The shortsightedness of the British Admiralty was never more manifest than in this proposed extinction of the naval reserve of Newfoundland. The first contingent of men enrolled last November, after a six months' cruise in the Charybdis, proved even more competent men than the ordinary blue-jacket. In sailor work, steering and boat management they beat the ablest blue-jackets on the warship. In a naval regatta at Barbados they gained two races and one second place out of the three events for which they were eligible, competing against picked crews from the nine ships of Admiral Bedford's fieet. Their success and the fact that they came back with money and uniforms, besides looking the perfection of manhood, so stirred up the youthful nishermen of the colony that the Charybdis could have had 300 men this year. The Admiralty could easily raise and train a force of 5000 reservists in this colony, and to them, in the event of a great naval war, the defence of the Canadian seaboard might well be left.



John Armstrong Hanged Himself, After Finding His Wife Dead in Bed.

SON MAKES AWFUL DISCOVERY.

Sad and Strange Circumstances Surrounding Yesterday Afternoon,s Tragedy on Defoe-st.

John Armstrong hanged himself in the cellar of his home at 54 Defoe-street yesterday afternoon and his wife, Jane, was found dead in bed. It was plainly evident that the man had suicided, but the cause of the woman's death will be sought when a post-mortem examination is made to

Armstrong was about 55 years of age and his wife apparently 10 years younger. They had been married for over 20 years and according to the stories of those who knew them well they were remarkably fond of each other. The surmise is that when Armstrong went home he found his wife dead and in the intensity of his grief went down to the cellar and ended his existence. Son's Awful Discovery.

The tragedy was discovered by their sen Herbert, a bright lad about 16 years

old. He returned from work at the trunk factory at about 5 o'clock and the house was quiet. He knew his mother was in bed, but was not aware that his father was in the house. It is his custom to light the fire and prepare the supper and when he went to the cellar for wood he found his father hanging from the rafters by a double strand of rope. The celling of the cellar is only about 6 feet high and the dead man's feet touched the floor sufficiently to leave the body in a half kneel-

ence. Detective Porter is investigating all the circumstances.






