BRITISH FORGE AHEAD NEAR PASSCHENDAELE

Gain Four Hundred Yards in Attack Delivered By Moonlight—Strong German Fortifications Are Captured.

BRITISH COUNTER-ATTACKS ROLL BACK GERMAN FORCES

Important Positions and Most of Lost Guns Recaptured—Many Germans Taken Prisoner in British Operations in Region of Cambrai.

With the British Army in France, Dec. 2.—The British yesterday and last night continued their counter-offensive operations in the Gonnelleu sector, which was overrun by the Germans Friday in an attempt to wrench off the salient which the British last week drove in about Bourlon Wood...

After recapturing Ganche Wood, the British continued their pressure in this region and pushed up still further on the higher ground to the southeast of the wood. One British tank captured 15 enemy machine guns in the assault on Ganche Wood...

The Germans this morning began a heavy shelling of the British entanglements at the position known as the Knoll, just south of Yserhuile, indicating the possibility of an impending attack in that vicinity.



BIG GERMAN OFFENSIVE WAS COMPLETE FAILURE

Enemy's Objective in Cambrai Attack Was Utterly Defeated—British Beat Nine Enemy Assaults on Saturday.

London, Dec. 2.—Nine separate attacks were made by the Germans yesterday on the Cambrai front near Masnières, the war office announced. They were all beaten off by the British, who inflicted heavy losses on the Germans.

Was German Defeat. London, Dec. 1.—The official report from British headquarters in France tonight says: "Reports from various sectors on the Cambrai battlefield together with captured orders and objective maps, enable the following account to be given of the battle which began yesterday morning."

"The enemy's intention was to deliver a simultaneous encircling attack with a large number of divisions and drive our troops from the important positions we had gained on Nov. 20. The following order was issued on Nov. 23 by General von Darnowicz, commanding the second German army: "Soldiers of the second army: The English, by throwing into the fight countless tanks on Nov. 20, gained victory near Cambrai. Their intention was to break thru, but they did not succeed in doing so, thanks to the brilliant resistance of our troops who were put into the line to check their advance."

"Owing to the magnificent defence and stubborn resistance of our troops the enemy advanced in masses in an encircling counter-attack. The fatherland is watching you and expects every man to do his duty." "Thus far the Germans have not renewed their attack either in the Gonnelleu region or the newly-won territory brought up heavily reinforced on yesterday's offensive, and that further attempts on their part to oust the British from the newly-won territory in the Cambrai sector were not expected. The Germans in their northern attack met a complete reverse at the hands of the counter-attacking British and the enemy suffered exceedingly heavy losses both in men killed and wounded. BRITISH REPEL GERMANS WITH HUGE CARNAGE

Nine Counter-Attacks Fall Down Like Wheat Before Wind.

QUITS MASNIERES

General Byng Removes Sharp Bulge by Evacuating Village.

With the British Army in France, Dec. 2.—Nine separate counter-attacks launched against Masnières by strong German forces yesterday, were all repulsed after most sanguinary fighting, although the British line back somewhat to lessen the sharp salient there. An intense battle raged all day and it is stated that the British killed more Germans between daylight and dark than in any similar period since the war began. It was practically a continuous fight from the start of the first counter-attack. The enemy infantry kept surging forward in waves and as each came up, it was caught by the fire from the artillery, rifles and machine guns. The attacking forces were mown down like wheat before the wind, but with characteristic Prussian discipline, they continued to fill their ranks and advance, until after the ninth assault had failed.

Suburb Recaptured. During the afternoon the Germans succeeded in capturing Les Rues Vertes, a suburb south of Masnières, but a British counter-attack delivered at five o'clock pushed the enemy out again. German guns on elevations south and southeast of Masnières late yesterday were conducting a heavy bombardment against the town. The British line at that time had...

ATTACKS BY TEUTONS ON ITALIANS BEATEN

Enemy Efforts to Advance in Piave Region Broken Down by Fire of Artillery.

Italian Army Headquarters in No. 10 Italy, Saturday, Dec. 1.—The enemy has again turned his attention to the lower Piave, where large forces of his infantry with machine guns have attempted to seal a lodgment inside the inundated triangle between the Piave and Old Piave. This inundated enemy out-look crossed later by several roads which stand just above the water, and taking advantage of this the enemy advanced his forces along these high stretches and given considerable trouble with sniping from the upper windows of farm houses. The Italian batteries west of the triangle and marine batteries at the mouth of the river have heavily shelled these movements along these roads crossing the inundated sector and the attempt to approach from that direction has been stopped.

PROTEST BY AMERICA

United States Tells Russia of Objection to Armistice.

Petrograd, Wednesday, Dec. 28.—Major General military attaché has been instructed by Ambassador Francis to make a protest on the part of the United States similar to that entered by the heads of the entente embassies here to the negotiations for an armistice between Russia and Germany. The commission to join the protest entered by the other allied ambassadors was due to the fact that it was based on the London agreement against a separate peace to which America is not a signatory.

RELIEVED OF HIS COMMAND.

Ottawa, Dec. 2.—The report is current here that Sir Arthur Currie, commander of the Canadian forces, has been relieved of his command. While the rumor has not been given confirmation, it appears to be accepted as probably true.
