Sheep Killed by Cats.

The residents in a small settlement several miles back of Buckingham Village have been for some weeks past in consternation at the loss of their sheep. Night after night the flocks were visited by some blood-thirsty animal, and the settlers awoke in the morning to find one of their best lambs killed, each animal bearing the same mark, a small hole below the ear, through which the lamb was bled to death.
