## ANNUAL REPORT.

---

A review of the last year offers but scanty material for the basis of a report.

The Managers have pleasure in stating that the calls upon their resources during the season now closed were comparatively light, when contrasted with those of the four years immediately preceding. As the Managers do not profess to be political economists, they venture no opinion upon the cause of this satisfactory result, but are content to ascribe it to the generally improved condition of the country.

There are always cases of chronic poverty, which no amount of relief will ever satisfy—as some one says, “he who finds the beggar’s staff once get warm in his hand, never does any good, but a great amount of evil.” The Managers have the good or bad fortune to be purveyors to a number of such cases: in fact it may be said that a large proportion of the present recipients belong to a class which may justly be considered the natural consequence of improvidence, or intemperance. When one individual disappears from the ranks, another soon steps forward to claim the vacant place, and thus the full regimental strength is constantly maintained.

Although the present season opened rather inauspiciously, it is gratifying to note that applications for relief have, thus far, been much below the usual average.

The Associated City Charities are doing a good work, as is evident from the marked abatement of the tramp nuisance. The object of this Association is to provide work for those

who are able and willing to work. They desire also to prevent the existence or formation of a pauper class, and solicit the co-operation of citizens in refusing alms at the door, or in the street. They recommend that such applicants be referred to their Secretary, and deprecate the asking of alms for special cases by advertisement in the city papers. This Institution is represented on their Board by Rev. Dr. King, Rev. D. J. Macdonnell, and Mr. Alderman Love.

Our Act of Incorporation (page 4) provides that any Trustee "who shall be absent for twelve months from the city, or who shall neglect to attend to any of the business of the Institution for six consecutive months, when not absent from the city, shall be considered to have vacated his seat, and that such vacancy shall be filled by the subscribers at their next Annual Meeting." It is much to be regretted that gentlemen, whose other engagements will not permit them to devote any time to the weekly meetings, where the real work of the House is done, are occasionally elected; their non-attendance at those meetings not only increases the responsibility of members who do attend, but jeopardises timely relief to the poor, and furnishes the public with just cause for complaint. It is strongly recommended that no gentleman, who cannot spare sufficient time for the proper discharge of the duties he undertakes, be henceforth chosen Trustee or Manager,

The Board record, with deep regret, the death of the Very Reverend Dean Grasett, whose name appears first in the Act of Incorporation, 2nd August, 1851. The late Dean was an active associate, for many years Chairman, and always displayed much interest in the welfare of the Institution.

During the last summer the Board sustained a loss, by the

removal of the Rev. Dr. Potts to another sphere of duty. Dr. Potts was a zealous worker in the field of charity, and a good friend to the poor: his late associates wish him God speed wheresoever his lot may be cast.

The Managers have also to announce the retirement from the offices of Superintendent and Matron (after a service of twenty-five years), of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Duckett, to whose credit it must be stated, that during that long interval their duties were performed with exemplary devotedness, and to the satisfaction of the various classes with whom they were brought in contact. In recognition of their services, the Managers had much pleasure in presenting to Mr. and Mrs. Duckett a testimonial, paid for by private subscription, as the funds of the House cannot properly be used for such a purpose. The peculiar knowledge acquired by Mr. Duckett during his long term of office must necessarily be of great value to the House; the Managers therefore recommend that he be elected a member of the incoming Board.

Mr. and Mrs. W. K. North, who entered upon their duties as Superintendent and Matron on the 1st of October last, have thus far discharged those functions in a satisfactory manner.

The Treasurer's accounts have received the usual audit, and are open to inspection, as are also the reports of the Medical Officer and Superintendent.

All which is respectfully submitted.

**MEDICAL OFFICER'S REPORT.**

On looking over the records of the House for the year 1882, I find that fifteen have died, whose ages average seventy-four years and seven months : the oldest being ninety-two and the youngest fifty-two years old.

Only one has died of acute disease ; but acute diseases have been much more prevalent in the House during this, than in former years.

I have visited the House one hundred and fifteen times. I have examined nearly every case before admission. I have treated several surgical cases arising from accident. I have made up with my own hands nine hundred and five prescriptions at a cost of twenty-nine dollars and fifty-eight cents for medicine, or an average of three cents for each prescription ; but in order to accomplish that, I have manufactured in the House the medicine most largely used.
