COURTS ENFORCING FOREST PROTECTION

Jail sentences and heavy fines for causing forest fires are now being applied more frequently by Canadian courts. For the first time on record, an Ontario settler was sent to prison recently for defying the law regarding the taking of precautions before clearing land with fire. His carelessness caused a loss of millions of feet of timber. Five New Brunswick sportsmen were fined fifty dollars each for leaving their camp-fire burning, causing thereby a serious timber conflagration. Heavy fines and jail sentences are also the rule with many Quebec magistrates who are determined to stamp out the prevalent carelessness of the public in regard to forest destruction.



CANADIAN FOREST INVESTIGA. TIONS

While in all districts where there

are technically trained foresters located there are observations being made and investigations of a more or less detailed character being carried on, the organized scientific work in these directions has been mainly centred at the forest experimental station at Petawawa, Ont., and at the forest nursery station at Indian Head, Sask. At Indian Head, a large number of plantations of small area, in some cases of single species and in other cases of various mixtures, have been in existence for some years. Careful records have been kept from year to year of the growth and development of the trees and there is being steadily accumulated a store of information that will be of the greatest value in future planting work

EXPERIMENTAL AND RESEARCH WORK IN GRAIN AND FIELD

CROPS of the Dominion Department of Agri- amounts received: culture, has made great strides in Canada during recent years. It is estimated, for instance, that the discovery of Marquis wheat by the Cereal Division of the Experimental Farms branch has enriched the wheat growers of the three Prairie Provinces by \$20,000,000 annually, and that the introduction of Preston. Stanley and Huron wheats into the other Provinces has brought about a gain of at least half a million dollars yearly. But wheat is not the only grain that has profited immensely through the work carried on at the Experimental Farms. By the introduction of Daubeney, Victory, and in particular Banner oats, a gain has been made of over \$9,000,000 annually, while other new grains, such as barley, flax and peas, have proven responsible for an increase in value of \$3,000,000 annually. All of these must and will develop in still greater profit to the country. Experiments n plant breeding work with garden and field crops have led to the discovery of many new varieties, such as the Melba apple, Early Malcolm corn, Alacrity tomato, etc. Hardy varieties of tree fruits have been proven of good growth in the Prairie Provinces, while some valuable discoveries have been made in forage crops, notably a perennial red clover. OF SOILS MAY BE DECREASED

(Experimental Farms Note) A soil is productive in proportion plants the elements required for the plants' development. If we look upon a soil as a bank or storehouse from which something may be drawn, we will realize that the producing power is largely in proportion to what is on deposit. Every atom of phosphorus or potash that we remove from a given area of soil leaves the soil just so much poorer. So if we keep on taking the essential or crop limiting elements from the soil by means of crop removal, the producing capacity of the soil will be reduced, just the same as a cash bank deposit will be reduced if something is drawn out and no corresponding return made. Neglect to return the required elements to any soil will lead to soil poverty. The crop-yielding capacity of a soil may be greatly reduced by poor plowing, poor tillage, and neglect to practise the best methods of soil management tor the district.
