TORONTO, ONT.—At a recent meeting of the council of the Canadian Institute, it was decided to recommend to the Institute the erection of a building in the rear of the present site, at an estimated cost of \$6,000.—Mr. J. Hudson, 95 Brunswick avenue, wants tenders for the labor required in erecting the brick and stone work of three houses.—A project is on foot by the members of the Caledonian Society to erect a monu-

ment to Robert Burns, at a cost of about \$25,000. The erection of a Burns Institute and public hall is thought by some to be more advisable.—At a recent meeting of the University Senate, instructions were given for the preparation of plans for a building for the departments of chemistry, mineralogy and geology, at a cost of \$60,000.—Mr. T. **USEFUL HINTS.**

The Austrian Hydrographic Bureau adopts the following method of making paper transparent for copying drawings: The sheet of paper being placed over the drawing to be copied, it is lightly rubbed with a ball of cotton saturated with pure benzine. The tracing can then be readily made, owing to the resulting transparency, and the benzine on evaporating, leaves the paper opaque as before, and without any trace of odor. Absolute purity of the benzine, however, must be insisted upon to secure good results.

**RAPID BLUE PRINTING PAPER.**—Mr. F. H. Latimer, of Vancouver, B.C., writes to *Engineering News* that a year or two ago, while experimenting with blue printing processes, more particularly with the object of getting bright blues and clear white lines, he found that after the usual washing a bath of quite dilute acid, such as hydrochloric, or, better, oxalic, would often greatly improve the clearness of the prints, a marked cause of dirty blues being a gradual altering of the solutions even when kept separate till just before using, though poor quality of the ammonia-citrate of iron seemed to have much to do with the results.

Replying to an enquiry as to what is the load upon a fireproof floor with four-inch brick arches, levelled up with concrete between the beams, the *Chicago Journal of Commerce* says: "Where the floor is for offices, or storage of light goods, the load will run about 70 pounds per square foot for the weight of the arches, concrete, ceiling and flooring; and when loaded with a crowd of people, 80 pounds per square foot more—this being in addition to the weight of the beams themselves."

A writer in the *Clay Worker* says: "It is a well-established principle in all engineering, that, however strong a building or superstructure may be, a single piece or pin of inferior strength in proportion to its size, makes the entire structure correspondingly weak. How forcibly, then, are we reminded of this in the erection of brick structures, for no matter how good the material, or how well the brick—no matter how careful that everything be square and plumb, in the use of mortar, if not made and laid in accordance with an established rule to preclude the possibility of cracking, if a single course be laid in poor cement, a crack ensues. That entire wall must be weak in proportion, and as is often the case, a corresponding crack follows the companion wall; these walls will be nearly as easy to collapse, and much more easy to blow down, than if laid one brick upon another, joints well broken without a trowel full of mortar."
