GOOD AS FAR AS IT GOES

Hon. Raymond Prefontaine's scheme

for a naval militia has provoked some

sarcasm at the expense of the minister

and his colleagues. Within the past

six months we have heard it urged by

the Ottawa government and its friends

that Canada, having no foes, has no

need of a formidable militia. We have

been warned to beware of militarism

and now when it might fairly be assumed

that the heart of the nation has been

filled with a horror of implementing

our defenses along some Raymond

Prefontaine's scheme for a navy.

Militarism, it appears, has again

broken out in our beloved country, and

if by militarism is meant the organiza-

tion of an army and navy and the

Canada's wealth and position, The

World does not regret the outbreak.

The inconsistency of the Dominion govern-

ment in adding a navy to the arma-

ment of a country which is in no

danger of invasion is a scheme for

the waste of its resources in organizing

a naval militia. Rational Canadians

know that Canada is no freer from danger

of invasion than any other country in

the world. Every other nation of conse-

quence in the world has an army and

navy. For Canadians to assert the doc-

trine that we have no need of land

and naval forces is to practically

declare that every other nation in the

world is a fool, and that we alone are

wise. The contention is absurd on the

face of it, and has been put forward

merely as an excuse for failure to per-

form an obvious national duty.

Canada's defenses to-day are a dis-

grace to the country and wholly out of

proportion to the country's position in

the British empire. We pride our-

selves on having risen to the dignity of

a nation, yet we are content to accept

the protection of an army and navy

which other people pay for. We are

anxious to be known as the most im-

portant of all Britain's possessions, yet

if there was a call to arms to-morrow

little Australia would be able to far

eclipse Canada in rendering assistance

to the empire.

Canada does not surely want to be

known as a nation of sponges. We are

not bankrupt, either in money or self-

respect. The question then arises, is

Canada prepared to take those practical

trying not to have its obligations to the

fused to talk compromise. It has stood

boldly on its rights and has been re-

warded with an unbroken string of

victories. This new suggestion of a

conference, while apparently coming

mistake if it allows terms to be made

HOW THE CITY IS WHIPSAWED.

What have the railways to gain by

fighting Toronto at every turn? The

Yonge-street bridge is simply an in-

stance of what appears to be a steady

policy on the part of the Grand Trunk

and the C.P.R. to exact the pound of

flesh in all their dealings with the city.

Toronto is in a dilemma. In the same

spirit towards the railways. It has

given them valuable concessions on the

water front. It has met every reason-

able proposal made by them in a

conciliatory spirit. A notable illustration

of this was in the city's attitude

towards the expropriation of the first

freight property south of Front-street.

When the railways want something

from the city they are fond of pointing

out that the city and company have

common interest, and that they

have everything to gain by work-

ing in harmony. When the city

stands to get something which

appears favorable, as the case of the

Yonge-street bridge, the railway

companies forthwith resort to the

courts.

The railway companies' attitude

towards the Yonge-street bridge judg-

ment is altogether out of harmony with

the spirit of the city's surrender of

PERIL IN CRIME. London Spectator Says Increase in Menace to Civilization.

London, Nov. 27.—The Spectator, in a long article commenting on the great increase of crime in the United States in the last twenty years, regards the situation as a grave menace to civilization...
