

This has been an eventful week to Italy, and since the interests of Suropean nations are so blended, it has been no less to Europe. We may go still further and say, that since any revolution affecting the power of the Pope would be of vast and incalculaimportance to christendom as giv determinate preponderance to ing a Christians are divided, it has been a st moment to all the inhabitants of ementary principles of christianity. The rumors which have reached us are uncertain, and by no means to be relied on implicitly, but if we can believe them to be true we must believe that Pio Nono still sits on a secure attack of Italian volunteers by the military power of France, and that the intrepid old soldier, Garibaldi, is destined to see his hopes of making me the capital of a united Italy trodden in the dust, and all his valiant efforts of no present avail. Conand liberty loving spirit must have the obtaining of which his father had had succeeded in animating his daring followers with a spirit as disin terested and noble as his own.

The world wondered why Napoleon looked on with an apparently unconcerned eye, while the Italian volunteers

Italy for the protection of his Holiness and for the maintenance of his power, both as a spiritual and temporal Prince in the city that was once mistress of the world. But before hostilities were actually commenced, Napoleon submitted an ultimatum to the King of Italy, demanding that he should keep strictly by the terms of the Sepmber convention. Report has it now that Victor Emmanuel has succumb ed, and that in consequence the Garibaldians have withdrawn from Italian soil, thus losing all the fruits of their toils and their victories. Furthermore, it is stated that Garibaldi has more, it is stated that Batazzis, the Italian Prime Minister, has resigned, but no cause is assigned for the action of the latter. 


