship to many motorists who are accustomed to use this road when returning to town from the country on Sunday nights. While the ordinance was made in the interests of the public it would be a great deal wiser if the Council made decent sidewalks on this road and compelled pedestrians to keep to them. It will be interesting to know whether a arrangement will be made to enable the many motorists living on LeMarchant Road to leave or return to their homes on Sundays.

MILLEY'S

Coffee When Boiled Loses Its Flavor.

The housekeeper who prides herself on her coffee realizes that the delicious flavor characteristic of the great American beverage when properly brewed cannot be coaxed out of the bean by haphazard methods.

For the past two years chemists in the department of biology and public health at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology have been studying coffee for the purpose of establishing facts of practical value to the coffee maker. One of their most important conclusions as set forth by Prof. S. C. Prescott, head of the department, declares emphatically that coffee should never be boiled.

The reason for this according to Prof. Prescott, is that the boiling causes certain chemical changes which emphasize the bitter elements in the coffee bean and give coffee a harsh taste which does not appeal to the average palate.

BUT BOIL YOUR WATER.

The method he recommends is, first, to bring the water to a full boil in a separate vessel, then to remove it from the fire and add the ground coffee. After the coffee grounds and the water are mixed, the infusion should be kept hot but not permitted to boil. This is the principle utilized in all drip coffee pots, but it may be applied to an ordinary coffee pot if the infusion is cleared by straining through filter paper or muslin cloth.

Prof. Prescott recommends that coffee should not stand on the grounds longer than is necessary to extract the delicate flavoring oils which are quickly released when the ground coffee comes in contact with water at the proper temperature.

The Daily Questionnaire.

THURSDAY, MAY 25. Mr. Moore—To ask the Minister of Public Works to lay on the table of the House a statement showing the total amount paid Messrs. Stafford, Druggists, of this city, for drugs and other requisites for the different public institutions from November 15th, 1919 up to date, and to lay on the table of the House for inspection by Honourable members the original bills furnished by Messrs. Stafford in regard thereto.

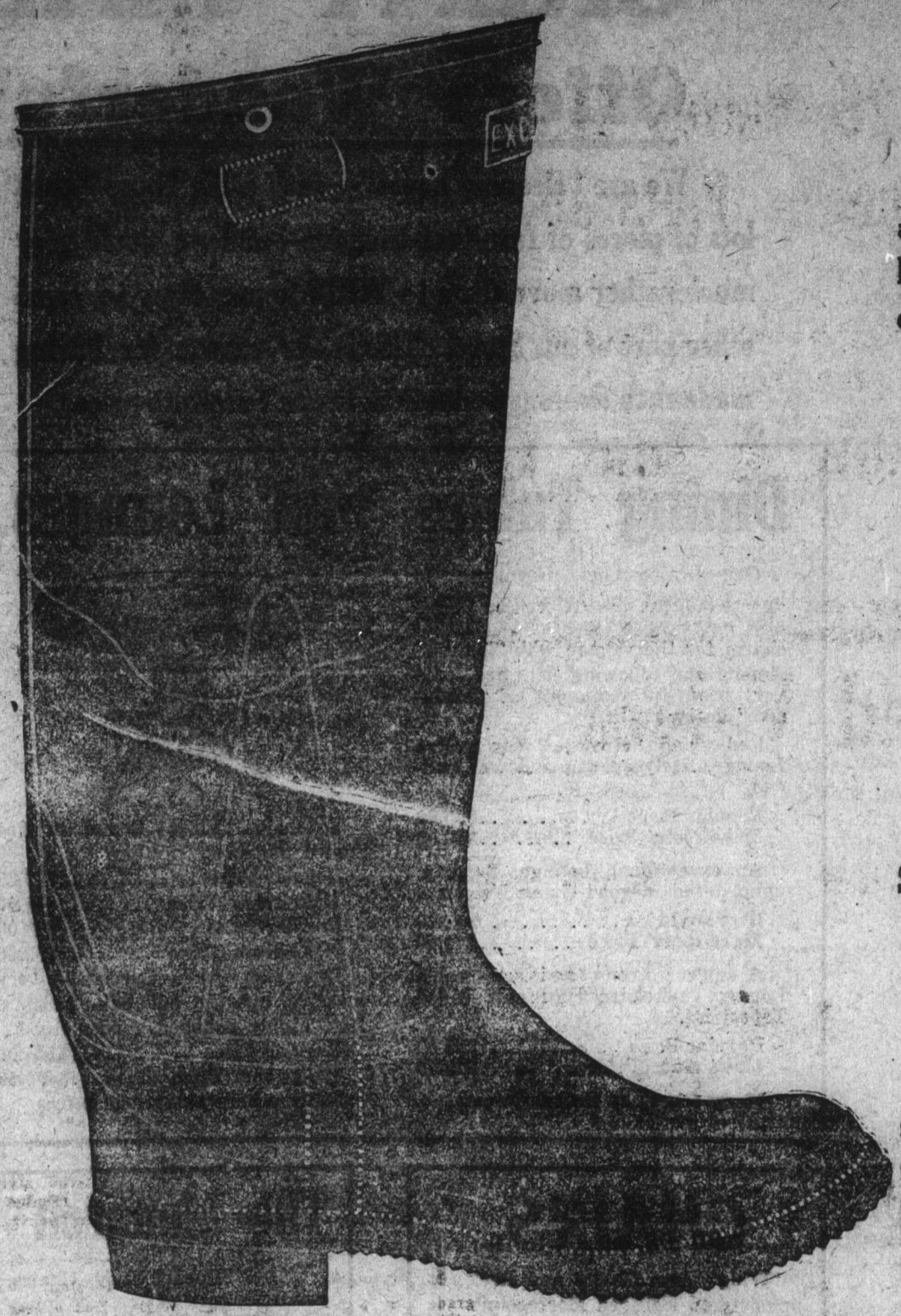

Strength in Spider's Web.

It is not only the strength of the spider and of the materials which he employs in spinning almost incomprehensible webs, but the strength of his thread are taken into account. Some recent experiments reported by a government naturalist on this subject are quite surprising. A single thread spun by a spider which weighed 14 milligrams supported a weight of four grams, or 70 times the weight of the spider. When a spider spins a web down to the ceiling or from the branch of a tree, and we see him descending and seeing the thread at all, we are perfectly sure that he is not in any danger of falling; but that he is every bit as strong as the thread on his invisible rope. Having this fact with respect to the strength of a web, in fact, we need not be surprised that the threads of a web, in fact, are very considerable strength. They are able to hold bees and wasps, and are very powerful in proportion to their size, and to bend and break under a weight of ten times their own weight.

Legislative Council.

TUESDAY, May 23.
The House met at 4 p.m.
The third reading of Bill entitled "An Act further to amend Chapter 22 of the Consolidated Statutes entitled 'Of the Customs,'" was deferred.

A Bill entitled "An Act to amend Chapter 85 of the Consolidated Statutes entitled 'Of the Postal and Telegraph Services'" passed third reading with amendment.
The Bill "An Act to amend the Act 5 Geo. V, Cap. 10, entitled 'An Act respecting Stamp Duties,'" and "An Act to facilitate the Reciprocal Enforcement of Judgements, Orders, and Awards in Newfoundland and other parts of His Majesty's Dominions" passed third reading without amendment.

Hon. Tasker Cook sat as Chairman of Committee on the Bill entitled "An Act to amend Chapter 108 of the Consolidated Statutes entitled 'Of the Protection of Animals.'" During the second reading of this Bill there was much discussion and amendments were suggested.

Hon. Geo. Shea urged the passage of the Bill contending that the law was designed more to apply to outside shippers of cattle than to local people. He said that the Bill had passed a special committee of the Lower House and imposed no hardship. He thought that no harm could be done by erring on the right side.

Sir Patrick McGrath said that the carrying of cattle was better attended to than years ago, when the animals were of so much less value. He had made enquiries as to the method of carrying cattle by the Kyles and he was told that the practice was to make the run across from the Canadian shore when the weather was favorable. The animals were carried in the well deck, tied head to the rail and pouched off. He was informed that the period allowed by the Bill (May 30 to Oct. 1) for carrying cattle on deck was too short and should be extended. He suggested amending the date to read from May 1st to Oct. 31st.

Hon. Ell Dave thought that the Bill would impose unnecessary hardship. He said that probably not 20% of local vessels had a hatch as large as required by the Bill. He would like to hear of sufficient and good reasons of cruelty to animals under present carrying conditions before he would vote for the drastic measure now proposed. Where cattle were landed by steam which there might, he thought, be a necessity for a 7 x 9 hatch but where cattle were hoisted by block and tackle there was no need for a 7 ft. wide hatch, as that width would allow two animals side by side to come through.

Hon. Tasker Cook, who left the chair to take part in the debate, said he agreed with what both the previous speakers had said. The Bill was so worded that it appeared to him it was desired to prevent cruelty to any number of cattle over 10, but that no provision was made for a less number. The amendment as suggested was put in the bill, after which it was moved on its last stage.

The War Pensions Bill also passed the Committee stage with some amendments to the verbiage.

Sir Patrick McGrath gave his hearty support to the bill. He thought that war pensions was one of our most justifiable outlays. It was thought by many to be a heavy burden, but in comparison it was perhaps one of the lightest. The cost, to this colony is about three dollars per head whilst in Canada the pensions and re-establishment cost the people of the Dominion \$6 per capita and in the British Isles the assessment totals 45 shillings or \$10.20. In reference to the war pensions burden in the old country Sir Patrick said that efforts to relieve the strain were being made by the raising of a loan which would be passed on to the next generation. In a similar manner relief from our burden could be accomplished. The speaker made reference to the pensions from the U.S. Civil War. The number of pensions being paid was surprising and although the war ended sixty years ago the payment of the last pension showed an increase over that of the previous year. The attention of the Government leader was drawn to the fact that there was practically no fire protection for the documents in relation to the war records of the \$500 men who went overseas. The records were stored in the Militia Building but were not kept in fire-proof safes, and should a conflagration take place all this valuable data would be lost.

The Bill entitled "An Act for the more effectual transfer of certain properties to the Roman Catholic Episcopal Corporation of St. John's" was given second reading, after which the House adjourned until Friday at 4 p.m.

Is it worth it? Do not those who prefer loyalty to the fleeting pleasure of being witty or caustic at their friend's expense choose the better part?


Criminals of the Air Without the Law.

MURDER DONE IN AIRPLANE UNPUNISHABLE FOR LACK OF JURISDICTION OVER AERIAL TRANSPORT.

WASHINGTON, May 16, (Special).—Murder committed in an airplane in flight from Mitchell Field, Long Island, New York, to the government field at Washington might go unpunished because existing laws cannot be applied in such a case. This is the opinion of legal authority. It is stated at Army Air Service headquarters, in view of the non-existence of Federal regulation and control of aerial traffic. The slayer would escape on the plea of "non-jurisdiction" since it is practically impossible to establish jurisdiction in a flight traversing portions of the states of New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Delaware, Maryland and the district of Columbia. Conflict over the question of jurisdiction in a criminal case of the kind would certainly arise in any action against a person known to be responsible. It is declared. A marriage or other contract of agreement, or a birth or death during a flight over a group of states would involve difference of legal opinion. It is pointed out, for now no laws on the statute books cover situations which may become common in these days of increasing aerial transport. A seaplane operated beyond the three mile limit is absolutely beyond the law, and criminal acts committed during flight over the sea are wholly immune, the legal experts assert. Federal control and regulation of aerial communication and transportation is the only solution for conditions which will become extremely troublesome should the states attempt to enforce local regulatory statutes. It is said. Aerial traffic being practically interstate, it is insinuated that it must be regulated by the Federal government as interstate transport on land. Such control, the lawyers say, will in no way conflict with state police rights. Even airplane landing field is regarded as an interstate port, and in view of the Aeronautical Chamber of Commerce of America and other organizations supporting the "Wadsworth Hicks bill for Federal control of the air, such control alone can solve problems already pressing. The argument is also advanced that landing fields are potential international ports and as such must come under Federal jurisdiction. In support of this contention it is declared that the ship lines will in the near future be making trips from Europe without stop into the interior of the United States. A passenger may make an interstate trip say to St. Louis and there embark for a continuous voyage to Paris. Complications arising during air passage over a combination of state and Federal routes are likely to be innumerable and, it is said, would cause a stir over the question of jurisdiction no court or courts could ever hope to disentangle. The Federal aerial regulation and control bill which has been passed by the Senate is still before the House Interstate and Foreign Commerce Committee. Chairman Winslow is confident, however, that it will be enacted into law before the present session of Congress is ended. The bureau of control provided in the bill would be under the Department of Commerce.

Two Noted Revolutionaries.

At the age of 72, the death of M. Francis Kossuth occurred at Budapest on May 25, 1921. He was but eight years old when his famous father, Louis Kossuth, the great reform leader, had to flee from the country after the collapse of the Hungarian Revolution in 1849. The Austrians made the small boy a prisoner and kept him for a year in the fortress of Pressburg, as a "political offender." On his release he was taken to his father, who had been living in exile at Kutchin, in Asia Minor, and when the great patriot came to England, he brought his son with him and placed him in an English school. He afterwards visited France and Italy, and spent in the latter country several years as a civil engineer. It was not until the death of his father at Turin in 1854, that Francis Kossuth returned to Hungary and devoted himself to politics. He became the leader of the Party of Independence, and waged a strenuous war against the Austro-Hungarian cabinets until in 1866 a National Cabinet lasted three years, and on its recognition Francis Kossuth once more went into opposition. Owing to illness he did not play a prominent part in public life for some years before his death. He was twice married, first to an Englishwoman who died in 1837, then to the widow of his friend, Count Bentouisky.

Why We Wink.

WHEN WE DO IT WE WASH OUR EYES.

Have you ever tried to see how long you could go without winking? You will find it very difficult to carry on for more than a minute or so, and very uncomfortable, too. This winking business, you see, is very necessary. It is, in fact, an arrangement of Nature for keeping your eyeballs clean, moist and comfortable.

The eyelids might be called the automatic roller of the eye, only the fluid is not oil, but a somewhat salty mixture which is secreted by the tear glands. There is one of these glands at the inner corner of each eye. If you examine your eye by pulling down the lower eyelid with the finger, you can easily see the mouth of this little gland, no bigger than a pin prick. The passage from it connects with the nose, and that is why, when you have a bad cold, your eyes water so constantly.

It is absolutely necessary that you should wink, and wink fairly often. But you don't need to think about it. Your sub-conscious self sees to that. It is a process which, for want of a better word, we call instinctive. Winking is accomplished with even less conscious effort than breathing.

Some people wink more often than others. A nervous person may even wink as often, perhaps, as 50,000 thousand times during the sixteen waking hours of the day. In such case the eyelids travel about 25,000 inches in the day, and so we arrive at the rather startling fact that, in the case of a person fifty years old, his eyelids have travelled a total distance of more than seven thousand miles. A wink is not a long operation. It occupies altogether about two-fifths of a second. Even when you are reading, the process continues, but so rapid is the wink that you are not conscious of any interruption.

Haig and Barrie.

ST. ANDREWS INSTALLATIONS

The ceremonies in connection with the installation of Earl Haig as Chancellor and Sir James M. Barrie as Lord Rector of St. Andrew's University took place on Wednesday. Students of both sexes in their scarlet robes and trenchers, making splashes of colour in the sunshine, were early astr to impart vivacity to the formal entry into the town of Earl Haig. The Field-Marshal motor-drove from Mount Melville with his motor, Dr. Younger, the Chancellor's Assessor, and was met at the boundary by Dr. Irvine, Principal of the University, and Mr. Eason, president of the Students' Representative Council, and a large body of undergraduates. The motor cars were dispensed with and an open landau was requisitioned, but the horses were removed and their places taken by willing students, who manned the rope and enthusiastically dragged the carriage to the Principal's house. Here a family group gave welcome to the famous soldier, who then thanked the students for their attentions.

Earl Haig later unveiled the war memorial, which has been erected in the form of an arch inside the University Chapel. The function of installing the Chancellor and the Lord Rector took place in the Volunteer Hall in the presence of a large and distinguished gathering, with the students making their presence audible in the familiar manner. Principal Irvine occupied the chair at the outset of the proceedings, and performed the ceremony of installing Earl Haig as Chancellor.

Sir James Barrie, in his speech, was delightful and arresting. His matter was whimsical, mystical, elusive, with here and there a touch of biting wit and stinging sarcasm. His theme was "Courage," and he applied it to youth acquiring a knowledge of the things that cause world clashes.—Glasgow Weekly Herald, May 6th.




