EXPORT OF AMERICAN BREADSTUFFS.—During the last week there were shipped from New York—principally for the English market—13,517 barrels of flour, 174,974 bushels of wheat, 78,363 bushels of corn and 24,021 bushels of rye. This is equal to 350,000 bushels of grain, and occurring so soon after the harvest in both countries, shows that for some time to come, at least, there will be a healthy European demand for American breadstuffs. But as the crops will be good throughout Europe, it is not likely the demand will long continue as brisk as now, and the probabilities are that there will be a considerable fall in prices. The American grain and flour usually reaches the English market earlier than that from Hungary, Southern Russia and the Baltic, hence the briskness of demand now and the high prices which prevail. The grain crop is excellent in almost all parts of the United States, and this will have a strong tendency to ameliorate the financial difficulties of the country. It is estimated that the American surplus of grain will reach \$75,000,000 in gold. Add to this the value of the surplus cotton crop, and the above figures will be increased to \$150,000,000 in gold. This large amount of exports cannot but produce a most favorable effect upon American finances.—*Hamilton Times.*

TRACTION ENGINES.—A traction engine, lately purchased in England by Messrs. Gooderham & Worts, Toronto, was on board the *Ardencote* which went ashore at Fox river on the 13th inst., and is consequently lost. Another is expected however, to be in the spring consigned for sale to Mr. W. Sutherland Taylor of Toronto.

Infinitely more advantageous would it be to the student, since his full course of tuition is already paid for, to incur the comparatively small additional expense of a few weeks board in order to make himself completely master of the course; and thus, by a small present outlay, qualify himself for some lucrative situation. The crudeness that such haste entails is highly detrimental, not only to the student himself, but also to the College where he graduates; and, besides, it brings opprobrium on Commercial Colleges generally. The common practice, therefore, of holding out this crowding system as an inducement to students is most deceptive and highly reprehensible.
