ONTARIO'S LIBRARIANS.

A Society Formed to Promote the Welfare of Libraries in the Province.

At the Normal School on Monday afternoon, about two dozen delegates assembled to organize a new association of Ontario librarians.

The aim of the society is to promote the welfare of the libraries by stimulating public interest in founding and improving them, and in securing legislation which will give improved results in library work.

It is a co-operative body for the exchange of views and the advancement of the most interests of those engaged in library and educational work. Any person engaged in library work as trustee, director or librarian is eligible for membership, and the annual fee is placed at \$2.

When the business portion of the meeting was concluded, two papers were read. "Modern Library Methods and Applications," by Miss Lois Sanderson, of Etobicoke, and "The Character of Books for a Small Library," by W. H. Keller, of Leaside.

The delegates present were: James Blair, Jr., of Toronto; E. H. Langton, of Blackwell; W. G. Eakin, of M. Nutting, of Malvern; E. W. McMillan, Miss (Mrs.) E. B. THE DEAL AS IT SHOULD BE.

We take a final opportunity to state how the proposed interchange of traffic between the city and suburban railway systems should be effected.

The basic principle of our proposition is that the rights of the City of Toronto to control its own streets and the franchise of the Toronto Railway Company should not be disturbed in the least.

We have an instance of the practical working out of the system that we propose in the operation of the cars between Munn Park and the city.

Passengers taken up beyond the city limits and conveyed to any point within the city, this is a practical exemplification of the principle which the Metropolitan Railway is asking.

If the Toronto and the Toronto Scarborough Railway can come to an agreement as to the interchange of passenger traffic between Munn Park and the city they can do so between Whitby and Toronto or between any other point on the Toronto & Scarborough line and Toronto.

The City of Toronto is not objecting to the interchange of traffic or to the principle involved. If the Toronto and the Metropolitan Railway are disposed to make an agreement as to interchange of cars they can do so just as they have done in the case of the Toronto Scarborough Railway.

There is no occasion for either of them to apply to the Legislature for the right, nor to the city. No one will prevent them from uniting their tracks or from using the same rolling stock.

It is not the City of Toronto that is insisting that this common rolling stock be used in that the common rolling stock will always be under the control and management of the Toronto Railway while it is within the city limits.

Young Englishman's Death Reveals Sad Life Story of Thomas Fawcett, a Wanderer.

New York, April 8.—Death has revealed the life history of a young Englishman, Thomas C. Fawcett, civil and mechanical engineer, formerly a member of the firm of Thomas Fawcett & Co., limited, owners of the Whitehouse Engineering Works, Leeds, England, who died on the 29th of his parents in Elizabeth Street, N.Y., aged 38 years.

He drifted to Greenpoint, L.I., where his big secured him a position as a contractor. He was a good deal of a gambler, and was wrecked by the dissipated life he had led, and for the last few years he had been unable to work on the allowance left him by his father.
