



LET IT BE CLEARED UP.

Editor World: Referring to the recent meeting of manufacturers at Berlin to discuss the getting of power from Nagara Falls, permit me to point out that the Ontario government, thru the Niagara Falls Park Commissioners, has bound itself not to develop power except for park purposes, that is running a merry-goround or ice cream freezer, etc., within the park at the Falls. This is the clause in the agreement with the Canadian Niagara Power Company to which I refer: Report of Commissioners, 1899, page 16. Paragraph 9 of the agreement of April 7, 1892 shall hereafter and henceforth be mult and of no effect, it being agreed that the Commissioners will not themselves engage in making use of the water to generate electric or pneumatic power, except for the purposes of the park. I would like the proper authorities to explain what this means. If the people of Ontario have actually given up their rights in this water power, what consideration did they receive for same? The government has already refused the right-to a municipality to bring power from the Falls, and if it has bound itself not to develop the power there is nothing for Commissioners, has bound itself not velop the power there is nothing for us to do but to take the power from private corporations or do without it. by the agreement referred to, but, on the face of it, it appears to be, and I think the public would be interested in having the matter cleared up.




