Temiskaming stock was the centre of interest and activity and within a few minutes after the opening of the Standard Exchange the price dropped as low as 74, a clear price dropped as low as 74, a clear break of 30 points from Saturday's a close.

statement of the Temiskaming Co., the opinions of those who are able to critistatement of the Termiskaming continuous of those who are able to criticise the statement have been that the position now taken by the directors of the company was the only course open. Up till Saturday it was thought possible that the company might cut the dividend in half with some show of reason, and this was partly responsible for holding the stock above the dollar mark. Thousands of shares were sold short by traders who expected the dividend to be passed and some attempt was made to cover these outstanding commitments to-day.

This is undoubtedly a big short interest, yet to be covered and unless more actual stock comes into the market a big advance might easily occur.


