The Price of Flour. A recent editorial in one of the Sunday editions of the Boston Herald makes the following comment upon the price of flour, which appear to us to be sound.

The price of flour and hence bread will be higher during the next few months than it has been during the last twelve, will hardly admit of doubt, and yet we are tempted to doubt whether the sudden advance that has been made in the price of grain and flour can be sustained for more than a few weeks. It almost always happens that the market of a staple commodity is overdone, and so far as retailers are concerned, the price is usually maintained after the cause for the increase has passed away. But dealers in wheat and flour have to make a profit on the grain, which, when duly brought to bear, cannot fail to reduce prices to at least a reasonable level. The advance in the price of wheat in Chicago has been very largely speculative. How far these increases are justified by the shortage of the wheat crop, the future alone can determine, but it seems to us not improbable that a place the average selling price of wheat at a point considerably below that which it now holds, and that the western millers, having better opportunities afforded them of purchasing their grain at lower prices for flour than those which have during the last few days been given out.

The commission of inquiry into the charges made against the leader of the Irish party in the Imperial House of Commons, by the London Times, is now in progress. According to the reports received thus far the case is favorable to Parnell. The most eminent counsel is retained on both sides.
