

NO AGREEMENT IS LIKELY BETWEEN LIGHT PEOPLE

Fugitive Shackleton Gives Himself Up—Body Found in Bay Still Unidentified.

Hamilton, Aug. 11.—J. M. Lowry, vice-president of the Dominion Gas Company, left this city for Pittsburgh this evening, without having made any arrangement with the Ontario gas companies with regard to taking over their franchise. He did not seem to think an agreement would be made between the companies.

Gives Himself Up.

After being a fugitive from justice for two months James Shackleton gave himself up to the police this morning at 4:10, when he went to No. 3 police station, Shackleton and Peter Williams, who were both employed at New's brick yard, had some words, which led to a fight. Shackleton took a pie and struck Williams on the head, inflicting a serious wound. For several days it was thought that Williams would die, but after a couple of weeks he recovered and is now about again. Shackleton made his escape, but for the last month has been living in the ravines in the west end of the city. He became very tired of that life, hunted continually by the police, and decided to face the charge of aggravated assault that had been laid against him. He was remanded till Monday, when he will be tried.

The identity of the woman who was found in the bay Wednesday afternoon is as much a mystery as ever. The body was buried this morning. It was thought that she was Miss Arnold of Waterbury, but her parents received a letter from her from Cleveland, yesterday.

PRINCE LOUIS AT QUEBEC GUNS THUNDER SALUTE

Six of the Premier Ships of Royal Navy Make Imposing Spectacle.

Quebec, Aug. 11.—Amid the thunder of guns from the citadel, the ships of the second cruiser squadron, under command of H. S. H. Prince Louis of Battenburg, arrived in the harbor of Quebec at 4:30 o'clock this afternoon and cast anchor to remain for a visit which promises to be of the greatest interest, and in honor of which the citizens of the ancient capital have made preparations on a grand scale for a round of festivities such as have been seldom witnessed here.

Upon the arrival of the fleet the admiral, Prince Louis, was received by a salute from the citadel and the salute was replied to by the flagship. Every point of vantage overlooking the river was crowded with spectators to witness the spectacle of six of the premier ships of the royal navy coming up the St. Lawrence.

Admiral Prince Louis with his staff landed about 6 o'clock and drove up to the governor-general's residence to make his official visit to his excellency and returned back to the ship about 7 o'clock.

The governor-general, Lord Grey, will go on board the flagship to-morrow morning.

WILL ADD TO STAFF.

The railways are beginning to make preliminary arrangements for the handling of the heavy volume of traffic that will come with the opening of the fair. The special rates will go into force on Aug. 28, and will be continued till Sept. 5.

In order to handle the immensely augmented volume of freight and baggage, from 40 to 50 temporary men will be taken on, and this number, together with the emergency employees of the express and transfer companies, will bring the number of extra help around the Union Station to about 100.

LIFE CO. URGES INQUIRY WILL BEGIN OCTOBER 1

Federal Authorities Hope to Have Co-Operation of States in Examination.

New York, N.Y., Aug. 11.—Insurance Commissioner Folk of Tennessee announced to-day that an inter-state examination of life insurance companies would commence on Oct. 1. The New York Life Insurance Co. will be examined first.

Mr. Folk said the conference was held at the invitation of President McCall. He added: "Mr. McCall stated that the company would welcome a full and complete examination of its affairs and that if interstate examinations of life insurance companies were to be made, the New York Life Co. would be the first examined."

"It being the desire of the commission to avoid any conflict with the work of the New York legislative committee, it was decided that the examination should begin on Oct. 1. It was assumed that the New York Life Co. committee will have completed its inquiry into the affairs of the New York Life by that time."

Mr. Folk said that he and his associates hoped to secure the complete cooperation of actuaries and other examinations into the affairs of the insurance companies made at regular periods.

"We regard our arrangements made to-day as a step toward the realization of our plan. There has been a great deal of clamor for federal supervision of the insurance companies. Our plan is to completely carry out what would be a practical substitute."

LABOR DAY ARRANGEMENTS.

Marshals of Parade Are Appointed—Trade and Labor Notes.

When the shareholders of the Labor Temple met for the reception of the annual report they will be cheered with a statement showing that the venture has been a success and that in addition to providing suitable accommodation for the numerous labor bodies at a smaller cost than under the old arrangements, of excitements there is a substantial cash balance to the good and the union.

The Labor Day committee had a session last night and chose the marshals for the big parade. C. J. Saunders will be chief marshal again this year, and his deputies will be R. Lee, J. A. McIntyre, R. Totten, Owen Finnegan, Wm. Haight and E. A. Skill. Returns have been received from nearly all the unions stating what part they intend to take in the demonstration. It was decided to select tickets through special delegates from the committee and also through representatives of the local unions.

There was a big meeting of the Plumbers, Steam and Gas Fitters' Union last night and they talked over Labor Day proposals. It was decided to engage the band of the Governor-General's Body Guard, to have floats and to wear a distinctive blue uniform. The plumbers will have their annual excursion at St. Catharines.

The Grand Trunk road houses at Mimico is nearing completion, and the work of laying down tracks will soon be begun. Resident Engineer Somerville expects that the new structure, which will be one of the largest of its kind on the system, will be in a condition for use in a couple of months. The preliminary leveling was started about a year ago, and the roundhouse could have been finished ere this, were there a pressing need, says Mr. Somerville. As it is, the work has been going on in a leisurely fashion.

PROMINENT BARRISTER DEAD.

Medowall Thomson Fell From Car—Concussion of Brain Followed.

As the result of a fall from a car on Monday evening last, Robert Medowall Thomson, the well-known barrister, died on Thursday night. Mr. Thomson was returning from Aurora, where he had been visiting at the farm of his father-in-law, Sir William Mulock. He was about to alight from a car at the corner of Huron and Fleet streets, but before he was safely on the ground the car started forward with a jolt. He was thrown violently forward to the pavement and was picked up unconscious. He was taken to his home at 129 Lombard avenue, where he lay until Thursday night suffering from concussion of the brain.

The greater part of Mr. Thomson's 39 years had been spent in Toronto. He was for some time a member of the firm of Mulock, Mulock & Lee, but latterly had carried on an independent practice in the Canada Permanent Building. He leaves a widow, and three children, Sir William Mulock, and three children.

The funeral will be held from the family residence to Mount Pleasant Cemetery at 2 o'clock this afternoon. The services will be conducted by Rev. Canon Welch, and it is expected that a large number of Mr. Thomson's friends will be present to pay a last tribute.

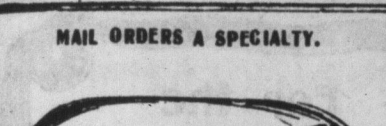

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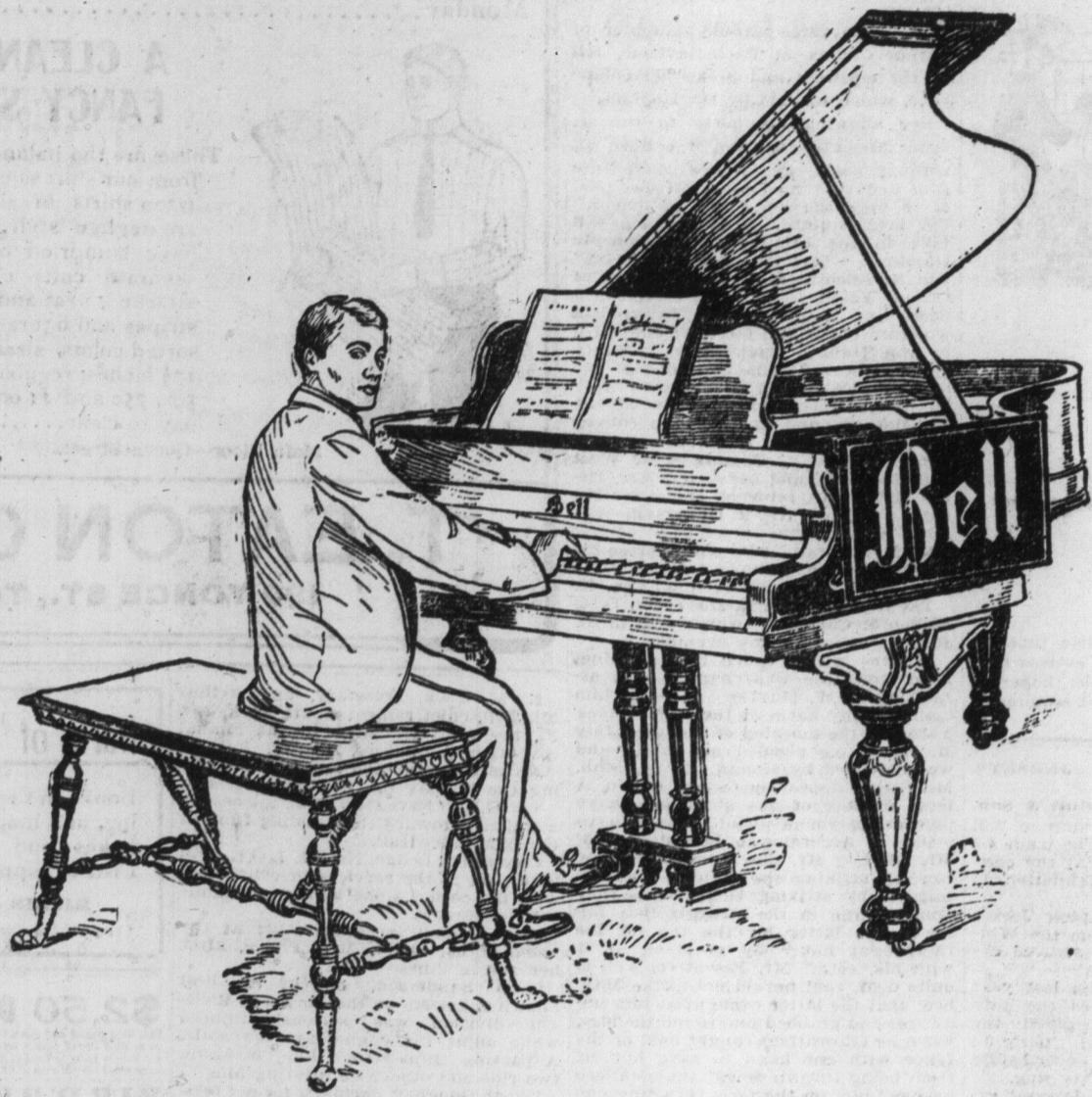

PARBOILED IN SOAP BLAZE
FIRE FIGHTERS IN PERIL

Brave Men Carried From Building Unconscious From Poisonous Fumes.

New York, Aug. 11.—Twenty firemen were carried, burned and unconscious, from boiling soap, five of them, very badly scorched, from a fire in W. H. Daggett's Soap factory, on West 12th-street, to-day. Tanks containing 70,000 gallons of soap fats exploded after a fire in the three-story building had been brought under control.

For five hours the firemen fought this new danger, crawling on their stomachs on the floor into the building, unable to stand in a poisonous cloud of smoke, which poured from the fiery soap greases and continually exposed to little rivers of the scorching fluid which flowed out of the building.

Water seemed, for the first three hours, to have no other effect on the burning soap vats than to cause them to flow more freely, with great peril to the fire fighters.

Before the fire was under control, six of the firemen had been carried to the hospital, many others, who did not go, were barely able to walk. The loss was estimated at about \$50,000.

The soap greases continued to burn all day, and by nightfall the fire was under control, 50 unconscious firemen had been taken from the poisonous smoke by means of blankets and many heroic rescues were made.

Fire Lieutenant Martin Mahoney swam thru a vat of hot lye to save Fireman Clancy of engine 20, who had fallen unconscious into a vat of lye. Both the fireman and lieutenant were carried with the fall of a 6000-pound safe thru the door into the cellar room, where a strong lye had been formed from the water and soap materials flooding the building. Clancy was crushed and internally injured during the fall.

Twelve hours after the start of the fire a crew of thirty fresh men from the fourth and sixth divisions filled the vacancies in the firemen's ranks made either by those who were taken to hospital or those too weak from successive fainting spells to work any longer.

TO BE HEARD PRO AND CON.

Printers Eight Hour Day Scheme to Be Discussed by Both Sides.

Before they close their convention here, the International Typographical Union will listen to addresses from Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, and from G. H. Ellis, president of the United Typographers of America. The typographers are the boss printers and the capitalists of the typographic industry.

The eight-hour day movement on Tuesday, and President Ellis speaks on the same subject on the same day. A third visitor to the typographical congress will be Frederick Driscoll, president of the Newspaper Publishers' Association, a famous man in his line of work, and a man who will be royally welcomed by the convention.

Next in importance is the matter of an agreement with the press telegraphers. J. Smith, president of that body, who is now in town, said yesterday that a union of the two bodies would be beneficial to both sides, and that the committee discussing the matter would see the fruits of their work at the telegraphers' convention in May of next year.

CUTS OFF TEN DESSERTS.

Comptroller Finds Table Set for Employees Too Lavish.

Reading, Aug. 11.—County Comptroller Livingston says the table set for the use of the employees and officials of the almshouse is too lavish. Last month \$22 was spent in fruit and melons for the employees' table alone. This included 140 dozen bananas.

Mr. Livingston dined at the home yesterday and said there were three kinds of melons, besides thickens, and eleven kinds of desserts.

RELIGION IN SCHOOLS.

Anglican Synod of Rupert's Land to Secure a Syllabus.

Calgary, Alberta, Aug. 11.—The Anglican Synod of Rupert's Land, in session here, have appointed a committee to interview representative bodies in the new provinces, seeking to secure a syllabus of religious instruction or Christian ethics in the public schools. The synod also passed a resolution endorsing a national hymnal for the church in Canada.

SCHOOL TEACHERS RESIGN.

R. N. Davey, assistant master, Park school; W. N. Colvin, assistant master, Dunbrin-street school; Miss L. L. Dixon, Palmerston-avenue; Miss H. A. Cross, Parkdale; and Miss M. E. Green, Gladstone-avenue school, have tendered their resignation to the secretary of the board of education. Inspector Duffin-street school, and approval of the management committee, their action in turn to meet with the approval of the trustees. Ill-health is alleged as the cause of Mr. Colvin's resignation.

Man Makes Strange Will, Telling What Shall Be Done With Body.

Morristown, N. J., Aug. 11.—The will of Richard D. Fonda, who died in New York, but who had a winter home here, and who was noted for his eccentricities, was filed to-day.

It provided that Mr. Fonda's body, "be subjected to such tests as science and medical knowledge have proven to be most effectual in determining life to be extinct, but not such tests as would extinguish any sparks of life that might still remain in the body, and that the body shall not be buried until it is absolutely certain that no life exists therein, and under no circumstances, nor for any pretext whatever, even tho' it be in the interest of science, shall an autopsy be performed;

WOMAN'S INSANE ACT.

New Albany, Ind., Aug. 11.—Mrs. Emma Winstandley, wife of Chester Winstandley, to-day drowned her eight-year-old daughter, Ruth, in a bathtub, walked into the adjoining room and shot her husband, who was confined in bed from an attack of typhoid fever, and ran into her own bedroom and swallowed carbolic acid. She died within an hour. Winstandley was shot in the side, the bullet passing thru his lung, but may recover.

MISSING MAYOR LOCATED.

Paterson, N.J., Aug. 11.—Public Prosecutor Emley of this city said to-day that Mayor Wm. H. Belcher of Paterson, who disappeared more than ten days ago, leaving his financial affairs in a bad way, had been located in Stockton, Cal. A warrant has been issued for the mayor's arrest on a charge of embezzlement.

C.P.R. CONDUCTOR KILLED.

Moore Jaw, N.W.T., Aug. 11.—Conductor W. E. Thompson of the C.P.R. was killed in the discharge of his duty at Osheila's gravel pit to-day. He fell from the top of a car and several other cars passed over his body.

WILL CITY PAY COST OF TRACKS?

Attitude of C.P.R. on Ashbridge Marsh May Bring This About.

The city engineer's pet project to turn the unprofitable wastes of Ashbridge's Marsh into a hive of activity, has received something of a facer in the communication from General Manager McColl, to the effect that the railway does not care to go ahead for the present. The outcome of this attitude of the C. P. R. will probably be, according to Mr. Rust, the bringing up again before the works committee, of the proposition that the city undertake to lay down the tracks itself. Mr. Rust referred to the matter having been brought before council a year ago, when it was turned down on the ground of too great expense.

MOVE TO IMPEACH PALMA.

Havana, Aug. 11.—The Liberals are preparing a manifesto, telling of facts on the part of the government alleged to be unconstitutional. The Liberal congressmen are directed to lay before the senate charges against President Palma to the effect that he has been guilty of various acts not warranted by the constitution. The Liberals, however, have not strength enough in the senate to bring President Palma to trial.

VERY COUSINLY FEELING.

Australian Journalist Seeks Idea of Antipathetic Sentiment.

Montreal, Aug. 11.—(Special.)—The cable stating that Australia was feeling badly against Canada was shown G. C. Leslie, who is a reporter of The Corona Free Press, New South Wales, and gives the impression of being thoroughly informed re affairs in the island continent.

NEW TREATY WITH GERMANY.

Present Tariff Arrangement Ends Next March. Washington, Aug. 11.—The Post to day says, on the authority of a high government official, that, in view of the prospect of heavy losses to the Chinese boycott and the decision of the German government to end the tariff arrangement in effect which the United States and Germany now operate, President Roosevelt has partially decided to negotiate an entirely new treaty of amity and commerce with Germany and to submit it to the senate at the next session for ratification.

CHILDREN SAVE HOUSE.

Barriade Door After Cyclone Blows Roof Off. Kenora, Aug. 10.—Hawatha Lodge, the summer home of W. H. Cross of the C.P.R., a mile and a half south of Keewatin, on the lake shore, was partially wrecked by a cyclonic storm on Wednesday evening. The veranda, which was 200 feet away, and the girders and posts, nine to twelve inches square, were blown away. Mr. and Mrs. Cross were away sailing at the time, and four children were alone in the house. Only the presence of mind of the latter in barricading the main door saved the house from being demolished.

WORLD PRIZES CANADA FOR PATRIOTIC OFFER

After a Chequered Session British Parliament Prorogues Till October 30.

London, Aug. 11.—Parliament was prorogued this morning after a chequered session, which will long be remembered for the unprecedented number of votes of censure and motions for adjournment moved with a view to the embarrassment of the government.

The session produced two measures of sociological interest—the Aliens Act and the Unemployed Workmen Act, the latter creating facilities for the providing of work and wages for all able-bodied applicants—and the conflict between the Scottish churches was also settled. Otherwise, the work of the session was mostly of a routine character.

Not more than 50 members of the house of commons assisted at to-day's closing scene. The Black Rod summoned them to the house of lords, where there were only two peers, besides the three royal commissioners. The lord high chancellor, the Earl of Halsbury, read King Edward's speech, the most interesting clause of which, from an interesting point of view, referred to the peace negotiations and the Swedish appearance in the Baltic.

Regarding the peace negotiations, the speech says: "Negotiations, due to the outbreak of the Crimean war, and the United States, are about to be entered upon between the Russian and Japanese governments, for the purpose of terminating the deplorable conflict which has lasted for so long a time. It is my earnest hope that they may lead to lasting and mutually honorable peace."

Concerning the Swedish situation, the speech says: "A dislocation of the union between Sweden and Norway is imminent. It is an event that, by the exercise of moderation on each side, a settlement will be arrived at which will be acceptable to both countries, and that it will be of such a nature as to enable my government to maintain with the people of the Scandinavian Peninsula the same friendly relations which have prevailed in the past."

The speech refers to the continued friendly relations with the powers, and cordially hopes that the outcome of Italy to the settlement of the international institute dealing of service to agriculturists, both at home and abroad.

It is a patriotic offer of Canada, to assume responsibility for the defence of Halifax and Esquimaux, which is in the course of being considered. Otherwise, the speech was of no general interest.

Parliament was nominally adjourned to Oct. 30, when it will be further adjourned.

BURNED AT THE STAKE.

Negro Charged With Assault Pays Penalty Fixed by Mob. Sulphur Springs, Texas, Aug. 11.—A negro, charged with assaulting the daughter of a widow near this place, was caught and burned at the stake on the Court House square today. The assault was committed by the negro early this morning. When the town was alerted, about a half dozen posse of armed horsemen immediately set out in pursuit of the assailant. The country was scoured in all directions, and the negro was finally captured. He was chained to a stake, and burned before an immense crowd of excited citizens. The name of the negro was not given. Little resistance was made by the officers.

BURIED UNDER FALLING WALL.

Syracuse, N. Y., Aug. 11.—Bert McGuire, 28 years old, was crushed to death to-day at the high school in that village. McGuire and a companion sought shelter from the rain in the basement of the school. McGuire sat close to a brick wall, behind which he hid. The man with him heard the wall cracking, and got away. McGuire was caught by the falling wall, and buried under bricks and coal. He was dead when taken out.

QUEEN'S SCHOLARSHIPS.

Kingston, Aug. 11.—The senior matriculation scholarships of Queen's, worth from \$200 to \$250, have been awarded. Those receiving them are: Clare McDonald, Dutton; H. MacDonnell; S. H. Henry; D. D. Barter; Kingston; G. MacDonald, Ethel; G. W. Brockville; W. J. Skirrow, Waterloo; and H. Black, Fergus. In junior matriculation, the winners of from \$200 to \$100 are: Harry L. MacDonnell, St. John's; W. Hamilton, Elizabeth; H. Newton, Hamilton; Miss Gabel, New. Williamstown, gets the \$300 scholarship for Glengarry candidates.

ESCAPES FROM CONSTABLES.

Chatham, Aug. 11.—(Special)—There was much excitement in Blenheim yesterday when Harry Cox, who was captured after exciting chase, was freed, escaped from two of the local constables in the presence of a large crowd of spectators. Cox was handcuffed at the time, but this did not prevent his making good his escape. He has not been seen since.

CANADIAN PLANT NEEDED.

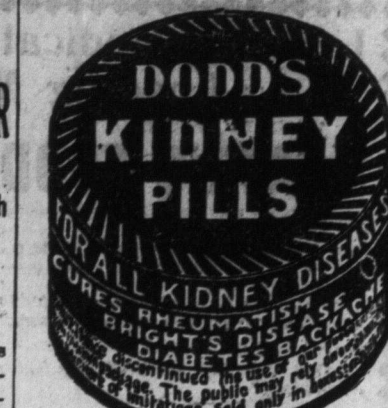
