A Slight Indisposition

MALS. — When animals are found dead they should never be allowed to re-main on the surface of the earth, ex-posed to the air filling it with unple-asaut odors, impregnated with disease and perhaps death, but should at once be removed and converted into a fertilizer for the growth of vegetation. This may be done by composition with muck or dry earth. Place the animal on a bed of earth say 5 or 6 inches in thickness, sprinkle over it a quantity of quick lime, and cover immediately with about 15 inches of earth, and in a few months you will have from 8 to 12 loads of good rich fertilizer, which will be exceedingly valuable as a top dress-ing for grass lands or grain crops.
