## RULE日 <br> MEMBIMRSAIP.

1. The mambers of the Agrinultural Societles of the sevesal Townahips within the Connty, or Electosal Division, or Unised Counties, wherein the Annual Joxhibition may be held, and the membuss of the County or Elactornl Division Socidy; whall be aloo members of the Association for that year, provided the Agrionltural Societien of the nald Townships, or ite Society of the said Coupty, or Bifectoral Division, or-Unitod Countien, blatll devete their whole findo for the year, fncimiling the Governmenti Gratt; in aid of the Acworiation, enid nhell priy over the same, accompanied with a lity uf the mombers of each anch Soblety, to the Tremburer of the $A$ meciation, two weeke provioas to the Erbilbitom; and provided also that the sum so paid over shall not be less than one diollar for each member of any such Society.
2. The members of the Board of Agricultire, and of the Board of Arts and Manufactures, the Presidents and Mioe-Presidents of all lawfully organized County Agricultural Societies, and of ull Horticultural Socleties, are members of the Amsociation for Upper Canads, ex-officic. The geyment o? one dollar and upwaris constitutes a formon member of the Association for one your, and ton doliars for life, when given for that specife object, and not as a contribution to the locial finds.
3. Membors can enter articles for competition in every department of the Exhibition, at any time previous to the dates below mentioned.

## ENTMRLES.

4. No one but a member shall be allowed to comipate for prizes, except in class 41, and section 10 of ctares 44.
5. All entries must be made on printed forms, which may be obtatined of the Secretaries of Agcicultaral Eocietien, or of Meohanics' Inatifatei' throughout the Province, free of charge. These forme are to be filled up and signed by the exhibitor, enclowing a dollar for momberahip, 'and tenif to the Socretary of wha Board of Ayricnlture, Teronto, previous to or on the following nameal daten:-

7. In the classes of Blood Horses uht pare: bred cattle, full pedigrees, properly cortod, must aceompany the entry. No animily witho allowed to compete as pure-bred, uwh wey possess regular Stud or Herd Book pedigrees, or gatisfictory evidence be produced that they are directly dencended from such stock. In this class of Durham cattle particularly, no animal mll be entered for competition, anless the petligrien of the same bo first inserted in tha unglish, Atmerlcan, or Canadian Herd Book, or in the Upper Canada Stock Register, kept' at the office of the Board of Agricultare.
8. Grain, Fidd Roois, and other Ferm Products, Agriculidural Implements, Ma vidury and Manufacd wres gerierally, must be entere il grevious to or on Safarday, September 1st, threo weeks preceding the Show.
19. Hortioultural Products, Ladies' Work, the Fino Arts, do., may be entered up to Saturday, September 15th, one clear week preceding the Show.
10. Exhititors are particularly requested to talice notice that it is absolutely requibito that the entries be made at the datien abovo memtioned, in order to asord. suficiont time to examino the entry papern, and to correwpond with parties, where necessary, for the correction of orrors and omlations.
11. In the Live Stock classes, the entry must In every instance be made in the name of the bona flie owner; and unless this rule be observed no premium will be awarded, or if awarded, will be withheld.
12. In all the other classes, entries must be made in the names of the producers or maputacturers only. If any person shall enter an article for exhibition as produced or manufactured by himmolf, when it hus not really been so, he rhall forieil may premium which may be awarded the article, and be precluded from exhibiting in future.
13. In all the departments the competition is open to exhibitors from any part of the world. without reservation.
14. Manufacturarsare requested to furnish with their articies exhibited, a statement of the quantity they can produce, or supply, and the price, tor the information of the Judges, whose decision will be based on the combination of quallty, style and price, and the adaptation of the article to the purpose or purposes for which it is intended.
15. No person shail be aliowed to enter for exhibition more than one specimen in any section of a class, unless the additional article be of a distinct named variety, or pattern, from the first.. This rule not to apply to aninals, but to apply to all kinds of grain, vegetable products, fruit, manufactured articles, \&c., in which each additional specimen wouid necessarily be procisely similar to the first. No exhibitor in the Arts and Manufactures Department shall be awarded more than one prize in any one section of the same class.
16. Extra Entries.-Every article must be entered under some one of the headings in the regular list, when possible, but if any article is of a distinct character from anything specified in the list, it may then be entered in the extra section of that class with which it most nearly corresponds. No article, however, will be allowed to be entered as an extra for want of sufficient quantity, or number, or any uther similar defect, when of the same kind or variety as anything named in the list; in such a case the article cannot be exhibited.
17. All Agricultural and Horticultural products musi be the growth of the present year. Manufactured articles or works of Art which bave been awarded prizes at any previous Provincial Exhibition shall not be entered in competition for the prizes named in the prize list for this year, but shall be awarded diplomas, if, in the opinion of the judges, such articles are superior to any others exhiblted, and are deemed worthy of the same.
18. On the entry of each animal or article, a card will be furnished the exhibltor specifying the class, the section, the number oi the entry, and the name of the exhibitor. which card must remain attached to such animal or article during the Exhibition.
transport of articles, placlig them on exhlBITION, $\angle \mathrm{ND}$ CHARGE OF THEM WHILE THERE.
19. All specimens in the Fine Arts Class must be delivered on the grounds not later than Friday, the 21st of September, and all articles, other than Live Stock, not later than Monday the 24th. Live Stock must all be on the ground not later than Tuesday, 25 th, at 9 a.m. Articles or animals arriving after these hours will not be allowed to compete. Exhibitors of machinery and other heavy articles are requested to have them on the grounds as far as possible during the week preceding the Show.
20. Exhibitors must provide for the delivery of their articles upon the Show Ground. The Association cannot, in any case, make provision for their transportation, or be subjected to any expense therefor, either in their delivery at, or returs from the grounds. All the expenses connected therewith must be provided for by the exhibitors themselver.
21. Articles not accompanied by their owners may be addressed to the care of the Superintendent of the Exhibition, who will receive them on their being delivered ai the grounds, but in no case will such articles be brought on the grounds and placed on exhibition, except by and at the expense of the owners or their authorized agents.
22. Exhibitors, on arriving with their articles, will apply to the Superintendent of the grounds, who will be stationed within the entry gate, and will inform them where the articles are to be placed.
23. Exuibitors will, at all times, give the necessary personal attention to whatever they may have on exhibition, and at the close of the Show take entire charge of the same.
24. No articles or stock exhibited will be allowed to be removed from the grounds till the close of the Exhibition, cn Friday afternoon, at two o'clock.
25. While the Directors will take every possible precaution, noder the circumstances, to ensure the safety of articles sent to the Exhibition, yet they wish it to be distinctly understood that the owners themselves must take the risk of exhibiting them; and that should any article be accidentaliy injured, lost, or. stolen, the Directors will give all the essistance in their power towerds the recovery of the same, but will not make any payment for the value thereof.
steamboats, railioads, customs.
26. The Association will make such favorable arrangements as are found practicable with Steamboat and Railroad proprietors for carrying articles and passengers at reduced rates.
27. Arrangements will be made with the Customs Department for the free entry of articles for competition.
admassion to the arounds.
28. As it has been found absolutely necessary to change the system of admlssion into the grounds, menbers' tickets, good for the whole week of the Show, have been discontinued.
29. Each member, on paying his subscription, will be furnished with four small admission tlckets, each of which will admit the holder once, and must be given np at the gate on passing into a grounds. By economy in the use of the f. ickets, they can be made to last during the Show ; but if a member shall have used them all, and still desires admission, he will have to purchase a single admission ticket in the same manner as a non-member. Life-members will be furnished, as heretofore, with tickets or badges adınitting them during the Show. Delegates from Socleties, and members of the Press, will also be furnished with complimentary admission badges or tickets, as heretofore.
30. The entry tickets upon animals or articles will admit the persor bringing them to the Snow Grounds for exhibition, along with such animals or articies, without the use of any other ticket. Afterwards such parties must be provided with proper admission tickets.
31. Necessary attendants upon stock and articles belonging to exhibitors will be furnished with admission tickets with their names written npon them, which tlcket will be good at the Exchibitors', Gate only, during the Show.

Tickets of admission to those who are not members will be issued on and after Tuesday mornlng, at 25 cents each-one such ticket to be given up at the gates each time of admission, on Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday. Children under 14 years of a ; e , half price. Carriages and horsemen wlll not be admitted. All horses for exhibltion purposes shall only be ridden or drlven whlle being exhibited, and in the ring.

## JUDGES $\triangle$ ND TEEIR DCTIES

33. The judges will be appointed by the Conncil of the Association previous to the Exhibltion, and wlll receive a circular informlng them of the fact, and inviting them to act.
34. The jndges are requestel to report themselves at the Secretary's Office of that Department in whlch they are scting, presenting their circnlar of appointment, immediately on their arrival at the grounds.
35. The judges of the Agricultural Department will meet at the committee room on the grounds, and the judges of the Arts Department at the office in the Crystal Palace, on Tuesday, September 19th. at 9 o'clock a.m., with the exception of the judges on Fine Arts, who will meet on Monday at the same hour, for the purpose of organizing and immediately entering upon their daties, and will taen be furnished with the committee books containing the numbers of the entries in each class. On receiving their class books, they will also be furnished with blank prize tickets, which they shall fll up and affix in each section as suon as they she'l have finally determined their awards.
36. No person shall act as a judge in any class in which he may be an exhibitor.
37. In addition $t$ the stated premiums offered for articles. enumerated in the list, the judges will have the power to award discretionary premiums for such articles not enumerated, as they may consider worthy, and the Directors will determine the amount of premium.
38. In the Flne Arts and Mechanical Departmeats, Diplomas will be awarded, in addition to the money prizes, to any specimen evincing great skill in its production, or deemed otherwise worthy of such a distinction, on its being recommended by the judges and approved of by the Committee, to whom all such matters shall be referred.
39. In the absence of competition in any of the Classes, or if the stoclc or articles exhibited be of inferior quality the judges are instructed to award only such premiums as they think the articles deserving of. They will exercise their discretion as to whether they will award the first, second, third, or any premium.
40. Each award must be written in a plain, careful manner, on the blank page opposit, the number of the entry; and the reasons for the award should be stated when convenient.
41. No person will be cllowed to interfere with the judges while in the discharge of their duties. Exhibitors so interfering will forfeit their rights to any premium to which they might otherwise be entilled.

## EXTRACTS FROM BY-IAW.

42. "The judges shall, in the execution of their duties, be careful to act with the most rigld im-
partially ; shall make their entries in a clear and conspicuous manner, in all cases of doubt or difflculty referring freety to the Secretary, to any member of the Council, or to the Snperintendent; and when they have completed their reports, shall sign and deiiver their books to the Secretary of the department to which they belong.
43. "Upon the discovery of any frand, deception, or dishonagt practice, either in the preparation, ownersulp, or of any representation concerning any article exhibited, which may have affected, or have been intended to affect, the decision of the judges, the Council shall have power to withhold the payment of any prize awarded. and may prohibit any such party or parties from exhibiting in any class for one or more years, and may also publish the names of such persons, or not, as may be deemed most expedient."

## delegates, THE'ANNUAL MEETING, \&C.

44. Delegates and members of the press are requested and expected to report themselves at the Secretary's office immediately on their arrival, when the delegates will be furnished with official badges, and the members of the press will be afforded all the usual facillties.
45. The Annual Meeting of the Directors of the Association will take place on the gronnds on Friday morning, Sept. 28th, at 10 o'vlock.
46. Delegates from County Societies desiring to obtain a portion of the Canada Company Prize wheat for their counties, will please apply to the Secretary for it before leaving the Exhlbition, and take it with them from thence.

## the general superintendent.

47. The General Superintendent will have the entire supervision of the grounds and the arrangements of the Exhibltion. He will have an office upon the ground, where all persons having inquiries to make in relation to the arrangements will apply.

PAYEN THE PREMIUMS.
48. The Treasurer will be prepared to commence paying the premiums on Saturday, Sept. 29th, at 9 a.m., and parties who shall have prizes awarded them are particularly requested to apply for them before leaving Toronto, or leave a witten order with some person to recelve them, stating the articles for which prizes are claimed.
49. Persons entitled to cash premiums must apply for thern at the Secretary's office of that department in which they are awarded, who will give Orders on the Treasurer for the amount.
50. These orders must be endorsed, as they will be payable to order, not to bearer, and on presentation to the Treasurer, properly endorsed. will be paid either in cash or by cheque on the bank.
51. Orders for premiums not applied for on Suturday as above, will be given by the Secretaries, and the amount forwarded by the Treasurer, on receipt of proper instructions.

## miscellanieocs.

52. Provender will be provided by the Association for live stock at cost price. For information, exhibitors will apply to the Superintendent of the grain and fodder department at his office.
53. Auctioneers will be on the ground after the premiums are announced, for the purpose of selling any animal or article which shall have been exhibited, and which the owner may wish to dirpose of, and every faciilty will be afforded for the transaction of business.
54. In case the Directors shall require any partioular information in reference to animnis or articies taking first prizes, the owners will be expected to transmit it when requested to do so.

## PROGRAMME FOR THE WEEK.

1. Monday, Sept. 24th, will be devoted to the awarding of prizes in Fine Arts, and to the final receiving of other articles for exinibition, and their proper arrangement. None but officers and members of the Association, judges, exhibitors, aud necessary attendants wiil be admitted.
2. Tuesday, 25th-The judges in all the ciasses except the Fine Arts will meet in their respective Committee Rooms at 9 A.M., and will commence their duties forthwith. On receiving their ciass books, they will be also furnished with the blank prize tickets, which they shall fill up and affix in each section so soon as they shall have finally determined their awards. The First Prize Tickets will be Red; the second Blue; the third Yeliow ; the fourth White ; Extras, Green. On completing the class, the judges will report to the Secretary of the praper deportment. The main Exhibition Building wiil bes closed all this
day for the purpose of affording the judges an opportunity for discharging their dukes properly. Non-members admitted to the grounds this day on payment of 25 cents each time.
3. Wednesday, 26 th. -The judgees of the various ciasses will compiete their awards as early in the day as possibie. All the buildings and grounds will be open to visitors. Admission this day the same as yesterday.
$\therefore$ Thursday, 27 th .-Admission this day the same as yesterday. The President will deliver his Address from the Grand Stand at 3 o'clock.
4. Friday, 28th.-The Annual Meeting of the Directors of the Association, for the purpose of electing officers, deciding upon the piace of holding the next Exhibition; and other business, will take place at 10, A.M., in the Committee Room. At 2, r.M., the Exhibition will be con. sidered officially closed, after which no one wiil be admitted into the Crystal Palace, and exhibitors may commence to take away their property. Admission to-day the same as yesterday.
5. Saturday, 29th.-The Treasurer will commence paying the premiums at 9, A.M. Exbibitors will remove all their. property from the grounds and buildings. The gates will be kept closed as long as necessary, and none will be admitted except those who can show that they bave business to attend to.
