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THE FIGHTING WAS DESPERATE FOR THE FIRE FIGHTERS

Fighting Which Led to the Capture of Tien Tsin on July 14 Fully Described.

FOUR THOUSAND CHINESE TROOPS

Victoria, B.C., Aug. 6.—More details of the desperate fighting between the allies and the Chinese which led to the capture of the native walled city of Tien Tsin on July 14 have been received by the steamer Argyle, which left Yokohama on July 18, two days after the siege.

The walled city, which is referred to by the Japanese as "Castles," was captured by the allied forces after a struggle in which the assailants had about a thousand men killed and wounded. It appears that the Chinese had their main positions in the walled city and in the western and eastern arsenals. But for the purpose of bombarding the fortress, the Japanese were in the habit of advancing to the rear of the city and its environs. The latter positions and the western arsenal appear to have been taken by the Japanese, and the Chinese stationed there maintained such a destructive cannonade that the allied commanders determined to storm the place.

On July 4 a vigorous attack was made on them with twenty-two guns, two of which, British naval 12-pounders, seemed to be very effective. In this attack the Japanese were temporarily silenced, but only temporarily. They resumed their firing as soon as they were dislodged. For that purpose a column of about 500 men, consisting of Japanese, 800 British, 400 Russians and 100 Americans, was formed and advanced to the walled city. The attacking column had guns, and was accompanied by a squad of British engineers. PREVENTION OF TUBERCULOSIS.

An Interesting Article By Dr. J. Cassidy in the Canadian Journal of Medicine and Surgery.

To put it briefly, while the bacillus tuberculosis is the efficient cause of consumption, that pathogenic microbe will not feed on the lungs of a sound person, no more, to speak by analogy, will the streptococcus develop a tonsillitis, unless some intercurrent disorder has lowered the patient's normal power of resistance.

In attempting to arrest the progress of the microbe of tuberculosis, the two most effective remedies are a constant supply of pure air and a sufficiency of nutritive food.
