London, Feb. 10.—Twenty-seven members of the new British Parliament were chosen yesterday, making a total number, thus far elected, of five hundred and thirty-six. Of these, two hundred and eighty-three are Conservatives, and two hundred and fifty-three are Liberals and Home Rulers. Conservatives have been returned for eighty seats which were occupied by Liberals in the last Parliament, and the Liberals have replaced twenty-eight Conservatives.

The number of members returned from Ireland, up-to-this morning, is 55. These are divided as follows: 31 Home Rulers, 16 Conservatives, and 8 Liberals.

It is announced this morning that a reconciliation has been effected between Mr. Disraeli and the Marquis of Salisbury and the Earl of Carmarvon, and that the Marquis and Earl have consented to assist Disraeli to form his Ministry.

The cash surplus at the end of 1873 amounted to \$4,672,482.67. Of this \$4,894,534.62 were invested or at deposit, and \$277,948.05 in hand.

### The Narrow Gauge Railways.

The feeling is prevalent, in more than one quarter, that the bill introduced by Mr. Crooks, the other night, respecting the Railway Subsidy Pund, has chieflybeen drawn up in the interest of the Narrow Guage Railways, which are now and for some time have been in a shaky condition. The suspicion receives a sort of indirect confirmation in an article in Monday's Leader, which, however is no great authority on such matters. In speaking of the burdens which are likely ere long to fall on the Ontario Treasury, it says:—

"The failure of our narrow gauge railways to earn sufficient money to pay expenses, in a very short period will be added to the list. At present, while these railways are continuing to draw their bonuses from the several municipalities, there seems to be nothing wrong, but when that scuree of supply is exhausted, what will they depend upon to keep them from becoming bankrupt? A time may come, and in our opinion that time is not very far off, when the 1stiways will have to depend upon the Government for aid or else stop altegether. It is just possible that the Government will be obliged to purchase the whole system of narrow gauge railroadslately constructed and in course of construction in the various parts of the Province."

This is a rather alarming picture, but it is only a frank confession of what has for some time been known to be the real position of these railways. That they are on the verge of bankruptcy appears certain, and that the whole system is a signal failure is now proved beyond a doubt. We never had any faith in the schemes of the railway speculators in Toronto, but their unsoundness has been demonstrated sooner than most people expected. The proposition to hand them over to the Ontario Government is an exceedingly cool one, which they will not think of entertaining without the consent and approval of the people. It would be a manifest injustice to a large portion of these Toronto railway speculators, for it is evident they mean mischief of some kind.




