enact a law that would practically place the bona fide legitimate trades unionist of America in the same category with the unscrupulous laborer who would like to tear it down. The testimony taken by the Dominion commission in British Columbia sets forth clearly the nature of the organization which is a detective in the employ of the railway company, and while the testimony does not show that the Executive Council is pursuing, the language he employs and the miserable means of his substance and the substance of his so-called organization would indicate that he has some source of support generally unknown. The course he is pursuing would further indicate that he is doing his level best to carry out the purpose of a subtle antagonist to bring censure on the name of organization and thereby attempt to destroy or disrupt it. While such an act might seem to be generally for the benefit of the people and the people generally a very great injury by reason of the denial of a natural and legal right, and thereby do grievous injury to all. "It must cause a sting of indignation and outraged justice towards the honest, legitimate trades unions of the American continent have pursued, and which is acknowledged in the Royal Commission's report, that we should be classified and come under the category of such organizations as the 'contaminated' of the civilized world."

Further, Mr. Gompers stated that it may not be generally known that the so-called United Brotherhood of Railway Employees made application to the American Federation of Labor in 1902, for a charter, and that the Executive Council, then in session at San Francisco, peremptorily refused to recognize it in any way. "We regard the attempted formation of this body as inimical to the best interests of working people everywhere, as will be seen by reference to the minutes of the Executive Council of July, 1902, and published in the October, 1902, American Federationist."

MOST NOTABLE OF THE YEAR
BALFOUR'S FISCAL BOOKLET

Vindicates His Reputation as a Respecting Leader - Some Guesses at the Situation.

London, Sept. 25.—Mr. Balfour has written an interesting and most profitable book of the year. His "Economic Notes in Insular Free Trade," just published, is obviously destined to have an immense sale, and the newspapers are allowed to advertise it by printing extracts restricted to a thousand words. It is a political manifesto sold for a shilling, and since there are only twenty-eight pages of large type, increased in a paper cover, the margin of profit ought to be wide enough to admit of generous royalties. It is a novel expedient for a Prime Minister—the publication of a shilling booklet, which has been confidentially submitted to a select body of sympathetic or controversial readers—the members of the British cabinet, and it fits in with the Newcastle program of guinea tickets for admission to Mr. Chamberlain's addresses, educational masses. It is also an interesting experiment in the application of literary methods to political matters, and the fact that it is now the authorized spokesman of fiscal reform for the Unionist party, has the distinctive quality of the same famous "Defence of Philosophic Doubt" and the "Foundations of Belief." It has dignity of style, gravity of exposition and an admirable reasonableness in examining the accepted traditions and dogmas of Cobdenism. It is an unmistakable bit of good literature and since political managers, wipers and voters will be forced to buy the pamphlet and to read it with Chamberlain's addresses, it may be said to have had a hardy fall to be wholesome.

Has Vindicated His Reputation.
The Prime Minister has just written a successful little book which will yield him handsome royalties, he has vindicated his reputation as a self-respecting leader, capable of making up his mind on the most important questions in English public life. He has not explained, but he has not denied, his improvised scheme of preferential tariffs based upon the taxation of imported food, politics in the market, and Lansdowne's argument in favor of retaliation and reciprocity, and that was life interest, but she claims absolute title. 



Primary receipts of wheat to-day, 951,322 bushels; shipments, 265,883; last year, 1,368,092; shipments, 261,889; estimates of receipts at Chicago to-morrow: Wheat, 10 cars; corn, 485 cars; oats, 100 cars.

MEMBERS MUST GET PASSES

Sir Mackenzie Bowell Would Rather See Them Prohibited Altogether.

Ottawa, Sept. 25.—(Special).—Senator McDonald of Prince Edward Island failed in his efforts to modify the clause in the railway bill relating to passes so as to make the issuing of passes to members of parliament optional, instead of compulsory. He moved his amendment in the Upper House to-day. Sir Mackenzie Bowell seconded the motion. He said he did not believe that the votes of members of parliament are affected by passes, and he felt certain that passes should not be made compulsory. He would rather see them prohibited. The amendment was lost, whereupon Sir Mackenzie moved to exempt members of the Senate from the operation of the clause. This motion was also lost.

McMillen and Bowell. Senator Watson tried to restore the clause affecting stray cattle on the highways to the form in which it left the Commons. He pointed out that every possible precaution against depredation which would be taken by cattle to get on the track, and to protect the farmer, the company and the travelling public, had been taken.
